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



Fishers road construction updates, week of Aug. 5

Keep Fishers DPW safe

With all the road construction happening right now, remember to slow down and drive carefully around road workers. Click here to see the Fishers DPW crew talk about worker safety.

Interstate 69

The Indiana Department of Transportation continues work on multiple projects to improve pavement conditions and repair winter damage on Indianapolis area interstates.

Through 6 a.m. Monday, Aug. 5, the right two lanes of I-69 northbound from 82nd Street to 116th Street will be closed. Entrance ramps from Allisonville Road to I-465 eastbound will also be closed until 6 a.m. Monday, Aug. 5.

Municipal Road & Lantern Road

The north end of Municipal Drive (beginning just north of the Nickel Plate District Amphitheater) that connects to Lantern Road will close again on Monday night to finish up utility crossings. During this time, access to the Municipal Complex from Lantern Road is available at North Street.

Allisonville Road

Traffic is scheduled to be switched to the west side of the road on Monday, Aug. 5. Please drive with caution as the final surface and striping is placed.

At this time, the section of road between 126th and 131st streets is anticipated to be open to four lanes of traffic by the end of the August, and the section between River Glen Drive and 126th Street is anticipated to be open prior to the start of the school year.

126th Street

All lanes of 126th Street at Parkside Drive are scheduled to be open by the end of this week. This includes the new connection road to Reynolds Drive.

131st Street & Marilyn Road

131st Street at Marilyn Road will be closed for two days starting Monday, Aug. 5. 146th Street & Allisonville Road

Beginning Tuesday, Aug. 6 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., the northernmost lane of 146th Street both east and west of Allisonville Road will be closed

to all traffic for roadwork by Hamilton County Highway Department. Access to northbound Allisonville Road will be maintained. Advance warning signs with and cones will be place before motorists reach the impacted area.

136th Street & Cyntheanne Road

The intersection of 136th Street and Cyntheanne Road is remains closed for the construction of a new roundabout. Detour signs are in place to direct drivers around the closures. What year did the Pan American games open in Indianapolis?

This week in Indiana's history ...

1876 – Ernest M. Viquesney was born in Spencer. He became a sculptor, most famous for Spirit of the American Doughboy, a statue honoring soldiers of World War I. It was reproduced many times and can be found across America in front of city halls, courthouses and listanding, including 11 in Indiana.

1899 – Marshall "Major" Taylor of Indianapolis won the 1-mile world championship in bicycling at Montreal. He was one of the first African American world athletes, setting numerous records in bicycle racing. The open-air velodrome in Indianapolis is named in his honor.

1919 - Allen County Judge William N. Ballou held court in a Fort Wayne theater to witness a film which showed striking workers interfering with operations at a local manufacturing plant. The newspaper reported that "as far as is known, it was the first time in the history of jurisprudence that a playhouse has been used as a courtroom and the silent art employed as evidence."

1927 – Over 200,000 Hoosiers cheered Colonel Charles Lindbergh as he rode in a 14-mile parade from Mars Hill Airport to the State Fairgrounds Coliseum. It had been less than three months



braries. There are thought to be 140 still historic flight over the Atlantic Ocean. He spoke at the Coliseum and later at the Columbia Club. The reporter for *The Indianapolis Star* said the reception was so great that "previous demonstrations in the city's history faded into obscurity.'

1928 - Hollywood producer Frank Melford was in Indianapolis to produce a local "Our Gang" two-reel comedy. Broad Ripple Park was the locale for the silent film which featured local youngsters as "stars" and over 500 more as "extras." The plot involved a pie-eating contest which ended up with more pies being thrown than eaten. The movie premiered a week later at the city's Palace Theater.



His leadership helped both Indiana and the Midwest region lead in not only R3 initiatives, but also landscape scale conservation, urban conservation, wildlife health and public access.

During retirement, Reiter plans to focus on time with his family and wants to build a house on property he owns in Owen County.
