Buckingham: "No comment" on County Treasurer's Office investigation

Investigation, Buckingham again replied, "No comment."

Hamilton County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham remains quiet on a State Police investigation into the County Treasurer's Office.

The Treasurer's Office was the focus of an investigation, requested by Hamilton County Commissioners in December, after a former employee alleged penalties were waived for late tax payments made by family members of the Treasurer's Office.

Hamilton County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham has refused comment on the investigation.

In April, Buckingham stated it was his policy not to comment on an investigation.

This week when asked about the status of the in-

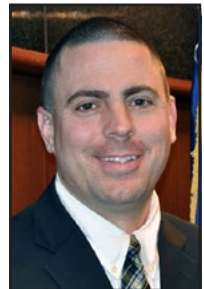
that Hancock County Prosecutor Brent Eaton has been assigned as Special Prosecutor to the case by Hamilton County Judge Paul Felix. Buckingham did not respond to a request to confirm Eaton's assignment.

"I trust Lee Buckingham, but this is becoming frustrating," said Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger.

Dillinger expressed his frustration stating, "We may need to make some changes in the Treasurer's Office, but until the investigation is concluded we can't."

Dillinger told The Reporter earlier this year the Treasurer's Office

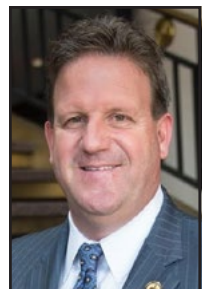

Noblesville holds ribbon cutting for Greenfield-Howe roundabout

Noblesville officials and construction crew members from United Construction Services and Butler, Fairman & Seufert, Inc. gathered on Greenfield Avenue for a ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark the completion of the new roundabout at Howe Road. Striping of the road was completed Wednesday and reopened to traffic for evening commutes.

The newly-constructed project was selected by the Noblesville Engineering Department due to concerns with vehicle delays and safety. In order to create a safer and more efficient intersection, a roundabout was chosen.

"This roundabout provides a more efficient connection with Howe Road and 146th Street and adds a traffic calming effect on Greenfield Avenue," said Assistant City Engineer Jim Hellmann.

INDOT selected United Construction Services to construct the roundabout, which cost \$847,117.10. The project was funded through a federal grant with the City of Noblesville's match of 20 percent

(\$169,423.42).

This is the third consecutive year the city has made improvements to Greenfield Avenue. Last year, Greenfield Avenue from State Road 37 to Boden Road was resurfaced us-

ing a Community Crossing Grant, which was funded evenly by the city and state. In 2017, the city resurfaced Greenfield Avenue west of 16th Street and constructed the roundabout at 10th Street.

Sheriff to cut ribbon on jail expansion

Hamilton County officials will hold a ribbon cutting for the expansion of the current jail at 11 a.m. on Friday, June 28. The \$13.5 million project will add 120 beds to the facility.

The initial phase of the jail expansion features five cell pods with 38 prefabricated steel cells consisting of two- and four-man cells. The expansion will also include an interior recreation area, classroom and medical support area. A second phase of the project could add additional beds.

The Sheriff's Depart-

ment is expected to move inmates into the new facility in early July.

The public is invited to tour the new expansion as well as the current facility. On Friday, June 28, "Slumber in the Slammer 2.0" takes place with a guided tour and more from 6 to 10 p.m., with financial donations accepted. Activities continue on Saturday, June 29 with guided tours taking place at 9 and 11:30 a.m.

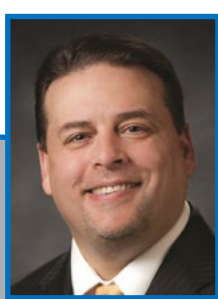

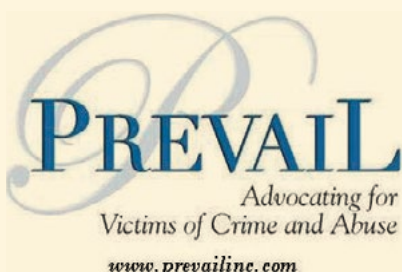

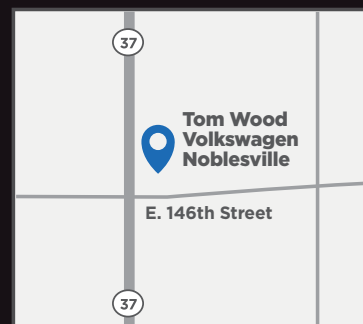

Shaffer concerned Carmel's borrowing will harm future generations

Dear Editor:

As Carmel central planners continue lavishing borrowed funds on entertainment and luxuries, the power to borrow more money shrinks.

Unwilling to go to the regulated and rated municipal bond market since its rating was downgraded in 2017, Carmel borrows against the future at higher interest rates and encounters greater resistance from bankers and the private equity market. Hotel Carmichael financing took more than two years to lock in, and then at high interest rates.

Now comes word of \$73.3 million need to significantly upgrade water and sewer services. High-density projects strain pumping and delivery systems – \$50.5 million for the water system and \$22.8 million for sewers.

Meanwhile, the city promotes and subsidizes unsustainable music, theater and other entertainments, and runs multi-million-dollar deficits, further digging a hole future generations presumably will fill with dollars.

Study confirms Hoosiers living with blood disorders benefit from hemophilia treatment centers' direct care

The REPORTER

Fewer visits to the ER, better compliance with preventing complications and the ability to self-administer medication are some of the benefits experienced more by Hoosiers who seek bleeding disorder treatment at a Hemophilia Treatment Center (HTC) than those who go elsewhere. This is true despite these patients being more likely to have severe hemophilia.

These significant findings and more can be found

in the complete Indiana-focused study, titled "Population-based surveillance of haemophilia and patient outcomes in Indiana using multiple data sources." Modeled after the influential epidemiological surveillance project conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in the late 1990s, this paper was recently published in the international journal Haemophilia and describes key findings from the Indiana Hemo-

philia Surveillance Project (IHSP).

HTCs are health care centers that specialize in the comprehensive care of rare and complex bleeding disorders. To receive a fed-

eral designation as an HTC, facilities must demonstrate deep expertise for treating these complex conditions. Indiana Hemophilia & Thrombosis Center (IHTC) is Indiana's only federal-designated Hemophilia Treatment Center.

The new study involved analyzing de-identified medical records to determine diagnoses of hemophilia and treatment sought within the state. The severity of each patient's hemophilia was noted, as well as where they sought care, how often and why.

"The findings support the high quality of care provided by the federally recognized network of HTCs across the country, particularly in Indiana," said Dr. Amy Shapiro, IHSP member and co-founder of IHTC. "This study re-en-

forces the messaging of HTCs, the CDC, and the National Hemophilia Foundation for the past 20 years – if you're not being seen at an HTC, you're not receiving the best care."

What's more, the IHSP found that more hemophilia patients in Indiana are being cared for at an HTC compared to 20 years ago.

"What the study found is hemophilia is more common in Indiana and is likely more common throughout the U.S. than it was 20 years ago," explained Chris Roberson, IHSP member and Director of Compliance & Community Programs for IHTC. "This is also likely because care has improved, so patients are living longer and then having more children."

Despite those patients with hemophilia seeking care at an HTC usually having a more severe form of the disease, they have better outcomes. Patients are 47 percent less likely to visit the emergency room, and they are more likely to be able to self-administer their medication to prevent bleeding, rather than only taking it after they've expe-

rienced a bleed.

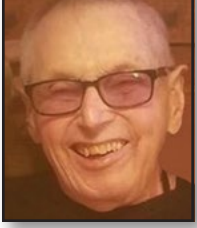

John C. Pashak, Jr., Noblesville, passed away Sunday afternoon, June 23, 2019, at Riverview Hospital in Noblesville.



John was born September 15, 1935, in Bay County, Mich., home of his parents, the late John Sr. and Elsie (Mattis) Pashak.

On September 15, 1962, at St. Vincent Catholic Church in Logansport, he was married to Judith Obenchain Pashak, who survives.

A 1954 graduate of TL Handy High School in Bay City, Mich., John went on to serve his country in the U.S. Army from 1959 to 1963.

For 28 years, John worked as a psychiatric attendant at the Logansport State Hospital.

He was the former co-owner of the Indiana Beach Taco stand in Monticello, a family-owned operation that had earned notoriety as the "best tacos" ever.

He was preceded in death by one son, David John Pashak; one granddaughter, Lindsay Michelle Widner; and two sisters, Jean Alvesteff and Elsie Filcek.
