## Carmel mayor's trash used for political agenda

### The REPORTER

The Reporter has learned a handwritten thank you note was taken from Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard's trash, which was on private property, not on the curb for collection.

A note expressing thanks for the mayor's attendance at a campaign event for Adam Aasen, candidate for Carmel City Council, Southeast District, was posted on social media at approximately 9 a.m. Friday morning.

Aasen told The Reporter the note was intended to express support for the mayor's re-election campaign and did not indicate he would unilaterally support all Brainard's policies, which is what the social media poster indicated.

"The mayor attended an event and I mailed him a handwritten thank you note," Aasen said. "I make it a policy to send handwritten notes to anyone who attends my events."

While Mayor Brainard was unavailable for comment Friday afternoon, Allan Sutherland, retired campaign advisor and long-time political consultant to Brainard,

was available.

Sutherland said he saw the original note while visiting Mayor Brainard at his home Sunday evening. Sutherland also confirmed that this is not only a matter of going through someone's garbage but of allegedly trespassing to do so.

"When it was posted I was on the phone with the mayor," Sutherland said. "The mayor was at an international energy conference in Colorado as a speaker. He said, 'I don't know how they got that unless they took it out of my trash. And if they took it out of my trash they trespassed because my trashcan is not on the street.'"

Sutherland told The Reporter, "I just have to say that I'm disappointed. I thought we were above this."

The original poster, whom this newspaper chooses not to name, later confirmed on social media that he had "staked out the mayor's trash" for two weeks.

## Noblesville Police Department honors officers, NWMS staff

The Noblesville Police Department presented three medals of valor, four lifesaving awards, a Purple Heart medal and distinguished citizen service awards to Noblesville West Middle School staff at an awards ceremony on Thursday.

"You never know what the next call will be or what the situation is when you are the first to arrive on scene" Police Chief Kevin Jowitt said. "We have an extraordinary group of officers protecting our community and these officers went above and beyond the call of duty to save lives and make a lasting impact."

Noblesville West Middle School teacher Jason Seaman and school nurse Megan Schlueter were given the NPD's Distinguished Citizen Service Award for their heroic actions on May 25. This award is the highest honor the police department can bestow to a civilian.

"Jason Seaman distinguished himself through personal bravery and in-

trepidness at the risk of his own life without hesitation, as he apprehended an armed assailant in his classroom. His extraordinary acts in the face of personal danger and his professional response during the incident are to be commended," Jowitt said, adding this

was the first time the award has been given since he became police chief. "Megan Schlueter's actions in this incident, while under extreme duress, demonstrated her commitment to providing the highest standard of patient care."

The department also dis-

tinguished school resource officers Patrolman Michael Steffen and Sgt. Andrew Reiss by awarding them with the Lifesaving Award for outstanding police performance in the saving of a human life on May 25.

## Single vehicle crash results in death of Cicero man

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is investigating a single vehicle crash which resulted in the death of an individual early Friday morning. First responders were dispatched to the area of 225th Street and Hinkle Road in northern Hamilton County shortly after 12:30 a.m. on Friday on the report a vehicle inverted approximately 1,000 feet east of the intersection.

The initial crash investigation indicates a 1998 silver Dodge Ram pickup truck was westbound on 225th Street east of Hinkle Road when for unknown reasons it crossed the center line and ran off the roadway into a ditch before rolling onto its roof. The driver of the vehicle, identified as Travis L. Tridle, 32, Cicero, was pinned under the ve-

hicle during the crash and was pronounced dead at the scene. It is unknown if he was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash.

No other people were in the vehicle at the time of the crash and there were no witnesses, so investigators are still working to determine the cause of the crash. Per policy, toxicology tests were performed to determine if alcohol or other substances contributed to the fatal crash; however, test results are pending and may take some time to be returned.

The incident is under investigation by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Team. Anyone with information pertaining to the crash is asked to contact the team through Hamilton County Public Safety Communications at 317-773-1282.

### Medal of Valor

**Master Patrolman Matthew Johnston & Sgt. Jordan Granger**

The officers demonstrated heroism in the face of danger on Nov. 11, 2018, when they responded to the 5500 block of East 146th Street in reference to a motor vehicle crash.

Once on the scene, Johnston and Granger observed a vehicle approximately 130 feet into the pond that was beginning to sink. The air temperature on this particular evening was 36 degrees and the water temperature was estimated to be approximately 40 degrees. The officers removed their duty gear and began to swim towards the vehicle.

Once there, both officers worked to breakout the rear window and to remove the driver from the vehicle. The three were assisted back to the shore with the assistance of the fire department, transported to area hospitals and treated for signs of hypothermia.

### Medal of Valor

**Lt. Jason Voyak**

On Oct. 23, 2018, Voyak was the first to arrive on the scene of a residential fire in the 300 block of Great Lakes Drive. He could immediately see smoke coming from the apartment and could hear someone moaning inside. Voyak found that the front door was unlocked but was overwhelmed by smoke after opening it. He then got into a crawling position, made entry into the apartment, located the victim just inside the doorway and was able to pull the victim to safety outside.

### Lifesaving Award

**Det. April Kline & Patrolman Corey McGriff**

On March 11, 2016, Kline and McGriff, along with several other NPD officers, responded to a residential fire in the 1000 block of Watermead Drive. As smoke and open flames had consumed the front door area of the apartment, Kline and McGriff proceeded to the rear of the apartment where they heard a person inside coughing. McGriff used his baton to break a nearby window and both officers pulled the victim through the window to safety.

### Purple Heart Medal

**Master Patrolman Jason McDermott**

On May 19, 2015, the NPD responded to the 17900 block of Phillips Drive in Noblesville in reference to a complaint of theft from vehicles. Officers arrived a short time later and encountered the alleged suspect in the parking lot. During the investigative process, a struggle ensued as Master Patrolman Jason McDermott was attempting to place the suspect into custody. Master Patrolman McDermott sustained multiple fractures to his right leg requiring an extensive recovery and rehabilitation period.

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

# Is change good or bad?

Carmel has undergone so many changes in the past 30 years. Most of them have been for the best, as evidenced by the city being regularly named one of the best places to live in the United States.

We see a lot of changes have taken place in the Old Town part of Carmel, which has undergone a transformation in the last 10 to 15 years. The Carmel Arts & Design District came first, then came the trio of The Palladium, the Carmel City Center and Sophia Square, which all opened within months of each other in early 2011. A few years later, an industrial strip along the Monon Trail was turned into the Midtown area.

Some residents love the changes. They remember when Carmel was a sleepy suburb with nothing to do on nights and weekends. Everyone had to travel south of 96th Street in order to go out to eat or enjoy a night at the theater.

Others worry that the

quiet city they once loved has become too crowded and too busy.

So how do we decide if change is a good thing?

Well, I like to use an analogy from my business. My family and I own a small Italian restaurant. If 20 years went by and we never changed a single thing ever, we never updated the menu and never did anything different, what would happen? We'd find that our customers would start going someplace else. Not because the quality had slipped but because we had become stale.

The same is true for cities. If you never change anything and you never try anything new, then you'll become stagnant. Other cities will surpass you.

Politicians all too often look at just the next four years and never consider the next 40. What kind of future are we building for our children and their children?

That isn't to say that we disregard our history, tear everything down or change

so dramatically that we're unrecognizable. That would be like if I took all the most popular items off my menu and replaced them with new options. My regular customers would be upset that we lost our identity.

Just like a business, a city needs to recognize what made it great in the first place and never stray from those principles. For Carmel, I believe that's low taxes, great schools and safe streets. We don't need to tear down historic buildings or displace longtime small businesses. We need these reminders of the past as we plan new chapters of our history.

Carmel needs to continue to change and adapt. It requires innovative leadership that considers new ideas while also planning responsibly. We can embark on a bright future while remaining true to what made us great in the first place.

# Rocky Shanehsaz running for Noblesville Council

Longtime Noblesville entrepreneur and real estate developer Rocky Shanehsaz filed Friday as a Republican candidate for one of three at large seats on the Noblesville City Council. He says his priorities as a city leader will focus on economic development and government transparency.

"Many international companies are eyeing our community for their headquarters," Shanehsaz said. "Attracting global industries to invest in Noblesville, rather than moving here to take advantage of tax breaks or free handouts, will create new opportunities for growth. Often, the economic impact of a wonderful project fails to get quantitatively communicated to the public, and a lack of understanding leads to a lack of support, which leads to the delay or abandonment of the project. Let's work together to plant the seeds of growth."

An Iranian immigrant, Shanehsaz moved to the United States more than 40 years ago and became a citizen as a teenager. He is best known for converting the historic Model Mill building into a successful events and conference center called The Mill Top in downtown Noblesville. Shanehsaz also made headlines when he bought and relocated three historically significant homes to preserve them, paving the way for construction of Nobles-



ville City Hall in 2005.

Shanehsaz has lived in Noblesville since 1990. He is married to Terri Shanehsaz and has two children: Abe, an attorney with Faegre Baker Daniels law firm in Indianapolis, and Ava, a freshman at Noblesville High School. He also helped plant three churches in Noblesville, working as a volunteer to grow several community-based projects.

The next big project on Shanehsaz's radar will bring about drastic change to fight and solve the opioid crisis in Hamilton and Marion counties. Shanehsaz thinks it's important to educate the public about current project and provide as much transparency as possible to gain community acceptance and trust. "The city needs visionary people who think independently and innovatively," he said. "I will serve Noblesville with integrity and put people first.
