Fishers mayor emphasizes "sense of community" at YMCA breakfast

Fishers was once a small town with that small-town feel where everyone knew you, your family and most of your life history. Mayor Scott Fadness grew up in a small North Dakota farming community with a feel much like that – everyone knew your name, your family and most everything about you.

The mayor emphasized community in his speech to the Fishers YMCA annual fundraising campaign breakfast Thursday morning. He cited the summer Tuesday night concerts that draw 5,000 to 6,000 local residents each week.

"Not one time, not one single time, have we had an issue with a person at those events," Fadness said. "I ask you, where else in America can you tell people you have a free concert, feel free to bring whatever you want to drink, have 5,000 people show up consistently every Tuesday night, and never have a single issue with people acting inappropriately? That says something about the character and quality of our community."

He cited the concerts as

one example where local residents can make a human connection and get to know each other. As Fishers has grown into a large suburban community, finding ways to get to know each other has become more difficult, but the Tuesday concerts serve as one example of how the city is trying to bring local citizens together, trying to build what the mayor described as "a sense of community."


The mayor told the crowd that the Fishers YMCA is on the front lines of building the city's sense of community. He said an organization like the local Y is the difference between "a sterile suburban environment and a true community."

Danny Brown told the crowd about how the YMCA saved his life. He was exercising and suffered a sudden cardiac arrest, a medical emergency where only about 5 percent survive and fully recover. Due to quick action, the use of AED equipment at the Y and the people on the scene when he collapsed, he became one of the 5 percent that fully recover from a cardiac arrest. Mr. Brown became emotional when talking about the people at the Fishers Y that day and how they saved his life.

The Fishers YMCA is best known for the exercise facilities and swimming pools, but there is much

more to the organization, including youth summer camps and after-school programs.

Perhaps it was the best place to present a check to the City of Fishers – the bay area of the IU Health Emergency Room in Fishers on a cold Tuesday afternoon in March. IU Health presented a check of \$43,680 to support the “paramedicine behavioral response” program.

The money will go to local efforts in providing follow-up and support help for mental health patients. This serves situations where the police department personnel and hospitals may not quickly identify mental health needs for some people encountered by first responders.

Mayor Scott Fadness pointed out that homicides are rare in Fishers but, sadly, there are many more suicides. This program will be aimed at helping those suffering from mental health issues at an early stage and provide the help needed.

Mayor Fadness began a mental

“This new behavioral response program was identified by the Fishers

Mental Health Task Force as an important component of the city’s mental health initiative,” said Alicia Shulhoff, President of the IU Health North Suburban Area in a news release.

Carmel plans new library branch in West Clay

A new Carmel Clay branch library, the first for Carmel’s award winning library system, will be underway this spring. The new \$2.5 million facility will be located in an existing, but completely renovated building, in the Village of West Clay. The new branch, expected to be developed without a tax increase, is set to be open before the end of the year.

The decision to add a branch has been under con-

sideration for the past two years. Hamilton East and Hamilton North libraries have built new branches in the recent past. The new Carmel facility will bring to eight the number of library locations in Hamilton County.

Carmel library director Robert Swanay released details of the new branch and its anticipated services. Ratio is the architectural firm being used and the interior design of the building has been done by Rowland and Associates of Indianapolis. When completed there will

be about 5,000 square feet of floor space.

A courier service will deliver certain requested materials to the branch from the main library. Digital checkouts, which have doubled in five years, are expected to be a major service.

In addition to the new branch, Carmel plans a major updating and expansion next year of the main library at 55 Fourth Ave. S.E. The building is now 20 years old and lacks the proper amount of space for certain services, according to Swanay.

Besides the typical loaning of books and other materials, the library has sponsored or cooperated with presenting 2,200 programs in the past year. And, the library operates a mobile unit (bookmobile) as part of its outreach program.

Carmel, like all public libraries in the county, originated with an Andrew Carnegie grant. Its current building, the third since 1914, opened in 1999. It is governed by an appointed board of seven members. Swanay has been director for two and a half years.





Maintaining flexibility as we age

"I never struggled with injury problems, because of my preparation – in particular my stretching."

– Edwin Moses, winner of gold medals in the 400m hurdles at the 1976 and the 1984 Olympics

Typically I address topics of nutrition as well as the importance of strength and aerobic conditioning, but I find that the subject of flexibility and movement is the most neglected area of fitness.

I ask my clients to envision a triangle with each point being strength training, aerobic conditioning and flexibility. In the middle of the triangle is nutrition. As I have often noted here that without proper nutrition, the fuel for the body, the rest will not be as effective for those people focused on a lifestyle that is active and enjoyable.

In noting the quote I have used this week to introduce my topic, you may think, well sure, but Edwin Moses

is an Olympic athlete, not exactly my profession and I don't train my body the way he did. True, but remember that as we age it takes less and less activity to result in injury. Missing a stair

step, tripping over a cord or small pet (yikes!) pulling an item that is too heavy from a shelf – you get the picture. As a child or young adult these actions or reactions are insignificant, and even if we did suffer a sprained ankle or wrist the recovery was relatively quick and complete. Baby Boomers, those days are gone. Our best hope is to remain strong, flexible and balanced.

Going back to the quote above attributed to Mr. Moses, do you know that Olympic and professional athletes attribute stretching and flexibility as the most important part of their training? Gymnasts, runners, boxers, skiers, skaters, you name it! They know that

without a great deal of flexibility they are much more prone to injury which could knock them out of competition and out of a profession! In addition to increasing balance and flexibility, regular stretching transports oxygen and removes toxins from muscles, improving athletic performance.

Dynamic stretching, or stretching by moving through a challenging but comfortable range of motion repeatedly usually 10 to 12 times, should not be confused with old-fashioned ballistic stretching which involves a bouncing movement and which you may recall from PE classes in days gone by!

As I have mentioned previously in my columns here, although I worked in executive management for many years, I pursued my credentials in both fitness training and in nutrition and wellness coaching. For over 20 years, I have enjoyed pursuing these interests when time allowed to do so, but now that I am retired/rewired I have the

flexibility (I couldn't resist!) to pursue my avocation. That is why I teach a class called "FlexAbility" – because I know that increased flexible movement and stretching will add a **very positive dimension to our lives as we age**. I have acquired additional training and certification in Full Body Flexibility and Balance Progression and I look forward to working with more groups as well as one-on-one training.

Another caveat to increased flexibility training? How about improved muscle tone, coordination and stronger bones? Watch for another article soon on more in-depth descriptions of the different types of stretching and how you can benefit.

How one of my own students reminded me to be a better person

I am writing for this space this week because the student who was scheduled to do so didn't. I don't know exactly why. She cited stress and not being able to decide on a topic as the reasons.

While I was initially disappointed, it led me to ponder those circumstances further. As a teacher, I try my best to keep in mind that my students have a lot going on in their lives. While their primary job, in my opinion, is to come to school and work hard, there are sometimes factors that get in the way of it. What I've realized over my years teaching is that as much as I want to be understanding of those factors, I can't truly understand them or know what they're actually going through.

This leads to me to my larger point: None of us can know what anyone else's life experience is. We judge others without knowing what

they're going through. But how do we avoid it?

I don't have the answers, and I am not an expert on this in any way. I am judgmental just like everyone else, no matter how hard I try not to be. I feel so lucky in my life. I have a great family, a job I love, health and wellness, cats who purr and sit on my lap, books to read and a beautiful outdoor world to explore. Realizing that not all my students are happy in their lives and that I cannot even understand their individual struggles is mind-opening. So, for me personally, the way I am trying to better myself in this regard is accepting that I cannot understand it all and then responding with kindness.

The "random acts of kindness" trend has been popular for a few years, and it's totally awesome. You could pay for the person behind you in a drive-thru or

leave change in a vending machine, or other little actions to benefit a stranger's day.

My goal is to be kinder to the people in my life, my students primarily, rather than strangers.

So far, I've found it's the little things that seem to matter the most in my quest to be kinder. For example, I love bananas, and I will often bring one to school to eat during a break. Now, I bring a bunch of bananas instead of one and share them with kids who want them. Greeting my students by name and letting them know I am happy to see them and be with them is another way I have tried to be kinder.

Though I can't know for sure what the rest of their day will be like, I can be sure that they know for the 45 minutes they spend with me, I am happy to be with them, and I respect them as individuals.

Yesterday, I was the recipient of an act of kindness from one of my students, and it reminded me of how im-

portantful it can be. My sophomores have very recently completed their first round of state-mandated ISTEP testing for the year. Hamilton County's Sue Dillon has been working on this for years. She is sometimes misunderstood by folks who think she is against daylight time. No, she is telling us the simple fact that we belong on Central Time where we could observe daylight time in the summer.

Let's not let this latest lunacy of maintaining Eastern Daylight the year around go any further or school kids will be standing in the dark at the bus stop until 8:30.

Boys basketball

Carmel defends regional championship

Carmel successfully defended its boys basketball regional championship on Saturday.

The No. 1-ranked Greyhounds won at the Class 4A Logansport regional, winning back-to-back titles for the second time. Carmel overcame a slow first half to beat Fort Wayne Northrop 58-42 in the morning semi-finals, then defeated No. 7 Zionsville 53-39 to claim the championship.

Carmel is now 24-1 for the season and won its 10th regional championship in program history. The Greyhounds also won back-to-back regional titles in 2012 and 2013. The 'Hounds will play Saturday, March 16 in the 4A north semi-state, taking on No. 9 Penn at Lafayette Jefferson. Tipoff is scheduled for 3:30 p.m., following the 1 p.m. 2A game between Frankton and Andean.

Carmel got in trouble against Northrop, finding itself down 14-9 after the first quarter and 24-16 at halftime. But the Greyhounds quickly got themselves together at the start of the second half, with senior and Butler commit John Michael Mulloy converting two three-point plays in the first minute of the half.

The Bruins' Isaac Anderson made a pair of free throws to get back of 26-22, but Carmel scored 10 straight points to take a 32-26 lead. Karsten Windlan hit two foul shots, then Robert Fry's layin tied the game. Windlan got the Greyhounds in front with a three-point play, then Andrew Owens drained a 3-pointer.

Windlan made another "and-1" to end the quarter: The senior drained a 3-pointer while being fouled, then hit the free throw to convert the rare four-point play with six seconds left. That gave Carmel 24 points in the third period, and put the 'Hounds ahead 40-32.

Northrop's Sydney Curry hit one foul shot at the end of the quarter, keeping the Bruins within 40-33 going into the fourth. But Carmel got off to another strong start, adding 11 points in the first 3:30 of the period. Owens scored five points (a layin

and a 3), then the 'Hounds made six straight free throws. Luke Heady drained four and Peter Suder hit two. That put Carmel up 51-33, and it maintained that lead for the remainder of the quarter.

Windlan scored 19 points, with Owens adding 13 and Mulloy 11. The freshman Suder pulled four rebounds, while Owens made four steals and Mulloy blocked two shots.

THREE FOR ALL

There was no slow start for the Greyhounds against Zionsville. Owens and Heady gave Carmel a quick 6-0 lead with back-to-back 3s. The Eagles' Nathan Childress brought his team back with six

straight points of his own, a three-point play and a 3-point basket.

But Windlan drained his own 3 to get the 'Hounds up 9-6, and that gave Carmel the lead for good. The Greyhounds kept the "3-for-all" going in the second quarter, with Owens making two more triples, and Heady getting another one. Carmel led 22-15 at halftime.

Owens started the second half with - guess what? - another 3, then Windlan made a jumper to put the 'Hounds up 27-15. Zionsville began to push at this point, cutting Carmel's lead to 30-22 with 4:28 left.

But Windlan made a 3 during that time to prevent a serious Eagles run, and he

would make two more downtown shots in the quarter, which ended with the Greyhounds up 36-27. Mulloy began the fourth quarter with an "and-1," then Zionsville scored consecutive baskets to get within 39-31.

Mulloy got the lead back to 10 with a jumper, and Carmel's advantage stayed at double digits until the final buzzer. Suder helped out big time during the fourth quarter, scoring eight points.

Windlan again was the scoring leader with 18 points, while Owens added 14; both players totaled four 3-pointers in the game. Suder collected eight rebounds, with Windlan grabbing five.

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


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I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about.
