

thing in this day and age, but Fishers Police want to warn local residents of a new scam where the caller impersonates a DEA agent.

The fake agent begins by day operations. Tickets accusing the person of being involved in an illegal drug investigation and demanding they send gift cards in order to clear their name.

Many of these telephone scammers instruct the victim to stay on the phone, not tell anyone of the conversation, and travel to a store and purchase gift cards or green dot cards for a certain amount.

Unfortunately, have been a few Fishers residents that have been taken thousands of dollars.

Here are a few safety tips you should follow if you are contacted by a possible telephone scammer:

• Immediately hang up the phone if you do not recognize or know the caller.

• Never give out personal information. If you feel the call might be legitimate, you can ask the person to mail you information.

• No legitimate company or organization requires payment via gift cards or green dot cards.

• No law enforcement agency threatens to arrest people over the phone.

• If something does not sound or feel right, hang up the phone.

• You are welcome to contact your local law enforcement agency, however most of these telephone scams originate from overseas and are very difficult if there not impossible to trace.



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# Pasta Bowl aiming for another record

As the annual local gridiron classic nears – the Mudsock Game, which pits rivals Fishers High School and Hamilton Southeastern in the big football game - another event tied to the Sept. 13 contest is reaching for a new record.

The Pasta Bowl has been collecting boxes of pasta for local organizations, such as the township trustees and Second Helpings, as part of the Mudsock Game, for several years now.



# **AG Curtis Hill urges** the FCC to strengthen efforts to stop robocalls

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill is urging the tomers. The call-Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to encourage telecom companies to implement call blocking and call authentication solutions that would protect consumers from illegal robocalls and spoofing.

The comment letter to the FCC comes after Hill last week led a coalition of 51 attorneys general and 12 phone companies in **un**veiling the Anti-Robocall **Principles** to fight illegal robocalls.

"We hear Hoosiers loud and clear," Hill said. "Robocalls are a huge problem in Indiana and across the country. We must continue to use every means at our disposal to stop these annoying and sometimes harmful calls."

In comments to the FCC, the coalition of attorneys general states that telecom providers should:

· Offer free, automatic technologies.

The coalition supports the FCC's proposal to take regulatory action against telecom companies that do not implement the specified

Many of these actions ti-Robocall Principles, a set of eight principles focused on addressing illegal robocalls through prevention and enforcement. Twelve phone companies, including Verizon, AT&T, T-Mobile and Sprint, have already signed on to the principles.

Hill is joined in signing these comments by attorneys general from all 49 other states and Washington, D.C.

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
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# **Indiana Archaeology Month starts Sunday**


The No. 3-ranked Shamrocks had a team score of 159 at the nine-hole tournament. Bruch led the way with an even-par 36.

# *Football preview* Noblesville-Carmel highlights Week 2

Week 2 of high school football in Hamilton County will see the first matchup between county schools, as a clash between Noblesville and Carmel highlights the seven games among local teams this Friday.

The Millers will travel to Carmel Stadium to take on the Greyhounds, with kickoff at 7 p.m. Both teams will be looking for a first win, as their season-openers finished in defeat. Carmel fell at Louisville Trinity 41-14, while Noblesville dropped a 42-14 decision to Cathedral.

Both teams had offensive highlights during the game. John Rogers scored a pair of touchdowns for the Greyhounds and totaled 110 yards rushing. Elijah Butler had a one-yard TD run for the Millers, with first-year quarterback Alex Zavac completing a touchdown pass.



"There's a reason why they were picked as the pre-season big school No. 1 team," said Noblesville coach Justin Roden of Carmel on HCTV. "They're just so fundamentally sound. They do things the right way.'

This will be the fourth year of the renewed regular-season series between the Millers and the 'Hounds. Carmel won 34-7 last season, although the teams have played each other frequently during the sectional.

#### FISHERS-PIKE

Fishers will travel to Pike for a 7 p.m. kickoff. It will be the second MIC opponent for the Tigers in as many games this season.

Fishers opened its 2019 campaign at Lucas Oil Stadium, taking on another MIC school in North Central. The Panthers beat the Tigers in last year's sectional final, but Fishers turned the tables last week, scoring a 26-0 win over North Central.

The Tigers set a school record in that win, as they caught six Panthers interceptions, a perfect example of how well Fishers' defense played. The victory got the state's attention: The Tigers entered the IFCA 6A poll at No. 10 this week.

The Red Devils began their season with a loss to another HCC school, falling at Zionsville 17-7. The Eagles led 3-0 at halftime. TraShaun Jones put Pike ahead early in the fourth quarter with a nine-yard touchdown run, but Zionsville scored two quick TDs to win the game.

"Pike is an athletic team," Fishers coach Rick Wimmer said on HCTV. "They return about half their defense Heights dropped a 44-23 game at Mount Vernon last from a year ago. They kept the score down against Zionsville."

#### SOUTHEASTERN-NORTH CENTRAL
