# Levinson design approved

The Noblesville Common Council approved two separate projects Tuesday evening that will strengthen the downtown and redevelop a substantial parcel on a major corridor east of State Road 37. The final public approval step was completed for the Levinson, a \$24.3 million mixed-use project, including the first new downtown apartments to be built in more than a century. The council also passed the bond financing for a \$31 million redevelopment project on the northeast corner of 146th Street and Promise Road.

Noblesville officials and Rebar Development first presented The Levinson project to the Noblesville Common Council on Aug. 28. The Levinson will be an architecturally significant building in the heart of downtown that will provide commercial space, modern apartment homes, and a parking garage in downtown Noblesville.

Throughout the process, Rebar's design team has incorporated more historic features similar to neighboring buildings that include a diamond pattern, limestone banding, a stone base, arched windows and cornices. Land-

scaping will consist of planters around the outside of the building that will match the Downtown District's transition to black planters.

"When we announced the Noblesville NOW capital improvement plan, one of our top objectives was to strengthen the downtown with more residents and more parking," said Mayor John Ditslear. "The Levinson helps us achieve that objective, as well as accomplishes some of the goals that came out of the housing study and parking task force while setting the stage for further enhancements like

those proposed in the downtown streetscape plan."

The Levinson includes 73 market-rate and 10 affordable-rate studio, one- and two-bedroom modern apartments with a rooftop deck and contemporary amenities; 5,100 square feet of commercial space; and a four-level, 300-space parking garage. A minimum of 200 spaces will be available for paid public parking – a net gain of 130 parking spaces over the lot's current availability.

With the final approval, the city will turn its attention to developing a robust com-

munications plan to keep the public informed about downtown parking and potential street closures or issues during the Levinson construction period.

"With any project of this size in an urban environment, there are bound to be some disruptions," said Deputy Mayor Steve Cooke. "Our goal is to minimize any inconvenience for residents, businesses and visitors to ensure our downtown district continues to thrive even throughout the Levinson's construction."

# Sheriff's Office looking for more details in Sheridan cold case

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office detectives are seeking assistance in solving a cold case they have been working for several years. It is an unusual case involving a missing person using possible false identifying information that has resulted in few results during the investigation.

On Friday, Nov. 27, 1992, the day after Thanksgiving, Paul Raymond Harrod left his home near Sheridan and has not been seen or heard from since that date. Harrod left a \$100 bill and a note for his wife stating he "needed to get away for a while." He

left in his 1992 white Geo Metro two-door hatchback but left no indication where he was going or when he might return. On Friday, May 7, 1993, Harrod's wife filed a missing person report with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office.

There has been little information to use as detectives try to track down Harrod's location. Over the years, investigators have uncovered bits and pieces of information, including:

- The Geo Metro was sold in Denver, Colo., in 1994.
- Harrod's Social Security number was not issued to

him until 1987.

- The high school Harrod listed as attending has no record of a person by that name ever being there.

- A Paul Raymond Harrod with the same parents' names and date of birth was killed by a car when he was five years old. The death occurred in Harrod, Ohio.

- Detectives believe Harrod may now be in his 70s, but an exact age may not be available.

Investigators working the case recently received the photos of Harrod. The individual photo of Harrod was taken on Thanksgiving Day in 1992, the day prior

to Harrod's disappearance. Detectives would also like to identify the best man in the wedding photograph in order to interview the individual for more information.

In addition to the Sheriff's Office working the case, detectives have also enlisted criminal justice students from Purdue University. Anyone with information on Paul Raymond Harrod or who may have known Harrod during his time in Hamilton County is asked to contact Detective Lockhart at 317-776-9887 or through Hamilton County Public Safety Communications at 317-773-1282.

Further details about the communications plan will be announced closer to the start of construction, which is expected to begin in early spring.

The council also approved an issuance of bonds to incentivize the 38-acre redevelopment of the northeast corner of 146th Street and Promise Road. A large portion of the site is cur-

rently being used as an auto salvage business. Jackson Development LLC plans to transform the ground into 200,000 square feet of office/flex buildings in what will be known as the Campus Center Business Park. The project also features 80,000 square feet of commercial and retail space in the area known as The Shoppes at Campus Center.

"This project opens up the potential redevelopment of the 146th Street corridor between State Road 37 and Corporate Campus," Ditslear said.

Jackson Development will close on the real estate this month. Utility work should be completed and the salvage cars should be removed by summer, and then construction will begin.

More details about the festivities will be announced in the future.

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


# Former White House photographer speaks to Cicero Kiwanis Club

Daugherty captured in detail life and highlights of the people and places he visited including Ho Chi Minh City, Phnom Penh, Hanoi and Saigon. He described both countries as fascinating and places he and his wife, Stephanie, had always wanted to visit.

In Vietnam, he could see the many cultural influences of Chinese rule for more than 500 years, followed by the French and the Americans, which were well preserved in this ancient nation that didn't gain its freedom and independence until the 1970s.

Cambodia, with a culture nearly destroyed by the Khmer Rouge, boasts incredible Angkor temples, Buddhist monks, spectac-

Tuol Seng Genocide Museum in Phnom Penh, an interrogation and detention center of the Khmer Rouge regime, preserves evidence




schools and the city's efforts to publicize the initiative. Fadness gave the quarterly update on the initiative to a packed crowd at Fishers City Hall Tuesday afternoon.

The mayor described recent statistics that show suicide rates are down throughout the world over the past 20 to 30 years, with a few exceptions. The United States is one exception, which shows an increase.

Indiana rates very low in the mental health condition of its residents and available assistance to address those mental health conditions, according to Fadness.

Initiatives now before state lawmakers in this legislative session were highlighted by the mayor.

"We also find ourselves in a time of economic disruption," said Fadness. "We see rural America changing. We see suicide

rates among farmers going up."

It is up to government to find systems and get them into place to help those suffering as a result of the very big changes, the mayor explained.

Mental health has become more of a public issue in recent years. Even Lady Gaga is on board. But Fishers has been on board for many years, and the journey continues.

raising our three kids here. We call this city home for the same reason you do – we think Noblesville is special. There's no better place in Indiana to live, work and raise our children,"





## IHSAA state wrestling finals are this weekend

Nine Hamilton County wrestlers will be part of this weekend's IHSAA state wrestling finals, which take place Friday and Saturday at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

Two hundred twenty-four wrestlers in all, 16 in each of the 14 weight classes, will begin first round competition on Friday at 6 p.m. First-round winners will return to wrestle on Saturday with quarterfinal action beginning at 9:30 a.m. and semifinal matches to follow after all weight classes have concluded. Consolation bouts begin at 5 p.m. and championship matches under the spotlight are scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Team scoring will begin with Friday night's preliminary matches. Scoring will go to eight places and, additionally, two advancement points will be awarded per match for a championship bracket victory while one point is earned for advancement in the consolation bracket.


Finally, points will be awarded to the top eight place-winners: 1st place: 16 points; 2nd place: 12 points; 3rd place: 9 points; 4th place: 7 points; 5th place: 5 points; 6th place: 3 points; 7th place: 2 points; 8th place: 1 point.

Eight defending or former state champions are part of this year's field led by seniors Brayden Curtis (126) of Yorktown and Asa Garcia (132) of Avon. Both will be looking to complete a third state championship season. Curtis is 34-1 on the year after two consecutive undefeated seasons (40-0 at 113 in 2018 and 43-0 at 106 in 2017). Garcia is 42-1 this season having won last year's 126 pound weight class going 39-4 and the 106 pound bracket as a freshman in 2016 when he finished 36-6.

Other returning champs include Portage's Jacob Moran (113), Jimtown's Hunter Watts (126), Roncalli's Alec Viduya (132), Columbus East's Cayden Rooks (138), Indianapolis Cathedral's Jordan Slivka (160) and Columbus East's Nick South (170).

### Defending State Champion

Indianapolis Cathedral is the defending state champion after winning the school's second wrestling crown last year. The sec-

# Furious rally by Bucks stops Pacers' win streak

Despite leading by as much as 10 points in the fourth quarter, a furious Bucks rally upended the Pacers' six-game winning streak as Milwaukee won 106-97 in the final game before the All-Star break.

Bankers Life Fieldhouse was on its feet when a Tyreke Evans 3-pointer splashed through the net, putting Indiana ahead 86-76, but the Bucks — owners of the league's best record — spent the final 9:35 in control, as Giannis Antetokounmpo's 33-point, 19-rebound, 11-assist performance was too much for the Pacers to overcome.

"He's a monster," said Pacers head coach Nate McMillan after the game. "It's a challenge to stop that kid. He does so much for that team. 19 rebounds; he is starting their break rebounding the ball and they were able to score 23 fast break points off our misses and turnovers."

Indiana (38-20) was able to cling to its lead until Antetokounmpo backed into the paint for yet another slam, putting Milwaukee (43-14) up 93-92. The Pacers briefly regained the advantage when Thaddeus Young drilled a three from the corner, but

the Bucks answered that with an 11-0 run, effectively ending the night for Indiana.

By the time the final horn sounded, the Pacers had been outscored 30-18 in the fourth quarter.

In the game's early moments, Milwaukee took a quick lead, jumping ahead 12-5 when Khris Middleton made a 3-pointer from the wing. The Pacers' starting unit responded with a rally, getting the score to just a one-point Bucks lead before Milwaukee's offense sprinted ahead once again, closing the quarter on a 9-2 run to grab a 26-18 lead after 12 minutes.

Antetokounmpo was especially effective, scoring 14 points in the opening quarter.

"He's a very, very tough player to guard. Very versatile," said Thaddeus Young, who finished with seven points and seven rebounds. "There's only so many things you can do; but when he's trying to post you up in the lane and is just spinning. He's already at the rim when he takes a spin."

With the bench units on the floor, Indiana opened up the scoring in the second quarter with a bucket from Doug McDermott, but the Bucks struck back, scoring seven unanswered as their lead ballooned to double digits.

Following a Pacers timeout, however, Indiana's offense snapped into action, breaking off a 7-0 run of its own to chop the score down to a 35-30 Bucks lead with 7:38 remaining in the half.

Late threes by Ersan Illyasova and former Pacer George Hill helped the Bucks jump ahead by 10, but a pair of free throws by Bogdanovic (20 points) with 4.1 left in the quarter helped the Pacers slice the deficit to a 55-47 Bucks lead at the break.

The Pacers erupted out of the locker room in the second half with a thundering 12-3 run as Darren Collison led the charge, scoring seven of the 12 points. In the early moments of the sprint, a defensive play by Young and Myles Turner helped ratchet up the intensity. After Young stripped Antetokounmpo, the towering Bucks forward was able to recover, only to have his shot blocked by Turner, delighting the home crowd at the Fieldhouse.

Just minutes later, it was Collison again, drilling a 3-pointer to put the Pacers ahead 64-62.

Caught off balance, the Bucks were able to regain their footing, getting another 3-pointer from Illyasova and a three-point play from Hill to get their deficit down to two.

A free throw from Tyreke Evans closed the scoring for the quarter as the Pacers carried a 79-76 lead into the final frame.

The fourth began the same way as the third — with a burst of Pacers offense. The second unit came out hot, as Evans knocked down a three from the wing to cap a 7-0 Pacers run to begin the quarter, forcing a Bucks timeout and opening up a deafening roar from the crowd.


Out of the Bucks' timeout, Milwaukee stabilized itself as Middleton started to find a groove driving to the basket. An and-one from the All-Star forward was part of a 15-4 response from the Bucks, giving a 91-90 lead to Milwaukee with 5:34 remaining in the game.

Although the Pacers were able to retake the lead momentarily when Young hit a 3-pointer, an 11-0 Bucks run put the game out of reach for Indiana from there.

"Their defense tightened up," explained McMillan "They went to switches that we didn't take advantage of. They had their five switching on our ball screens and we had size in the post. But we could never take advantage of that. That was the difference in the ball game."


