**Day one of county's budget deliberations**

The Hamilton County Council concluded day one of its 2020 budget hearing on Tuesday.

The 2020 county budget, expected to be just under \$100 million, includes a 3 percent pay raise for county employees.

Council President Brad Beaver in a statement published last week said, "It's a big operation. Our biggest expenses are salaries and benefits for the 800 county employees as well as highway projects."

During the hearing, council members did not have a majority vote to approve funding for three full-time employees, but did approve funding for one part-time employee for the Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program (YAP). The council deadlocked on the vote for the three full-time employees with a 3-3 vote. Council members

Amy Massillamany, Steve Schwartz and Ken Alexander voted in favor. Council members Fred Glenn, Brad Beaver and Rick McKinney voted not to approve. Councilman Jeff Hern was not in attendance at Tuesday's meeting.

YAP Program Director Trisha Akers was asking the council to fund one youth advocate for each of the cities of Westfield, Carmel and Fishers. Those communities currently have only one advocate handling a large case load.

YAP serves as an early intervention advocate for youth ages 3 to 17 who are facing challenging life circumstances.

County Councilman Rick McKinney stated, "All in all, the Hamilton County Council's first day of budget deliberations went extremely well."

McKinney told the Reporter, "Based on our financial consultant's estimates, See Budget . . . Page 2

On Monday, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook unveiled the Westfield Police Department's newest canine officer. The Indianapolis Colts donated the canine, named Billy, and Westfield-based, Custom Concrete contributed the labor and materials for the kennel.

"This generosity emphasizes the importance of partnership in public safety," said Cook. "Keeping our community safe is truly a team effort and we are beyond grateful for having partners in the Indianapolis Colts and Custom Concrete."

"It's our mission - as a family, a team and an organization - to entertain, unite and inspire our fans, and one way we do that is by giving back to the communities in which we live, work and serve," said Kalen (Irsay) Jackson, Indianapolis Colts Vice Chair & Owner. "Donating this canine officer to the Westfield police and schools is one way for the Colts to say thank you to the people of Westfield for being such gracious hosts and wonderful partners."

Billy is a two-year-old German Short Haired Pointer and comes from Hungary. He was trained in explosives detection after spending three weeks in training with his handler, Officer Anuar Velazquez, at Vohne Liche Kennels. The duo will be primarily assigned to Westfield High School in a continued effort to increase police presence in the school system.

Billy is the third canine in the Westfield Police Department. His assignment in the schools is part of the WPD's strategic school security program.

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**Blue Star Memorial Plaque ceremony today in Carmel**

A Blue Star Memorial Plaque will be dedicated to the City of Carmel and Clay Township at 2 p.m. this afternoon at the John W. Hensel Government Center, 10701 N. College Ave. Phyllis Grzeskowiak of The Broad Ripple Garden Club, National Blue Star Chair Jayne Kesler, Clay Township Trustee Doug Callahan and other distinguished guests will be present.

The Blue & Gold Star Memorials Program honors all men and women who serve in the United States Armed Services. The program began in 1944 with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs as a living memorial to veterans of World War II.

In 1945, the National Council of State Garden Clubs adopted this program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker was placed at appropriate locations along the way.

The Blue Star became an icon in World War II and was seen on flags and banners in homes for sons and daughters away at war, and in churches and businesses. This program has been active all through the years to the present, a fitting tribute to the Armed Forces.

**Ana Gaston elected Girls Nation president**

A celebrity starts school today at Fishers. Ana Gaston begins her senior year as president of Girls Nation, the American Legion Auxiliary annual program for high school students. Gaston was elected last month by delegates from throughout the nation.

Gaston is believed to be the first girl from Hamilton County to be elected president in the 73 year history of Girls Nation. She and delegates from all 50 states enjoyed a week in Washington, D.C., visiting government and historic sites and campaigning for president and vice president in a mock election.

The process, designed to acquaint young Americans with their government, begins with Hoosier Girls State where Gaston was chosen to be one of two representing Indiana at the national conclave.

There is also a Boys State and Boys Nation sponsored by the American Legion. In the mock election in Washington, Gaston (president) and Caroline Couch of Tennessee (vice president) ran successfully on the Federalist Party ticket. The entire delegation was welcomed by Vice President Mike Pence.

Hamilton County also did well at the Girls State gathering earlier when Carolyn Ramsay of Carmel was elected governor.

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**Patrolling county's roads for impaired drivers**

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of local law enforcement agencies, is joining about 230 law-enforcement agencies across Indiana and thousands nationwide in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over mobilization. From mid-August through Labor Day, police will be working overtime to arrest impaired drivers. Expect to see increased sobriety checkpoints, roving patrols and saturation patrols.

Any substance that makes you feel different - like legal or illegal drugs and alcohol - can also make you drive different. Designate a sober driver today as officers will be on patrol for impaired drivers.

A driving while intoxicated (DWI) arrest means going to jail and losing your driver's license. The average DWI cost? About \$10,000, including car towing and repairs, attorney fees, fines, court costs, lost time at work and other hefty expenses.

Overtime patrols are supported with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration funds distributed by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). For more information, visit [on.IN.gov/drivesober](http://on.IN.gov/drivesober).

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**Ride sober**

Motorcycles are about 3 percent of registered vehicles but are dramatically over-represented in impaired driving crashes. And the more that bikers are impaired, the less likely they are to wear helmets.

**Report impaired drivers**

If you see an impaired driver, turn off the road away from the vehicle and call 911. Signs of impaired driving include:

- Weaving, swerving, drifting, or straddling the center line
- Driving at a very slow speed
- Braking erratically
- Making wide turns
- Stopping without cause
- Responding slowly to traffic signals
- Driving after dark with headlights off
- Closely missing an object or vehicle
- Turning abruptly or illegally
- Driving on the wrong side of the road

**Tips for a safe and fun season**

The annual Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over enforcement campaign includes the Labor Day weekend, with thousands upon thousands of Hoosier families taking to their cars for end-of-summer barbecues, football games, lakes and pool parties. Sadly, it is also one of the deadliest times of year for impaired-driving deaths.

With all of today's options for getting home safely, there's no excuse for getting behind the wheel impaired as it endangers you and everyone else around you. Law enforcement recommends these safe alternatives to impaired driving:

- Designate, or be, a sober driver.
- Use public transportation.
- Call a cab or a ridesharing service.
- Download the SaferRide mobile app on the [Android Play Store](https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.saferide) or the [Apple iTunes Store](https://itunes.apple.com/us/app/saferide/id1441111111). This app only has three options: call a taxi, call a friend, and identify your location for pickup.
- Celebrate at home or a place where you can stay until sober.
- Throwing a party? Offer non-alcoholic beverages and plenty of food.
- Never provide alcohol to minors.
- Ask young drivers about their plans.
- Friend or family member about to drive? Take the keys and make alternate arrangements.

the county tax rate will decrease 1.4 percent with assessed valuation increasing 6.33 percent.”

“Hamilton County government is in a solidly strong financial position today, which will continue through the end of 2020, with a projected combined Rainy Day and General Fund cash balance of nearly \$46 million.”

“We have approved the addition of six new full-time and two part-time positions for county government in 2020,” said McKinney. McKinney did point out two highlights from Tuesday’s meeting:


1. The approval of \$835,000 for new and additional voting machines to

improve and lessen the time to vote.

2. The County Recorder providing \$574,606 from the office’s dedicated document fee fund to pay for her office’s salaries. This was made possible by a state law that includes an annual allowance from this fund, which may be done on a year by year basis. The fund’s current balance is \$3.9 million and can only be used for the office’s operations.

The budget hearing resumes at 8:30 a.m. today at the Hamilton County Judicial Center. Council members are expected to discuss the County Highway and Communication Center

budgets, along with possible funding of nonprofits.

## Sheriff's Office warns of suspicious calls, potential scam

Over the past few days, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has received at least three reports of suspicious activity that may lead to a potential scam.

According to information received by deputies, a caller claiming to be "Lt. Hickey" from the Sheriff's Office has told people to report to the Sheriff's Office to take care of issues with subpoenas. There is no Lt. Hickey employed at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office.

The caller made no threat of arrest and did not demand money, which is unusual as these types of calls generally involve those two circumstances.

However, the caller does insist on meeting immediately at the Sheriff's Office

to rectify the situation, so it may be a ruse to have people leave their residences unoccupied.

The Sheriff's Office once again reminds citizens that these types of issues are not handled by telephone. If a call sounds suspicious, hang up the phone, research the correct number, and verify the situation or call Hamilton County Public Safety Communications at (317) 773-1282 to speak to an officer or deputy.

Do not be pressured into responding over the phone and do not rely on callback numbers provided. Names may be researched on the internet and technology allows numbers to be spoofed, so always use due diligence in responding to calls of this nature.

# Indiana Trails chair calls for rails & trails

Dear Editor:  
As a Central Indiana resident and Chairman of the Board of Indiana Trails, I am appalled to learn there were no satisfactory bids to do a complete job of removing the Nickel Plate Railroad tracks, ties and rail spikes, and then rebuild the railroad crossings impacted. Yet, the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority still voted to move forward.  
There is a simple, practical answer to the situation that would actually be more beneficial to the community: Leave the tracks where they are and create a biking/jogging/hiking/walking trail along the right-of-way of the existing tracks. That course of action would save the taxpayers the substan-

tial expense of removing the beds and building new crossings at street and road intersections.  
Plenty of evidence exists of "rails and trails" coexisting for the benefit of the communities they serve. An analysis of the existing Nickel Plate right of way reveals there is sufficient space for a synergistic solution that will allow the creation of the trail and keep the railroad tracks for historic and entertainment purposes.  
Trains are demonstrably popular among the people of Indiana, and the Indiana Fair trains proved to be popular when they ran fairgoers from Fishers to the Indiana State Fairgrounds. A trail along the Nickel Plate would very likely prove to

be appreciated by the public, and keeping the rails for their potential development as educational artifacts of our community's history makes sense.  
As a child I remember the excitement and fun of riding the old Grand Trunk Railroad from Chicago to Flint, Mich. In recent years I have enjoyed taking my grandchildren to ride on existing museums on rails in Indiana. What great fun!  
Let's do something positive for the northeast side of our community: Develop the "rails and trails" potential of the Nickel Plate!

# AG Curtis Hill says President Trump is right to embrace 'red flag' laws

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill expressed on Tuesday his support for President Trump's embrace of "red flag" laws in the wake of recent mass shootings in Dayton, Ohio, and El Paso, Texas. Red flag laws are statutes allowing law enforcement officers to take possession of firearms from people they believe to be dangerous as defined in the statutes.  
Indiana was one of the first five states in the nation to enact red flag laws, passing such a statute in 2005. Today, 17 states and the District of Columbia have such laws.  
"Indiana's red flag law is a common-sense mea-

sure that in no way inhibits the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding citizens," Hill said. "As President Trump takes concrete actions to stop gun violence in our country, he is wise to encourage more states to adopt these kinds of provisions."  
Under Indiana's law, a person is considered "dangerous" if the person presents an imminent risk of physical injury to himself or others. A person can also be considered dangerous if the person presents a potential risk of physical injury and has either been diagnosed

with a mental illness and failed to take prescribed medication, or if there is documented evidence that the person has "a propensity for violent or emotionally unstable conduct."  
Indiana's law prescribes that within 14 days after a firearm is seized from a person deemed dangerous, a court hearing must be held to determine whether the firearm should be returned. To keep possession of a firearm, law enforcement officials have the burden of proving by "clear and convincing evidence" that a person is dangerous.

In an Aug. 5 address to the nation, President Trump said, "We must make sure that those judged to pose a grave risk to public safety do not have access to firearms, and that, if they do, those firearms can be taken through rapid due process. That is why I have called for red flag laws, also known as extreme risk protection orders."  
On a White House visit in February 2018, Hill touted the value of red flag laws in conversations with President Trump and other officials. He traveled to Washington, D.C. again in March 2018 to discuss red flag laws with U.S. Senator Lindsey Graham of South Carolina.
