DAR recognizes Good Citizens

The Horseshoe Prairie Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, recently recognized winners from Hamilton County high schools in the Good Citizens Program.

The program is intended to encourage and reward the qualities of good citizenship. It is open to all high school seniors enrolled in public or private schools accredited by their state board of education. United States citizenship is not required.

Students submit their essays on the topic of what good citizenship means to them. The student selected as the school's DAR Good

Citizen must have the qualities of dependability (which includes truthfulness, loyalty and punctuality); service (which includes cooperation, courtesy and consideration of others); leadership (which includes personality, self-control and ability to assume responsibility); and patriotism (which includes unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation) to an outstanding degree.

The essays are independently judged and each school's winning essayist receives a DAR Good Citizen pin, certificate, recognition card and a \$100 scholarship award. One student is selected as the overall

Fishers Plan Commission sends city council neutral recommendation on building ordinance change

The Fishers Plan Commission voted 8-1 Wednesday night, sending a neutral recommendation to the city council on a proposed text amendment to the city's Unified Development Ordinance. The proposal would require third-party inspections before a developer turns over common area improvements contained in housing developments to a Homeowners Association.

The no vote was cast by Plan Commission Member Brad DeReamer,

who is also a Fishers City Councilor.

DeReamer had offered a motion to send a favorable recommendation to the city council for approval of the ordinance amendment, but the motion died after no Plan Commission member was willing to second his motion.

The "no recommendation" motion that was approved means the Plan Commission is taking no position on the proposal at this time. Initially, Plan Commission Member Pete Peterson, who also serves on the city council, offered a motion to send an unfavorable recommendation to the city council, but at Plan Commission President Warren Harling's suggestion, Peterson changed his motion to a "no recommendation." Harling argued this mat-

ter needs to be studied and perhaps would come back as an ordinance amendment if needed in the future.

Rich Block, a Plan Commission and city council member, voiced opposition to the proposal, saying he is hesitant to add another layer of government to the building process. Peterson voiced the same argument.

DeReamer said he was elected to represent the people, and in his opinion the citizens want this change, adding that the City of Carmel has already enacted such an ordinance.

Kate Collins, representing the Builders Association of Greater Indianapolis (BAGI), said her group opposes this change because it puts government in the middle of private, contractual relationships.

Jonathon is a busy high school senior right now, attending J. Everett Light

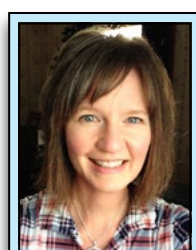
Career Center on weekday afternoons, working part-time at Pizza Hut, and completing scholarship applications. We don't often have long conversations.



I care, and I can go with you to talk to an adult who can help.



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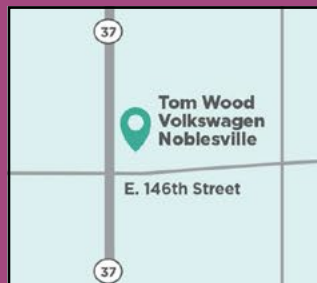


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I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about.

House supports Goodrich's bill improving virtual schools

The House of Representatives recently advanced legislation co-authored by State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) that would strengthen Indiana's virtual education programs.

Building off of recommendations made by the Indiana State Board of Education in 2018, the proposal would establish an onboarding process for virtual schools to help students and parents.

"Online programs can provide flexible learning options to accommodate

different learning styles and meet a child's particular needs," said Goodrich, a member of the House Education Committee. "Creating an annual orientation program would help students and parents get on the right track from the start, know what to expect and how to avoid common challenges of virtual education."

Goodrich said this proposal would also require virtual charter schools to

be managed by a statewide authorizer like the Indiana Charter School Board or a state university, providing a more consistent and higher level of accountability for virtual programs. Similar to school boards, authorizers oversee the operations of charter schools.

Currently, school corporations can establish virtual charter schools with their own rules and regulations,

but Goodrich said consistent oversight is lacking. According to Goodrich, some virtual charter schools have struggled to meet Indiana's academic standards, and he said this proposal would help improve accountability statewide for virtual education programs.

House Bill 1172 can now be considered by the Senate. To learn more, visit iga.in.gov.

Bill to raise smoking age to 21 moves out of Health committee, Ways and Means endorses vaping tax

The legal age to buy tobacco and vaping liquids in Indiana would be raised to 21 and the state would start taxing those e-cigarette materials under bills advancing in the legislature.

The Indiana Senate Health Committee voted 8-2 Wednesday to advance a bill raising the minimum age from 18 to 21 to buy cigarettes, other tobacco products or e-liquids. It also would prohibit anyone younger than

18 from buying or possessing vaping liquids even if they didn't contain nicotine.

Supporters say raising the age could improve the state's health as fewer people start smoking.

The House Ways and

Means Committee endorsed a 4 cents per milliliter vaping liquid tax. Vaping business officials argue the tax could hurt the industry, but the bill sponsor says it aims to tax the liquids similarly as cigarettes.

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Girls basketball regionals

Royals take on Fort Wayne Carroll in first round at Kokomo

For the first time in 12 years, the Hamilton Southeastern girls basketball team is playing in a regional.

The Royals will travel to the Class 4A Kokomo regional on Saturday to play Fort Wayne Carroll in the day's first game at 10 a.m. Zionsville and Homestead will play immediately afterwards in the second semi-final, with the championship game at 8 p.m.

So just how long is 12 years for Southeastern? The Royals won their last championship during the 2006-07 school year, during which this year's seniors were in kindergarten. This year's sectional title was the fourth in school history for Southeastern; the Royals also won in 1999, 2006 and 2007. Southeastern also won a regional title in 2006.

Fort Wayne Carroll comes into the regional after winning its third straight sectional championship. The Chargers had been having an up-and-down season, starting out 4-0, then losing four in a row late in the season. But Carroll stepped up in the DeKalb sectional, beating Snider 49-42, East Noble 52-32 and Northrop 61-48 to claim the program's ninth sectional title.

The Royals played the Chargers earlier in the season, on Nov. 17, winning 62-22. Since then, Southeastern has rolled to a 23-1 record, with its only loss to Ryle, one of the top teams in Kentucky. The Royals then won their own sectional by beating Fishers 36-27 and Carmel 47-34.

Carroll is 14-10 for the season. The Chargers are led in scoring by sophomore Emily Parrett, who is averaging 12.9 points per game. Two junior players are chipping in over nine points per contest: Olivia Hoepfner is scoring 9.4 points per game and Malia Williams is averaging 9.3 per game. Williams is the team's top 3-point shooter, making 38 triples out of 118 attempts for 32.2 percent.

Junior Audrey Freeland leads the rebounding with 4.2 per game and is also Carroll's top shooter, making 49.5 percent of her field goals. Hoepfner has the most steals this season with 82 (3.6 per game) as well as the most assists with 78 (3.4 per

game), and is the leading free throw shooter at 75.3 percent.

The Royals' leading scorer is junior Sydney Parrish, a varsity player for HSE since her freshman year. The heavily-recruited Parrish is averaging 20.9 points per game and passed the 1,000-point mark for her career earlier in the season. Parrish leads the Royals in almost all the statistical categories: She is a 50.4 percent field goal and 39.4 percent 3-point shooter, is averaging 7.0 rebounds, 2.7 assists and 1.8 steals per game.

Southeastern's senior class contains four four-year varsity players. Amaya Hamilton

is averaging 12.2 points and 6.8 rebounds per game, while Malea Jackson scores 9.8 points per game and has made 41 3-pointers this season. Tayah Irvin is a strong presence on defense, and Molly Walton is able to contribute solid minutes as well. Both Irvin and Walton average 4.0 rebounds per game, with Irvin totaling 32 steals this season and Walton 31. Junior Jackie Maulucci scores 7.6 points per game, and sophomore Lydia Self is a rising star; she also averages 4.0 rebounds per game.

The second semi-final at Kokomo features two teams that made the state championship game in the past two years. Homestead won state in 2017, while Zionsville was the runner-up in 2018, falling to Warren Central.

The Eagles are 18-8 and won their own sectional, beating Lafayette Jefferson 78-60, Kokomo 67-28 and Harrison 62-26. Zionsville was instantly boosted by the return of senior Maddie Nolan, who had been injured for most of the season, but came back for the Eagles' regular-season finale. Already in those four games, Nolan averaged 13.5 points.

Sophomore Katey Richason is scoring at a 13.7 points per game clip, with senior Delaney Richason adding 10.8 points. Katey Richason pulls 7.1 rebounds per game, and senior Megan Sheridan is averaging 7.0 per game.

Homestead is 24-3 for the season and also won its own sectional, defeating Fort Wayne Wayne 76-13 and Fort Wayne South Side 63-36. The Spartans recently were three-time regional champions, winning in 2015-16-17 and culminating in a state title in 2017, where they beat Pike 61-54.

Freshman Ayanna Patterson is already a 6-foot-3 force: She is averaging 12.9 points and 7.7 rebounds per game. Senior Sylare Starks is scoring at an 11.1 points per game clip and hands out 4.0 assists, and junior Syndey Graber contributes 10.0 points and

6.2 rebounds.

Pacers make it a Los Angeles sweep with win over Clippers

Two nights after crushing the Lakers in a 42-point rout, the Pacers defeated Los Angeles' other NBA franchise in similarly convincing fashion.

Indiana (36-19) rolled to its fourth straight win, easily handling the shorthanded Clippers (30-26) on Thursday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 116-92.

Bojan Bogdanovic led all scorers with 29 points in the victory, going 12-for-19 from the field and 3-for-6 from 3-point range while also pulling down six rebounds.

"I've never been in this situation, to be a starter and one of the (primary scoring threats) on the team," Bogdanovic said. "That's given me a lot of confidence to shoot the ball the way I'm shooting right now."

Myles Turner and Thaddeus Young, meanwhile, were two-way forces. Turner had 17 points on 7-of-8 shooting (3-of-3 from 3-point range) while tying career highs with four steals and six blocks. And two

nights after coming within two assists of his first career triple-double, Young again stuffed the stat sheet, finishing with 14 points, five rebounds, four assists, and five steals in just 23 minutes.

Despite having just 10 active players after making a flurry of trades before Thursday's afternoon deadline, the Clippers got off to a strong start. The visitors made their first 11 shots on Thursday, but the Pacers hung close thanks to five Los Angeles turnovers over that stretch and some hot shooting of their own.

Indiana eventually made it front, going 16-for-23 from the field in the opening frame and getting nine points from center Turner while taking a 36-31 lead into the second quarter.

Even an unexpected delay didn't slow down either team in the first quarter. A rogue bat made its way down to the court, causing the referees to stop play with 6:39 remaining as staffers did their best to chase the winged creature out of the building.

"I didn't even know Indiana had bats,"

Turner said after the game.

"That was probably the best part of the game," Bogdanovic joked.

The Blue & Gold opened up the game with a 13-0 run midway through the second quarter. The sequence featured a Turner 3-pointer and Young dunk before being capped by back-to-back threes from Bogdanovic, sending the home crowd into its first non-bat frenzy of the night.

"We've got a good thing going on the offensive end," point guard Darren Collison said after the win. "We're making shots. (It's) not necessarily something you want to rely on, but when you're making shots you want to keep that momentum going."

"But I think most importantly our defense has been contagious."

Indiana shot 66 percent from the field and scored a season-high 71 in the first half, taking an 18-point lead into halftime.

The lead continued to grow after the break, as the Pacers extended their advantage to as many as 27 points in the third quarter.

The only real drama of the third quarter was the bat's brief return to floor level, causing another brief delay before it ascended back up into its bat-cave in the rafters of The Fieldhouse.

The outcome was all but decided by the time the quarter buzzer sounded, with the hosts holding a 98-73 advantage.

Bogdanovic was the only starter to see the court in the fourth quarter as the Blue & Gold cruised to another victory.

Collison and Cory Joseph were the final two Pacers players to reach double figures. Collison had 14 points and five assists, while Joseph added 13 points, nine rebounds, and six assists off the bench.

Montrezl Harrell led the Clippers with 19 points on 9-of-13 shooting and four rebounds. Danilo Gallinari added 12 points and five rebounds in the loss.

The Pacers continue a five-game homestand on Saturday night, when they welcome the Cleveland Cavaliers to The Fieldhouse. Indiana also hosts Charlotte and Milwaukee next week before the NBA All-Star break.
