County Election Board votes down Weingarten's request for investigation

The Hamilton County Election Board voted last Wednesday to dismiss Democratic Chairman Joe Weingarten's request for a full evidentiary hearing regarding allegations of Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard's campaign offering money to mayoral opponent Fred Glynn to not run in the 2019 Primary Election.

During questioning by board member Greg Purvis, Weingarten stated Glynn told him he was offered money to withdraw from the race. Weingarten did not say who offered Glynn the money, stating Glynn told him it was the Brainard campaign.

Weingarten confirmed to Purvis that he was requesting the board to issue subpoenas and hold a full evidentiary hearing in this matter or for the board to ask the county's prosecutor to do it. "Somebody needs to get to the bottom of this," said Weingarten.

Present at the meeting were attorneys Joseph Chapelle, representing Brainard's campaign; Tim DeLaney, representing former Glynn campaign manager Dan Hennessey; and David Brooks, representing Laura Campbell and the Hamilton County Republican Party.

Brooks pointed out in-

consistency in what Weingarten had brought to the election board.

"Mr. Weingarten has provided inconsistent testimony; he submitted an article claiming there was this \$140,000 number and now it's \$40,000," said Brooks. "He says he's talked to Fred Glynn, yet he didn't bother to ask him any questions you need to know. Given that it is hearsay, he didn't ask him (Glynn) to show up and give any evidence at all ... The amount of evidence in front of you at this point is woefully inadequate for you to reach a conclusion that there is a substantial reason to believe that an election law violation has occurred."

Chapelle told Election Board members, "Long-standing Indiana law would be, in an administrative hearing such as this, a decision cannot be based solely on hearsay. The only evidence that has been presented to this body is an article printed in the Carmel Current."

Brooks called Weingarten's complaint frivolous and asked board members Ray Adler, Kathy Williams and Greg Purvis to dismiss the complaint.

Purvis, the only Democrat on the election board, said, "This hearing was not meant to be a full evidentiary hearing. It was my understanding it was to be

a probable cause hearing."

Purvis, when referring as to whether the election board should move forward on Weingarten's complaint, said, "I think we risk violating the public's trust. I think we should have a full evidentiary hearing, even if it turns out to be a 'nothingburger' at the end ... I very much oppose to sweeping this under the rug without having a full evidentiary hearing."

Purvis motioned for the board to conduct a full evidentiary hearing. The motion did not receive a second and died.


After Purvis' motion failed, Election Board President Ray Adler said, "I want to make a comment to the press. The term 'bribe' is a hot button that has nothing to do with anything that happened in this case and I would hope the press would not use that term. It doesn't do anything to add to the academic debate. I think by uniform agreement of the five lawyers in the room it doesn't apply legally."

Williams followed Adler's comments by saying, "I would like to make a motion that we dismiss this complaint due to no probable cause existing at this time." Adler seconded.

The board voted 2-1 not to move forward with Weingarten's complaint, with Purvis voting against Williams' motion.

Accomplishments made, challenges remain for mental health in Fishers

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness was proud of a statistic: 57 percent of students in Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools receiving mental health services saw academic improvement.

But there was another fact that stands in the way of progress: Adults have the right to refuse mental health services and often do, even when it is clear the adults are in need of help.

The mayor began an initiative to promote better mental health as long as he has been in the mayor's office – nearly five years.

The city's "Report To The Community" on the Fishers Mental Health Ini-

tiative was full of accomplishments, but also has a number of challenges before it.

The mayor points to the city's partnership with the local HSE School District and the district's funding of its own mental health program through passing a voter referendum as major accomplishments. But he also pointed to a Fire Department program featuring EMS Duty Officers (EDOs) that specialize in responding to mainly adult residents with mental health issues.

The work continues and the mayor knows there is a long way to go.

Westfield's Northpoint Business Park selected for site readiness program

Fishers looks to the future of 5G technology

The Fishers Board of Works and Public Safety approved a nonexclusive agreement with AT&T last week, allowing the communications giant to install small cell towers, paving the way for 5G technology to be available in the city.

City Attorney Chris Greisl told board members the city will establish an engineering standard and AT&T will attach the 5G small cells to city infrastructure, such as traffic signals, street lights, municipal buildings and park structures. AT&T is looking to begin 5G installations in three areas of downtown

Fishers. The city will talk with other 5G providers about similar agreements.

The board plans on scheduling a work session later this month to discuss the issue of handling city approvals of 5G small cell installations in residential neighborhoods. Mayor Scott Fadness says he is looking for a healthy discussion at the board's work session.

The board will set up the approval process for requests to place this 5G equipment within Fishers neighborhoods. There are a number of small cell pieces of equipment required to furnish 5G service because the range is small – only 500 to 700 feet.



Now as an extrovert you would think I could just walk into that gym and find my way around. Sure, I could do that but I was not comfortable doing so.

The truth is that I have always dreaded walking into a room of people by myself. What if I sit in the seat where someone usually sits? What if I am not familiar with the program and what to do when?

I have tried my best over the years to include new people in a conversation. If

someone looks lost I try to help them find their way. I've also believed that what goes around comes around.

Comfort is found in the simple kindness of others.

My mother was a great example of making people feel comfortable, and at 93 she still does.

Last week when her assisted living was having a Mother's Tea she heard her neighbor say that she would just stay in her room. She had asked the activity director where she was supposed to go and why. Mom sensed her hesitation. Mom gave me the "look."

I reassured her neighbor that she could sit with us and join in the fun. We would

make sure she got back to her apartment. She smiled as she walked with us down the hallway.

with a rural lifestyle develops. 4-H does a phenomenal job of teaching farm kids how to accept criticism. It's pretty hard to stand in front of the judge and listen to him/her explain where

you went wrong with your project, whether it be for horticulture or showing a steer that you thought deserved Grand Champion. After spending all year getting up every single morning – including Christmas and every other holiday – to feed, water and take care of an animal, and to spend countless hours walking it and practicing, it's not very fun to lose. But 4-H'ers

learn through this process how to accept criticism from the judge and use it to make their project even better next year.

For FFA members, reading over the evaluation sheets after contests helps develop the same skill.

Judges will mark where you went wrong and what you should've done and will

usually make notes in the margins of their critiques. Similar to 4-H projects, sometimes these criticisms are hard to hear after spending countless hours striving to make a project perfect.

For farm kids who aren't involved in these organizations, sometimes the criticism comes from the elevator when discussing seed. Or when, for some reason, yields just aren't doing well.

Or when you've stacked all the hay, but the farmer you're working for says you didn't do a good enough job – do it again. This criticism can hurt and be a pain, but farm kids, 4-H'ers and FFA members learn to take it in stride and learn from it.

Many kids who aren't involved with rural life don't learn how to do that until much later in life, which can serve to their detriment in future careers.

Lastly, for most farm kids, family is the cornerstone upon which they stand.

From gathering together for birthdays to helping another farm family with harvest, rural life teaches kids what true family values are.

They're raised to know how important it is to show up for family events.

Farm life teaches kids the value of serving others through family relationships as well.

Whether it's helping a local farmer harvest wheat because he was injured by a steer or fell ill, to loading up supplies and food to help a family in a rough spot, farm kids learn that it's never all about them. There's always someone else who can be helped, somewhere else to be served. Rural communities are frequently rather close-knit, and many farming families grow up together, so this mentality of service bears helpful to all.

In conclusion, there is no such thing as "just" a farm kid. People who are raised on a farm or involved with agriculture develop a plethora of skills that will be forever beneficial to them.

Royals win fourth in a row, seven schools get individual champs

FISHERS - This year's edition of the Hamilton Southeastern girls track and field sectional was arguably one of the more balanced sections on record.

The athletes at last Tuesday's event performed accordingly, with great performances from all of the competing schools. That included individual sectional champions from seven different schools.

In the team standings, the host Royals won again, using their solid depth to score 143 points. This marks the fourth straight sectional title for Southeastern, its longest streak of consecutive wins. Overall, HSE has won 13 team sectional championships.

Southeastern won the most individual events with seven, including two in record time. Senior Tierra Sydnor was part of both new records: She set a new mark while winning the long jump, breaking her own record with an effort of 18 feet, 8.5 inches. At the conclusion of the meet, Sydnor joined Olivia Burgess, Mya Hammons, Sydnor and Alyssa Barker running under the state standard time. Other top three finishers (and regional qualifiers) for the Royals are Barker in the 100 and 200 dashes, Burgess in the 200 dash, Halle Hill in the 1600 run, Kennedy Drish in the pole vault and Jehnea Mirro in the long jump.

Plenty on to regionals, lots of good spots there," said HSE coach Julie Alano. "800, Maddie Mirro did well. 200, we went 2-3, those two are both running well. Just lots of good spots. We like to have someone score in every event. We didn't quite do that tonight like we did last week, but still a good night."

In addition, Ella Wilhelm finished fifth in the pole vault, but her vault of 11-2 was right on the state standard, giving her a ticket to the regional next week.

backs: McFarland in the 400 dash, Pedersen in the 800 run, Ellie Johnson in the 3200 run and Madisyn Etheredge in the high jump, bringing the Royals' qualifying total to 19.

Fishers finished in second place as a team, scoring 110.5 points. Freshman phenom Ella Scally led the way, winning three events.

Scally was first in the 100 and 200 dashes, then joined Myah Donaldson, Gabrielle Lewis and Grace May to take the 4x100 relay.

Scally also advanced in the long jump, placing second.

CARMEL - After a one-day delay, the Carmel boys track and field event took place Friday at Carmel Stadium.

It was worth the wait, especially for the host Greyhounds, as they claimed the team trophy. It was the first sectional title for Carmel since 2017 and its 26th overall championship. In addition, the Greyhounds had four champions and had 21 qualifiers for Thursday's regional at Lafayette Jefferson.

"The guys did a great job," said Carmel coach Ken Browner. "We're a young team and we really scored where we needed to score. We didn't really lose much

The Tigers also swept the middle to long distance races. Freshman Keefer Soehnigen cruised to a win in the 400 dash; his time of 49.62 seconds was over a second ahead of second place.


