Attendees are encouraged to dress in jeans and other casual western attire while enjoying dinner and drinks with an open bar and live music featuring local musician Craig Thurston.

'Spend an evening with your friends under the stars at Conner Prairie for this one-of-a-kind fundraiser that supports atrisk kids in Noblesville," said Matt Nelis, president of the NYAP board of directors. named safest cities to raise children

Safewise.com has named Carmel the safest city in the country to raise children. Fishers is close behind in the fourth spot.

With a population of just over 93,000, Carmel enjoys a SafeWise Safety Score of 97.13, thanks to a violent crime rate of 0.18 per 1,000 people, a property crime rate of 7.47 per 1,000 people and a sex offender rate of 1.3 per 10,000 people.

U.S. News and World Report names Carmel High School as the fourth best high school in Indiana with a graduation rate of 97.9 percent.

Regarding safety in general, SafeWise lists Carmel as the 39th safest city in the United States.

As the only other city in Indiana to be included on a list of the safest cities to raise children, Fishers, with approximately 92,300 inhabitants, enjoys a SafeWise Safety Score of 95.46.

Fishers's violent crime rate is 0.47 per 1,000 people, the property crime rate in 9.26 per 1,000 people and the sex offender rate is 3 per 10,000 people. The graduation rate is 97.5 percent.

Chris Jensen and the Noblesville's Next Chapter Transition Committee held their first full meeting last week, outlining their vision and process for ensuring a successful transition of city government in 2020. Made up of community, government and business leaders, the transition committee will work to build a shared vision and policy goals for the upcoming administration.

"The committee cochairs are ready to work with our residents, leaders, and surrounding communities to find the best answers to the challenges Noblesville faces during the next four years," Jensen said. "At its core, this transition process is a chance for our city to discuss innovative ideas and real change to make Noblesville a better place to

live, work and play."

The transition committee is organized around four key policy areas: Comprehensive Economic and Workforce Development, Downtown, Culture and Recreation, Roads and Infrastructure, and Public Health and Safety. 
