Noblesville ready for Fourth of July Fireworks Festival

Thursday marks the spectacular 2019 Noblesville Fireworks Festival and the city is excited about the expanded, free events taking place with the parade downtown and the fireworks festival at Forest Park.

Parade

The festivities kick off with the annual Fourth of July Parade presented by Gaylor Electric Inc. at 2:30 p.m. The parade is starting earlier this year, but its route will remain the same through downtown: 16th Street to Logan Street; Logan to Ninth Street; Ninth to Monument Street; and Monument to 16th Street. Luke and Sally Kenley will lead this year's parade as grand marshals.

Fireworks Festival

The free Fireworks Festival, presented by IDI Composites International, will take place at Forest Park from 4 to 10 p.m. The event will include traditional festival items including a food court, an Armed Forces Action Zone (with the U.S. Army, Air Force and Marines), Kids Zone and fireworks show at 10 p.m.

"Forest Park provides guests with the traditional park amenities such as play-grounds, shelters – and most importantly, nature providing plenty of shade. It also ex-

pands our festival area and layout," said Mike Hoffmeister, festival co-chair.

This year's Kids Zone will include more activities than ever before, including 11 inflatable bounce houses with sizes for different age groups. The area will have its





own entertainment stage presented by Noblesville Economic Development with a Dr. Seuss, pirate and comedy-magic shows and DJ Jason Fritz playing music specifically for children. The area also will have six balloon artists, six face painters, two silt walking jugglers, a trackless train to ride and an art project through Caravan Classes.

"Other exciting new additions to cater to all ages include a 300-foot zipline, beer garden, a ninja warrior course, cornhole and an Indy Eleven activity," Hoffmeister said. "We also will have live music on the main stage presented by Republic Services with headliner Road Trip, a fantastic cover band from Milwaukee, and School of Rock as the opener."

West Nile Virus found in Carmel's Meadowlark Park

The Hamilton County Health Department has detected West Nile Virus in mosquitoes sampled from a trapping site located at Meadowlark Park in Carmel. Truck-mounted spraying will be scheduled in the identified areas.

The use of personal protection sprays that contain DEET is recommend during any outdoor activities throughout the county.

Health Department Officials indicated the **mosquito control website** will be updated as new trap sites become positive.

Truck-mounted spraying areas

- All spraying activities are forecast-dependent related to precipitation and wind speed
- All spraying has an approximate start time of 8:30 p.m. or local sunset.
- In the event of inclement weather (high winds or precipitation) individual routes will be rescheduled on the following business day.
- Please be aware that nuisance biting activity is increasing and that the Hamilton County Health Department uses only adulticide sprays for mosquitoes in known areas of positive West Nile Virus activity.

Here are some precautions individuals can take to prevent mosquito-borne disease transmission:

- 1. **Use mosquito repellent.** Use insect repellent on exposed skin when you go outdoors. Use an EPA-registered insect repellent such as those with DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Even a short time being outdoors can be long enough to get a mosquito hite
- mosquito bite.

 2. Clothing can help reduce mosquito bites. When weather permits, wear long-sleeves, long pants and socks when outdoors. Mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing, so spraying clothes with repellent containing permethrin or another EPA-registered repellent will give extra protection. Don't apply repellents containing permethrin directly to skin. Do not spray repellent on the skin under your clothing.
- 3. **Be aware of peak mosquito hours.**The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many species of mosquitoes.
 Take extra care to use repellent and protective clothing during evening and early morning or consider avoiding outdoor
- activities during these times.

 4. **Drain standing water.** Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Limit the number of places around your home for mosquitoes to breed by getting rid of items that hold water.
- 5. **Install or repair screens.** Some mosquitoes like to come indoors. Keep them outside by having well-fitting screens on both windows and doors. Offer to help neighbors whose screens might be in bad shape.







Governor Eric J. Holcomb on Tuesday announced the next call for projects is open in the Community Crossings grant program for shovel-ready local road construction projects. Community Crossings is part of Gov. Holcomb's Next Level Roads program, a 20-year, fully funded plan to enhance Indiana's highways and local roads.

'Our transportation infrastructure plays a crucial role in ensuring Hoosier residents and businesses reach their full potential," Gov. Holcomb said. "Community Crossings is a partnership between the state and local communities to make meaningful investments in transportation to catalyze economic growth, lation of fewer than 50,000 add jobs, attract and retain talent, all while promoting safety on every mile."

Projects that are eligible for funding through Community Crossings include road resurfacing, bridge rehabilitation, road reconstruction and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance in connection with road projects. Material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations are also eligible for

Projects submitted to the Indiana Department of Transportation for funding will be evaluated based on rials must be submitted by need, traffic volume, local support, the impact on connectivity and mobility within the community, and regional economic significance.

counties as they build and maintain their local transportation assets," said IN-DOT Commissioner Joe McGuinness. "Local roads are the first and last mile of the state's transportation system. Because of that, INDOT is committed to partnering with communities to make local roads stronger and safer."

Community Crossings is open to all local government units in the State of Indiana.

- · Cities and towns with a population of fewer than 10,000 will receive funds using a 75/25 match.
- Cities and towns with a population of greater than 10,000 will receive funds using a 50/50 match.
- Counties with a popuwill receive funds using a 75/25 match.
- · Counties with a population of greater than 50,000 will receive funds using a 50/50 match.

Over the last three years, the state has awarded more than \$500 million in matching funds to support local road and bridge projects around Indiana. Longterm funding for Community Crossings is part of House Enrolled Act 1002, passed by the legislature and signed into law by Gov. Holcomb in April 2017.

A map of the trolley routes and park festivities has been created to help guests plan where to park and what attractions they will want to visit during the festival. Shuttle routes will in designated parking lots.



a.m. to the time of service.



HSE's Parrish nets world-class honors

Local player bounces from state championship to University of Oregon

Sydney Parrish fulfilled the dream of many an Indiana basketball player when she and the Hamilton Southeastern girls team won a state championship in February.

After a little bit of time off. Parrish was back in the news again, making headlines when she committed to the University of Oregon. Then it was back in the gym and onto the court for summer ball with the Royals.

So while the state may be at the halfway point between basketball seasons, there's always something going on. The Reporter caught up with Parrish a couple weeks ago at the Westfield Shootout, where Southeastern was playing. Parrish was there with her team, then on her way to an All-Star game in Anderson that night. But she appreciated the break she got after the Royals won state.

"It was definitely a good rest time for all of us," said Parrish, noting that it was necessary because of HSE's long and successful season. After that was AAU, then the month of June consisted of "workouts and weights and back into high school ball," she said.

Parrish, who was named Indiana's Gatorade Player of the Year, was selected as a member of the IndyStar Indiana Junior All-Star team, as a member of the six-player core group. The Juniors played the Kentucky Juniors in early June, then took on the Indiana Senior All-Star team a couple days later.

"It was really fun to play in that game with all the best juniors in the state and then against the best seniors in the state, and against the Kentucky players, because I know some of them," said Parrish. It was so much fun playing with them."

The core group contained some well-known players in addition to Parrish. North Central's Jasmine McWilliams, a Northwestern commit, was in the group, as were Kendall Bostic (headed to Michigan State) and Madison Layden (committed to Purdue) of Northwestern High School, which has dominated the Class 3A state tournament the past two years. Northwestern will move up to 4A this year. Also in the group was Danville's Ella Collier and Jeffersonville's Nan Garcia, both of whom have received Division I offers.

"We all got along really well," said Parrish. "There cool because a lot of us have just been playing against each other for a long time, so having all of us in the same room, we all just connected right away and it was a really good experience."

The Indiana Juniors split the two-game series with Kentucky, winning the first contest 89-85, but falling 111-107 in the second game. Parrish scored 26 points and handed out four assists in the first game, and
