While there may be no such thing as a free lunch, every Wednesday in Sheridan there really is a free dinner.

At 5:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, you can come enjoy a meal prepared and served by local kids at Sheridan CrossRoads Student Center, 305 S. Main St. It is an opportunity for you to enjoy not only the meal, the knowledge that just by showing up you are helping local youth find positive ways to spend their time and give back to their community.

According to Pastor Chris Brooks, CrossRoads café was created for three purposes.

1. To serve the community.
2. To help recreate the idea of community. “The fellowship that comes with people eating together is priceless,” Brooks said. “I’m hoping to bring back the old-school neighborhood that looks out for each other and helps each other.”
3. To provide opportunities for young people to invest in themselves and their

“Our café provides a wonderful opportunity for our students,” Brooks told The Reporter. “The kitchen is completely run by students under our teen head-chef Robert Bowen, who aspires to one day run his own restaurant. Our café teaches students how to cook, clean

The western-themed, adults-only fundraiser will take place from 6 to 11 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 5 at Conner Prairie in the recently remodeled Prairie House.

Attendees are encouraged to dress in jeans and other casual western attire while enjoying dinner and drinks with an open bar and live music featuring local musician Craig Thurston.

“Spend an evening with your friends under the stars at Conner Prairie for this one-of-a-kind fundraiser that supports at-risk kids in Noblesville,” said Matt Nelis, president of the NYAP board of directors. “Thanks to the generosity of our title sponsor, Gaylor Electric, Yee-haw for Youth allows adults to give back to the community in a meaningful way that has an immediate, positive impact on the lives of youth – all while having a rootin’-tootin’ good time.”

Mayor Fadness unveils Fishers budget proposals

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness provided the first glimpses of his administration’s spending proposals for 2020 before the City Council Finance Committee Monday evening.

The mayor says the city tax rate should remain about the same as last year, unless council members decide to issue a short-term one-year bond, which would be financed through a one-year-only rate hike of 1 to 2 cents, in order

to pay for needed street repairs in some older neighborhoods.

Fadness is proposing a 2 percent increase in pay for city workers next year, while increasing the city match for employee contributions to the city’s retirement plan by \$500 a year per employee. The city is proposing no increase in the employee’s share of health insurance premium costs in 2020.

The city projects \$2.2 million will be collected in 2020 from the Wheel Tax on vehicles registered to Fishers residents. The mayor also told the committee the General Fund will have \$16.4 million in the bank, as cash reserves, heading into the start of 2020.

The Finance Committee plans more meetings as the bud-

get details take shape. A public hearing will be held by the City Council on the budget in September, with the final vote on next year’s city spending to be held in October.

and create meals. All these skills teach responsibility as well valuable job skills for the future.”

One thing that sets CrossRoads apart is the fact that is it truly free to anyone in the community, young or old.

“Most community dinners are self-serve walk through lines and ask for a ‘free will’ offering,” Brooks said. “There is

nothing wrong with that. But is has been my experience people feel burdened when free will donation is attached to the invitation. One of our biggest goals at crossroads to not fall into the ‘traditional’ model that has been failing for years.”

CrossRoads also sets itself apart by treating anyone who comes to the Wednesday café like a

guest.

“Our guests come in and sit down like they would at any commercial restaurant,” Brooks explained. “Our students take their orders and serve them as well as offering free refills on food and drink. Prayer over the table is always offered by our student servers. In a world that seems to focus on lazy kids, ours have

proven just the opposite. They are so eager to be involved. Not only do our students run the café. But they do so many other service projects for our community from lawn work to moving furniture for people who need help.”

You can come to CrossRoads every Wednesday from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. to show these local kids you appreciate all they do.

Chris Jensen and the Noblesville's Next Chapter Transition Committee held their first full meeting last week, outlining their vision and process for ensuring a successful transition of city government in 2020. Made up of community, government and business leaders, the transition committee will work to build a shared vision and policy goals for the upcoming administration.

"The committee co-chairs are ready to work with our residents, leaders, and surrounding communities to find the best answers to the challenges Noblesville faces during the next four years," Jensen said. "At its core, this transition process is a chance for our city to discuss innovative ideas and real change to make Noblesville a better place to

live, work and play."

The transition committee is organized around four key policy areas: Comprehensive Economic and Workforce Development, Downtown, Culture and Recreation, Roads and Infrastructure, and Public Health and Safety. Additionally, Transition Committee Chairman Judge Steve Nation will lead the committee's process on city administration and organization.

Each policy area's co-chairs will spend the upcoming months seeking input from residents and leaders to identify challenges, strengths and overlooked problems to be addressed by municipal government. Following its work, the committee will produce a final report to serve as a policy roadmap for the incoming administration.

Noblesville then battled eventual sectional champion Hamilton Southeastern in the first round of the sectional, pushing the Royals to penalty kicks before dropping the game, and finishing the season 11-6-1. As a result, Millers coach Ken Dollaske said his team has "very high expectations" for this year.

"Our squad is very excited for the upcoming season," said the coach.

Noblesville has nine players returning from last season, plus another one rejoining the team: Senior Harrison Christman is back after playing two years at the development academy with the Indiana Fire Junior team. Dollaske said Christman "should provide even more fire power up top."

"We have a core group of returning players along with some fresh, young talent to fill the void left by some graduates," said Dollaske.

The list of players to watch includes three seniors: Midfielders Gabe Imes and Jack Miller, and goalkeeper Adam Carter. Imes was an All State Honorable Mention last year and was named to the District 2 First Team. Carter made the Second Team, and Miller was a Top Team Player.

Also back are two sophomores, Palmer Ault and Spencer Holland, who were the Millers' leading goal scorers last season. Palmer was named to the District 2 Second Team.

Noblesville opens its season Tuesday by hosting Greenfield-Central, then will play at Carmel next Thursday (Aug. 22).

"This is a much younger team than we have had in several years, which will make it challenging for some, but it is a great thing to hear and see guys working to improve each other. This quality in several of these players made it hard for them to choose their captains. With several new guys to the varsity level this season we are looking for them to step up and fill some roles this season as they have started to show over the summer at PFW and summer friendlies. Not to be forgotten are all of the other guys that have been working hard during conditioning and training in order to try and win starting

spots. Keep up the hard work."
