Noblesville Schools announced Wednesday that Superintendent Dr. Beth Niedermeyer has been named the Superintendent of the Year for Central Indiana by the Indiana Association of Public School Superintendents (IAPSS).

She was selected for the honor by her peers, approximately 40 central Indiana superintendents who based their decision on accomplishments, qualifications and leadership.

"Dr. Niedermeyer is a role model among her peers and is frequently sought out by other area superintendents for her counsel and advice," shared Noblesville Schools Board of Trustees President Carl Johnson. "She is

Carmel listed among best places to live in the country

Carmel has once again made the list of top places to live in the United States.

USA Today recently ranked the top 50 best places to live, and Carmel ranked 17th on a list that was highlighted by some big

USA Today attributed Carmel's ranking to the 71 percent of people 25 and older having a college degree. Also highlighted was Carmel's 2.1 percent unemployment rate and a 3.7 percent poverty rate.

The national media outlet reported Carmel's household median income of \$109,201, one of the highest in the nation.

The top-ranking city on the list was West University Place, Texas. Beverly Hills, Calif., placed second.

Levee Trail opens in Noblesville

The City of Noblesville and Hamilton County Parks and Recreation officials officially opened the Levee Trail on Tuesday. The new amenity continues to increase Noblesville's trail availability and connectivity. The Levee Trail adds 1.4 miles of multi-use asphalt on the east side of Morse Reservoir running from Morse Park and Beach north along the reservoir to Carrigan Road.

"This trail has been discussed for several years and I'm very pleased to see it come to fruition. The trail is especially important as it connects at least 7,000 northern Noblesville residents to existing trails leading to downtown," said Mayor John Ditslear. "Trails provide enjoyable and safe options for pedestrians and alternative transportation, which reduces air pollution, and the Levee Trail adds beautiful scenery along the Morse Reservoir."

The Levee Trail is a collaboration between the City of Noblesville and Hamilton

Sitel to bring up to 350 jobs to Fishers

Sitel Group is planning to locate an office in Fishers, bringing up to 350 jobs to the city by the end of next year. Sitel is a tech company focused on customer experience.

The Miami-based firm plans to locate near 121st Street and Cumberland Road, investing more than \$4 million to lease and equip a 42,000 squarefoot facility. Sitel is describing the Fishers location as its new Midwest hub. The company plans to be fully operational in this new location later this fall.

"Sitel choosing Indiana to establish a Midwest hub is a reflection on our state's strong economic climate, thriving business community and talented workforce pipeline," said Indiana Secretary of Commerce Jim Schellinger, in an agency news release.

(HCPR). It is the second trail project connecting Noblesville residents to a county park - the first being the White River Greenway Trail and Potter's Bridge Park.

"The addition of the Levee Trail that includes Morse Park will enhance the access and use of the park, as well as furthering the connectivity of the park to more of the City of Noblesville and the Town of Cicero," said HCPR Director Al Patterson.

On Tuesday, the city also dedicated its 100th trail mile with a decorative marker north of Dakota Drive on the Levee Trail. When Ditslear city had 35 trail miles.

AG Hill: Double check before you write a check

The REPORTER

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill warns Hoosiers to be cautious when donating to relief efforts to help those affected by Hurricane Dorian.

"Hoosiers are generous people," Hill said. "They need to know about potential scams that could ensnare those trying to help victims of Hurricane Dorian. Don't let scammers stop you from donating, but be sure to research organizations before giving them money. Double check before you write a check."

Donors should stay vigilant toward possible fraudulent solicitations made via emails or phone calls. They should be on the lookout for unscrupulous individuals posing as charities. Donate on your terms. Don't feel you have to agree to donate during a telephone solicitation or by responding to an email. You can politely but firmly end a telephone call, or just not respond to an email solicitaty before agreeing to donate. Then, if you're comfortable giving to the charity, you can contact the charity directly to make the donation. Here are

cause you care about – like "hurricane relief" or "homeless kids" - plus phrases like "best charity" or "highly rated charity." Once you find a speing giving to, search its name plus "complaint," "review," "rating," or "scam." If you to find another organization.

• Check out the charity's website. Does it give information about the programs you want to support, or how it uses donations? How much of your donation will go directly to support the programs you care about? If you can't find detailed information about a charity's mission and programs, be suspicious.

• Use one of these organizations to help you research charities: BBB Wise Giving Alliance, Charity Navigator, CharityWatch, and GuideStar.




