
Noblesville Schools announced Wednesday that Teri Ditslear, a member of the Noblesville Schools Board of Trustees, has resigned her position effectively immediately.

## Noblesville West Middle School awarded \$15K in teacher contest

Norwegian Cruise Lines awarded cruises to 30 educators as well as thousands of dollars to their schools as part of its Giving Joy campaign, an effort to reward teachers who inspire students and bring joy into the classroom.

Locally, Noblesville West Middle School and teacher Jason Seaman were honored.

The month-long campaign, which recognized the powerful connection between travel and education, launched in advance of the newly revitalized Norwegian Joy's North American inaugural sailing during Teacher Appreciation Week, May 6 to 10. The 30 teachers with the most votes won a seven-day cruise for two and were provided with airfare and accommodations for an award ceremony in Seattle on May 3. There, the three grand prize finalists were awarded with \$25,000, \$15,000 and \$10,000 for their schools.

Noblesville West Middle School received \$15,000 from the cruise line.

The teachers were invited to join a public pier side celebration at the Port of Seattle's Bell Street Pier prior to Norwegian Joy's first sailing from Seattle, Wash. 



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

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# Fishers student wins \$10K in national memory championship

# Scholarly young ladies honored for 2,803 hours of community service

The Crossroads Chapter of National Charity League (NCL) held its annual awards ceremony to recognize its 2019 scholarship winner along with mothers and daughters (grades 7 through 12) for their community service efforts, which culminated in the chapter donating 2,803 volunteer hours over the past year.

### NCL Crossroads Scholarship Winner

The local chapter – the first one in Indiana - has awarded Elizabeth Martine a \$500 scholarship for her consistent involvement in community service, leadership and cultural activities. Martine, a senior at Zionsville Community High School, will attend Indiana University's Kelley School of Business this fall. She plans to pursue a career in Entrepreneurial Business and eventually earn her MBA.

Community service is at the heart of the NCL scholarship and in the heart of Martine. She has been a steadfast volunteer at Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church for both Greek Fest and in the Hellenic Dance Troupe. She has served with Best Buddies, The Lord's Pantry, Women in Engineering at Purdue University and in the Business Professionals of America, among other organizations. After participating in two mission trips to Guatemala, Martine was motivated to get involved with Project Mexico, an organization that helps build homes for deserving families.



## Shaffer runs the numbers on **Performing Arts attendance**

#### Dear Editor:

I have been scolded in an e-mail from the spokesman for the Palladium. He challenged my statement that the Center for the Performing Arts averages just 467 patrons per event.

I had quoted the mayor who said in his State of the City address: "Since the Palladium opened in 2011, our Center for the Performing Arts has become a leader ... hosting more than 1,800 performances, welcoming more than 840,000 patrons." Naively, I divided 840,000 by 1,800 and got 466.667.

Asked if he thought the mayor's words were baseless, my correspondent wrote, "The mayor's words are correct. Your premise is faulty." He rightly noted the Center includes three venues of different capacities - the

Palladium at 1,600, the Tarkington at 55, and the Studio Theater at 200.

I gladly recalculated. First, I divided the 1,800 events by 8 years since 2011 - annual average of 225 events. The 2018-2019 schedules for the three venues is 48 - 177 short of 225.

But, by proportioning the 840,000 attendance proportioned to capacity and dividing that by 8 years and that by the 2018-2019 event number:

 The Palladium shoe-horned 1,974 patrons into 1,600 seats.

• The Tarkington crammed 4,565 bodies into 500 seats.

• And, the Studio Theater creatively places 1,522 folks into 200 seats.
