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

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4-H donates 2 tons of meat to fight hunger

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has "Meating the Need," a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy and Swine projects and HCH.

HCH is a nonprofit organization supporting local food pantries and meal programs year-round in Hamilton County. This year, HCH purchased seven beef and eight swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on Tuesday, July 23.

In addition, the Hamilton County Community Foundation purchased another swine and beef to add to Meating the Christopher's Need, and a 10-year 4-H Sheep member donated his lamb. In total this was a record-breaking year for Meating the Need.

The estimated 4,045 pounds of meat will be used to supply 20 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef, pork and lamb raised by 4-H members. Meat Distribution Day will be Saturday, Aug. 10. 

No one wishes to endure pain, and no one likes to see a loved one in pain. However, the use of powerful prescription opioids on the market today should raise a red flag if you have a family member who is currently prescribed one (or more!) of those medications. Ideally those are intended for shortterm use only, and family members should closely monitor those situations.

If you feel that there is an area of concern, talk plainly with the family member and if needed reach out to personal and professional caregivers and the prescribing physician. Your loved one's life may depend on it.



The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will soon close a portion of Interstate 465 on the southeast side of Indianapolis for 15 days.

I-465 eastbound/northbound will be closed from (I-465 I-65 to I-70 on the southeast side. This closure will begin on Friday, Aug. 9 and run through Saturday, Aug. 24. After the Labor Day I-465 in

holiday, INDOT will close I-465 southbound/west-bound from I-70 down to I-65. That closure will begin on Sept. 6 and run through Sept. 21.

No closures will be in place during the Labor Day weekend.

The closures are part of a statewide \$150 million plan to repair winter damage and improve pavement

conditions around the state.

During the closures, IN-DOT would like to remind drivers to plan alternate routes and leave early.



She married Fred D. King on February 16, 1946. He preceded her in death May 24, 1997. In addition to her husband and parents, she was preceded in death by her siblings.


