## Noblesville goes with the flow

Indiana American Water, a subsidiary of American Water Company, released details on an \$18 million project that adds additional capacity and water treatment capabilities to its Noblesville system. The project includes construction of a new water treatment facility and an additional groundwater well at a wellfield located on the city's north side along Allisonville Road.

"Noblesville has consistently been one of the fastest growing of all the com-

munities we serve around the state," said Indiana American Water President Matt Prine. "A high-quality source of water is a key factor for any successful community, and this project enables us to continue to meet the needs of a growing Noblesville."

The project, which will be completed early next year, includes construction of a new water treatment facility, adding a second well to the existing well at this location, and construction of a 1 million gallon ground-

water storage tank. The plant design will also allow the company to recycle nearly all of the water used to backwash the filters at this location. The plant will be able to provide approximately 3 million gallons of filtered drinking water and is being constructed so it can be easily expanded as future demand requires additional capacity.

Indiana American Water has already invested more than \$50 million over the last decade in its water infrastructure in Hamilton

County, including construction of a new elevated storage tank near Promise Road and 186th Street, installing/upgrading several large-diameter transmission mains, and investing nearly \$15 million to install new water mains, fire hydrants, service lines and water meters.

Indiana American Water serves nearly 17,000 customers in the area, or a population of approximately 45,000. Customer counts have increased by nearly 12 percent over the last five years in Noblesville.

## County updates junk ordinance

An updated Junk Ordinance will go into effect within the unincorporated areas of Hamilton County on Thursday, June 20. On Monday, May 13, the Hamilton County Commissioners approved the ordinance, which prohibits the accumulation of inoperable vehicles and junk on private property.

"It is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Hamilton County to prohibit the accumulation of junk," said Steve Dillinger, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "Not only are these yards unsightly, but they also reduce the property value of those living nearby. Some even create fire hazards, pollute surface water and attract rodents."

The terms of the updated ordinance apply to all real estate privately owned in Hamilton County outside a city or town. The term "junk" refers to discarded, abandoned, or cast-off ma-

terials including, but not limited to, scrap metals, broken glass, building materials, automobile parts, furniture, mattresses and appliances. Also, disassembled, unlicensed, junked, wrecked, or other inoperable vehicles will not be allowed to remain on property for more than 15 days, unless the vehicle is in

connection with a legally zoned automobile sales or repair business.

"This ordinance also addresses excessive numbers of vehicles – operating or not," said Dillinger. "You are no longer allowed to park more vehicles outside your garage than the number of bedrooms, as shown on your county property record card for the residential lot, plus one. So if you have a four bedroom home, you should not have more than five cars parked outside your garage at any time."

Anyone in violation of the new ordinance will be subject to fines. Once

## Westfield announces school patrol figures for 2018-19

On Tuesday, the City of Westfield, in partnership with Westfield Washington Schools (WWS), released school year-end statistics on the community's new school security initiative.

A key component of the program is the Police Substation initiative, which provides space inside WWS school buildings to Westfield Police Department (WPD). When officers are work-

ing on reports, they are encouraged to visit a school substation in their assigned patrol district to complete office-related tasks.

From Aug. 7, 2018 to May 24, 2019, there were:

- 1,604 total directed school patrols, including 324 Police Substation Visits; and
- 828 hours of time WPD officers spent

## HSE accepting applications for vacant school board seat

When HSE School Board President Michael Bottorff resigned his seat on the board last week, the question swirling around the local community was how the board will go about selecting someone to fill the board seat.

After a Tuesday board executive session, we now know. Residents residing in Fall Creek Township may apply through 4 p.m. on Friday, June 7. To be eligible to apply, you must be at least 18 years of age, you must have lived in Fall Creek Town-

ship at least one year and have no record of a felony conviction.

The application must include the following:

- Name
- Occupation
- Relationship to HSE
- Brief description of why applicant wishes be considered

All applications must be submitted to [djustice@hse.k12.in.us](mailto:djustice@hse.k12.in.us).

Candidates will be interviewed in public, with at least three finalists. Those interviews will be held at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, June 18 in the Mudsock Room at the HSE Central Office.

The board plans to make a formal appointment at the regular board session on Wednesday, June 26.

## Carmel launches new, interactive volunteer recruitment, management system

With the task of planning and implementing more than 50 free public events each year, the City of Carmel relies heavily on the time and talents of its dedicated volunteers.

Over the past year, staff members have been working with City Council President Jeff Worrell to identify a user-friendly, online platform on which to list event opportunities and recruit volunteers and have settled on CERVIS (Community Event Registration & Volunteer Information

System). With CERVIS, event planners can match volunteer interests with specific needs, communicate freely with volunteers before and after each event, and track and recognize the hours of dedicated work those volunteers put in each year.

According to Worrell, "On almost a weekly basis, residents will ask me how they can get involved to support their community. My response is usually based on my aware-

ness of immediate needs. This program will not only help us connect willing volunteers with groups looking for immediate help, but will help us keep track of everyone ready, willing and able to serve in a variety of capacities throughout the year."

Volunteers need only register once, but can log in at any time to register for future events, track their hours and receive real-time correspondence before, during and after each event.

notified of a violation, by either the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office or the Director of the Hamilton County Planning Department, the homeowner will be given up to 60 days to

rectify the problem. If the property is not brought into compliance, the homeowner can be fined up to \$2,500 for the first offense and up to \$7,500 for any future violations.

If the property continues to be a problem, the county may forcibly remove any or all materials that are in violation and assess the costs of the removal to the landowner.

inside WWS buildings, conducting Police Substation visits and directed School Patrols.

It is important to note that these figures do not include the assigned School Resource Officers' (SRO) activity and their time spent in schools on a daily basis.

"School security is a priority in Westfield," said Mayor Andy Cook. "We came in to this school year looking at how we could strategically support our schools from a police perspective. We wanted a bal-

anced approach across the district and we did that. I am proud of the innovation and dedication our officers and Police Department leadership have shown. This summer we will focus on identifying improvements we can make."

"Moving forward, our goal is to continue with the increased and balanced visible presence at all schools and increase positive interactions between the police, students and staff resulting from the strong partnership between Westfield Washington

Schools and the Westfield Police Department," said Dr. Sherry Grate, Superintendent of Westfield Washington Schools. "Ensuring a safe classroom and campus environment is our primary concern and this partnership is another layer of security we can provide our students and families – and at no additional cost to taxpayers."

In addition, the Westfield Police Department is conducting facility security audits at existing and new construction within the district.

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
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# Sobriety checkpoint results released

On Friday, May 31, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership conducted a Sobriety Checkpoint at 146th Street and Edgar Way in Noblesville. Checkpoint operations began at 9:38 p.m. and ended at 11:57 p.m. Operations were suspended several times due to the number of investigations occurring at the checkpoint.

Officers from Partnership agencies checked 80 vehicles throughout the evening. Law enforcement officers administered Standardized Field Sobriety Tests to six drivers due to initial indicators of the possibility of impaired driving.

Three drivers were arrested for operating while intoxicated, and two of those arrests involved alcohol impairment. A third driver

was arrested for operating while intoxicated – drugs and possession of marijuana. Two other drivers were arrested for license problems: One for driving while suspended with a prior conviction and the other for having never received a license.

Drivers were stopped in the checkpoint line for an average of 59 seconds before being released on their way or directed to pull off for further investigation.

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership (HCTSP) is a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County

working to increase the usage of seat belts, to combat aggressive driving, and to decrease impaired driving with the overall goal of creating a safer Hamilton County. The HCTSP is comprised of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, Westfield Police Department and Cicero Police Department, with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

## McMahon reflects on D-Day

As we (hopefully) remember, reflect and honor the 75th anniversary of the D-Day event on June 6, 1944, I hope that we all just take a moment and realize the significance of this event. Had it not been for the thoughtful compromise, respect and diligence of the Allies, our world would be a very different place right now.

In particular, the United States under the leadership of Franklin Roosevelt and the United Kingdom under the leadership of Winston Churchill worked very closely together to plan and execute the invasion which ultimately brought World War II to an end. While I am sure that they did not always agree and had their share of misgivings, they showed respect for one another and worked together for one ultimate goal – the freedom we enjoy today.

As a lifelong "history junkie" and history major, I have realized that what I have studied and learned about the history of this momentous event and the brave men who lived and died to make it hap-

pen has been through post-formal study.

I encourage our teachers and academic instructors to make this a focus going forward as we are losing so many of our WW II veterans every day. Most of them are now in their 90s and over 100 years old. Their stories, their heroism, and their imprint on our freedoms and lives we enjoy today cannot be taken for granted. Their stories must be told, with emphasis on both the decisions made by remarkable leaders and the sacrifice of these young people who carried out the mission.

My hope is that future generations are taught to revere these amazing young soldiers, many of whom had never seen combat, who stormed the beaches that historical day and failed in many instances to return home, resting forever in France.

To these heroes and all the past and present military men and women, I thank you for your service and patriotism.

## Shaffer calls for township independence

Dear Editor:

Carmel City Hall elites have dashed all hopes non-mayors had for a return to fiscal responsibility in local government.

As reported in this newspaper, councilors unveiled a \$59.8 million plan for Clay Township to finance city fire department, parks department and round-about construction costs.

Hiding behind a grand plan for a Dads' Club facility were projects the city otherwise would have to borrow money and further erode its own credit standing.

This city cannot do. It's tapped out. Carmel's year-end debt load was \$213.9 million; the Redevelopment Commission, \$572.7 million, for a city-wide \$786.6 million.

Historically, Clay Township has carried at \$33 to \$47 million debt load, according to the Indiana Department of Local Government Finance. Now, Clay Township will run its debt from \$29 million to \$89 million for City Hall benefit.

Granted, Clay Township is all within city limits, but legally is a separate governmental entity over which the city council has no formal control.

Forget that. The highly in-bred municipal machine steamrollered any thoughts of township independence much as the machine politicians have done in Chicago and Cook County, Ill., for years.



# Field Drive/Cumberland Road intersection to close for seven weeks

The City of Noblesville notifies motorists and residents that effective on or after Monday, June 10, the intersection of Field Drive and Cumberland Road will be closed for seven weeks, weather permitting.

The intersection is scheduled to be a full closure to all traffic. During the closure, traffic should utilize the signed detour route of Allisonville Road, East 191st Street and State

Road 37.

The intersection was analyzed by the Noblesville Engineering Department due to concerns with vehicle delays and safety. In order to create a safer and more efficient intersection, a roundabout was chosen. Construction on the roundabout has been coordinated around Noblesville School's summer break to minimize the impact to the high school.

United Construction Services has been selected

by INDOT to construct the roundabout, which costs \$977,000. The project is funded through a federal grant with the City of Noblesville's match of 20 percent (\$195,400).

Access to all adjacent residences, businesses and facilities will be maintained and posted throughout construction. Emergency services have already been notified about the impending construction that would block or limit access.

# AG Curtis Hill stresses value of collaboration in protecting older Hoosiers from scams

With World Elder Abuse Awareness Day coming up on June 15, Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill has announced that his office is working with other state agencies and non-profit organizations through membership in the newly-formed Indiana Council Against Senior Exploitation (IN-CASE).

IN-CASE pursues a mission of educating seniors and their caregivers on how to prevent all types of fraud. Each year, older Americans lose an estimated \$2.9 billion to \$36.5 billion to financial exploitation, abuse and scams, according to the National Council on Aging.

"In this office, our efforts to protect consumers

already involve a significant focus on seniors," Hill said. "We must use every available tool to safeguard Hoosiers from scammers trying to take people's money or steal their identities. One way we make progress on this front is through collaboration with partners."

Other members of IN-CASE include the Office of the Indiana Secretary of State, the Indiana FSSA Division of Aging, the Indiana Association of Area Agencies on Aging, the Better Business Bureau Serving Central Indiana, AARP Indiana, Indiana Legal Services and other pub-
