While the Noblesville Street Department monitors roads daily, it also is asking for the public's help in reporting potholes. Any motorists that have seen the effects of winter weather are encouraged to report them so that the potholes can be repaired as soon as possible.

"The drastic change in temperatures we've seen in the past week wreaks havoc on roads," Noblesville Street Commissioner Patty Johnson said. "To combat this, the street department is out filling potholes every day as the weather allows, which means when it's not snowing or raining. We attempt to respond within 48 hours to any complaint." 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





Storm system could bring flooding to **Hamilton County**

A series of weather systems is expected to bring rain to Hamilton County through Thursday night. A total of 1 to 3 inches of rain will be possible with higher amounts in localized areas.

This will likely result in river and stream flooding, as well as flooding of some fields and roads.

The National Weather Service in Indianapolis has issued the following information:

- Flood Watch for portions of Central Indiana (which includes Hamilton County), East Central Indiana, South Central Indiana, Southeast Indiana, Southwest Indiana, and West Central Indiana.
- 1 to 3 inches of rain are expected through Friday
- · River flooding will be likely. Standing water in fields and along some area roads will be possible. This may result in driving difficulties or even possible road closures.

AG Curtis Hill asks U.S. Supreme Court Read it here, to rule on Indiana fetal ultrasound law

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill this week asked the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn a lower court's ruling on the constitutionality of an Indiana law requiring fetal ultrasounds at least 18 hours and childbirth at prior to abortions.

In July of 2018, a panel from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit enjoined the law - accepting Planned Parenthood's contention that it placed an undue burden on women seeking abortions. In this week's filing, however, Hill notes that the law essentially combines two Indiana statutes that have been on the books for years.

passed the informed-consent statute, specified that a woman must receive, in person, information relevant to abortion least 18 hours be-

fore an abortion. The U.S. Supreme Court upheld a similar statute in Planned Parenthood of Southeastern Pennsylvania v. Casev.

"If you are reading this in the paper, I'm gone. But let's start at the beginning. I was created by two happy socialists, Helmuth and Hjordis Rodewald, arriving on November 15, 1927 in Milwaukee, Wis. Shortly thereafter, the Great Depression reared its ugly head, causing massive problems for about every adult, but no big deal for this roust about preteen.

Living in socialist Milwaukee in the 1930s was like living in Disneyland. Out and about, starting at three years old, I had beautiful

parks, massive swimming pools (with diving boards), a super zoo and dazzling Lake Michigan, all within walking distance of my home. In the winter, the city would build skating rinks at possibly every third schoolyard, with warming huts. What's not to like? Having my dad's street car pass on the weekends made it even better.

In 1939, the Big War started in Europe, ending the Depression, but creating all kind of jobs for this eager teenager: Caddy at 12 years of age, pinsetter at 13, busboy at 14, fry-cook at 15, iceman at 16 (does anyone remember the cards in the front window telling the iceman how large a piece of ice was needed), steelworker at 17 (I had to join the Steelworker's union for this one), and taxicab driver for the rest of my school life.

At this point, I met Charlotte, the first of my three beautiful wives. She accepted my proposal with one caveat: 'You will return to the University of Wisconsin and complete your Engineering degree.' Three years later, we married and quickly had our three kids: Sue, Bob and Jim.

The U. of W. degree provided a path to Ralph Stahl of Stahl Engineering, and 55 years of selling Lindberg Heat Treat Furnaces: The best job that the Good Lord ever created.

With the loss of Charlotte, my life took a big dip, but was brought back to normal with my second wife, Pauline, who added two more kids to my growing flock: Mike and Trish. Stahl Engineering provided enough income to start three small businesses, travel the

world and buy an RV to see all the states. Another dip occurred with the loss of Pauline. The Internet came to my rescue and

gave me Carmela, my present delightful wife and super companion. Carmela also gave me my last child, Karen, her husband, Jeff Mallaber, and their special family.

Along the way, there were little things that made my day: Flying an airplane, skiing a mountain, snorkeling and spearing two lobsters with one shot, bidding and making a grand slam, sailing my little boat and playing drums in the 60-piece Shrine band (what a

Finally, after watching, listening and enjoying my eight grandchildren, and surely my four great-grandchildren (and counting), I'm convinced I'm immortal."







Third quarter spurt sends Huskies past Blackhawks

ARCADIA - After a close first half, Hamilton Heights went on a quick run of the third quarter to take control of its county rivalry game with Sheridan on Tuesday at the Huskies' gym.

Heights would go on to win 61-44. It was a nice beginning to what will be a busy week for the Huskies, as this was the first of three games they will host over the next few days.

"We're treating it like a sectional week," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "We played Tuesday night and we're going to play Friday night and play Saturday night, just like that same routine we play in sec-

The Blackhawks came out hot in the first quarter, jumping out to an 11-2 lead. Drake Delph scored four points, while Caleb Duke and Jesse Kolb both made a 3-pointer.

The Huskies went on an 8-0 run to get back within 11-10, with Cory Vonfeldt and Issiac Hickok both hitting 3s and Gus Etchison making a basket. Kyle Eden made a traditional three-point play for Sheridan with around a minute left, but AJ Field answered that with a 3-point basket, keeping Heights within 14-13 after one.

The 'Hawks led 17-13 a minute into the second quarter, before the Huskies went on a 10-0 run to lead 23-17. Hudson Hochstedler scored five points in that run. The Blackhawks managed to cut it to 26-24 by the halftime buzzer; Nick Burnell helped out with two late baskets.

"Sheridan was locked in, they did a very good job," said Ballenger, who admitted that his team came out flat. But it was all Heights run midway through the third to get within

The Huskies went on a 15-0 run to start the third quarter, scoring all those points in a two and a half minute span. Etchison got the first six points, all of them off of steals by various members of the team. Hickok drained a 3, then Etchison added five more

"We got out in the lanes, we denied," said Ballenger. Heights had six steals during the first few minutes of that third quarter.

"And that's how we want to play," said Ballenger. "Our guys just weren't real

focused to begin with. We're still working. We haven't been very good defensively on some nights."

The Blackhawks went on their own 8-0 43-34. Burnell scored six of those points, including two putbacks. Brent Pennington ended the run with a 3-pointer, and the Huskies used a 7-0 run that bridged the third and fourth periods to get back on top 53-36.
