Noblesville police chief will retire on January 31

Jowitt has served as head of department since 2009

Kevin Jowitt announced Monday that he will retire as Chief of Police for the City of Noblesville on Jan. 31, 2020. Jowitt has served as Noblesville's police chief for 10 years, the second longest tenure in the city's history, and has had a law enforcement career that spans 43 years.

'After careful consideration the time has come for me to take another path," Jowitt said. "It has been an honor to work alongside my law enforcement colleagues, and a privilege to serve the Noblesville community as chief. My law enforcement career has been challenging, rewarding and personally fulfilling."

Jowitt was appointed police chief by Mayor John Ditslear in May 2009. Under his leadership, the Noblesville Police Department is one of only nine Indiana agencies that have national and state accreditation; the crime rates in Noblesville have dropped more than

any city Noblesville's size during the past three years; and Noblesville is the only department in the region to have police officers in every school building. He also implemented several programs during his tenure such as the Problem Oriented Policing, Traffic and Crime Analysis units.

"Our equipment, vehicles and training are absolutely first-rate; and most importantly, we continue to attract outstanding people who want to be Noblesville police officers," Jowitt said.

Part of Jowitt's legacy is building community partnerships through a number of outreach programs. He has been steadfast in his efforts to ensure that the citizens of Noblesville and the police department are working hand-in-hand to solve community issues. Jowitt implemented programs like the Citizens Police Academy, National Night Out, Coffee with a Cop,

Nickel Plate rail removal began Friday in Fishers

moved. Mayor Scott Fadness tells LarryInFishers the removal process began Friday and will continue into the fall. The city has said construction of the Nickel Plate Trail would begin this fall.

In late July, the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority approved a bid to remove the rails by A&K Railroad Materials. Now that the cities of Noblesville and Fishers, along with Hamilton County, have also approved the bid, the rail removal process has begun.

The rail removal process is beginning at 146th Street and moving south. The A&K bid does not include removing the rails at road crossings, and Fadness says that removal will happen as the trail is under construction.

Noblesville Schools safety dog pilot kicks off

Noblesville Schools announced recently that it has launched a new safety dog pilot in school buildings and at school facilities and events. Trained Labrador Retrievers will monitor for firearms in the joint initiative between the district and the Noblesville Police Department.

The friendly dogs, who have undergone extensive training and certification, are ideal for use around children and the public as they are able to detect the scent of firearms and related products in the air around

them, and are not used for

direct physical inspection of individuals.

The safety dog pilot is another element of prevention and detection in the district's overall comprehensive safety plan, and is just one of many safety enhancements made recently thanks to the additional funding from the passage of last year's referendum.

"We introduced the dogs to our families at this year's Back to School BASH and have been using them since school started," said Noblesville Schools Director of Safety and Security Heather







Betty Jane Kirby-Egler, 87, Sheridan, passed away on Wednesday evening, August 14, 2019 at Wellbrooke of Westfield surrounded by her loving family. Born in Hamilton County on December 20, 1931, she was the daughter of the late James Minten and Florence Edna (Roberts) Mossburg. Betty was a 1949 graduate of Sheridan High School and a lifelong

fixture within the Sheridan community.

She cherished her many years as a farm wife. A workaholic, Betty was in her element when there was a constant stream of chores to be done. Running errands and tending to the chickens kept her busy, but the job that she was never in danger of losing was cooking for farm hands. If she had ever decided to hang up her apron a mutiny would

have been planned behind the barn. Her meatloaf and baked beans were some of her bestloved dishes. There always seemed to be a lot more help around the farm on the days that people knew Betty would be cooking.

Betty worked for Aero Drapery for several years before making the move to hire on with United Feeds in Sheridan. Her knowledge of farming and strong work ethic combined with the fact that she knew (and more than likely fed) most of the farmers in the area made her a perfect fit for the growing company. For over 20 years Betty managed the farm contracts for United Feeds until her retirement. Working in the agriculture industry for most of her life helped foster her love of the outdoors. She had a lifelong love of flowers and gardening, so much so that during her years at Wellbrooke she took it upon herself to tend their garden beds. When the staff couldn't seem to find Betty, you guessed it, she was outside dead-heading the flowers. Working out in the garden and listening to birds always helped put her mind at ease.

Betty was blessed with a beautiful voice, graciously sharing her talent throughout the years by singing at weddings and funerals. Another passion that Betty put to good use was her sense of humor – more specifically, her love of pulling pranks. Her standby routine was removing the labels off cans, but she would never pass up the opportunity get in on a good old-fashioned TP'ing job. It didn't matter if she knew who lived there or not – if it was going to happen, she wanted in. In between pranks, Betty also enjoyed playing cards and games.
