For many years, the City of Fishers has been eyeing parts of Indianapolis Metropolitan Airport for economic development, and a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was announced between Fishers and the Indianapolis Airport Authority (IAA) in October of 2015 with that development in mind.

World Trade Center Indianapolis signs partnership with Indian counterpart in Carmel

World Trade Center Indianapolis and World Trade Center Pune forged a new partnership over the weekend, signaling an era of cooperation between the Hoosier-based economic development group and their counterparts in Pune, India.

WTC Pune Managing Director Sagar Chordia joined WTC Indianapolis official Doris Anne Sadler and Indiana Economic Development Corporation India Director Raju Chinthala of Carmel at a gathering of Indiana business leaders on Sunday in Carmel to sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the two World Trade Centers.

The signed agreement details potential opportunities for WTC Indianapolis and WTC Pune to collaborate – including trade missions, lead generation for businesses in both regions, and support for each organization's international marketing efforts. Both World Trade Center groups will name a liaison to

serve as first contact for the partnership. "We are leading Indiana into a new era of economic cooperation with India," said Sadler. "Between the work of firms like Cummins and Infosys and the work Governor Holcomb has done to establish connections in India, our state economy is in a great position grow alongside some of the fastest emerging markets in the world."

Governor Holcomb led a trade delegation to Pune in October 2017, creating the pathway for WTC Pune and WTC Indianapolis to collaborate.

The two regions have a longstanding history. Columbus-based manufacturer Cummins opened its India headquarters in Pune in 1962, and the two have been sister cities since 2018. Columbus Mayor Jim

Sobriety checkpoint coming this weekend

A sobriety checkpoint will be conducted on the night of Friday, May 31 and the early hours of Saturday,

Impaired driving is one of the nation's most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2017, alcohol-related traffic crashes killed 99 people and injured another 1,788 people. Twenty-five percent of all drivers involved in fatal collisions in Indiana were legally impaired.

In Hamilton County in 2018, the State filed 989 cases involving impaired driving. Of these, 170 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

To combat this crime, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will be setting up sobriety checkpoints around Hamilton County to aggressively deter, detect and arrest those drivers who make the decision to drive impaired. Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

In order to raise awareness of the prevalence of impaired driving in our community and the efforts of the Partnership to combat the crime, the Partnership maintains a webpage at hamiltoncounty.in.gov/503.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along the roadway, often depending upon the support of local

of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data and a consideration of officer safety.

Vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officers available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety concerns.

Upon making contact with the driver, the officer advises them that they've been stopped at an HCTSP sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license and the vehicle's registration. If, in the course of the contact, the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and that the driver may be impaired or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. Further investigation may involve the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs).

On the other hand, if all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is often on his or her way in less than two minutes.

Officers staffing the sobriety checkpoints work on an overtime basis paid by grant funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration through the Indiana Governor's Council on Impaired and Dangerous Driving.
