Day one of county's budget deliberations

The Hamilton County Council concluded day one on Tuesday.

The 2020 county budget, expected to be just under \$100 million, includes a 3 percent pay raise for county employees.

Council President Brad Beaver in a statement published last week said, "It's a big budget. It is a big operation. Our biggest expenses are salaries and benefits for the 800 county employees as well as highway projects."

council members did not have a majority vote to full-time employees, but did approve funding for one part-time employee for the Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program (YAP). The council deadlocked on the vote for the three fulltime employees with a 3-3 Council members vote.



A Blue Star Memorial Plaque will be dedicated to the City of Carmel and Clay Township at 2 p.m. this afternoon at the John W. Hensel Government Center, 10701 N. College Ave. Phyllis Grzeskowiak of The Broad Ripple Garden Club, National Blue Star Chair Jayne Kesler, Clay Township Trustee Doug Callahan and other distinguished guests will be present.

Memorials Program honors all men and women who serve in the United States Armed Services. The program began in 1944 with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs as a liv-

ing memorial to veterans of World War II.

In 1945, the National Council of State Garden Clubs adopted this program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker was placed at appropriate locations along the way.

The Blue Star became The Blue & Gold Star an icon in World War II and was seen on flags and banners in homes for sons and daughters away at war, and in churches and businesses. This program has been active all through the years to the present, a fitting tribute to the Armed Forces.

Patrolling county's roads for impaired drivers

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of local law enforcement agencies, is joining about 230 law-enforcement agencies across Indiana and thousands nationwide in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over mobilization. From mid-August through Labor Day, police will be working overtime to arrest impaired drivers. Expect to see increased sobriety checkpoints, roving patrols and saturation patrols.

Any substance that makes you feel different - like legal or illegal drugs and alcohol can also make you drive driver today as officers will be on patrol for impaired drivers.

A driving while intoxicated (DWI) arrest means going to jail and losing your driver's license. The average DWI cost? About \$10,000, including car towing and repairs, attorney fees, fines, court costs, lost time at work and other hefty expenses.

Overtime patrols are supported with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration funds distributed by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). For more information, visit on.IN.gov/drivesober.

In every state, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 percent or higher. In Indiana, drivers under 21 with a BAC of 0.02 percent or higher are subject to fines and a license suspension for up to one year.

But DWI includes more than alcohol, and there is no quick field test for the many prescription, over-the-counter and illegal drugs that can impair drivers. To assist with traffic enforcement, ICJI recently provided Indiana police agencies with:

• 2,600 portable breath tests to evaluate alcohol impairment in drivers,

 1,000 RADAR and LI-DAR speed-measurement devices, and

• Android tablets for 248 highly trained police officers who document drugged drivers

New impaired-driving lakes and pool parties. Sadly, it is also one of the deadliest times of year for impaired-driving deaths.

With all of today's options for getting home safely, there's no excuse for getting behind the wheel impaired as it endangers you and everyone else around you. Law enforcement recommends these safe alternatives to impaired driving:

• Designate, or be, a sober driver.

• Use public transportation.

Call a cab or a ridesharing service.

· Download the Safer-Ride mobile app on the Android Play Store or the Apple iTunes Store. This app only has three options: call a taxi, call a friend, and identify your location for pickup.

• Celebrate at home or a place where you can stay until sober.

• Throwing a party? Offer non-alcoholic beverages and plenty of food.

 Never provide alcohol legally to minors.

• Ask young drivers about their plans.

• Friend or family member about to drive? Take the keys and make alternate arrangements.

Ride sober

Motorcycles are about 3 percent of registered vehicles but are dramatically over-represented in impaired driving crashes. And the more that bikers are impaired, the less likely they are to wear helmets.

Report impaired drivers

If you see an impaired driver, turn off the road away from the vehicle and call 911. Signs of impaired driving include:

• Weaving, swerving, drifting, or straddling the center line

• Driving at a very slow speed

- · Braking erratically
- Making wide turns

• Stopping without cause

· Responding slowly to

traffic signals Driving after dark with headlights off

• Turning abruptly or il-

• Driving on the wrong side of the road

Drivers should also watch for impaired pedestrians who may not be paying attention to their surroundings.

the county tax rate will de- improve and lessen the time crease 1.4 percent with assessed valuation increasing 6.33 percent."

"Hamilton County government is in a solidly strong financial position today, which will continue through the end of 2020, with a projected combined Rainy Day and General Fund cash balance of nearly \$46 million.'

"We have approved the addition of six new full-time and two part-time positions for county government in 2020," said McKinney.

McKinney did point out two highlights from Tuesday's meeting:

1. The approval of \$835,000 for new and additional voting machines to

to vote. 2. The County Recorder providing \$574,606 from the office's dedicated document fee fund to pay for her office's salaries. This was made possible by a state law that includes an annual allowance from this fund, which may be done on a year by year basis. The fund's

current balance is \$3.9 million and can only be used for the office's operations.

The budget hearing resumes at 8:30 a.m. today at the Hamilton County Judicial Center. Council members are expected to discuss the County Highway and Communication Center budgets, along with possible funding of nonprofits.



Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill expressed on Tuesday his support for President Trump's embrace of "red flag" laws in the wake of recent mass shootings in Dayton, Ohio, and El Paso, Texas. 

In an Aug. 5 address to the nation, President Trump said, "We must make sure that those judged to pose a grave risk to public safety do not have access to firearms, and that, if they do, those firearms can be taken through rapid due process. That is why I have called for red flag laws, also known as extreme risk protection orders."

On a White House visit in February 2018, Hill touted the value of red flag laws in conversations with President Trump and other officials. He traveled to Washington, D.C. again in March 2018 to discuss red flag laws with U.S. Senator Lindsey Graham of South Carolina.




