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# Fishers, HSE high schools getting upgraded auditorium equipment

Upgrades to the audio, video and lighting systems in the auditoriums of both Fishers and Hamilton Southeastern high schools have been in the works for some time. The project has hit another snag, but school staff found ways to work around the issues.

Facilities Director Harry Delks described this project as “challenging.” Only one bid was submit-

ted for the two plans, totaling \$2.7 million, significantly over the proposed budget. Delks said many school districts around the state are seeing either one bid or no bids on proposals such as this one.

Once it became obvious the only bid was over the budget, staffs from both high schools started working on ideas to reduce the project’s budget by \$409,000.

The school board voted Wednesday night to approve the only bid, then add a change order for just over \$409,000 to bring the work within the budget. High school officials told the board the items cut from

this budget could be added back over time in the future without a big budget hit in one year. The plan, with reductions, will still bring needed upgrades to both auditoriums.

One example mentioned of paring-down the budget was an intercom used within the staging system which will still be upgraded, but will be wired and not be wireless, saving \$30,000.

With unanimous board approval Wednesday, Delks said this work will be completed in the fall. Both schools will be working around this construction with various productions until all is completed.

**New dean at NHS**

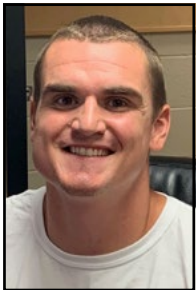

## Anvl software company plans for its long-term growth in Fishers

Anvl, a workforce-first safety software company, announced plans this week to scale up its operations in Central Indiana. The company’s growth plans include creating up to 41 new, high-wage jobs in Fishers by the end of 2022.

“What we are doing at Anvl is really important work,” said Anvl Co-founder and CEO Robin Fleming. “Our innovative software helps companies modernize their safety programs by engaging and helping front-line workers be safer. Support from the entire Indiana business ecosystem is critical to help companies like Anvl grow and create value for our employees and customers. Our entire team is passionate about our mission and excited to be part of the growing technology and business community in Indiana.”

Anvl, which delivers safety software to help reduce and prevent injuries for the front-line workers in hazardous en-

vironments, was launched out of Indianapolis-based venture studio High Alpha in October 2018. Led by technology-veteran Robin Fleming, the company will invest \$125,000 to establish permanent office space in the Meyer Najem building at 11787 Lantern Road in Fishers. The new space will allow Anvl to continue growing its operations following a \$2 million seed funding round announced last month which included participation from Revolution’s Rise of the Rest Seed Fund, High Alpha Capital and a number of experienced tech leaders and angel investors, including Hoosier entrepreneur Steve Cage.

“Under Robin’s leadership, Anvl is disrupting its industry, and Fishers is excited to be part of the next chapter of their growth,” said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. “The Anvl team joins the growing network of entrepreneurial companies in Fishers, and we look forward to working

## Field Drive/Cumberland Road roundabout now open in Noblesville

The intersection of Field Drive and Cumberland Road reopened Wednesday in Noblesville. However, construction work is not complete and the intersection will be temporarily closed Saturday morning through Sunday afternoon to finish

surface paving and striping. “The priority for the entire project schedule was to not impact school traffic,” said Assistant City Engineer Jim Hellmann. “The project is close to finishing and this plan allows school to start without construction interference or the noise of

alongside them for many years to come."

Anvl is the 10th company to launch out of High Alpha. The company has nearly doubled its workforce since June and plans to move into its new Fishers location in late August, supporting the growth of its team. Anvl's current open positions and future positions can be found online.

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# 4-H donates 2 tons of meat to fight hunger

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has sponsored its fourth year of "Meating the Need," a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy and Swine projects and HCH.

HCH is a nonprofit organization supporting local food pantries and meal programs year-round in Hamilton County. This year, HCH purchased seven beef and eight swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on Tuesday, July 23.

In addition, the Hamilton County Community Foundation purchased another swine and beef to add to Meating the Need, and a 10-year 4-H Sheep member donated his lamb. In total this was a record-breaking year for Meating the Need.

The estimated 4,045 pounds of meat will be used to supply 20 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef, pork and lamb raised by 4-H members. Meat Distribution Day will be Saturday, Aug. 10. The 18 4-H members who have designated their animals for sale to HCH will be helping to feed those families and children in local communities with the equivalent

of 20,180 meals of good, healthy protein.

Protein is an item that is often missing from HCH clients' meals and is hard to provide consistently by the pantries because of cost. When beef and pork are available, the families are appreciative. Donations to this program will go towards the appraised market purchase price of the 4-H animals and to the 4-H members as they pursue their 4-H, education and life goals.

HCH thanks all of the generous donors that have contributed to fully fund this year's project.

## DNR free activities, bargains highlight State Fair

See live reptiles, teach a child to fish, talk with DNR experts, and enjoy loads of more free activities with the DNR at the Indiana State Fair, taking place Aug. 2-18. A DNR favorite, the Kids Fishin' Pond, kicks off day one of the fair and will be offered daily.

"Reptiles Rule," a live reptile show, will also be offered daily throughout the fair. Interpretive naturalists from across Indiana will talk about reptiles Hoosiers might find throughout their state.

Also featured each afternoon is a program with at least one live bird of prey.

Those events and more will be in or next to the air-conditioned Natural Resources Building, the hub of DNR State Fair activities. Check [dnr.IN.gov/statefair](http://dnr.IN.gov/statefair) for the entire DNR schedule, which is subject to change.

The 312,000-gallon Fishin' Pond is adjacent to the Natural Resources Building and is packed

with fish that are ready to be caught and released. Youth fishing is available there every day in the early evening and most mornings. Parents/guardians should check the daily schedule online or in the State Fair program. Exact hours differ on some days.

Visitors to the building also can view native Indiana fish in aquariums, ask questions of DNR experts, visit Mother Nature's Mercantile to buy unique outdoors-themed items, or just take an air-conditioned break. The Mercantile will be selling state park Annual Entrance Passes to use for the remainder of 2019 for \$20. The regular price is \$50. The 2019 Golden Hoosier Passport, which is for senior citizens and also expires at the end of the calendar year, will be available for \$10. Regular price is \$25. Both offers are available only at the Mercantile at the State Fair.

Free copies of the just-off-the-presses Hunting Guide, as well as the current

Recreation Guide, Fishing Guide and other informational brochures will also be available. You can also subscribe to Outdoor Indiana magazine at a special State

Fair deal. Simply buy a subscription at the Mercantile and you will be handed the current July/August issue. Your one- or two-year subscription will start with the

September/October issue, so you will get one issue for free.

All DNR activities at the fair, except buying items at the Mercantile, are free af-

ter paying gate admission to the Indiana State Fair.

# Talking openly about medication concerns

“The aim of the wise is not to secure pleasure, but to avoid pain.” – Aristotle

My topic this week is one that we hear more about almost daily – the increasing opioid epidemic in our country. It is a topic about which I know little really, but feel compelled to address especially as it relates to the mature adults and elderly in our population.

Obviously many, many young people are involved in the opioid epidemic tragically, but our older adults are also suffering from the effects of pain medications and the often-resulting dependence upon them.

I have had the experience of elderly family members who have been prescribed – by their physician – powerful and addictive pain medications. One family member was prescribed 19 medications by one physician! Ultimately the family member became very confused, depressed, forgetful and sometimes aggressive. Only when she was found walking on the road alone without proper clothing in the rain and cold did other family members and friends become aware and step in to get assistance for her. After months of medication adjustments – not to mention changing physicians – she is doing much better but

has suffered long-term effects from this overdosing of our population.

Persons aged 65 years and older comprise only 13 percent of the population, yet account for more than one-third of total outpatient spending on prescription medications in the United States. Older patients are more likely to be prescribed long-term and multiple prescriptions, and some experience cognitive decline, which could lead to improper use of medications.

Alternatively, those on a fixed income may abuse another person’s remaining medication to save money.<sup>1</sup> The magnitude of opioid use among seniors is “astounding,” said Frederic Blow, who directs addiction research at the University of Michigan’s medical school and was not involved in the study.<sup>2</sup>

There are alternatives to treating pain, including biofeedback and acupuncture. Although I personally have not had the opportunity to experience acupuncture, I have several friends who have and had good results. I will not hesitate to give it a try if needed in the future.

And we who care about our pets know that they can also experience pain and discomfort. My dog Sweetie, who is now gone, received relief from pain due

to arthritis and scar tissue after receiving acupuncture from an experienced veterinarian. (Sweetie’s story is impactful and available from Amazon, “Sweetie’s Scars: A Journey of Hurt, Hope, and Healing.” All proceeds benefit the Humane Society for Hamilton County.)

No one wishes to endure pain, and no one likes to see a loved one in pain. However, the use of powerful prescription opioids on the market today should raise a red flag if you have a family member who is currently prescribed one (or more!) of those medications. Ideally those are intended for short-term use only, and family members should closely monitor those situations.

If you feel that there is an area of concern, talk plainly with the family member and if needed reach out to personal and professional caregivers and the prescribing physician. Your loved one’s life may depend on it.

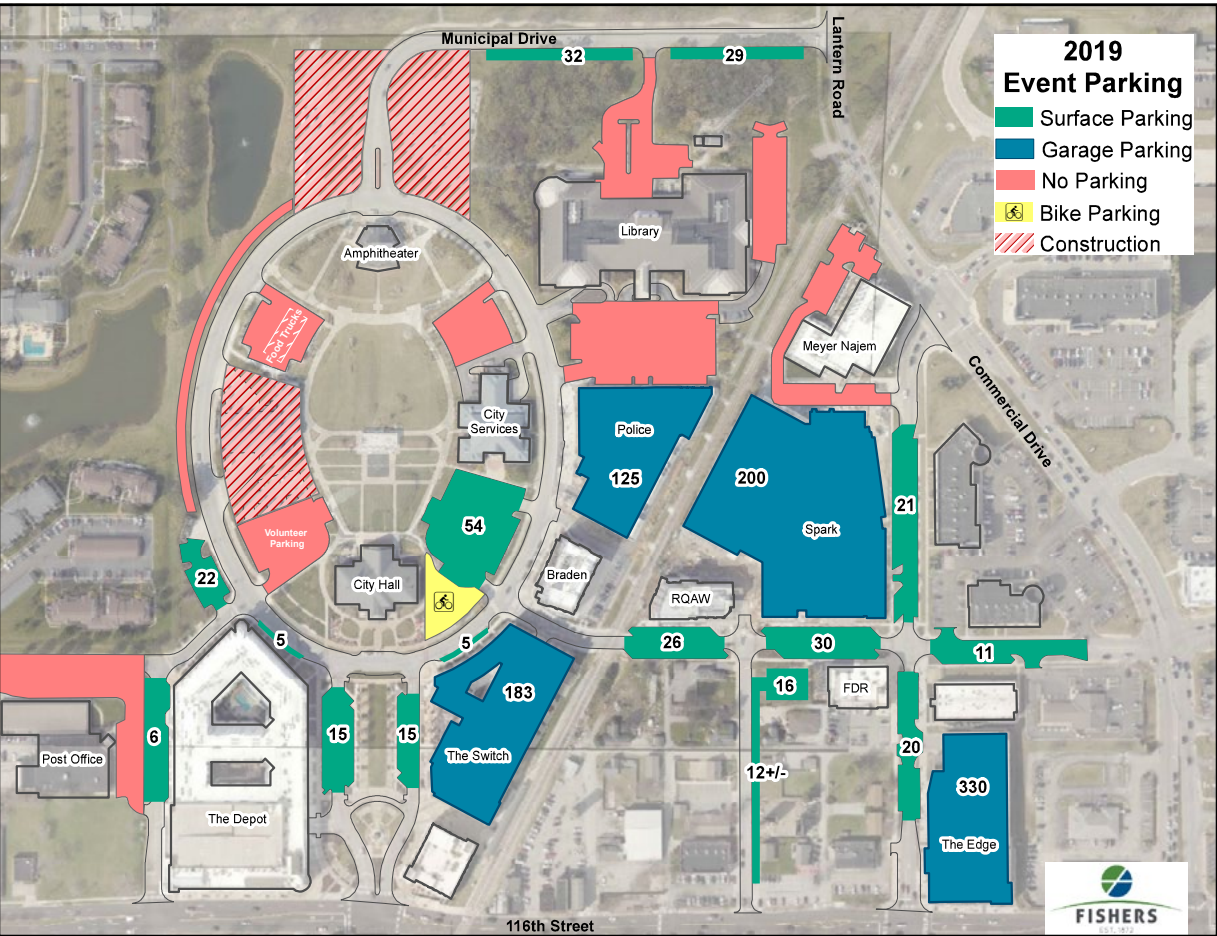

# I-465 to close next week on southeast side of Indianapolis

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will soon close a portion of Interstate 465 on the southeast side of Indianapolis for 15 days.

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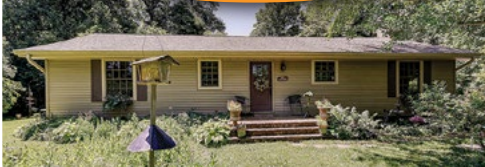

It's August and school is starting across Indiana, which means it's time to begin the 2019-20 high school sports season.

The first sport to begin is girls golf, with the first practices set for Friday and Saturday. Golf teams can play their first matches on Monday. As for the other sports, they can conduct their first practices on Monday. Competition in cross country, soccer, boys tennis, unified flag football and volleyball can start on Saturday, Aug. 17, with football starting on Friday, Aug. 23.

Once the regular season begins, teams will have their eyes on the post-season, which is only a couple months away. The Reporter has you covered in the following comprehensive look at each fall sport, highlighting where all the Hamilton County schools will play in sectionals – and hopefully beyond.

### GIRLS GOLF

#### Sectionals

County golf teams will again be divided among two sectionals. Carmel, Guerin Catholic, University and Westfield will play Friday, Sept. 20 at the Ben Davis sectional, which takes place at South Grove Golf Course in Indianapolis (1800 W. 18th St.) Also competing are Brebeuf Jesuit, Cardinal Ritter, Covenant Christian, Pike, Speedway and the host Giants.

The next day, Saturday, Sept. 21, Noblesville will host the sectional at Harbour Trees Golf Club. Fishers, Hamilton Heights and Hamilton Southeastern will also be at that site, along with teams from Alexandria, Anderson, Elwood, Lapel and Shenandoah.

#### Regionals

The top three teams and top three individuals not on an advancing team qualify for the regional, which is set for Saturday, Sept. 28.

Teams getting out of the Noblesville sectional head over to the Lapel regional, which takes place at Edgewood Golf Club, just west of Anderson on State Road 32. Teams advancing from the Ben Davis sectional will travel to the Roncalli regional, which will be played at Smock Golf Course, located on the south side of Indianapolis in the Marion-Johnson county line.

#### State finals

The top three teams and top five individuals not on an advancing team will go to the state meet. For the sixth year, Carmel's Prairie View Golf Club will host the big meet, a 36-hole tournament that takes place Friday Oct. 4 and Saturday, Oct. 5.

### BOYS TENNIS

The tournament draw for tennis is on Monday, Sept.

30.

#### Sectionals

The sectional round for boys tennis is scheduled from Wednesday, Oct. 2 to Saturday, Oct. 5. County sectionals usually take place Wednesday and Thursday to make room for rain dates.

Both sectional sites will have four teams. Hamilton Southeastern will host Fishers, Hamilton Heights and Noblesville, while Carmel's Todd Witsken Tennis Center welcomes Guerin Catholic, University and Westfield.

#### Regionals

The four-team regionals will be played Tuesday, Oct. 8 and Wednesday, Oct. 9. The champion at Southeastern will travel to North Central, while the Carmel champion heads north to Kokomo.

#### Semi-state

The semi-state round is set for Saturday, Oct. 12. The North Central winner will play for one of the two championships at Homestead, with the Kokomo winner competing for one of the Culver Academies championships. (Four teams play at each semi-state, with the winners each receiving a championship and qualifying for the state meet.)

#### State finals

The state quarter-finals will be played on Friday, Oct. 18, with teams competing either at Carmel or Center Grove. The semi-finals and championship are set for Saturday, Oct. 19 at North Central.

### UNIFIED FLAG FOOTBALL
