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Fishers launches Civil Rights investigation into Clerk's Office

The Fishers City Council is investigating City Clerk Jennifer Kehl in what the council describes as a "Title VII" probe.

Title VII is a part of the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits employers from discriminating against employees on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin and religion. The council news release does not specify which part of Title VII is involved in this case.

The council statement says a third party will be contracted to conduct this investigation.

"As of this moment I have not been made aware of any specific allegations brought against me," said Kehl. "I am confident I will be found innocent of the allegations as that is not who I am. I have not done anything wrong."

A statement issued by the Fishers City Council said the following:

"On May 10, Fishers City Council was made aware of several Title VII allegations against City Clerk Jennifer Kehl by current and former employees. The City Council takes every allegation of discrimination and harassment very seriously

and immediately acted to provide workplace accommodations.

"The City Council has hired a third-party firm to conduct an independent investigation into the allegations. Although the Office of the Clerk is separate and distinct from the City of Fishers, the City Council has investigatory powers over all officers, departments and employees of the City. "The City Council respects the order of due process that all parties involve deserve. The City Council will not provide further comment until the investigation is complete."

Carmel stops all events at Lucas Estate

The City of Carmel is filing requests for a preliminary and a permanent injunction against the Lucas Estate to prohibit them from conducting a business at their private residential property.

For the past two years, the city has tried to work with the Lucases to come to an equitable solution to the issue created by their repeated violations of the residential zoning ordinances that occur when they make a profit from hosting large scale events at the property at 116th Street and Ditch Road. At this point, the City of Carmel believes that the Lucases have not shown a good faith effort to comply and therefore, the city is taking this action.

"It doesn't matter who you are, we owe it to the residential neighbors in the community to require compliance from the Lucases," said Mayor Jim Brainard. "The neighbors rely on the city to enforce the zoning ordinances in place, which helps protect their property values."

The events at the Lucas Estate have repeatedly created a large volume of traffic, generated noise complaints and violated the zoning ordinance. While the Lucases claim that they are only making this venue available to close friends and business clients, it does not appear that this is the truth as advertisements for the space have appeared in wedding guides. It is also listed on Facebook and a website as the location for a concert series.

The fact that the Lucases claim they are donating the event space for non-profit events does not hide the fact that the Lucases are making a profit from the catering for these events. Other for-profit event venues often donate or reduce room charges when the cost of the food and beverage service reaches a certain level.

The fact that the venue is not required to install the same safety features as other event venues also puts event attendees at greater risk and poses an unfair advantage in the marketplace when charities are looking for venues in which to hold their fundraising events.

Honoring a half-block of history with Noblesville's Levinson

Construction set to begin on new apartments, parking garage

The Levinson construction is getting underway in downtown Noblesville. City officials have been working with Rebar Development and our community partners to help minimize the impact from construction on public parking.

Check out Noblesville-NOW.com and follow us on Facebook and Twitter to get the latest updates, and help share our downtown parking map to alleviate the inconvenience from the construction.

We look forward to the day when we can add 83 high-end apartments, a 300-space parking garage and 5,000 square feet of commercial space. However, before we break ground on this transformative project that will help support and sustain our downtown well into the future, it's important to remember our past – and how we got here.

Many residents are curious about what the excavation may uncover once it begins. Fred Swift devoted a column in *The Hamilton County Reporter* to this topic on Aug. 25, 2018, when he asked, "What lies beneath new project site?" The city plans to dedicate a display in City Hall about the Levinson construction and showcase any interesting artifacts.

The half-block area where the Levinson will be constructed on Maple Avenue between 8th Street and

9th Street has served many purposes throughout our history. The site evolved over time from the days of The Wild Opera House facing 9th Street, which stood from 1895 to 1959, and the Houston Hotel on the corner of 8th Street and Maple Avenue that was built in 1898, but burned down in 1984.

Even during the Wild Opera House's lifetime, its use changed over time as well. Built for stage productions, the Wild was converted to mostly show silent movies in 1919 before eventually transitioning to "talkies," but closed as a full-time movie theatre in 1936.

The current structure at Maple Avenue and 9th Street was originally envisioned as a 50-foot-tall, four-story hotel – but the builder's plans

got downgraded. Ownership has changed hands over the years as well, along with the buildings' facades. Previous occupants included a telegraph office, a telephone exchange, an electric railway company, a music store popular with musicians, and lastly, attorney and real estate offices.

The evolution of Noblesville on this half-block of downtown has included two different city hall buildings, the first constructed in the 1870s and the second in 1954, until City Hall was relocated in the 1980s to its current site, repurposing the old Carnegie Library that had been built in 1912. Police and fire departments also moved – but across Maple Avenue to where they stand today, occupying

Each summer after swim season ended, Mom and Dad would load the whole family into the station wagon so we could travel all over the U.S. She planned each trip without the internet, credit cards or cell phones. We survived trips to Custer's Last Stand and Gettysburg (though it seemed the larger battles were fought in the car), the South, the East Coast, Cape Cod, Canada, Seattle, San Francisco, and a few lively Spring Breaks in Panama City.

Our last big childhood trip was in 1971, with the whole family piled into a VW bus for a legendary journey through the European Alps. Mom only made reservations for the first and last nights, finding guest houses along the way. We all seemed to inherit this sense of wanderlust, for which we are eternally grateful. Famed fashion designer Norman Norell was a Noblesville Levinson

Work has begun in earnest on clearing the site of the new Levinson complex as Deputy Mayor Steve Cooke observed in a *Hamilton County Reporter* guest column last week. In his

column Cooke reviewed the history of the Levinson site on Maple Avenue which consists of a half-block of land between 8th and 9th streets and north from Maple to the mid-block alley.

Official groundbreaking is set for the end of June for the new structure which will be composed of retail space, apartments and a parking garage. Most of the ground is now a parking lot, but one building, formerly housing

the Holt Legal Group and Ayer's Realty office, is being cleared for the project.

But, the interesting thing is the history of the Levinson family which donated so much to Noblesville, and produced one of the city's most famous sons, Norman Norell. His legal name was Norman Levinson. Operating with the professional name of Norell, he became one of the nation's leading fashion designers.

During his 50-year career Norman designed both men's and women's clothing, but achieved fame in women's wear design. Such celebrities as Marilyn Monroe were clients. Even

after Norman's death, First Lady Michelle Obama wore Norell designed dresses.

Norman Levinson was born in 1900 in his family's home at 840 Cherry Street which was located on land his ancestors had purchased in 1857. Norman likely developed an interest in fashion design while working at his father's clothing store on the Courthouse Square. Harry Levinson later moved his store to downtown Indianapolis where the Levinson store operated into the 1970s.

But, Norman wanted to go to New York and did so after a time in military school. From 1922 until his death in 1972, the name Norman Norell became famous in the world of clothing design and his

work can still be viewed online. (Levinson is buried in Crownland Cemetery.)

Meanwhile the Levinson family, finding success in Noblesville and later Indianapolis, gave generously to their home town. Funds went toward building the local Masonic Lodge, the former high school gym and Forest Park golf course. Their ongoing gift is the Levinson Award, scholarships awarded to a graduating senior boy and girl at Noblesville High School each year.

So, it is fitting that the city's newest downtown development on land formerly owned by the Levinsons is named for this benevolent family which never forgot the community from which they came.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness sent out a Twitter message the day before delivering his State of the City address. As he was putting the finishing touches on the speech, he wrote, "It looks to be a bit unconventional."

Unconventional it was. The mayor gave up a good deal of his allotted time to local school officials and his senior staff to talk about what they are doing.

The mayor was brief but

to the point on what needs to be done in his second term – Indianapolis, as a metropolitan area, has problems, and those problems can be solved only if all local officials in the region are willing to be part of the solution.

Fadness called on local officials in the Indianapolis metropolitan area to "come together and work as

a region to tackle these ... issues, not because it's simply the right thing to do, but because every other region out there that we are competing against is already doing it."

Fadness argues that a state measure, championed by local State Representative Todd Huston, would have allowed regions to "marshal revenue streams"

to improve an entire metro area. That bill did not pass during this year's legislative session, but the mayor vows there will be an effort to enact the proposal in next year's session of the Indiana General Assembly.

"I'm committed to seeing this happen in my next term in office," said Fadness, "not only because I think it's the right thing to do, but it's because I believe it is directly tied to the long-term success of the city that I live in, the city I love, Fishers."

the former U.S. Post Office building.

Delving into this history proves that change has always been part of Noblesville's past – it's a sign of the community's growth. But that doesn't mean we have to forget our history. In fact, the 1950s-era City Hall sign that once stood over the entrance of that building, and is currently facing 8th Street, will continue to be preserved. The sign and much of the brick work from the two buildings on Maple Avenue that will soon come down will be incorporated into the Levinson's interior.

These are some of the ways the city and Rebar Development are honoring Noblesville's past while moving forward with downtown's first apartment building in more than a century.

Another way we are honoring history is by the name of the project itself, which we were fortunate to learn about from county historian David Heighway. The Levinson family homestead stood on 8th Street and was described in a Noblesville Ledger article from Feb. 23, 1938, as a landmark of the community during its heyday and "at one time the center of many social events and charity programs."

The Levinsons emigrated from Germany and settled in Noblesville in 1857 to open a successful clothing shop that operated on the square for more than 40 years. This prominent Jewish family gave much of their time, attention and money to important causes and community endeavors – including funds for a new high school gymnasium, a high school scholarship and construction of Forest Park to name a few.

According to the Ledger, with the donation of their homestead in 1938, the "property belongs to the city and perhaps some way may be arranged to commemorate the memory of this popular and helpful family of the early days of Noblesville."

Their memory deserves more than a parking lot. As the project bearing their name rises from the ground, the Levinsons will be remembered forever for their service to the community in which they lived, worked, raised two generations and gave so much of their success back to Noblesville.

I am proud that the City of Noblesville is both making history with this project as well as honoring our history for generations to come.

Track and field regional

Southeastern girls edge out West Lafayette for team title

LAFAYETTE - Hamilton Southeastern went into the final event of last Tuesday's Lafayette Jefferson girls track and field regional with the slimmest of leads: One-half of a point over West Lafayette.

All the Royals had to do was finish ahead of the Red Devils, and the regional plaque was theirs again. No problem: Southeastern won the 4x400 relay, which clinched another championship for HSE. The Royals finished with 104.5 points to West Lafayette's 101, thus winning their 15th regional title.

Just as important, if not more so, Southeastern had 10 qualifiers for the IHSAA state finals, which will take place Saturday, June 1 at Indiana University. The Royals will head to Bloomington as defending state champions.

The seniors led the way for the Royals. Kennedy Drish claimed her third straight pole vault title. Drish, in fact, broke the regional record with her vault of 12 feet, 6 inches.

It was a remarkable result for Drish, the two-time defending state champion in that event, as she had been injured for most of the season. Drish herself said her goal was just to get the state standard of 11-2, thus automatically qualifying for state.

"That was my goal, was just to clear 11-2, and then see how high I could get," said Drish.

Senior Lulu Black won the 3200 run, and was part of the state-qualifying 4x800 relay, which finished second. Senior Maddie Mirro, sophomore Annice McFarland and junior Ellie Pedersen were also on the 4x800.

Senior Tierra Sydnor was part of the Royals' two relay wins. Sydnor joined senior Mya Hammons, junior Olivia Burgess and sophomore Alyssa Barker in winning the 4x100 event. Burgess, Hammons, Sydnor and freshman Regan Wans were on HSE's victorious 4x400 relay.

Sydnor also finished second in the 300 hurdles, sending her to state in three events. The top three in each event head to state, along with anyone who equals or betters the state standard in an event.

"Tierra and Lulu did really well," said HSE coach Julie Alano. "Kennedy coming back and winning the pole vault, that's huge."

Other state qualifiers for Southeastern included Barker and Burgess, who were second and third respectively in the 200 dash; Wans, who placed second in the 400 dash, and Ella Wilhelm in the pole vault, who tied for fourth but matched the state standard of 11-2. Three Royals received callbacks to state: Sophomore Halle Hill in the 1600 run, Mirro in the 800 run and Sydnor in the long jump.

Fishers placed third as a team with 56.5 points and had five regional qualifiers. Freshman Ella Scally had a part in four of those efforts.

Scally won the 200 dash, placed second in the long jump and took third in the 100 dash. Scally also ran on the Tigers' runner-up 4x100 team, along with senior Myah Donaldson, junior Gabby Lewis and senior Grace May.

"It's been a pretty cool year," said Scally. "I worked really hard to get here and it's just been really fun with all my teammates helping me get here."

Sophomore Alison Casey tied for fourth in the pole vault, but qualified for state as she was one of six vaulters

to make the 11-2 state standard.

"It was a good meet tonight," said Fishers coach Andrew Belloli. He called Scally's performance "outstanding again," and had praise for other athletes as well, including the Tigers' 4x800 relay. The team of junior Abby Carter, freshman Vera Schafer, junior Emma Gillespie and freshman Elizabeth Barrett finished fourth in that event, and received a callback. Schafer also got a callback in the 800.

"The 4x1 was excellent again tonight and Alison Casey in the pole vault was one of six to hit the state standard, which is incredible," said Belloli.

Noblesville had a solid meet, placing fifth and getting five state qualifiers. Shelby Tyler made it to state in two events, winning the high jump (where she is the two-time defending state champion) and the pole vault, where she placed sixth but made the state standard of 11-2.

Freshman Kiana Siefert had an outstanding day in the long jump, placing second. Her best jump of 17-6 was a personal best by more than a foot.

"It's insane," said Siefert. "I'm a freshman. I've been doing track since I was like, 5 or 6 since my mom did it all throughout high school and college. And it's just such a cool experience. I love all my teammates. It's just a really fun sport."

Senior Maria Anderson qualified for state in two events,

placing third in the 400 dash and joining sophomore Bella Sharples-Gordon, senior Aubrie Deal and junior Anna Hazelrigg for a third-place result in the 4x800 relay. The 4x400 relay team of Anderson, sophomore DeLaney Boles, Sharples-Gordon and Hazelrigg received a callback.

Carmel finished seventh as a team. Junior Phoebe Bates qualified for state in both long-distance events, placing second in the 1600 run and third in the 3200. The Greyhounds also got a callback in the 4x800; the team consisted of junior Emily Hand, sophomore Annie Christie, junior Martha Hunter and junior Sydney Haines.

Hamilton Heights sophomore Maria Mitchell earned a place at state in the 1600 run. Mitchell finished fifth, but her time of 5:02.10 beat the state standard. She also received a callback in the 800 run.

"I was pretty excited," said Mitchell. "I was kind of nervous, I wasn't sure if I was going to make it, but the state standard is what I got."

Sheridan junior Becca Merritt won the discus with a throw of 133-7, qualifying for state in that event. Merritt also qualified for state in the shot put.

Westfield senior Zoe Pentecost placed second in the discus, also qualifying for state.

Guerin Catholic senior Ellie Schroeder finished third in the 800 run, earning her a place at state.

Fishers boys claim first ever regional championship

Here's an interesting trivia question: How many track and field teams have won a regional championship before ever winning a sectional championship?

Whatever the answer is, now Fishers can be added to the list. The Tigers won their first-ever post-season track and field title Thursday by claiming the Lafayette Jefferson regional. Fishers

emerged out of a crowded field, scoring 90 points.

"I'm thrilled for them," said Tigers coach Nathan Warnecke. "Great night."

Athletes of all ages had a part in Fishers' historic win. Senior Ethan Meyer had a part in three of the Tigers' five event wins, starting with the 4x800 relay. Meyer joined senior Hunter Christy, junior Drew Smith and soph-

omore Jayden Castillo in placing first in that event.

Meyer later won the 1600 run, finishing over five seconds ahead of second place. Then in the 4x400 relay, Meyer joined senior H.L. Lewis, Castillo and freshmen Keefer Soehngen to win that race, beating out West Lafayette by a quarter of a second.

"I just want to help our team score as much as we can, because we knew it was going to be a close meet," said Meyer.

Soehngen cruised to victory in the 400 dash. In the throwing events, junior Hayden Tobias won the shot put and also placed third in the discus, while his classmate Wyatt Puff was second in the discus and third in the shot put.

"It feels amazing," said Tobias. "Putting in all that hard work. It feels great for it to finally pay off."

All of the above athletes qualified for next Friday's IHSAA state finals at Indiana University. The top

three finishers in each event make it to state. Fishers got two callbacks, giving them 10 total state qualifiers; Castillo advanced in the 800 run and Lewis earned a spot in the 200 dash.

"State's a whole different

animal," said Warnecke. "Hopefully we get a few more callbacks and we'll just go down there to Bloomington and do the best we can."

Hamilton Southeastern finished fourth with 70 points. The Royals won three events and had top-three finishes in three more, giving them six state qualifiers.

Senior Noah Malone continued his post-season dominance. Malone won the 100 dash in a new regional record time of 10.61 seconds, beating the old record of Avon's Issac Guerendo by .02 seconds. Malone also easily won the 200 dash. Senior Jacob Wiggers placed first in the 3200 run.

Also qualifying for state from Southeastern were sophomore Chris Stein in the 400 dash, sophomore Xan Cluff in the pole vault, and the 4x100 relay of team of freshman Stephen Sydnor, sophomore Gage Pratt, junior Caleb Durden and Malone. All of the above

finished third in their respective events. The Royals got two callbacks: Senior Eric Carothers in the 1600 and Pratt in the 200.

Carmel finished fifth as a team with 65.5 points. Junior Logan Sandlin picked up a win for the Greyhounds in the pole vault and also finished second in the 300 hurdles, qualifying for state in both events.

"It feels great," said Sandlin. "It takes a lot of work in the pole vault just because it's such a technical event. So to see everything come together in a big meet, it means a lot."

Carmel had two other state qualifiers. Senior Pat Campbell was the runner-up in the 3200 run, and the 4x800 relay team of senior Drew Thornton, freshman Charlie Schuman and seniors Robert Kinney and Thomas Gastineau placed second as well.

Tigers power their way to Sectional 8 championship

CARMEL – Something had to give. Locked in a scoreless tie with rival Hamilton Southeastern in the Sectional 8 championship last Wednesday night, the Fishers Tigers needed a breakthrough, and their potent lineup delivered.

It was just a matter of time. “We’re pretty potent all the way through,” Fishers coach Daren James said. “When you’re 0-0, it just takes one big swing, and I’m glad we’re the ones that got it because they have some hitters in that lineup that can put it on the other side of the fence, too.”

Hannah Mays provided the first big hit with a home run lined directly over the center field wall at the Cherry Tree Softball Complex, and her teammates followed suit as Fishers erupted with a decisive eight-run, seven-hit bottom of the sixth to defeat HSE 8-0 for the title.

The championship marked Fishers first since 2015-16 and second overall in program history. In their Mudsock showdown earlier this season, the Tigers won 5-4, and early on the game appeared destined to end in similar fashion.

Then, the Tigers caught fire.

Fishers sent 12 batters to the plate in the bottom of the sixth and chased HSE starter Jaylah Guilliam after three consecutive hits. Olivia Bucher relieved Guilliam, but the Royals reinserted their starter after four hits by Fishers.

Mays had both of her hits against Guilliam, who was 6-6 on the season with 59

strikeouts in 70.2 innings pitched leading up to the championship game.

“(Guilliam) stymied us for five,” James said. “We got the one big hit, and that got us going.”

Nothing came easy for the hard-hitting Tigers, however, despite carrying a .394 team batting average into the championship final. With 230 runs scored in 24 games prior at an average of 9.5 runs per game, Guilliam stifled the Tigers through the first five innings. At least until, Mays came out swinging in the bottom of the sixth.

Mays finished the game 3-for-4 and drove in five runs – all in the sixth inning.

Her two-run bomb to dead center was just the start. Her bases-loaded three-run double was the icing as Fishers jumped ahead for good 8-0 with two outs.

“Hitting the home run was basically like I won the trophy, but hitting the double put more and more on top of the cake,” Mays said. “It was so nice.”

Mays, who limited Carmel to one hit during the quarterfinals on Monday en route to a 10-0 run-rule win, pitched the Tigers past the defending sectional champion Noblesville Millers 10-2 with five hits allowed in the semifinals on Tuesday. Against the Royals (14-10), Mays held the opposition to four hits – all singles.

“I had to focus a lot because I know a bunch of those girls and I know they can really hit the ball,” Mays said. “I really tried focusing on spinning the ball and using my legs a bunch, but I also knew if I threw a bad pitch that my defense would have my back.”

Mays struck out six and walked two with a hit batter, but she induced 11 pop outs and three groundouts to defuse every threat, including runners on the corners in the top of the sixth with one out. Mays improved to 13-6 with three straight postseason wins.

The defense backed its ace to minimize the Royals’ dangerous lineup that had hit .362 entering the Mudsock rematch.


“We just want to win so much. The closer and closer we get, the more we see it. We’re just waiting to grab it,” Fishers shortstop Brooke Benson remarked on the team’s state championship aspirations. “Our end goal is that state trophy. That’s been our goal since the beginning.”

Fishers (16-9) struggled against Guilliam leading up to the bottom of the sixth, leaving five runners stranded, including three in scoring position. The trend didn’t last long.

Guilliam held the Tigers to three hits before Benson, and Indiana commit, reached base after getting hit by a pitch to lead off the frame. From there, Mays took over, launching a 1-1 offering over the wall.

The Tigers 2-0 lead swelled to 4-0 after catcher Sarah Bumps, who was 2-for-3, drove in a pair with a bases-loaded single. Courtney James added an RBI single with one out to make it 5-0, then Mays capped the inning with the bases loaded for a third time in the bottom of the sixth.

“That (home run) gave us all satisfaction knowing we had at least a safety net with two runs, if they did score one run that we had at least

a one-run lead,” Benson said. “That’s all we needed.” The home run was Fishers’ 33rd overall this season and Mays’ seventh.

“I knew this was a talented group,” said Daren James. “I told them from the start, I thought this was the most talented group Fishers has ever had, so let’s see what we can do with it. We’re still chugging along.”

For the seniors, who were freshmen the last time Fishers won sectional, the late-game charge brought them full circle and one step away from a potential regional championship. The Tigers hosted Harrison in the regional on Tuesday. (The game was played after press time.)

“Since the seniors saw the first sectional in school history and now seeing it again, it makes everything worth it, working toward this for the past four years,” Bumps said. “It’s going to be really nice to be on our home turf (for regional).”

In last Tuesday’s semi-

finals, Fishers defeated Noblesville 10-2 to reach the championship game, with the Royals beat North Central 10-0 in five innings. The sectional began last Monday with the Tigers beating Carmel 10-0 in five innings, and the Millers defeating Westfield 17-3.
