

away on July 20. He had served two terms as a member of City Council and subsequently served for three years on the Carmel Redevelopment Commission. "Bob was a ded-





Based on witness statements and evidence collected at the scene, it appears that two subjects entered the store and soon thereafter confronted the lone employee with a handgun. 

New York teen claims top honors in national Songbook Academy Finals

A high school junior from upstate New York earned the top title of Songbook Youth Ambassador at the Saturday finals concert to cap the weeklong Songbook Academy®, the nation's only youth music intensive focused on the timeless popular standards of jazz, Broadway and Hollywood.


