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HSE School Board votes down proposed additions to nondiscrimination policy

"The school corporation does not discriminate in its educational or employment activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex (including transgender status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression), disability, age, religion, military status, ancestry or genetic information, nor on any basis prohibited by applicable federal or state laws."

That language was the subject of a long and heated debate among members of the Hamilton Southeastern

"Although I recognize and respect the division of authority between our school system and city government, I cannot abdicate my role as a community leader. Our community continues to be viewed and recognized as one of the best cities in the nation to live and raise a family. Those accolades ring hollow if we are not willing to support those among us who are most vulnerable. We should not discount the effect of finally saying in an affirmative voice that we see you, we hear you, and we stand with you as one community. For those currently in power, it may be difficult to discern the value of these actions, but we have not walked in others' shoes. We have not experienced the pain and struggles of those who have felt marginalized by our society. As Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once said, 'The arc of the moral universe is long but it bends toward justice.' It is my hope and ask that the HSE School Board will enumerate those most vulnerable in their anti-discrimination policy and bring us one small step closer to a more complete community."



Noblesville named a 'Tree City USA'

The City of Noblesville has been named a 2019 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management. This is the 29th consecutive year Noblesville has earned this national distinction.

"Being a Tree City USA member for almost three decades shows the importance that the city and its citizens have for our environment and its sustainability year after year," said Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear. "I also want to thank the Noblesville Tree Board for its overall care of city street trees and the educational outlet and projects it provides our residents."

Noblesville received Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: A tree board or department, a tree-

care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

As the city celebrated its Tree City status, the Noblesville Tree Board planted a Red Oak Tree at Federal Hill Commons in honor of Ditslear's years of dedication and service to the city.

The tree board will be at the Noblesville Farmer's Market on Saturday, May 4 to pass out free Black Gum Tree saplings and other goodies and tree information. Earlier this month, the Noblesville Tree Board planted 129 trees in the median of a two-mile stretch of Hazel Dell Road south of State Road 32 to Noble Crossing Elementary School.

Pauley: "He needs to stop ... he needs to stop" Carmel Clerk Treasurer describes harassment allegations against Mayor

At a press conference conducted on Thursday in Westfield, Carmel Clerk Treasurer Christine Pauley outlined additional allegations of harassment by Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard.

City of Carmel Director of Community Relations Nancy Heck spoke to the Reporter after the press conference on Mayor Brainard's behalf.

Pauley stated in 2015, when leaving a Christmas party, Brainard forcibly kissed her and grabbed her buttocks.

"The mayor is denying the allegations at the Christmas party," Heck said.

Pauley outlined how, in 2016, she refused Brainard's offers of trips to Rome and a lodge in Wisconsin.

Pauley also provided members of the media with an email sent to her

from Brainard that contained an adult toy advertisement. The email from Brainard said, "I keep getting these ads to ... wondered if my rosy signed me up [smiley face emoji]."

Pauley said the email made her feel dirty, stating, "On many occasions he would drunk email or text me and so I just ignored it and said no, I am just going to ignore it."

Heck responded to this point by telling the Reporter, "The website issue was one that many people receive these days where you get your unsolicited ads for random stuff. [The mayor] was jokingly trying to find out if she signed him up for the notices."

At the news conference Pauley denied ever having a sexual relationship with Brainard.

Blackhawk Commons construction underway at former school in Sheridan

Construction is underway at Blackhawk Commons, a \$7.2 million adaptive reuse development at the historic Adams Elementary School in Sheridan.

Leading affordable housing firm Woda Cooper Companies, Inc. (formerly The Woda Group, Inc.) is co-developing the property

with nonprofit Housing Services Alliances. The Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development Inc. (HAND) collaborated by helping secure County funding to restore the former gymnasium.

Development of Blackhawk Commons will transform the former school building into an attractive,

contemporary affordable housing community. The architectural design for the new complex pays tribute to the school's vintage features while creating energy efficient, modern living spaces. Blackhawk Commons will offer 32 one-, two- and three-bedroom

apartments affordable for families who earn up to 60 percent of area median income. Targeted completion is December 2019.

The new apartments will have open concept floorplans with quality finishes, high efficiency windows and HVAC systems, kitchens

Westfield launches SafeRoads campaign

Last Tuesday, Mayor Andy Cook launched Westfield's new SafeRoads campaign. It is a city-wide effort to reduce the number of personal injury and fatality automobile crashes in Westfield. Along with the mayor's office, the efforts include the Westfield Police Department and the Westfield Department of Public Works.

"Westfield is a safe, family-oriented community but in the last year, we have seen our accidents tick up 5 percent," said Cook. "Statistics also show that 90 per-

cent of accidents are caused by human error. That means they are preventable. We are going to try and prevent some of those accidents."

The SafeRoads campaign will have four focus areas:

- **Education:** The City will implement ongoing awareness campaigns around the dangers of distracted driving, drunk driving, etc.

- **Enforcement:** The Westfield Police Department will target the top 10 accident locations in the

Blackhawk Commons will offer 32 new apartments in what used to be Adams Township Elementary School in Sheridan.

with EnergyStar appliances including dishwashers, washer/dryer hookups and plenty of storage. Four units will have ADA features for those with mobility impairments and one unit is designed for those with hearing/sight impairments.

The school’s gymnasium will be restored and used by the Sheridan Recreation League for youth

sporting events. The existing wooden gym floor will be renovated and retained, and new stands will be added for spectators. Other community amenities include an on-site manager’s office and a community room for tenants to enjoy. The property will earn Enterprise Green certification, demonstrating its adherence to the latest green building materials and methods. It will be smoke free.

Financing for Blackhawk Commons was made

possible through the allocation of Rental Housing Tax Credits from the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority. InSite Capital invested \$5.6 million in equity with additional permanent loans from IHCDA’s Development Fund and West Union Bank. Chemical Bank contributed a construction loan. Hamilton County provided a \$300,000 appropriation to HAND, who is in turn providing a low-interest loan to fund the gym renovations.

with the Reporter, Pauley described returning home from a date and finding Mayor Brainard sitting in her residence.

Heck told the Reporter, “[The mayor] has no recollection of the particular event that the Clerk Treasurer is referring to in the last allegation.”

“Jim Brainard is a very powerful and politically connected mayor,” said Pauley. “I am no different than any other female who has experience unwanted advances. I felt shame and embarrassment and figured no one would believe me, so I continued on, walking a tight rope, trying to remain professional, but not being sucked into the May-

or’s promises and advancements. In today’s political world, I believe it’s time to have this discussion. I am not running for office so I don’t have to live in fear of retaliation. The citizens of Carmel deserve to know who they are electing to be their next mayor.”

“I don’t know if I am the only one that he had pursued, but from my understanding there is more. I’d like to plead that any other women that have been a victim of Mr. Brainard come forward,” concluded Pauley.



American Legion celebrating 100 years

The American Legion is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year, and since there are a lot of things about the Legion that I never knew, I thought a little research might be in order.

The Legion was not founded in the U.S. It was founded in Paris in March of 1919 by Americans including soldiers serving in France four months after the end of World War I.

But, for most of the past century the Legion's national headquarters has been in Indianapolis, and it is here that the anniversary will be observed with the organization's national convention in August.

The Legion has about two million members in 12,000 posts throughout the U.S. and even overseas in France, the Philippines and Puerto Rico. I learned that the popular GI Bill was essentially prepared by Legion members and the Legion was instrumental in getting the Department of Veterans Affairs established.

There are six Legion posts located here in Hamilton County at Noblesville, Carmel, Westfield, Sheridan, Cicero and Fishers.

Of course, Legion membership now includes veterans of all American wars as well as those who served in the military during peace time. But, with the passing of so many World War II veterans, membership has decreased.

The Legion tries with some success to enroll veterans with recent military service, but like most organizations today it is difficult to secure new mem-

bers. There are also affiliated groups including the Legion Auxiliary for women and Sons of the American Legion for those whose fathers served.

Not getting

as much publicity as they should are various projects and programs sponsored by the Legion. Boys' State and Girls' State are two major annual programs conducted for high school students in each state followed by Boys' and Girls' Nation held in Washington, D.C.

Other projects include American Legion Baseball with winning teams from each state playing for the Legion World Series championship, an annual oratorical contest, Operation Comfort, the National Emergency Fund, the Legion Riders, and a number of scholarships for high school seniors.

Legion members in cooperation with the Veterans of Foreign Wars, place flags on the graves of veterans in most local cemeteries and conduct Memorial Day ceremonies in several of those cemeteries.

As an observer, I have the opinion that the Legion needs better public relations to spread of word of their activities. For example, as someone who's been in the news business for years, I find it rare that names of delegates to Boys and Girls State are supplied to the media, or that times and locations of Memorial Day excises are distributed. With better public relations, the Legion could improve and expand its image, and possibly expand interest and membership in a worthy organization.

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‘White River Plan’ presented to County Commissioners

An outline of what is called The White River Plan was presented to County Commissioners at last Monday’s meeting by Tourism Director Brenda Myers.

The plan calls for steps to make the river and its banks cleaner and more attractive to those visiting the county’s major waterway. Beyond that, the plan is to encourage knowledge of the numerous parks and historic sites along the river.

The river improvement plan was conceived several years ago with the intent of making the river a recreational asset for Hamil-

ton and Marion counties. Currently the project’s supporters are in the process of preparing recommendations for what can be included in the development stage.

Myers said “an action-oriented plan” will be created by May 16 taking recommendations into consideration. She stressed that there will be no consideration of purchasing or making use of privately owned land that borders the river. Earlier, there were apparently unfounded rumors of plans to condemn or purchase river frontage.

Existing recreational and historic sites on White River include Strawtown Koteewi Park, Potters

Bridge Park and trail, the Noblesville Riverwalk, Conner Prairie, Carmel’s River Heritage Park, Fishers Heritage Park and Hazel Landing Park.

Monday’s presentation was informational only. No vote by commissioners was requested.

The county parks department is expected to coordinate with the plans as they move forward. Eventually, some type of Hamilton-Marion County board for White River development is envisioned to carry out and maintain river improvements including possibly retrofitting dams to maintain a favorable river elevation.

Noblesville awards \$3.7M in street rehabilitation projects

Noblesville will begin its annual street rehabilitation projects shortly to address the most necessary infrastructure needs within the city. The city has awarded \$3,730,069.36 through two contracts to address road and alley repaving and repair work to sidewalks and ramps.

This year’s recently bid rehabilitation projects include 12 miles of streets and 2.25 miles of alleys in Old Town Noblesville – an increase from the 10 street miles and 1.6 alley miles resurfaced last year. The contracts include the city’s annual street rehabilitation with E&B Paving and the Community Crossings Grant with Midwest Paving.

In addition to these projects, the city has already begun resurfacing work on Olivo Road-146th Street and construction on the Greenfield Avenue-Howe Road roundabout. Those costs are not included in either contract.

Rehabilitation Projects

- Miscellaneous Thoroughfares – Hague Road (portions between 196th and 216th streets); 161st Street (portions between Bays Drive and Cherry Tree Road); Lakeview Drive (State Road 32/38 to bend in Lakeview); and Lafayette Road (Lakeview Drive to State Road 38).

- The Meadows – Amber Way (Meadows Boulevard to Golden Meadow Way); Canal Way; Lupine Court; Carmine Drive; Chamomile Court; Mimosa Court; and Iris Court.

- Clover Road – Clover Road (Stony Creek Road to Pleasant Street); and Town and Country Boulevard (Clover Road to State Road 37).

- Old Town – North Street (10th Street to 16th Street);

Evans Avenue (10th Street to 16th Street); Central Avenue (11th Street to 16th Street); 11th Street (Monument Street to Evans Avenue); 12th Street (Grant Street to North Street); 14th Street (Monument Street to North Street); and 15th Street (Grant Street to North Street).

2019 Community Crossings Projects

In March, the City of Noblesville was awarded \$920,715 from the Indiana Department of Transportation as part of the state’s Next Level Roads: Community Crossings Initiative. Noblesville’s three 50-50 funded grants include 10th Street, Hazel Dell Road and Mill Grove subdivision – which total \$1.87 million in investment. Each project is expected to begin in June and be completed by Labor Day.

- 10th Street (1.5 miles) – 10th Street from Greenfield Avenue to Field Drive. The city utilized local funds to construct the roundabout at the Greenfield Avenue intersection with 10th Street in 2017 and resurfaced 10th Street north of Field Drive in 2016. Average daily traffic is 10,000 vehicles.

- Hazel Dell Road (2.28 miles) – Hazel Dell Road from Noble Crossing Drive to State Road 32. This is the initial phase of a multi-year rehabilitation of Hazel Dell Road/Little Chicago Road. Average daily traffic is 15,000 vehicles.

- Mill Grove Subdivision (1.6 miles) – Maple Grove Way (Little Chicago Road to Mill Creek Road); Edwards Grove Drive (Mill Oak Drive to Dado Drive); Mill Grove Drive (Mill Oak Drive to Maple Grove Way); Walter Grove Drive (Grove Walk Court to Mill Grove Drive); Grove Walk Court (Mill Grove Drive to end of cul-de-sac); and Gusset Court (Maple Grove Way to end of cul-de-sac). Phase I of this project was completed using local funds in 2018.



argued that the proposed amendment's language was unnecessary.

When it came to a board vote, Amanda Shera, Mike Bottorff, Sylvia Shepler and Brad Boyer voted to reject

the Chambers amendment. Julie Chambers, Janet Pritchett and Michelle Fullhart voted for it. As a result, the amendment was voted down 4-3.

The board then voted

4-3 to accept the following language instead:

"The school corporation will not discriminate in its educational and employment activities on any basis prohibited by applicable federal or state laws."

Shera, Bottorff, Shepler, and Boyer voted yes on that measure. Chambers, Pritchett and Fullhart cast no votes.

The vote followed some sharp verbal exchanges. Ten members of the public spoke passionately before the board in the public comment period, all but one arguing in support of Board Member Chambers's amended language, which they felt was a strong statement of protection for all

students in the HSE School District.

A majority of board members did not see it that way, and once Chambers's amendment was voted down by one vote, there were outbursts from the audience, some in anger, some breaking down in tears over the board's decision. Many left the meeting room after warnings from Board President Bottorff about public outbursts during the session.

And there is one more thing: This was just the first reading of this non-discrimination policy. It is not officially approved until voted on once again by the board in second reading, likely at the next regular board meeting.

Shamrocks, Millers split first two games of series


The Noblesville and Westfield baseball teams split the first two games of their three-game series this weekend.

control in the middle innings and ran away with an 11-4 win at Don Dunker Field.




Heights began the sweep on Tuesday by beating Northwestern 4-3 on Tuesday at the Panthers' field.

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Tigers do “Whatever It Takes,” win Mudsock trophy

FISHERS – With two outs in the bottom of the sixth, the game tied 3-3 and the pressure of the Mudsock rivalry at its apex on Tuesday night, Fishers’ freshman Kaylee Kardash didn’t get lost in her head.

Instead, she was right in rhythm, thanks to her favorite band, Imagine Dragons.

“I was honestly singing in my head,” Kardash laughed. “That’s my walkup song [Whatever It Takes], so since it wasn’t playing tonight, I just thought I’d sing it in my head.”

Up 1-0 in the count, Kardash’s swing was pitch perfect.

With adrenaline in her veins and Fishers’ flawless Hoosier Crossroads Conference record on the line, Kardash crushed a go-ahead two-run home run over the center-field fence, powering the host Tigers to a 5-4 victory over rival Hamilton Southeastern.

“I was just looking to get a base hit and keep the lineup going through,” said Kardash, who finished 2-for-3. “I wanted to make sure we kept getting runners on and just do what we do best, which is scoring runs.”

The Tigers (8-2, 4-0 HCC) kept their offensive trend going behind Kardash’s towering bomb. With 90 runs scored in 10 games this season, Fishers won its fourth straight to remain unbeaten in its pursuit of a potential league title.

Junior Brooke Benson, an Indiana University commit, blasted a solo home run – her second this year – to tie the game 1-1 in the bottom of the fourth, and Caroline Bernhardt put the Tigers in front 3-1 with a two-run single in the same frame.

The Tigers racked up eight hits, including seven in the final three innings to avenge last year’s 10-0 Mudsock loss to HSE during the regular season.

Fishers eliminated HSE 4-3 in the sectional semifinals last season, but the Royals (6-5, 2-2 HCC) refused to go quietly on Tuesday, despite trailing twice.

Unable to capitalize on two bases-loaded situations in the top

of the first, senior Nicole Lang broke through against Fishers’ starter Hannah Mays with a solo home run in the top of the fourth.

The Royals faced a 3-1 deficit in the top of the sixth and deadlocked the game 3-3 with an RBI single by Olivia Capuano, who went 2-for-3. A Tigers’ throwing error plated Lillian Leiner and cut the margin 3-2 after the junior hit a triple to move into scoring position.

“We had an opportunity in the first inning to score, and we didn’t take advantage of that, but I liked how we battled,” HSE head coach Dave Cook said. “We put a lot of pressure on them. I thought it was a pretty good ball game both ways. There were big hits both ways and some good pitching both ways. But we had opportunities.”

Hamilton Southeastern left four runners in scoring position as Mays settled in to improve to 6-2 on the year. Laboring through a 35-pitch top of the first, Mays regrouped and tossed a complete game with two walks, two strikeouts and two earned runs.

“There was a lot of adrenaline starting that game. She was a little too hyped up, I think,” Fishers head coach Daren James said. “Once she settled in and once she gets in her groove, she moves the ball around and does a good job for us.”

Mays retired eight straight to end the threat in the first inning and extended her dominance through the third. Lang’s sixth home run on the year snapped Mays’ run before the right-hander bounced back and limited the damage against the determined Royals.

The Tigers’ bats took care of the rest.

“We got some clutch hitting tonight for sure. Brooke gets that solo to get us tied back up, and then we get a nice one out of Caroline, and we get the two-run home run out of the freshman to get us over the top,” James said. “We had a lot of timely hitting tonight.”

Kardash’s two-out heroics in the bottom of the sixth unfolded after Bernhardt sliced a 3-1 offering from HSE starter Olivia Bucher

into center field for a single.

“I just knew I had to keep smiling and have a good mindset in that situation,” Kardash said. “It was a lot of fun.”
