Noblesville's Judi Johnson earns economic development award

Noblesville Director of Economic Development Judi Johnson recently completed the Advanced Economic Development Leadership (AEDL) Program, an executive education course developed by four partner universities: The University of Alabama, Clemson University, Texas Christian University and the University of Southern Mississippi.

At a ceremony in Kansas City, Mo., Johnson was awarded the Economic Development Master Practitioner Certification. She is one of only 80 people worldwide to have achieved this certification.

The advanced program is an experiential course that explores economic development subjects that impact communities and states across the U.S. Instructors include site consultants, business leaders, nationally known subject experts and university professors. This world-class faculty discusses negotiation, communication, workforce/education, project management, and community development, influencing change, international trade/foreign direct investment and other key subjects that impact

quality job creation. "I am honored to have been chosen to participate in the AEDL Program. It is a privilege to work for a community that continually strives to create a robust and resilient economy for its businesses, citizens and visitors," Johnson said.

Since becoming Noblesville's economic development director in 2012, the city has success-

fully worked attraction, retention and expansion projects resulting in more than \$340 million in new capital investment and over 2.7 million in new building square footage. A sampling of those projects include: Borg Warner, Embassy Suites, Blue Sky Technology, SMC Corporation, Helmer Scientific, Verdure Sciences, Zevacor Molecular

and Cabela's. Johnson is a graduate of Purdue University and the Oklahoma University Economic Development Institute. She also has completed the Ball State University Certified Public Manager Program, the Ball State Building Better Communities Program, and is a graduate of the Hamilton County Leadership Academy.

and somehow I didn't thoroughly read the email. Jonathon couldn't walk across stage that evening for the scholarship.

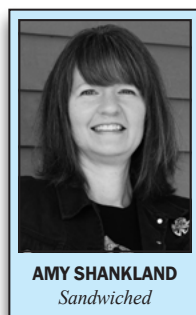

U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) on Thursday issued the following statement on the 75th anniversary of D-Day, one of the world's largest amphibious military assaults:

"Today marks the 75th anniversary of D-Day, a turning point toward Allied victory in World War II. This war called on almost 400,000 Hoosiers to defend our nation's freedom and claimed the lives of approximately

12,000 Indiana service members, leaving another 17,000 wounded."

"On D-Day, American troops stormed the beaches of Normandy to help alter the course of history forever.

One of those heroes, Sergeant Carl Mann, a native of Mount Vernon, Indiana, died this year at age 96. Brave men and women like

Carl enabled the Allies to defeat Nazi Germany and unthinkable evil. Today, I ask that Hoosiers – and all Americans – join me in remembering these heroes, who embody the selfless service of our Greatest Generation."

parked outside your garage at any time." The Carmel EggFest is presented by O'Malia's Living at the Carmel Farmers Market. Proceeds from the event benefit the growth and development of the

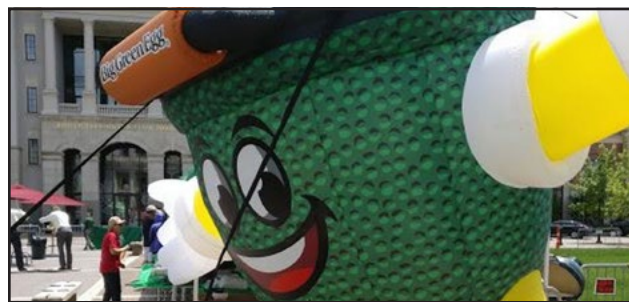

Spartz, other legislators studying causes of rising health care costs in Indiana

State Sen. Victoria Spartz (R-Noblesville) and members of the Indiana General Assembly met this week with the **Employers' Forum of Indiana** to discuss the rising health care costs across the state.

Employers' Forum of Indiana is an employer-led health care coalition of employers, physicians, hospitals, health plans, public health officials and other stakeholders.

"Health care costs have increased dramatically over

the last 20 years," Spartz said. "These costs are unsustainable and a major economic development issue for our state."

In 2017, the Employers' Forum of Indiana hired the **RAND Corporation**, a research organization that specializes in public policy, to conduct two studies on Indiana's rising health care costs. The **first study** revealed there is a wide vari-

ation in the average health care costs assessed to Hoosiers. The **second study** revealed Indiana had the highest health care prices when compared to 25 other states. Spartz authored several legislative initiatives during the 2018 and 2019 legislative session to assess health care costs and outcomes. The topic was assigned to be studied this summer.

AG Curtis Hill files court documents aimed at stopping unlicensed abortion clinic from opening in South Bend

On Sunday, Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill filed documents appealing a federal district court's Friday ruling that an abortion provider may open a South Bend clinic without a license. Hill also asked for an immediate stay that would prevent the unlicensed clinic from opening until Indiana's appeal can be considered.

In March, Texas-based Whole Woman's Health Alliance asked the district court to issue a preliminary injunction allowing it to open a clinic without first obtaining the standard approval from the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH). The ISDH previously has denied Whole Woman's Health a license after the entity failed to provide requested documentation about the safety record of affiliated clinics in other states and other information.

The proposed South Bend clinic would provide chemical abortions – procedures in which one type of medication is used to kill the fetus after which another is administered to induce the woman to expel it.

In its preliminary in-

junction ruling, the district court held that requiring Whole Woman's Health to obtain a license would, with all the administrative hassle, impose an undue burden on women seeking abortions.

"This federal judge seems to believe that every large city in the state is entitled to its own abortion clinic," Hill said. "She further seems to think that state licensing requirements must give way whenever a clinic proposes to open in a city without one. The U.S. Supreme Court has never even remotely implied that such a rule exists."

Allowing the operation of unlicensed abortion clinics could cause harm to patients, Hill added.

"This is a facility that would dispense medication that ends pregnancy and causes women to expel fetal remains," he said. "This course of treatment may cause substantial loss of blood and may prompt years of regret, depression and other emotional harm

to women." Indiana has good reasons for requiring abortion clinics to be licensed, Hill said, such as the state's interest in protecting the health of the mother and preserving the life of the fetus.

"Criminal and civil penalties can only punish violations of the law after they occur," he said. "Licensing makes violations less likely to happen in the first place. This is precisely why states have licensed the legal and medical professions since the mid-nineteenth century. Requiring abortion clinics to be licensed facilities is entirely reasonable and constitutional. For that matter, it's the very least we should do to protect the health of women and unborn children."

Noblesville, Carmel win regional championships

When it comes to an IHSAA golf regional, the main focus is getting a top three spot, which ensures that a team will advance to the state meet.

Winning the regional isn't necessarily the top priority. But it is fun to win, and Noblesville got to experience that feeling Thursday at the Muncie Central regional, which took place at The Players Club in Yorktown.

The Millers squeezed past Yorktown by one stroke, 300-301, to claim their second regional title in three years and the seventh in program history. Both teams advance to next week's state meet at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel, along with Hamilton Southeastern, which placed third.

"It always feels good to win, but it feels better to advance," said Noblesville coach Gary Sewell. The coach said this is what a team works all year for, a chance to play in the state finals. The Millers will be making their 22nd appearance at state.

"We have that now," said Sewell. "One of our goals was to get to the state tournament. We're there. So let's just see what happens."

Noblesville was led by Jacob Deakyne, who has been having a sensational run over the past week. Deakyne tied for second individually with a two-under par 70; he hit an eagle on hole No. 2 and also drained three birdies.

"It's been an awesome day," said Deakyne. "I started off really hot, the team started off really hot. We shot even on the front side. Kind of struggled on the back side. The back side's much tougher, in my opinion. But I finally got my putter rolling on the front and it showed by my score. I was just glad we could get out of here, not just only getting out, but also being champions."

Clay Merchant added a 73, including four birdies. Joe Whallon carded a 78, while Jaxon Stutz also had a birdie in his round of 79.

The Royals placed third with a score of 309. John Cherry was Southeastern's low man with a 75, including one birdie. Daivic Akala made two birdies in his round of 76.

Baseball semi-state preview

Southeastern ready for redemption at Plymouth

The Hamilton Southeastern baseball team has already gone further in the IHSAA post-season tournament than any other Royals team in the history of the program.

Now, the only thing standing between Southeastern and its first appearance at state is a group of Cavemen.

The Royals (21-8) will take on Mishawaka (25-6) in the Class 4A north semi-state Saturday at Plymouth. That game will see its first pitch around 3:30 p.m., following the 1A game between Rossville and Washington Township.

"We were at Plymouth earlier in the year, however, we didn't play very well in the Plymouth Invite," said Southeastern coach Jeremy Sassanella. The Royals dropped both games at that invitational in early May; the coach believes his team is "looking more at redemption at that site from earlier in the spring," rather than the familiarity of having been there.

Southeastern earned its semi-state spot after beating Fort Wayne Carroll last Saturday to win the Lafayette Jefferson regional. The Cavemen beat Lake Central to take the La Porte regional, but that game was delayed to Monday due to weather. That allowed the Royals a chance to see Mishawaka play.

Sassanella called the Cavemen a "bunch

of quality ball players with a very competitive spirit." He noted that 10 of the players on the Mishawaka team were on the Cavemen's football team that reached the semi-state last fall.

"They are a physically big team of grinders, we'll have to be at our best," said Sassanella. "Their pitching staff is strong with three quality right handers that have been very good for them all year. They've got some quality bats at the top of the order and have also been able to manufacture runs as they've needed."

Junior Donovan Snyder is Mishawaka's leading hitter, with a .433 average. He is the co-leader for the Cavemen in runs scored with 27. Snyder shares that place with senior Grant Jablonski, who also has 27 runs

scored. Jablonski is batting .368 and leads Mishawaka in hits with 32 and runs batted in with 26. Jablonski is also the Cavemen's best pitcher with an 8-0 record and a 0.41 earned-run average; he has struck out 78 this season.

Greyson Droste is on top of Southeastern's batting list with a .407 average. Droste also leads the team in hits with 33 and in doubles with 11. He is tied with Matthew Buckingham for most RBI with 25; Buckingham has scored the most runs with 21. On the mound, Tyler Schweitzer (8-2) and Michael Dillon (8-1) have been the dominant pitchers, with Schweitzer compiling a 1.21 ERA and 85 strikeouts. Dillon has struck out 63.

Sassanella said that as the post-season begins, a coach looks for his team to be business-like and focused, but at the same time not too tight.

"They've really grown over the course of the year and they're a group that played together a long time," said Sassanella, who said his team knows what is at stake and what needs to be done. "Our preparation has been sharp and focused this week and I'm hopeful and confident we'll be ready to play."

UNIVERSITY GETS RE-MATCH

University will play the Class 1A south semi-state at Jasper on Saturday, taking on Tecumseh in a re-match of last year's semi-

state.

The Trailblazers won last year with a come-from-behind, 7-4 victory at Plainfield. The Braves come into the semi-state at 21-7, while University is 20-10-1.

Tecumseh cruised through the Loogootee regional, beating South Central 13-0 and Barr-Reeve 5-0. Senior Steve Molinet leads the Braves with a .511 average, as well as in total hits (45), runs scored (42) and home runs (five). Another senior, Spencer Buse, has batted in 28 runs this year.

As for the pitchers, Buse is 6-2 with a 1.92 ERA and 53 strikeouts. Senior Josh Jagelewski has a 6-0 record and leads Tecumseh in strikeouts with 69.

University easily won the Morristown regional, defeating Indianapolis Lutheran 10-1 and Shakamak 9-0. The 'Blazers have been hitting the ball extremely well, with three batters averaging over .400. Alex Washlock is hitting at a .511 clip and leads University in hits (48) and doubles (11). Tyler Galyean is averaging .479 and Dawson Estep is hitting at .443 and a team-leading 42 runs scored. Ben Westerkamm holds a .398 average and leads the RBI count with 33.

Galyean holds 5-3 record on the mound, with a 2.03 ERA. Jacob Lange leads the strikeout list with 57.
