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Brainard joins Indiana mayors on push for more gun control

Five Indiana mayors, including Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard, are pushing Congress to take action on gun legislation after the latest mass shootings.
They've joined more than 230 mayors nationwide asking the U.S. Senate to vote on a pair of House bills which passed with bipartisan support.
The letter highlights two bills involving background checks: House Bill 8 and House Bill 1112. House Bill 8 would require all gun sales to go through a background check, prohibit unlicensed and unregulated secondary sales and help police trace crime guns.

House Bill 1112 would extend the review period of background checks to 10 days.
The request comes just days after the latest mass shootings in Dayton, Ohio and El Paso, Texas.
The mayoral letter was put together by the United States Conference of Mayors and includes five in Indiana: Indianapolis, Carmel, Fort Wayne, Gary and South Bend where Mayor Pete Buttigieg is also running for president.
The letter is addressed to both Senate Republican and Democratic party leader-

ship and asks them to do something immediately.
There have been 251 mass shootings in this year's first 216 days — defined as any incident where at least four victims are shot, even if they don't die, no matter the circumstance, including gang violence.
News from this past Thursday means the mayors are getting at least part of their wish. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R) said he won't bring the Senate back early but said when they return, background checks and red flag laws will be up for discussion.

HSE Schools student count may top 22,000

The new Southeastern Elementary was projected to be 80 percent occupied; now it is at capacity with a larger than expected kindergarten class.
Two students were recognized at the staff gathering. Ana Gaston of Fishers High School was named American Legion Auxiliary Girls President, a national honor. HSE High School student Salma Mohammad gained national recognition, winning the National Poet Award, Student Ambassador.

Increase in local income tax to finance 911 communications

Hamilton County wage earners will find their local income tax increased by 10 percent next year if a proposed countywide tax for operating the 911 communications system is approved. The new tax requires approval of the Local Income Tax Council made up of the county's eight municipalities and county government, with representation of each roughly equal to population.
The new tax comes essentially in answer to a long-discussed inequity in financing the vital communications operation where 911

calls are answered and dispatched to appropriate police, fire or EMS units. For years the largest cities along with county government have paid most of the costs. The new tax, which would increase local income tax from the present 1 percent to 1.1 percent, will mean income earners will pay their share. About \$15 million annually will be raised by this additional tax.
If a majority of the local tax council's proportional vote is affirmative, the tax will be effective on Jan. 1. Carmel and Fishers can achieve this majority because together they represent more than half the votes needed.

The proposed ordinance originated as a group effort of local government units, according to County Commissioner Christine Altman. The ordinance does not mandate the tax be revenue neutral. In other words, several million dollars now contributed by the county, Noblesville, Carmel, Westfield and Fishers may be used for any other expenses these units incur.
The municipalities and county government must vote for the ordinance by Oct. 1 in order for it to take effect next year. It is unclear when each of these votes will take place, but they should show up on council agendas prior to consideration.

New law helps teens in juvenile detention continue their education

Thanks to a new state law, it's now easier for teens locked up in juvenile detention to keep up on their education. Just because the heavy doors shut, learning doesn't stop inside the Hamilton County Juvenile Services Center.
"We really care for these children," Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush said. "We want them to continue a productive life. I think education is a huge piece of that."
That is why, for the last 13 years, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office has worked with Noblesville Schools to get locked up teens laptops and their classwork via email.
"It comes in daily," Hamilton County Juvenile Services Director Kija Ireland said. "The teachers can upload it as the kids complete tasks. Then they can continue to upload things, login and do their work."
"For 13 years, we've had a full-time teacher, a social worker, and a part-time assistant here on staff at the facility," Quakenbush said. "They're an employee of Noblesville Schools."

New hires, employee raises top list of expenditures in county's 2020 budget

Hamilton County Councilors wrapped up two days of budget hearings at the Judicial Center last Wednesday. They finalized a budget of just under \$100 million for the 2020 fiscal year.
"I'd like to commend our council for doing a great job," Council President Brad Beaver said. "There are seven different viewpoints on this council and a lot of passion in the decision-making process, but overall I'm happy with the outcome. We spend very wisely."

The proposed budget includes six new full-time positions, one each in the Surveyor's Office, Parks and Recreation Department, Sheriff's Department, Office of Emergency Management, and Soil and Water Conservation District. A new part-time employee has been budgeted for the Purdue Extension Office. The proposed

budget includes raises averaging 7 percent for county employees and 3 percent for elected officials. A total of \$1.2 million was also budgeted to support 13 Hamilton County not-for-profit agencies, including Janus, Aspire and the Humane Society.
"All in all, budget deliberations went extremely well," said Council Vice President Rick McKinney. McKinney will become Council President in January. "Hamilton County government is in a solidly strong financial position today, which will continue through the end of 2020."
A public hearing on the budget is scheduled for 7 p.m. Sept. 4 at the next monthly meeting. Formal adoption of the proposed budget is set for 8:30 a.m. Sept. 16. The budget will be subject to state approval before going into effect Jan. 1, 2020.

Duke Energy donates \$10,000 for Jumpstart program . . . Heights receives grant for summer literacy program

The Hamilton Heights School Corporation recently received a generous grant of \$10,000 from Duke Energy to help fund its Jumpstart program that took place July 16-26.
The summer literacy program, now in its third year, is designed for Heights students who recently completed kindergarten, first and second grades, and who could benefit from a jump start for the upcoming school year. A maximum of 30 students can participate in this interactive summer reading program that will be conducted for three hours daily for 10 days prior to the start of the school year.
Hamilton Heights Primary School Principal Julie Griffey said each student has an individualized curricular component designed around the STAR Reading, Aims Web Plus data, and Fountas and Pinnell reading benchmarks.
This grant is part of an approximately \$400,000 investment the Duke Energy Foundation is making in summer literacy programs around the state.

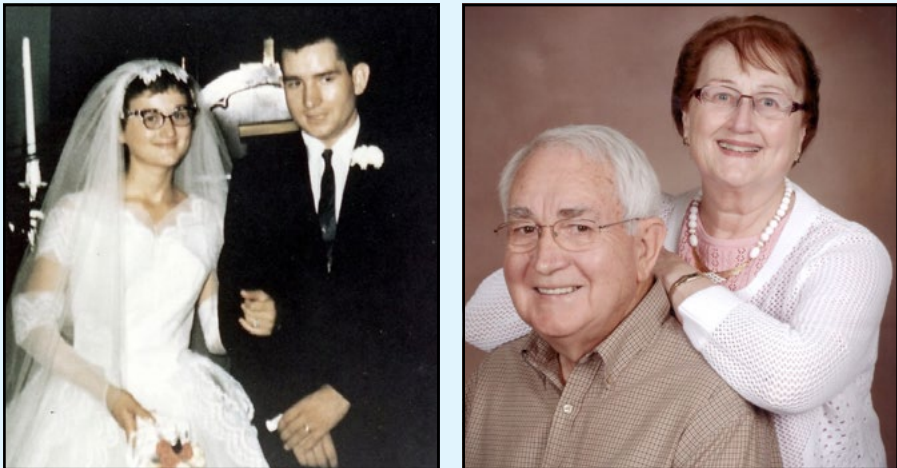

When finishing up a podcast recording session with Fishers Police Chief Ed Gebhart on Aug. 7, I asked the Chief if there was anything he wanted to add before wrapping up. He immediately went to gun safety.

Chief Gebhart comes from a family with guns, but says his father taught him strict lessons growing up on the importance of gun safety and security.

"I would just ask my community to please keep their weapons out of their vehicles and lock them up,"

Gebhart said. "Let's keep our community safe."

A recent Facebook page post by Fishers Police says seven guns have been stolen from vehicles in the city during a one month.

"If you own a gun, please be a responsible gun owner and secure it in your residence in a proper gun safe," the Facebook posting says. "Your firearm could end up in the hands of criminals, which is extremely dangerous to our city, our children, and our police officers. If you have any in-

formation regarding these thefts, please call (317) 595-3300."

During the podcast, the Chief also talked about how Fishers Police are now working with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department in running down guns suspected of being used in criminal activity. Gebhart says both Fishers and Indianapolis have seen success in that program.

Heights' Eric Fisher named semifinalist for teaching prize

Skilled trades teachers compete for share of \$1 million for their programs

Two Indiana high school skilled trades teachers are among 50 teachers and teacher teams from across the country named as semifinalists for the 2019 Harbor Freight Tools for Schools Prize for Teaching Excellence. They and their high school skilled trades programs are in the running for a share of \$1 million in total cash awards.

Eric Fisher, an industrial technology teacher at Hamilton Heights High School, Arcadia, and Chad Sutton, a construction and manufacturing teacher at Garrett High School, Garrett, were chosen by an independent panel of judges from among a field of 749 skilled trades teachers who applied for the prize. The semifinalists –

some competing as individuals and some as teacher teams – hail from 26 states and specialize in trades including manufacturing, welding, construction, automotive and agriculture mechanics.

Fisher teaches industrial technology at Hamilton Heights High School, offering his students a program that aligns the career development standards of the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) with many real-world opportunities. As Hamilton Heights School Corporation, a district that serves White River and Jackson townships,

pursues a multi-year construction project to expand and renovate its elementary, middle and high school buildings. Fisher takes students on regular site visits to meet with construc-

tion managers and see an active job site firsthand. A 30-year teacher, Fisher has never stopped learning and improving his program. He is currently pursuing a master of science in construction management from Purdue University and is adapting a new building information modeling curriculum to his classroom.

County taxable valuation jumps by \$1.4 billion in only one year

Hamilton County’s tremendous growth in new construction is reflected in new taxable valuation totals from the County Auditor’s office. The figures reveal the tax base on which property tax rates are calculated will raise more money next year if a tax rate remains the same as this year.

Countywide, the increase in assessed valuation rose more than \$1.4 billion to a record \$23.5 billion. Carmel experienced the greatest gain: \$570 million, but \$195 million of that was due to annexations. Arcadia was the only unit to suffer a loss in valuation, dropping from \$38.7 million to \$37.9 million.

Overall, there is good news for taxpayers because tax rates are expected to remain static in the case of most units of local government. In fact, rates could be reduced slightly and governmental

units could still raise that same revenue as this year. (Exceptions would be in the case of any unit where voters have approved a referendum seeking more money.)

Of course, reductions are actually not likely because needs for services are increasing along with the population. Salary increases, added employees, energy costs and insurance costs will likely eat up the new money provided by the expanding tax base.

In any event, the larger tax base is one advantage of living in a growing county. In many areas of the state where taxable values are static or even falling, officials continue to be faced with either increasing taxes or cutting back on public services and facilities.

Property tax rates for 2020 will be calculated in the next few months. Those proposed rates will be published for each unit of government: City, school, township, library and county.

Passport Fair comes to Noblesville

The United States Postal Service is making passport application a bit more convenient for you this next weekend.

The Noblesville Post Office, 1900 Pleasant St., is offering extended hours this Saturday for anyone who needs a passport. The Passport Fair will offer customers the option to get a U.S. passport book or passport card from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 17. Walk-ins are welcome.

According to Noblesville Post Office Lead Clerk Mike Cimarossa, “The passport book is the normal passport. It allows you to travel any way you’d like. You can fly, you can drive, you can take a boat to any country we are allowed to be in. The card only allows you to surface travel to Canada and Mexico or take a

cruise to the Caribbean and Bermuda.”

As of Oct. 1, 2020, Real ID-compliant identification will be necessary to travel by air in the United States. One way to comply with that standard is to have either a passport book or card.

According to Cimarossa, you can bring your own photo when you apply for your passport, as long as it complies with the Department of State guidelines, or you can have the Post Office take one for you.

“The exact measurements are on the application itself,” Cimarossa said. “It is a 2 by 2 inch color photo with a white background. The total head height is an inch and 3/4 and the head is a 7/8 oval.”

Visit tinyurl.com/PassportApp2020 to download an application online, or you can pick one up at the Post Office.

There are multiple fees

when you apply for your passport, some of which need to be paid to the U.S. Department of State and some of which will be paid to the Post Office.

“The fee that goes to the State Department has to be in a check or money order,” Cimarossa said. “Our fees can be paid with cash, check or debit.”

The passport fair was organized at the request of the U.S. Department of State.

“The State Department wants us to reach out and have times available outside out normal times of being open,” Cimarossa said. “That way people who could not make it on Saturday morning or during the day during the week would have an extra opportunity to come in and take care of something that can be kind of frustrating to do if you

Two injured in Noblesville crash

At 4:37 p.m. Friday, police officers and firefighters from the Noblesville Police and Fire Departments responded to a two-vehicle crash at the intersection of State Road 32 and Oakmont Drive in Noblesville.

Reports indicate a 2006 Chevy Cobalt was traveling southbound on Oakmont Drive and was stopped at the stop sign for SR 32 just prior to the crash. It appears the Chevy Cobalt pulled out onto SR 32 in an attempt to go eastbound; however, in doing so pulled into the path of

a 2001 Mercedes that was traveling westbound on SR 32.

The driver of the Chevy Cobalt is identified as Alexa R. Lockhart, 18, Noblesville. She was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Indianapolis) in critical condition. No one else was in the vehicle.

The driver of the Mercedes was identified as Ana Roche, 67, Westfield. She was transported by ground ambulance to Riverview Health with minor injuries. No one else was in the vehicle.

Single-car crash leaves Westfield woman dead

At 7:47 p.m. on Aug. 5, Westfield police officers and firefighters were dispatched to a single vehicle crash involving serious bodily injury at the intersection of Grassy Branch Road and Mere Boulevard.

Upon arrival at the scene, officers located a 2006 Buick sedan which had broken into several pieces. The driver, Debra Clark, Westfield, was extri-

cated from the vehicle and transported to Riverview Hospital at Westfield, where Clark was then pronounced deceased.

Preliminary information suggests the vehicle was southbound on Grassy Branch Road and lost control. The vehicle then hit a tree head on. The accident is still under investigation by members of the Westfield Police Department Crash Reconstruction Team.

Patrolling county’s roads for impaired drivers

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of local law enforcement agencies, is joining about 230 law-enforcement agencies across Indiana and thousands nationwide in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over mobilization. From mid-August through Labor Day, police will be working overtime to arrest impaired drivers. Expect to see increased sobriety checkpoints, roving patrols and saturation patrols.

Any substance that makes you feel different – like legal or illegal drugs and alcohol – can also make you drive different. Designate a sober driver today as officers will be on patrol for impaired drivers.

A driving while intoxicated (DWI) arrest means going to jail and losing your driver’s license. The average DWI cost? About \$10,000, including car towing and repairs, attorney fees, fines, court costs, lost time at work and other hefty expenses.

Overtime patrols are supported with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration funds distributed by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). For more information, visit on.IN.gov/drivesober.

New impaired-driving equipment

In every state, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 percent or higher. In Indiana, drivers under 21 with a BAC of 0.02 percent or higher are subject to fines and a license suspension for

up to one year.

But DWI includes more than alcohol, and there is no quick field test for the many prescription, over-the-counter and illegal drugs that can impair drivers. To assist with traffic enforcement, ICJI recently provided Indiana police agencies with:

- 2,600 portable breath tests to evaluate alcohol impairment in drivers,
- 1,000 RADAR and LIDAR speed-measurement devices, and
- Android tablets for 248 highly trained police officers who document drugged drivers.

Tips for a safe, fun season

- Designate, or be, a sober driver.
- Use public transportation.
- Call a cab or a ridesharing service.
- Download the SaferRide mobile app on the [Android Play Store](https://play.google.com/store/apps/details?id=com.saferride) or the [Apple iTunes Store](https://itunes.apple.com/us/app/saferride/id1441111111?mt=8).
- Celebrate at home or a place where you can stay until sober.
- Throwing a party? Offer non-alcoholic beverages and plenty of food.
- Never provide alcohol to minors.
- Ask young drivers about their plans.
- Friend or family member about to drive? Take the keys and make alternate arrangements.

Crime or abuse is not the victim’s fault

Too many times a victim of crime or abuse is blamed for the abuse they have endured. The blame often comes from everywhere – family members, close friends, law enforcement, social media ... the list goes on and on. In cases of domestic violence, victims are often asked, “Why don’t you just leave?” or “What did you do to make him/her that mad?”

The most common questions victims of sexual assault/abuse hear are: “What were you wearing?” “Were you drinking?” “Did you flirt with him/her and give them the wrong impression?” “Why didn’t you scream/kick/fight/run away?” “Why didn’t you report this sooner?”



Victim blaming often happens due to the victim blaming phenomenon. The victim blaming phenomenon occurs when an individual identifies something that the victim could have possibly done to make the abuse/assault happen.

Identifying something that someone did to “make” an event/situation happen often gives the person a false sense of security. It can look like this in domestic violence cases: “Well, if that were ME in that situation, I would NEVER let someone hit/abuse me. I would call the police, I would leave that relationship. Since he/she (victim) isn’t leaving or reporting the abuse,

I in 3 women and 1 in 6 men in their lifetimes. Anyone, at any time, can find themselves in an abusive relationship with their partner, spouse, or family member because the abuser is the only one that can decide not to be abusive.

Every 92 seconds an American (man, woman, or child) experiences sexual assault (RAINN, 2019). Most victims know their perpetrator and many victims say that they trusted the person who assaulted/abused them. Domestic violence and sexual assault can happen to anyone, regardless of their gender, race, age, ethnicity, socioeconomic status or religion.

A victim never chooses to be hurt, assaulted or abused. However, the perpetrator of the violence, assault or abuse chooses to hurt others by their actions. The conversation surrounding domestic violence and sexual assault needs to change; the questions often asked are the wrong questions.

We need to be asking why the abuser/offender is choosing to hurt others. We need to be asking why the abuser/offender isn’t being held accountable or what can be done to hold them more accountable. We, as individuals, communities, and society need to focus on the actions of the perpetrator instead of the victim. It is never a victim’s fault.

If you have ever experienced crime/abuse, please know that at Prevail we believe you, we support you, and it is not your fault.

Under a new state law that took effect July 1, if a child’s parent or the facility asks for it, a school corporation must send over materials for the grade level or courses the child would be enrolled in if he or she was not in juvenile detention.

“They would deliver those materials once a week, so they wouldn’t have to deliver it every day,” said State Senator Mike Bohacek (R-Michiana Shores). “There would be sufficient time for the student to get the materials, complete them, and get them returned back to the teacher.”

Sheriff Quakenbush said most juvenile detention centers statewide already have a program like this in place.

“The state statute now gives a little more teeth to the rule, if you will, in case

there were ever any issues,” Sheriff Quakenbush noted.

Sheriff Quakenbush and Ireland both said they hope teens who come through detention center classrooms see this law as a way out.

“In some cases, it is,” Sheriff Quakenbush said. “Depending on the background of the child or what crime they committed, this could be very instrumental in them being successful in the future.”

That success could spring from the pages of a textbook, or a laptop screen.

“I think they could see a lot of benefit in it once they realize we’re on their side and we are there to support them,” Ireland said.

The state law says the school district is responsible for paying for preparation and delivery of the school materials.

The membership of the Hamilton County Communication Operations Board shall be as follows: a. The Hamilton County Sheriff. b. A member of the Board of Commissioners, or the Board’s designee. c. The Mayor of Carmel, or his designee. d. The Mayor of Fishers or his designee. e. The Mayor of Noblesville or his designee. f. The Mayor of Westfield or his designee. g. A voting Representative of Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia, and Atlanta (“the Small Towns”) chosen by a vote of designated representatives of the Small Towns. This representation of the Small Towns shall be subject to annual vote of the Small Towns. Section 6. This Ordinance shall be of full force and effect from and upon its adoption of Resolutions approving this Ordinance by more than fifty percent (50%) of the vote of the members
