



Jackson rushed for a pair of 1-yard touchdowns, but he netted negative yardage as Carmel hounded him for five sacks and forced two turnover on downs, including a muff snap on a punt attempt during the Trojans' second offensive se-

"It was a great game plan, great execution by our defense, great coaching staff. It's just a great feeling to win this game," Carmel senior lineback Ty Wise said. "I've never beat Center Grove, so this week of preparation for our defense was nothing like I've seen before. We came out at practice focused every single day. 
