Former county employee files suit . . .

Stoesz wants Special Prosecutor in Treasurer's Office investigation

Westfield-based attorney Tim Stoesz has issued a letter to Prosecutor Lee Buckingham, requesting a Special Prosecutor be assigned to an investigation of alleged misconduct by the Hamilton County Treasurer's Office.

The Treasurer's Office was the focus of a recent Indiana State Police investigation after a former employee alleged penalties were waived for late tax payments.

In December, Hamilton County Commissioners asked the State Police to conduct an investigation regarding alleged actions of the Treasurer's Office.

Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said, "While the county does not believe there is a factual basis for these charges, we feel it is our duty to ask an impartial party to investigate the claims. That's why we have asked the Indiana State Police instead of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office for help. We owe it to the taxpayers to investigate the

claims and to assure them that their tax dollars are being managed properly."

Stoesz feels the "impartial party" should also include the Prosecutor.

Stoesz, in his letter to Buckingham, stated, "It's a well-known secret that the Indiana State Police has provided you with an investigation report of the Hamilton County Treasurer's Office several weeks ago. During the past several weeks I have received information that you have failed to appoint a Special Prosecutor to review the investigation report and make determination if criminal charges are warranted."

Heirbrandt recently confirmed the State Police investigation had been turned over to

the Prosecutor's office, but did not know the outcome.

"I believe there is an inherent conflict of interest when one Hamilton County elected official investigates another elected official," said Stoesz. "In order to avoid an appearance of impropriety, Buckingham should immediately appoint a Special Prosecutor."

In his letter, Stoesz concluded, "For the sake of good government and legal ethics, I strongly encourage you to seek a Special Prosecutor to review the Indiana State Police investigation report of the Hamilton County Treasurer's Office and make determination if criminal charges are warranted."

Stoesz told the Reporter, "I stand by my

letter to Prosecutor Buckingham. I'm not going to stop until I've exhausted all of my remedies."

The Reporter's attempt to reach Prosecutor Buckingham for comment prior to press time was unsuccessful.

Stoesz represents a former Treasurer's Office employee, Susan Diane Byer, in a lawsuit that alleges Byer was unjustly terminated from her job.

Court documents in the Byer civil case allege Deputy Treasurer Kim Goode may have gone through the desk of a recently terminated employee and shredded documents. Because of that, Byer, through Stoesz, filed a request asking the court to restrain the Treasurer's Office from shredding or destroying further documents related to Byer's complaint.

In addition, a county employee the Reporter has chosen not to name stated explicitly they had seen Susan Byer's name on shredded documents prior to Byer's termination.

The Byer case, filed in November of last year, has not yet been set for trial.

Final 'Candidate Conversations' for Noblesville mayoral hopefuls

The Noblesville Chamber of Commerce and the League of Women Voters of Hamilton County will co-host the third and final Candidate Conversations event featuring Noblesville mayoral candidates Vince Baker, Mike Corbett, Chris Jensen and Julia Kozicki, prior to the primary election on May 7. This informal fo-

rum will be held from 6:30 to 8 p.m. on Monday, April 8 in the Noblesville High School auditorium.

According to Bob DuBois, Noblesville Chamber of Commerce President and CEO, this is a unique opportunity for Noblesville residents to help shape the mayoral race conversation.

"The Noblesville Chamber, in partnership with the

League of Women Voters, has created an online portal to accept questions. Every question asked by our residents will be shared with the candidates," said DuBois.

Noblesville citizens can submit questions for the Candidate Conversations series via a form on noblesvillechamber.com. Questions will be carefully

selected for the Candidate Conversations based on content and time restraints. However, all questions will be shared with the candidates privately.

Candidate Conversations has offered a unique format, with specific topics being addressed at each event. On April 8, the may-

Voter registration deadline is April 8

The deadline is April 8 for those who are not registered to vote and want to participate in the May 7 primary election. New voters may register at the county Government and Judicial Center or a license branch.

County Clerk Kathy Williams said last week that requests for absentee ballots are trickling in at the rate of about 10 per day. Early voting will be available again this year at satellite locations in Carmel, Fishers and Westfield beginning April 24 as well as at the county elections office.

Notices to nearly 40,000 voters go out April 12 advising of a change in their

election day polling place. The majority of those affected are in Fishers.

The primary election will be for those voters within the city limits of Hamilton County's eight cities and towns. There is no election this year for those in unincorporated areas of the county.

The County Election Board meets Friday, April 5 for approval of this year's ballot and voting machines. Williams said that during the meeting the board may or may not consider a request from Democratic County Chairman Joe Weingarten to look into allegations of a financial offer allegedly being made to Carmel mayoral candidate Fred Glynn to drop out of the race.

US Rail appeals Nickel Plate decision

The organization "Save The Nickel Plate" issued a news release Tuesday, saying US Rail Holdings is appealing previous decisions by the federal Surface Transportation Board, asking the board to allow the company to operate and purchase the Nickel Plate Line as a passenger train operation.

The City of Fishers says US Rail is filing the exact same arguments filed last year that the board rejected.

Save the Nickel Plate asserts in the release, "...the City of Fishers is now facing a significant challenge to their trail-only plan." The city argues otherwise.

"The latest filing by US Rail Holdings is merely an attempt to re-litigate its failed position before the Surface Transportation Board," the City of Fishers responded in a statement.

The city points out that the Surface Transportation Board's December 2018 decision allowing the Nick-

el Plate Trail to move forward still stands.

According to Save the Nickel Plate, US Rail says First Transit has agreed to work with US Rail in providing passenger rail service to Union Station.

The city says it "does not support any proposal that leads to freight cars travelling through neighborhoods and clogging Fishers' main thoroughfares multiple times a day."

The US Rail request for an injunction from the Surface Transportation

Board wants the board to order Fishers not to remove any rails along the Nickel Plate until the board rules on US Rails request to reac-

tivate the rail line.

Fishers is moving forward with plans to begin converting the Nickel Plate Line to a trail, with con-

struction scheduled to begin this fall.

Save the Nickel Plate has been arguing that the city did not properly con-

sider a proposal to use concepts allowing a trail alongside the rails. Fishers argued its engineers had looked at the rails plus trails idea and

rejected it. The City of Fishers then released an engineering study in February 2019 conducted by Indianapolis engineering firm Butler, Fairman & Seufert, which estimated a trails and rails plan would at least cost an additional \$20.5 million.

Save the Nickel Plate is

planning a public meeting "to explore the feasibility and benefits of a rail-with-trail design as an alternative to the trail-only concept proposed by the City of Fishers." That meeting will be held at 6 p.m. on Monday, April 8 at the building at Holland Park.

oral hopefuls will tackle the Noblesville economy and finances, including city budgets, capital improvement plans and economic development.

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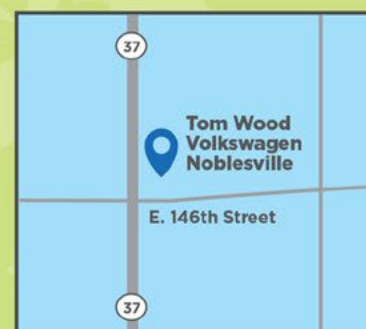

Indianapolis man hit by dump truck in Carmel

At approximately 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Carmel Police responded to an accident on the U.S. 31 northbound exit ramp to 146th Street and 151st Street. Officers arrived and found one vehicle and one pedestrian involved in the crash.

Based on the preliminary investigation, it appears a pedestrian walked into the roadway in the path of a 2000 International dump truck. The driver of truck was not able to stop and struck the pedestrian.

The pedestrian was identified as Adam J. Bisesi, 35, Indianapolis. Bisesi

was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The U.S. 31 northbound exit ramp to 146th Street and 151st Street was closed for several hours while accident reconstructionists from the Carmel Police Department investigated the crash. The investigation is ongoing.

Montgomery County man charged in local burglaries

On Monday, detectives with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office arrested a suspect in conjunction with a series of burglaries in the central part of the county.

Three homes in the 700 block of West 186th Street, the 600 block of East State Road 38, and the 1200 block of East 203rd Street were allegedly burglarized over the last weekend of March. Another residence in the 16700 block of Mill

Creek Road experienced an alleged residential entry during the weekend.

Detectives were able to locate a vehicle seen leaving the area of at least one of the incidents and were able to locate and identify the owner of the vehicle as a suspect in the alleged burglaries. This along with other ev-

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Rep. Brooks supports life-saving legislation to protect newborns

Congresswoman Susan W. Brooks (R-Ind.-05) provided the following statement after signing a discharge petition that would bring the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act to a vote on the House floor:

"The Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act is a common sense bill every Member of Congress, whether Republican or Democrat, should support because it protects people who cannot protect themselves – newborn babies.

"This bill is designed to

ensure any baby who is born alive after an attempted abortion receives the same protection under the law as any other newborn baby. It requires medical professionals, clinical staff and other relevant personnel to preserve the life and health of the child as well as to report any violations to state and federal law enforcement. Anyone who violates the requirements would be subject to fines, imprisonment of as long as five

years, or both. Additionally, this bill provides the mother of the abortion survivor a civil cause of action and protection from prosecution.

"Twenty-four states lack protection for born-alive infants and as a cosponsor of this bill, I am proud to stand on the House floor with my colleagues to sign this discharge petition that will hopefully bring this critically important bill to a full debate and vote."

Carmel reader looks into city's 2016 tax records

Dear Editor:

The Carmel Center for the Performing Arts paid artistic director Michael Feinstein \$75,000 a year, according to its 2016 IRS Form 990 tax exempt organization filing.

The same presumably was paid in 2017 and 2018, though no public records are available.

The Form 990 further indicates the money actually went to Terwillker, Ltd., in Fishers. The address listed is that of Terwillker, Ltd. (with an "i"). The site is that of a CPA firm.

Dun & Bradstreet reports Terwillker

has annual revenues of \$34,000. The address in Fishers is a mailing address for a firm located at 2405 Glendower Ave., Los Angeles, Calif. Its principal employee on record: Michael Feinstein, president.

The artistic direction fee is seven times the median household income in Carmel (\$109,858 according to U.S. Census Bureau estimates). That's also about 4.5 times the annual salary of the mayor of Carmel (\$170,000).

And none of the above is a bad April Fool's Day joke.

Noblesville Diversity Coalition disappointed in local legislators

Dear Editor:

The Noblesville Diversity Coalition is disappointed that our elected representatives, Senator Victoria Spartz and Representative Chuck Goodrich, sided with their colleagues rather than their constituents when it comes to bias crime legislation. We ask them to reconsider their positions and encourage the conference committee to restore the list of protections for all Hoosiers.

NDC is part of a wide-ranging coalition across Central Indiana consisting of citizens, businesses, faith groups, educational institutions, service organizations and cities and towns that are advocating for a comprehensive bias crime bill that would protect all Hoosiers.

Unfortunately, the bills approved by the Senate and House lack an enumerated list of protected characteristics. Every single Hoosier is covered when the list specifically includes race, ethnicity, religion, national origin, age, disability, sex, gender identity and sexual orientation – as the Senate Public Policy committee had approved in February.

Rather than include this list, Senate Bill 198 references a section of Indiana Code as its solution to who will be protected from hate crime – with no mention of age, gender or gender identity. But similar language used in legislation passed by other states has proven to be too vague in order to be effective.

We can all agree that the problem of hate is very real for communities such as Noblesville. Our citizens have experienced hate first hand. Meanwhile, the business community is justifiably concerned that without an effective bias-crime law, Indiana will struggle to recruit young professionals while companies that offer high-wage, high-tech jobs will likely go elsewhere.

What we cannot agree on is how to ensure protections are inclusive. The bill as passed by the Senate and House will

fail to address our concerns without a list of these specific characteristics that are inclusive and Constitutional, give judges the specificity and clarity they need so the law and sentencing are consistently applied throughout the state.

We are calling on members of the Indiana General Assembly to restore the list of protections in a comprehensive bias crime bill during conference committee. We cannot move forward as a state if we support a bill that falls short on providing equal protection to ALL our citizens.

The time is now to get this done before Indiana falls further behind the rest of the nation.

Hill warns Hoosiers to beware storm chasers

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill is warning Hoosiers to beware of scammers who descend on storm-affected communities in order to take advantage of homeowners needing repairs. Hill offered these tips to Hoosiers:

- Do not sign documents or agree to any repair work on the spot during initial contact with someone offering services. Instead, simply obtain the person’s contact information.
- Do not provide access to your home to any stranger offering to perform a free inspection. Among other possible dangers, unethical contractors have been known to secretly cause damage to homes in order to then repair it.
- Do not fall for high-pressure tactics such as the claim that you’ll get the best deal by agreeing to hire a contractor immediately on the spot.
- Consider the possible wisdom of finding your own contractor rather than accepting the services of someone who shows up at your house.
- Research any business or individual offering services. Look for signs of credibility such as official

websites. Seek reviews and testimonials from former customers.

- Contact your insurance agency to find out your terms of coverage. Ask whether your insurance company recommends any particular repair company.

The Corvette Grand Sport Pace Car can accelerate from 0-60 mph in 3.6 seconds. The car also has an available cornering capability of 1.2 g, thanks to the Corvette Z06's many advanced aerodynamic components.

Chevrolet has a storied history with the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Chevrolet was founded in 1911, the year of the inaugural 500-mile race, and company co-

founder Louis Chevrolet, along with brothers Arthur and Gaston, competed in early Indy 500 races. Arthur competed in the 1911 race and Gaston won in 1920.

Eight drivers with Chevrolet engines have combined to win "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" 10 times, with Rick Mears, Emerson Fittipaldi, Arie Luyendyk, Al Unser Jr., Helio Castroneves, Tony Kanaan, Juan Pablo Montoya and Will Power taking the checkered flag with bowtie power.

Power drove the No. 12 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet to victory in the INDYCAR Grand Prix and the 102nd Indianapolis 500 presented by Gainbridge last May, the first time a driver has swept both events in the same year. Chevrolet also was on the pole for both races, with Power leading the way in the INDYCAR Grand Prix and Ed Carpenter taking the top spot for the Indy 500.

Team Chevy also has won the NTT IndyCar Series manufacturer championship in six of the last seven seasons.
