

# Carmel Clay Schools board approves safety referendum

Carmel Clay School Board has approved a first-ever safety referendum that could be placed on the November ballot.

Superintendent Michael Beresford says that the plan is crucial to increase school security as the rise in school violence across the nation Schools officials has grown.

The days where school safety was on the back burner are over," said Beresford.

The board voted unanimously in favor of the proposal last Wednesday night in a meeting.

"The last decade has her been frightening. I do think about the referendum. we just have to keep adding layer upon layer upon layer in order to keep our kids safe," said Beresford.

The referendum would increase taxes by 5 cents for every \$100 of assessed value.

For example, property taxes on a \$250,000 home would increase by \$65 per year. Or, property taxes on Carmel Clay Schools a \$750,000 home would increase by \$232 annually.



## Fishers, along with Hamilton County, looking for a solution to 911 funding with a tax increase




2013 was the first year that Fishers, then a town, was assessed an amount of money by Hamilton County to pay for 911 emergency services, as all of the county was income tax increase consolidated into one

911 dispatch center. Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness told the Fishers City Council last Monday that the county has informed local officials Fishers will pay \$1.7 million in 2020 for 911 service, \$1 million more than 2013.

The mayor told council members there is a solution available to lift the financial burden on Fishers and other local units of Hamilton County government.

Income Tax (COIT) Council may, under state law, enact a 0.1 percent county income tax to pay for

this service. Fadness says this would likely bring in



county-wide, while the 911 service bill for the entire county is about \$11 million a year. The extra \$5 million could be used to defray costs for electronic equipment installed in police vehicles, which is part of the dispatch system.

# Noblesville man awarded for helping seniors repair homes

After people retire, they often spend their time golfing, traveling or working on a hobby. Not Lamar Ziegler.

The 70-year-old from Noblesville often can be found repairing a roof or installing a grab bar, fixing loose deck boards or repairing a leaking faucet. When Lamar retired from civil engineering in 2015, he became a full-time volunteer working more than six days a week helping low-income and elderly homeowners in Hamilton County.

Lamar doesn't volunteer for praise or awards; however, the work he's doing and the difference he's making in the lives of seniors has not gone unnoticed. CICOA Aging & In-Home Solutions named Lamar its 2019 Senior Volunteer of the Year.

governments representing more than 50 percent of the county's population must pass this tax increase by the end of October, which would then go into effect throughout Hamilton County in 2020. Fadness says that if Fishers and Carmel both passed this resolution on the tax increase by the deadline, it would be enough to pass it in the entire county in 2020.

Fadness expects small communities in the northern part of the county to begin enacting this resolution. Once that happens, the mayor says Fishers must vote on the measure.

from Page A1 Mayor Fadness supports passing a resolution increas-

ing the county income tax. 'This would mean a fairly significant cost savings to the City of Fishers, probably to the tune of about \$2 million a year, if this income tax were to be passed," said Fadness.

The city is beginning to put together the 2020 city spending plan, and the mayor and his fiscal staff need to know whether this income tax resolution will pass, according to Fadness.

"This is very important to know which direction this is going for our budgeting purposes," said Fadness. "That's a wild swing if that doesn't come in."

The Fishers City Council will likely consider the income tax increase resolution in August. The law requires a public hearing before the measure is voted-on by the City Council.




