# Fishers calls for proposals to develop metropolitan airport

For many years, the City of Fishers has been eyeing parts of Indianapolis Metropolitan Airport for economic development, and a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was announced between Fishers and the Indianapolis Airport Authority (IAA) in October of 2015 with that development in mind.

On Wednesday, the parties announced the next step in developing part of the land at the airport by calling for proposals to develop a large part of that property.

The private firm JLL is involved in this process, named last year as marketing broker for the project.

"The City of Fishers

welcomes the opportunity to partner with the Indianapolis Airport Authority and JLL on this call for proposals," said Mayor Scott Fadness in a city news release. "We have seen a significant amount of interest in this property since our

MOU was established in 2015, but developers and companies have been hesitant due to the preference of land leases. We now have the chance to sell this land and continue to transform development along 96th Street."

Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger,

who also serves as IAA's Vice President, said, "This further step with JLL is a continuation of that positive momentum that will deliver improvements to our citizens."

IAA owns the airport property, which is just north of 96th Street on Fishers' southwest side.

# Quick look at June events and issues

Noblesville's newest roundabout will get underway soon at Cumberland Road and Field Drive near Noblesville High School, with construction beginning immediately after the end of the school year next week. The intersection will be closed for eight weeks, and open by the start of school Aug. 1.

Clay Township Democrats will caucus June 26 to choose the party's candidate for mayor of Carmel and possibly a city council candidate, says County Chairman Joe Weingarten. Democrats have until June 30 to fill their ticket for the November general election, but no new candidates are expected in other municipalities.

County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt will speak at the June 19 meeting of the

County Republican Breakfast Club updating members and guests on current county projects and upcoming plans. The breakfast meeting will be held at Bridgewater Clubhouse near Westfield.

The Cool Creek Summer Concert Series begins at 7 p.m. on Friday, June 14. Sponsored by the Hamilton County Parks Department, the series of six outdoor concerts is held annually at Cool Creek Park, located just east of U.S. 31 at 151st Street. Admission is \$5.

Test borings are being conducted through downtown Noblesville. The object of the drilling is to measure any ground water contamination coming from places of business that may have had seepage of chemicals into the soil. The test wells will be monitored from time to time with results going to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

# World Trade Center Indianapolis signs partnership with Indian counterpart in Carmel

World Trade Center Indianapolis and World Trade Center Pune forged a new partnership over the weekend, signaling an era of cooperation between the Hoosier-based economic development group and their counterparts in Pune, India.

WTC Pune Managing Director Sagar Chordia joined WTC Indianapolis official Doris Anne Sadler and Indiana Economic Development Corporation India Director Raju Chinthala of Carmel at a gathering of Indiana business leaders on Sunday in Carmel to sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the two World Trade Centers.

The signed agreement details potential opportunities for WTC Indianapolis and WTC Pune to collaborate – including trade missions, lead generation for businesses in both regions, and support for each organization's international marketing efforts. Both World Trade Center groups will name a liaison to serve as first contact for the partnership.

"We are leading Indiana into a new era of economic cooperation with India," said Sadler. "Between the work of firms like Cummins and Infosys and the work Governor Holcomb has done to establish connections in India, our state economy is in a great position to grow alongside some of the fastest emerging markets in the world."

Governor Holcomb led a trade delegation to Pune in October 2017, creating the pathway for WTC Pune and WTC Indianapolis to collaborate.

The two regions have a longstanding history. Columbus-based manufacturer Cummins opened its India headquarters in Pune in 1962, and the two have been sister cities since 2018. Columbus Mayor Jim

Lienhoop even traveled with the Indiana Economic Development Corporation to meet with WTC Pune.

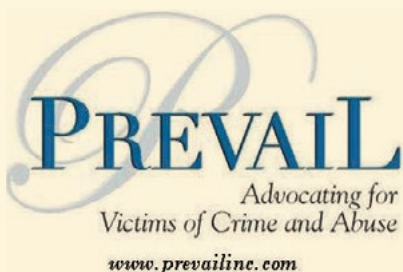
“The MOU between WTC Indianapolis and WTC Pune, Maharashtra [in India] is significant considering the similar industrial ecosystem in states of Indiana and Maharashtra,” said Mr. Sagar Chordia, managing director of WTC Pune.

He added that the existing bilateral trade and investments can be mutually fostered by the two WTC locations, with inward delegations and trade services to serve as a starting point.

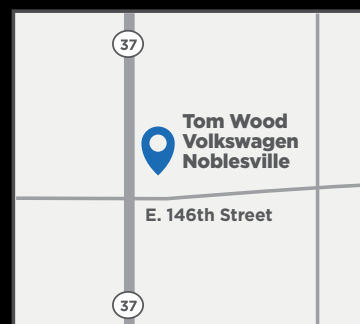

# Heights names 2019 Teachers of the Year

Volz, who has worn many hats during her long tenure at Heights, says one of the most important things she does daily as a teacher is to create an environment where her students feel comfortable learning and sharing. She works to ensure that every student knows they are noticed, they count, and they are important.

Volz has an enthusiastic and upbeat personality that makes her a favorite among students. Many of her former students credit her for the success that they have had in college. Volz lives in Westfield with her husband Ryan and daughter Ellen, 11.

**Kari Beery**

It wasn't until after Kari Beery's first semester at Purdue University that she realized she had a knack for engaging kids and connecting with them. This began her path toward education and a successful career as a middle school teacher.

Beery, who strives to bring her best every day, is an outstanding teacher and leader at Hamilton Heights Middle School. She has the ability to motivate students

to do their best and help students achieve at a high level. She is the type of individual who doesn't mind getting in the trenches and putting in the time it takes to do her job well. The selection process for the annual Teacher of the Year begins after Spring Break. The annual Teacher of the Year nominees should reflect the HHSC Core Values of Innovation, Community, Accountability, Respect, Encouragement and Excellence. A nominee must have received a Teacher Evaluation Rating of either Effective or Highly Effective the previous year at HHSC to be considered for the Building Level Award. From the nominees, the building level Teacher of the Year is chosen by the building level administration team. Selection is based on nominee's reflection of HHSC Core Values and Teacher Evaluation Rating. Building Level Teacher of the Year are asked to submit a Professional Biography, Philosophy of Teaching and Letter of Support by May 15. The selection committee meets to review information submitted for each candidate and make their selection for the HHSC Teacher of the Year by June 1.

**About the INTOY Program**

Each year, the Indiana Department of Education

conducts this special program to recognize outstanding classroom teachers from across the state. One person, in accordance with National Teacher of the Year guidelines, is chosen to represent Indiana teachers at the national level.

All school corporations are invited to share in this recognition program by honoring their teachers and nominating one teacher to represent local educators at the state level of the program. IDOE hopes the underlying idea behind the recognition of excellent teachers will spread to every community in Indiana.

# Sobriety checkpoint coming this weekend

A sobriety checkpoint will be conducted on the night of Friday, May 31 and the early hours of Saturday, June 1.

Impaired driving is one of the nation's most frequently committed violent crimes. Just in Indiana in 2017, alcohol-related traffic crashes killed 99 people and injured another 1,788 people. Twenty-five percent of all drivers involved in fatal collisions in Indiana were legally impaired.

In Hamilton County in 2018, the State filed 989 cases involving impaired driving. Of these, 170 drivers had prior convictions for operating while intoxicated within the last five years.

To combat this crime, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership will be setting up sobriety checkpoints around Hamilton County to aggressively detect and arrest those drivers who make the decision to drive impaired. Sobriety checkpoints have proven successful in both raising awareness of impaired driving and reducing the likelihood of a person driving after they have been drinking.

In order to raise awareness of the prevalence of impaired driving in our community and the efforts of the Partnership to combat the crime, the Partnership maintains a webpage at [hamiltoncounty.in.gov/503](http://hamiltoncounty.in.gov/503).

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along the roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use

of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data and a consideration of officer safety.

Vehicles are stopped in a specific sequence, such as every other vehicle, every third vehicle, every fourth vehicle or by stopping three, four, or five cars in succession and allowing other traffic to proceed while checking the stopped vehicles. The planned sequence in which vehicles are stopped depends on the number of officers available to staff the checkpoint, traffic congestion, and other safety concerns.

Upon making contact with the driver, the officer advises them that they've been stopped at an HCTSP sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license and the vehicle's registration. If, in the course of the contact, the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and that the driver may be impaired or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. Further investigation may involve the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs).

On the other hand, if all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is often on his or her way in less than two minutes.

Officers staffing the sobriety checkpoints work on an overtime basis paid by grant funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration through the Indiana Governor's Council on Impaired and Dangerous Driving.

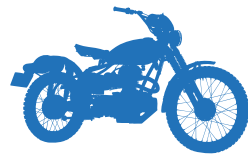

Sobriety checkpoints are conducted in 37 states, including Indiana, and the District of Columbia. In 1990, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that, if conducted properly, sobriety checkpoints do not constitute an illegal search and seizure.

In the 2002 case of State v. Gerschoffer, the Indiana Supreme Court found that sobriety checkpoints are constitutional when conducted properly. Members of the Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney's Office work

with the Partnership to ensure that each checkpoint meets constitutional requirements.

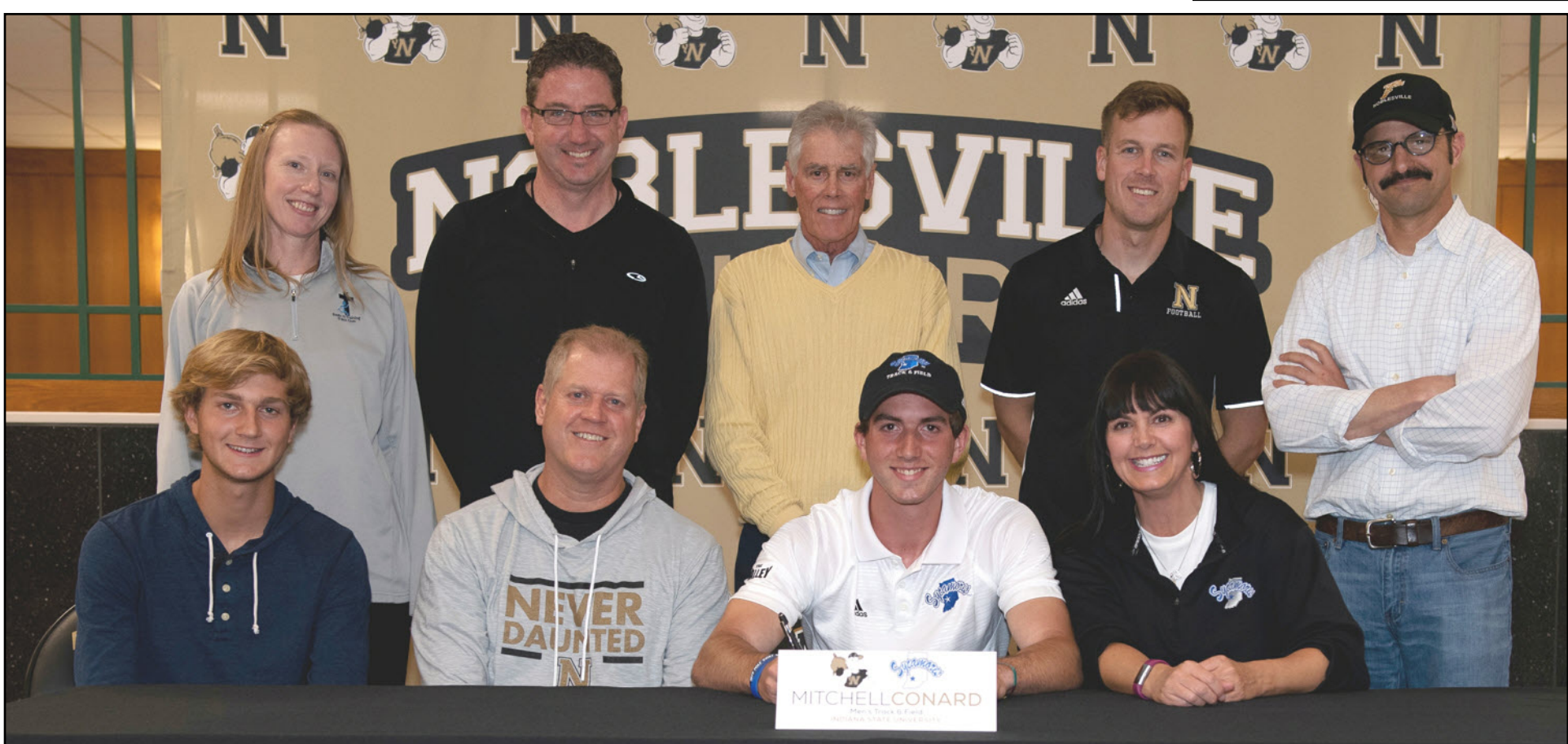
