HSE school board learns ILEARN

When the Indiana Department of Education released ILEARN testing results for school districts around the state earlier this month, it was emphasized that this test was much different than the previous ISTEP tests. Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board members received a look at just how different the testing regime was at a Tuesday morning work session.

The board viewed a video of an elementary student being shown an interstate highway sign with one exit 1 1/4 (one and one quarter) miles away and the next

exit 1 1/2 (one and one half) miles away. The student was asked to determine the difference in mileage between the two exits.

The elementary student appeared stumped, not sure how to solve the problem. After a minute or two, the student is then asked to solve the problem of 1 1/2 minus 1 1/4. The student had no problem working the answer to that problem.

HSE Schools Assistant Superintendent Jan Combs used this example, illustrating how ISTEP and ILEARN were different. ISTEP was geared more to having students answer the question of 1 1/2 minus 1 1/4, where ILEARN would present the student with the

"real world" example of a sign on an interstate highway.

Combs told the board this will help teachers and administrators better prepare students for the ILEARN test in future years.

There were other big differences between ILEARN and ISTEP, according to Dr. Combs.

ISTEP was a timed test, where ILEARN had no time limits for students to complete the test.

Also, ILEARN had a different testing path. For example, if a student had answered the interstate highway question correctly, the next ques-

Fishers City Council passes LIT increase to fund 911 service

The Fishers City Council has put its stamp of approval on the proposal to increase the Hamilton County Local Income Tax by 0.1 percent to funding 911 emergency services.

The state law governing these decisions requires elected municipali-

ties representing more than 50 percent of the county's population to approve the proposal for it to become law in all of Hamilton County.

Under that state provision, if only Fishers and Carmel councils approve the 911 tax, it becomes effective in all of Hamilton County. So far, the Arcadia Town Council is the only other municipality to approve this tax.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness argued in favor of enacting this tax increase. The city's share of funding countywide 911 service is \$1.3 million in 2019, and would grow

to \$1.7 million in 2020. The mayor said he fashioned his 2020 city budget proposal assuming this tax would be enacted. If not, Fadness told the Council cuts would need to be made in next year's spending plan.

The vote was 8-0, with council member David George unable to attend the Monday meeting.

During the public hearing, former Fishers Town Councilor Mike Colby and unsuccessful mayoral candidate in this year's GOP primary, Logan Day, each argued against enacting the 0.1 percent income tax increase.

tion would be a more difficult question. If the student answered that question incorrectly, a less challenging question would be presented to that student next.

In the 2019 ILEARN testing, 56.1 percent of HSE students taking the English Language Arts (ELA) and the Math test passed them both. That compares with 73.5 percent passing both

exams last year. Last year's test was the old ISTEP, with 2019 being the first year the state utilized ILEARN.

As far as how HSE students did on the individual Math and ELA tests – 64.3 percent passed the ELA ILEARN test this year, while 69.2 percent passed this year's Math test.

Statewide, 37.1 percent of the students taking both

the ELA & Math ILEARN exams passed both, compared to last year's pass rate of 50.7 percent on ISTEP. The statewide pass rate for just the ELA test was 47.9 percent and 47.8 percent for Math.

Administrators are now looking into ways to help students apply the skills learned in class with practice in applying those skills.

Carmel Utilities smoke testing city's sewer lines

Carmel Utilities resumed smoke testing of the sewer lines in the northern part of the city on Tuesday. The project will take approximately three to four weeks, weather dependent. Hours of testing will be 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Wednesday through Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday.

A Carmel firefighter and a Utilities employee will be on site each day to respond

to any concerns from citizens. Signage will also be placed around the affected neighborhoods.

During smoke testing, you may see smoke in or near your home. If you experience smoke in your home, you have something in your plumbing that needs attention. Please look for crews outside and notify them so they can help you identify where the smoke entered your home. Nor-

mally, it's something simple like a dry plumbing trap or a bad wax ring on a toilet. Smoke in the home during this time could indicate that sewer gas could enter the home and needs to be addressed.

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

All-county matches highlight Tuesday play

It's already been a busy week for the Noblesville volleyball team.

On Monday, the Millers hosted Yorktown, the defending Class 4A state champions and arguably the best team in the state. The Tigers beat Noblesville 25-5, 25-14, 25-12.

Lexie Almodovar had nine digs, six kills and three assists for the Millers. Riley Branch dished out nine assists, while Rose Crist put down six kills. Abby Johnson collected four digs, Allison Parks had three digs and Sydney Sparks had two digs. Ella Peter hit two kills, Anna Kiser had one kill and one block, Bella Hines served one ace and Diana Cox had one dig.

Noblesville traveled to Hamilton Heights on Tuesday and came home with a hard-fought win, 25-14, 25-17, 27-25. The Huskies led 5-0 in the third set and held two set points before the Millers came back to win.

Almodovar was her usual dominant self with 21 kills, 15 assists, seven digs, four blocks and two aces. Mandy Knieper and Peter both hit four kills, while Branch handed out 21 assists and served four aces. Cox picked up 16 digs and Kiser made three blocks.

Crist was injured before the Tuesday match and unable to compete. Noblesville coach Jill Almodovar credited McKinley Rose for coming in and taking Crist's place, doing "a really nice job in a tough position: Playing JV to dressing varsity to playing varsity."

"I felt like we came in here and did the job we needed to do."

The Huskies were led by Carlie Ward, who had a total of 24 serve receives and had only four errors. Kelsey Smith made 10 assists, while Jordan Fryman hit six kills.

"With a young team, we just need to work a little bit harder on not having so many lows and a few more highs," said Heights coach Steve Ward.

In another hard-fought county match, Carmel swept Westfield in three tough sets on Monday, 29-27, 29-27, 25-17.

Macarty McQueen hit 11 kills for the Greyhounds, and also had six digs and four aces. Anne Lesure dished out 19 assists in addition to 10 digs and nine kills. Gabby Smith had seven kills and four blocks, while Ella Bostic handed out 18 assists, plus five digs and one ace.

Kenzie Daffinee led the Shamrocks with 16 kills and four aces. Peighton Isley picked up 14 digs and Katie Sweet made three blocks.

In a Tuesday Metropolitan Conference match, Carmel was swept by Lawrence North 27-25, 25-17, 25-23. Kamryn Kichefski put down 10 kills, with Smith hitting eight kills. Anne Lesure totaled 15 assists, seven kills and seven digs, Bostic had 20 assists, four digs and one ace, and Maria Zweig collected 14 digs.

On Saturday, the Greyhounds played in the Providence Round Robin.

Carmel beat Jasper 25-6, 25-17, 25-10. McQueen had 10 kills, Lesure had 14 assists, nine kills and three aces, Smith had six kills, three blocks and two aces, and Bostic totaled 17 assists and eight digs.

The Greyhounds lost to Providence 28-26, 25-21, 25-17 in their second match. Lesure had 15 assists, 11 kills, 10 digs and two blocks, McQueen totaled 10 kills, 10 digs and two blocks, Smith had six kills, five digs and four blocks, and Zweig collected 13 digs.

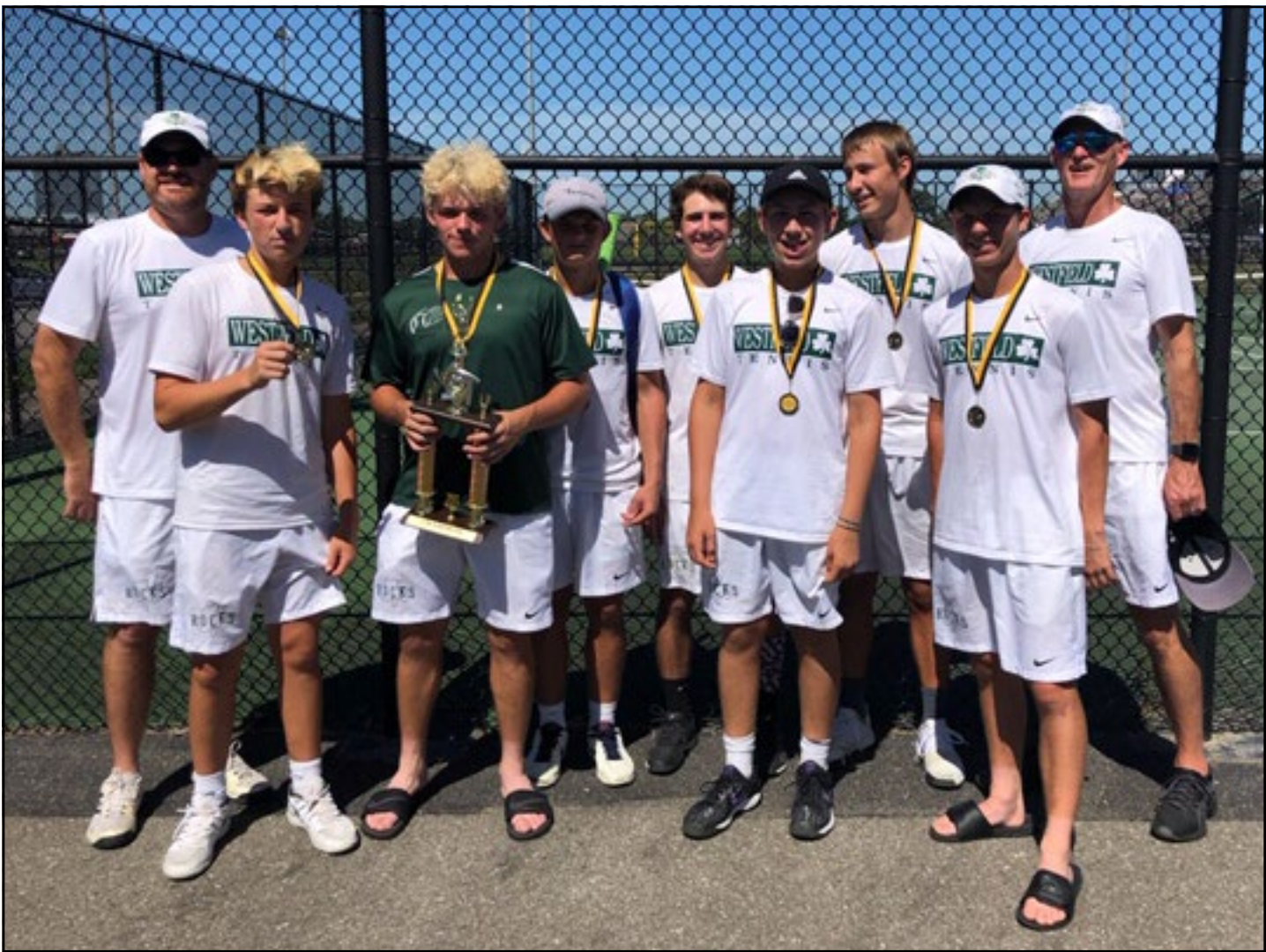
Hamilton Southeastern won an all-county dual meet with Guerin Catholic 4-1 on Tuesday.
