Heart and Soul Free Clinic has new Executive Director

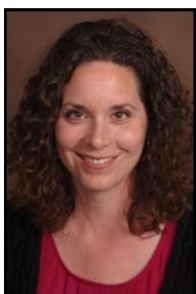

Founded 10 years ago, the Heart and Soul Free Clinic is a Medical and Dental Clinic in Westfield that provides the highest quality health-care to its uninsured and underinsured neighbors in Central Indiana. Heart and Soul Free Clinic serves over a thousand patients per year, treating minor illnesses, monitoring chronic

illnesses including high blood pressure and diabetes, performing blood pressure screenings, and providing dental treatment as well.

Fishers PD: Beware of new DEA fake agent phone scam

this day and age, but Fishers Police want to warn local residents of a new scam where the caller impersonates a DEA agent.

The fake agent begins by accusing the person of being involved in an illegal drug investigation and demanding they send gift cards in order to clear their name.

Many of these telephone scammers instruct the victim to stay on the phone, not tell anyone of the conversation, and travel to a store and purchase gift cards or green dot cards for a certain amount.

Unfortunately, there have been a few Fishers residents that have been taken advantage of and have lost

thousands of dollars.

Here are a few safety tips you should follow if you are contacted by a possible telephone scammer:

- Immediately hang up the phone if you do not recognize or know the caller.
- Never give out personal information. If you feel the call might be legitimate, you can ask the person to mail you information.
- No legitimate company or organization requires payment via gift cards or green dot cards.
- No law enforcement agency threatens to arrest people over the phone.
- If something does not sound or feel right, hang up the phone.
- You are welcome to contact your local law enforcement agency, however most of these telephone scams originate from overseas and are very difficult if not impossible to trace.

State approves sports betting rules, gaming starts Sunday

The Indiana Gaming Commission and its executive director on Wednesday afternoon approved **emergency rules** to allow sports wagering to begin as soon as Sunday in the state.

Although some wagering facilities say they are planning to offer sports betting, only five places had been approved by the gaming commission by Wednesday afternoon:

- Indiana Grand Racing & Casino starts Sunday.
- Ameristar Casino Hotel East Chicago starts Sunday.

- Hollywood Casino & Hotel Lawrenceburg starts Sunday.
- Horseshoe Hammond starts Sept. 4.
- French Lick Casino starts Sept. 6.

The commission expects more locations to be added in coming days. All sites will be posted on [the commission's website](#).

Indiana legislators earlier this year approved expanding gaming, making Indiana the 12th state with sports betting when the

Crews to begin minor repair work on Pleasant Street in Noblesville

Construction crews will spend two days making repairs on Pleasant Street in front of the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds drive approach. The pavement re-

pair is warranty work from the roundabout at 19th and Pleasant streets that has resulted in a dip in the road.

Construction work will begin Thursday to remove pavement that is settling

and add flowable fill. A steel plate will be placed over the repair area to allow time for the fill to cure. Further investigation of the excavated area also will occur to try to determine any further

causes to this problem. On Tuesday, Sept. 3, crews will patch the area with pavement.

During the two days of work, flaggers will be in place in the eastbound lane.

new state law takes effect Sunday. Iowa became the first Midwestern state with legalized sports betting on Aug. 15.

Gamblers must be 21 or older to place a bet. Indiana will allow the casinos

to take wagers on dozens of professional, collegiate and international events, including football, basketball, baseball, auto racing, hockey, soccer, boxing, golf and Olympic competitions. No betting is allowed on high

school or youth sporting events, or e-sports.

Gamblers will have to register and prove their age with a casino before being able to use a mobile wagering app. Those online apps, however, must use geofencing

technology so that the bets are placed within the state borders, meaning any Chicago residents would have to cross into Indiana each time they wanted to place a bet using their cellphone.



Pasta Bowl aiming for another record

As the annual local gridiron classic nears – the Mudsock Game, which pits rivals Fishers High School and Hamilton Southeastern in the big football game – another event tied to the Sept. 13 contest is reaching for a new record.

The Pasta Bowl has been collecting boxes of pasta for local organizations, such as the township trustees and Second Helpings, as part of the Mudsock Game, for several years now.

In 2019, the Pasta Bowl organizers are setting an ambitious goal – 25,000 pounds of pasta donations. Last year, the 21 schools in the Hamilton Southeastern school district collected a total of 20,152 pounds of pasta donations.

There are now 22 HSE district schools with the addition of Southeastern Elementary. The Pasta Bowl volunteers will soon have collection boxes available throughout the school district, and, of course, there will be plenty of collection boxes at the Mudsock Game itself.

School buildings engage in a friendly competition to collect the most pasta. Here are the building results from 2018, with winners listed by category:

- Riverside Intermediate – Intermediate/Junior High and Overall District Winner (2,789 pounds of pasta)
- Fishers High School – High School Winner (2,096 pounds of pasta)
- Hoosier Road Elementary – Elementary Winner (2,369 pounds of pasta)
- Cumberland Road Elementary – Most Improved (2,166; 1,891 more pounds than in 2017)

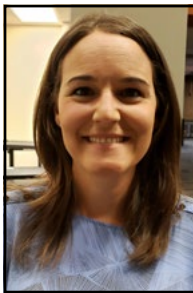

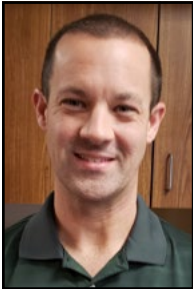

AG Curtis Hill urges the FCC to strengthen efforts to stop robocalls

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill is urging the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to encourage telecom companies to implement call blocking and call authentication solutions that would protect consumers from illegal robocalls and spoofing.

The comment letter to the FCC comes after Hill last week led a coalition of 51 attorneys general and 12 phone companies in unveiling the Anti-Robocall Principles to fight illegal robocalls.

"We hear Hoosiers loud and clear," Hill said. "Robocalls are a huge problem in Indiana and across the country. We must continue to use every means at our disposal to stop these annoying and sometimes harmful calls."

In comments to the FCC, the coalition of attorneys general states that telecom providers should:

- Offer free, automatic

call-blocking services to all customers. The call-block services should be based on reasonable analytics and should not block important calls, including emergency alerts or automated calls for which customers have signed up (such as medical reminders).

- Monitor network traffic to identify patterns consistent with robocalls and take action to cut off the calls or notify law enforcement.

- Implement certain caller ID call authentication technologies that help ensure that telephone calls are originating from secure, verified numbers rather than spoofed sources. The coalition supports the FCC's proposal to take regulatory action against telecom companies that do not implement the specified technologies.

Develop caller ID authentication to prevent robocalls to landline telephones. This is particularly urgent because many people victimized by robocall scammers are elderly consumers or live in rural areas, meaning they are more likely to use landline technology.

Many of these actions are also covered in the Anti-Robocall Principles, a set of eight principles focused on addressing illegal robocalls through prevention and enforcement. Twelve phone companies, including Verizon, AT&T, T-Mobile and Sprint, have already signed on to the principles.

Hill is joined in signing these comments by attorneys general from all 49 other states and Washington, D.C.

Archaeologists have recorded more than 71,000 sites in Indiana since the early 1800s, helping to shape public understanding of the prehistoric and historic people who also called this land home.

"Archaeology tells us not only about the past but also sheds light about ourselves today and our future," said Cameron Clark, DNR director and state historic preservation officer. "Archaeology month provides a perfect way for Hoosiers to find out how, with programs that are not only educational and infor-

mative but also fun."

This year's commemorative poster highlights Evansville and the fact that it is a persistent place. The Angel Mounds site (12Vg1) was a thriving Native American community a thousand years ago. Today, the Evansville area, including Angel Mounds, continues to be an important locale in southwestern Indiana. Long-term occupation of a place is based upon a number of factors and leads to lasting imprints on the landscape.

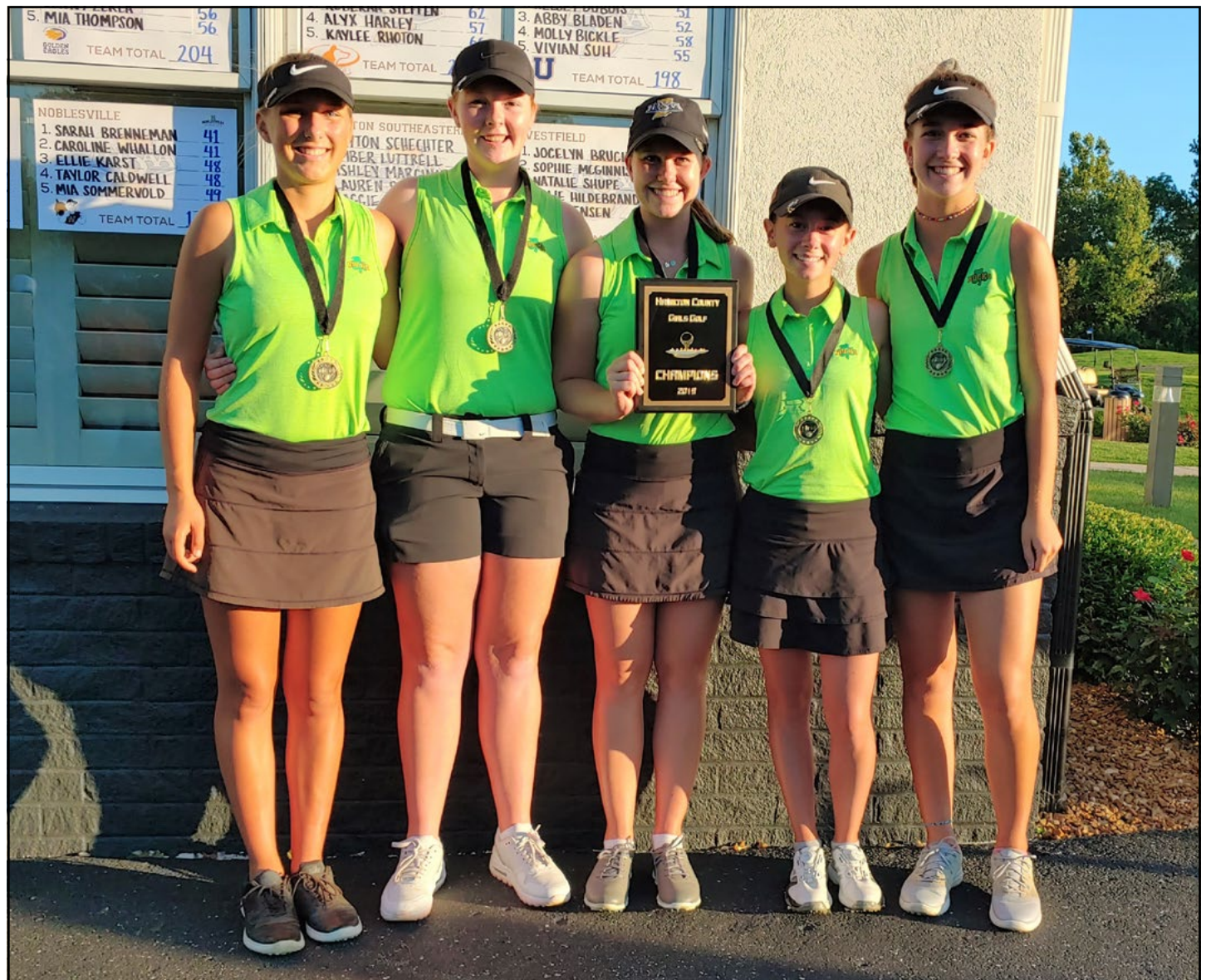
The No. 3-ranked Shamrocks had a team score of 159 at the nine-hole tournament. Bruch led the way with an even-par 36.

"Talked to a lot of the coaches, we just felt like it was too good of an opportunity to get some of the best players and

Noblesville-Carmel highlights Week 2

Week 2 of high school football in Hamilton County will see the first matchup between county schools, as a clash between Noblesville and Carmel highlights the seven games among local teams this Friday.

The Millers will travel to Carmel Stadium to take on the Greyhounds, with kickoff at 7 p.m. Both teams will be looking for a first win, as their season-openers finished in defeat. Carmel fell at Louisville Trinity 41-14, while Noblesville dropped a 42-14 decision to Cathedral.

Both teams had offensive highlights during the game. John Rogers scored a pair of touchdowns for the Greyhounds and totaled 110 yards rushing. Elijah Butler had a one-yard TD run for the Millers, with first-year quarterback Alex Zavac completing a touchdown pass.

“There’s a reason why they were picked as the pre-season big school No. 1 team,” said Noblesville coach Justin Roden of Carmel on HCTV. “They’re just so fundamentally sound. They do things the right way.”

This will be the fourth year of the renewed regular-season series between the Millers and the ‘Hounds. Carmel won 34-7 last season, although the teams have played each other frequently during the sectional.

FISHERS-PIKE

Fishers will travel to Pike for a 7 p.m. kickoff. It will be the second MIC opponent for the Tigers in as many games this season.

Fishers opened its 2019 campaign at Lucas Oil Stadium, taking on another MIC school in North Central. The Panthers beat the Tigers in last year’s sectional final, but Fishers turned the tables last week, scoring a 26-0 win over North Central.

The Tigers set a school record in that win, as they caught six Panthers interceptions, a perfect example of how well Fishers’ defense played. The victory got the state’s attention: The Tigers entered the IFCA 6A poll at No. 10 this week.

The Red Devils began their season with a loss to another HCC school, falling at Zionsville 17-7. The Eagles led 3-0 at halftime. TraShaun Jones put Pike ahead early in the fourth quarter with a nine-yard touchdown run, but Zionsville scored two quick TDs to win the game.

“Pike is an athletic team,” Fishers coach Rick Wimmer said on HCTV. “They return about half their defense from a year ago. They kept the score down against Zionsville.”

SOUTHEASTERN-NORTH CENTRAL

Hamilton Southeastern will be the next county team to take on the Panthers, as the Royals travel to North Central on Friday.

While the Panthers had a tough game last week against Fishers, Southeastern coach Adam Morris is aware of how tough North Central can be. The Panthers won last year’s game against HSE 31-13, on their way to the school’s first sectional football title in 25 years.

“They are an elite 6A MIC program,” Morris said after the Royals’ win over another MIC team, Lawrence Central, last week. “If you don’t play well, they’re going to beat you and beat you by a lot. So we’re going to have to have a good week of practice and show up with our best effort next week to win it.”

Southeastern held off the Bears 24-20, the second year in a row that the Royals won a close game over Lawrence Central. Andrew Hobson threw two touchdown passes and totaled 233 yards over the air, with Deandre Rhodes making six catches for 144 yards, including one of the touchdown receptions.

HEIGHTS-NORTH MONTGOMERY

Hamilton Heights plays its first home game of the season on Friday, taking on what has become a new rival in North Montgomery.

The two teams have played each other three times in the past two seasons, twice in the sectional. The Huskies won in the 2017 sectional first round 37-23, but the Chargers beat them twice last year, 19-7 in the regular season and 50-24 in the sectional first round.

“North Montgomery, they’re a team we’ve got some unfinished business with,” said Heights coach Jon Kirschner on HCTV. “They’re big and they’re physical. We’re going to have to play very disciplined, very physical football to beat them this Friday.”

Both teams come in to the Huskies’ stadium 0-1. Heights dropped a 44-23 game at Mount Vernon last week, while the Chargers lost a tough one to North Putnam 21-20. North Montgomery senior Jaron Bradford passed for two touchdowns and 163 yards.

Heights, healthy again after an injury-laden 2018 season, also had some decent numbers. Isaac Wilson threw for 146 yards and a touchdown, with Camron Knott making five catches for 104 yards.

SHERIDAN-CLINTON CENTRAL

Sheridan will take on old rival Clinton Central at Bud Wright Stadium. While always a big game, it has become even more important in recent years, as it is the Hoosier Heartland Conference opener for both teams.

The Bulldogs, in Class 1A, began their season with an impressive win over 4A Frankfort 28-6. Anthony Ransford was the star of the game, scoring three touchdowns on 139 yards rushing. JT Holton threw one touchdown pass.

The Blackhawks, also a 1A school, dropped their opener to Western Boone, the No. 1-ranked defending 2A state champion, 41-6. Playing with a young team, Sheridan got its touchdown on a one-yard rush from junior Cameron Hovey. Sophomore Silas DeVaney threw for 93 yards as quarterback.

WESTFIELD-DECATUR CENTRAL

After a big win last week, Westfield will head south to Decatur Central for its second game of the season.

This will be the home opener for the Hawks, who lost their season opener at Franklin Central 30-13 last week. Decatur Central had a great season last year, going 12-2 and reaching the 5A state championship game, where it fell to New Palestine.

“Very quality opponent coming up in Decatur Central, who played in the state championship game last year,” said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert on HCTV. “They beat us last year in a game where it went down to the last few minutes.”

Junior Peyton Horsley is the Hawks’ quarterback, and he had a sensational game against the Flashes, completing 23 of 39 passes for 292 yards and a touchdown. Two DC players, senior Kenny Tracy and junior Matt Cook, both had seven receptions, while sophomore Javon Tracy made six catches.

“They always have some experienced players,” said Gilbert.

Westfield beat Harrison 55-28 last week. Senior Camden Simons had an incredible game under center, throwing for three touchdowns and 314 yards on 10-of-13 passing. Simons and Eli Patchett both topped 100 yards rushing and also scored two TDs on the ground.

GUERIN CATHOLIC-LAFAYETTE CENTRAL CATHOLIC

Guerin Catholic will play its first game at the Eagles Nest on Friday, welcoming diocese rival Lafayette Central Catholic.

The teams play every year for the Bishop’s Cup. The Golden Eagles have won the cup the past two seasons, including a 40-7 victory last year at the Knights’ field.

“Obviously LCC has a great tradition,” said GC coach Tom Dilley on HCTV. “There’s been a lot of back and forth in the contest. There’s going to be a trophy at the end of the game and all that kind of stuff.”

Central Catholic started its season on the road, falling to Tri-West 22-7. Sophomore Clark Barrett threw a touchdown pass for the Knights, finishing with 110 yards over the air.

Guerin Catholic began its season not far from LCC’s field, as the Golden Eagles beat McCutcheon 24-14 in their season opener. Gus Baumgartner rushed for over 200 yards, while quarterback Christian Gelov went 10 for 14 with a couple touchdown passes.
