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Carmel dedicates “Carter’s Green” honoring legacy of city councilor

In a surprise announcement Saturday morning, Carmel mayor Jim Brainard told the public that the space known as Center Green will now be known as Carter’s Green. The city of Carmel has dedicated this space to Carmel City Councilor Ron Carter, who has served on the Carmel City Council since 1996.

Carter was the catalyst for the creation of the Carmel Farmers Market, which takes place on Carter’s Green from May through September, offering fresh local produce and culinary in a lively community environment.

Carter is an avid bike rider who was an early proponent of biking in Carmel, helping pave the way for the Monon Greenway and the city’s vast system of trails and paths. He was a founding member of the Monon Greenway Committee and the Hamilton County Alternative Transportation Taskforce.

Noblesville Fire Chief Greg Wyant was honored by his peers in the fire prevention community Friday evening with the prestigious 2019 Fire Chief of the Year Award at the annual Indiana Emergency Response Conference in Indianapolis.

“I am honored and humbled to have received this recognition from the Indiana Fire Chiefs. I could not be more grateful to city administration and my staff for secretly coordinating the evening which included my family,” Wyant said.

Wyant began his service with NFD in 1994 and has served as an administrator since 2004. In his tenure with the department, Wyant has been a firefighter,

Fishers City Council passes LIT increase to fund 911 service

The Fishers City Council has put its stamp of approval on the proposal to increase the Hamilton County Local Income Tax by 0.1 percent to fund 911 emergency services.

The state law governing these decisions requires elected municipalities representing more than 50 percent of the county’s population to approve the proposal for it to become law in all of Hamilton County.



Under that state provision, if only Fishers and Carmel councils approve the 911 tax, it becomes effective in all of Hamilton County. So far, the Arcadia Town Council is the only other municipality to approve this tax.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness argued in favor of enacting this tax increase. The city’s share of funding countywide 911 service is \$1.3 million in 2019, and would grow

to \$1.7 million in 2020. The mayor said he fashioned his 2020 city budget proposal assuming this tax would be enacted. If not, Fadness told the Council cuts would need to be made in next year’s spending plan.

The vote was 8-0, with council member David George unable to attend the meeting.

During the public hearing, former Fishers Town Councilor Mike Colby and unsuccessful mayoral candidate in this year’s GOP primary, Logan Day, each argued against enacting the 0.1 percent income tax increase.

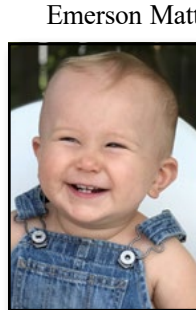

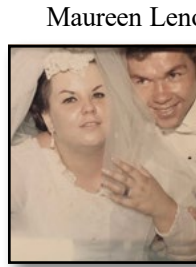

HSE Schools student count set at 21,794

The State of Indiana provides financial support for local schools based on the number of students reported in each school district throughout the state. Indiana has what is called the “Average Daily Membership” (ADM) count which is used by state officials to pass out money to local school corporations.

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools ADM count for this school year, as recorded by a head count of students conducted Sept. 13, shows a total of 21,794. Students in kindergarten through 12th grade are up a total of 273 over the previous school year.

HSE’s Chief Financial Officer Mike Reuter provided board members with the following student population breakdown during a work session last Tuesday:

- For kindergarten through fourth grade, the student count is up 5.
- The total number of first graders is 1,550.
- In grades 5 and 6, the student count is down by 2.
- The freshman and sophomore classes are the largest entering high school this year.
- The count of freshman students is 1,786.
- The number of junior high students increased by 20.
- High school seniors

outnumber the junior class.
• The total number of high school students is up by 245.

Reuter told the board that student population is “stabilizing.” The number of kindergartners entering HSE this school year exceeded 1,500, compared to last year’s kindergarten ADM population of 1,476.

“We opened Southeastern (Elementary) and I know it feels like we just grew and grew, and we did grow out there, more than we’d hoped to,” Reuter told board members. “But it’s because of their kindergarten class. It’s just completely off the charts compared to (Southeastern Elementary’s) other grade levels.”

HSE administrators have shared the ADM figures with the district’s demographer Jerry McKibben and expects fresh future enrollment projections by November.

Reuter also provided board members with an early overview of the 2020 school district budget. No overall budget number was available because Reuter is still processing the numerous sources of revenue and the wide range of expected costs for calendar year 2020.

The public hearing on the 2020 school corporation proposed budget will be held Oct. 9, with final budget approval by the board expected at the Oct. 23 board meeting.

Carmel council looks at building fees

Home-building fees, were discussed at a Carmel City Council meeting on Sept. 16.

The council heard a park impact fee ordinance on first reading. It would impact people looking to build a new house in Carmel.

Right now, the fee is

\$2,972. Under the new proposal, that fee would increase to \$4,882.

Supporters of the increase say as the population of Carmel grows, the new people moving to Carmel should contribute financially to the growth of the city and its parks. But opponents of the ordinance said the increase is just too much.

“A 40 percent increase is pretty significant, especially when you look at how it’s three times the next highest community,” said Kate Collins with the Builders Association of Greater Indianapolis. “That just creates additional burdens for those developers when they are thinking about their planning and how they can help offset

some of those costs.”

Council members said it’s a one-time fee for new home builders, not a tax increase. The fee would only apply to new home development and not to someone looking to remodel or add on to their home.

The ordinance was sent to the finance committee and will likely be voted on by Nov. 18.

MetroNet, Fishers find a way forward

For the past two-and-a-half years, the relationship between certain Fishers neighborhoods and the Internet company MetroNet has been a rocky one. Subcontractors for the firm have been accused of utility strikes while digging fiber optic networks. There have been stop orders issued on more than one occasion by the City of Fishers.

At a recent Fishers City Council work session, the city and MetroNet officials talked about how to move forward as MetroNet construction continues in Fishers. Kris Smith, gov-

ernment affairs manager for Metronet, and Mark Hill, market manager for the MetroNet area including Fishers, met with the council and talked about past errors as well as how to move forward.

Fishers Director of Engineering Jason Taylor briefed council members on what has happened so far with MetroNet and the city. Taylor described weekly meetings his staff has recently had with MetroNet and said there are situations when people blame MetroNet when another utility may be at fault. Regular communications with the technology firm have helped, according to Taylor.

“We have an even stronger commitment to safety and restoration today,” MetroNet’s Smith told Fishers city councilors. “We’ve improved our construction communications program tenfold. We have an executive vice president who is running our construction team. We’ve put several layers in place.”

Smith said subcontractor crews will always be clearly marked, outfitted in vests, with identifying signs on trucks, along with arm badges on workers with their names and pictures. If there are language barriers, there will be an English-speaking crew member on site. If that En-

glish-speaking person is away or next door, cards will be provided with a customer service phone number residents can call to get questions answered.

MetroNet expects to be finished with construction within what the company calls the Fishers “city build” areas by spring of 2020. “City build” means MetroNet will not be installed in all Fishers neighborhoods.

“We made some mistakes, there’s no question of that,” Smith said. “But it’s how we’re moving forward; we want to improve that.”

MetroNet provides home internet, television and telephone services.

homeowners also get involved,” Farley told The Reporter. “So around 600 vendors is the estimate throughout the whole town.”

It should be noted that official participation in the New Earth festival will involve all vendors and events taking place up to the south side of County Line Road.

According to Farley, Main Street will be reserved for vendors offering handmade items.

“On Broadway Street you will find antiques, collectibles, crafters, pet items, candles, and while there will be handmade things there, not everything is focused specifically on that,” Farley said.

There will also be a farmer’s market on Broadway.

Returning Vendors have consistently told Farley this is the event that puts them in the black for the year. The festival also helps the Town of Atlanta in many ways.

“It is a kickoff to Christmas shopping for many people,” Farley said. “But it helps us too. Our general fund budget is not that large, so this festival helps us fund things that we otherwise could not do.”

Trimming trees, the purchase and removal of abandoned properties, special projects, maintenance of Dolles Park and other local projects are paid for with funds from the festival.

If all that seems a little overwhelming, have no fear, the Boy Scouts are always prepared to help. There will be an information booth on Main Street manned by local Boy Scouts to help you find your way around. You can find fliers, maps, programs, T-shirts and more at the booth.

Farley wanted to emphasize the importance of the sponsors and volunteers who make this festival happen every year. Some of the main sponsors include: Commissioners Mark Heirbrandt and Christine Altman, Hamilton County Tourism, Roudebush Equipment, Endeavor Communications, Taft Law, Nickel Plate Express, and Mr. Muffins Trains and the Choo Choo Café.

A big draw for Hamilton County visitors is the live entertainment. “The entertainment sponsorship started at our 40th anniversary,” Far-

ley said. “We decided we wanted to do something new and we wanted to do it right. In order to fund that we started a sponsorship program. This year’s free entertainment is made possible by the sponsorship of Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. Commissioner Heirbrandt was one of the first Sponsors of the festival and we appreciate his continued support.”

Once again, the festival is also partnering with Good Samaritan Network on a festival food drive.

Farley told The Reporter the Good Samaritan Network (GSN) is a project begun by Nancy Chance to unite several charitable organizations in one place. All the resources that are available for charitable and outreach projects are reachable in one location. Thus, the network can connect people with the right organization for their individual needs.

According to gsnlive.org, GSN is a collaborative/network of nonprofits in Hamilton County. GSN utilizes two serving approaches, direct and indirect services, and in part is designed to ensure efficiency and communication among the different agencies, social services, nonprofits, local government, pantries and businesses – as together they serve the needs of Hamilton County residents who are at-risk or underserved.

When asked about the name and history of the festival, Farley told The Reporter, “The festival started on Main Street in 1974. One of the business that helped start it was called ‘A Touch of Earth.’ Everything at the first festival was handmade. Originally it was the first week in October, but in time it was moved the fourth weekend in September.”

It takes several people to help put the festival on – from putting 600 trash boxes together, to setting up water and electrical services for vendors, placing barricades and sponsor signage and having emergency services available.

Farley would like to especially thank Ryan Horine and the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Department and Atlanta Utility Superintendent Andy Emmert for all they do to help make the Atlanta New Earth Festival a success.

lieutenant, captain, division chief, assistant chief and fire chief.

During his time at NFD, Wyant has strongly advocated for firefighters as well as the department, championing improvements and issues that impact firefighters’ safety and health – especially the research he conducted on cancer risks among firefighters and the resulting initiatives established within the fire industry to help lower the cancer risk among firefighters. His research on firefighter exposure to harmful carcinogenic airborne products after a fire was published in the International Fire Service Journal of Leadership and Management and led to the creation of safer operating procedures where firefighters wear self-contained breathing apparatus throughout a fire incident, including the period of time immediately after the fire is extinguished.

“This was more than a policy change, it was a cultural change and NFD led the way,” said Mayor John Ditslear. “Noblesville was one of the first departments in the area to start implementing this and many departments still don’t have or enforce policies on this protection type. There is no doubt that this has reduced the health risks for an entire generation of NFD firefighters and will continue to benefit us in the future.”

“The greater reward for this research will hopefully reveal itself in the years

ahead when our firefighters exhibit lower cancer rates than the industry trend. This policy change is just one of many actions the fire service is embracing to reverse the cancer trends,” Wyant said.

Wyant has served as Noblesville’s Fire Chief since 2015. His belief of fire prevention and education led Noblesville to host 171 community education events, provide nearly 100 smoke detectors to residents, install 25 smoke detectors and hold fire training for local businesses in 2018.

During his NFD career, Wyant was appointed by Governor Mitch Daniels and reappointed by Governors Mike Pence and Eric Holcomb to serve on the Indiana Board of Firefighting Personnel Standards and Education, where he also served as the board’s chairman for five years. He graduated from the National Fire Academy’s Executive Fire Officer Program and is a graduate and past president of the Hamilton County Leadership Academy. Prior to his employment with NFD, Wyant served six years in the United States Navy.

“For all the qualities that have made Chief Wyant an outstanding public servant, his leadership has brought about significant accomplishments. He serves our community with integrity, courage and exemplifies the level of distinguished service of this deserving award,” Ditslear said.

Hamilton County's premier political junkie, Dave Tudor, died last Wednesday. I use that term "junkie" in a respectful sense, and I think Dave would agree that is what he was. He was actually also a longtime attorney in Noblesville, but his first love and passionate hobby was Republican politics.

I knew Dave for more than 40 years. I knew if I mentioned the name of an Indiana politician, Republican or Democrat, we would talk (or in my case, listen) for 20 minutes while Dave gave the history of the subject. He seemed to know them all. Dave never held elective office. He ran for state representative twice and for county Republican chairman once. He did not win these races, but that did not dampen his interest in politics in the slightest. He showed up at political gatherings all around central Indiana until illness in recent years prevented it. Dave was born into a family of educators. His mother was a teacher and his father was a teacher and basketball coach, so he knew the sport well and could give you plenty of information of that too.

He grew up in Westfield and later lived in Sheridan. Dave was married twice, but had no children of his own. Following a lengthy illness, he died this week at Harbor Manor nursing facility. Depersonalization-derealization disorder: Like walking through life outside yourself

Editor's Note: The Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School's 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams. The feeling of depersonalization and derealization can be compared to living in a dream or watching your life from outside your body as if it were a movie. Many days it can feel like you're watching someone in a two-way mirror, and it's scary in many ways, not being able to recognize yourself. It's as if you are someone else, and nothing around you feels real, as if your entire reality has been warped. "Many people have a passing experience of depersonalization or derealization at some point.

But when these feelings keep occurring or never completely go away and interfere with your ability to function, it's considered depersonalization-derealization disorder. This disorder is more common in people who've had traumatic experiences." (Mayo Clinic). The exact cause of depersonalization-derealization isn't known, but the most common causes seem to be high stress and trauma or childhood trauma. Mayo Clinic also says that it may also be attributed to genetic or environmental factors. The cause of dissociative disorders is not clear but may be attributed to genetic or environmental elements. Cleveland Clinic says that depersonaliza-

tion and derealization experiences are found in 50 percent of the population, but a separate diagnosable disorder is found in only about 2 percent of the population. Many cases of derealization and depersonalization can go undiagnosed for years; for some, it's so frequent that the dream-like world becomes their reality. The experience of derealization and depersonalization can be a symptom of schizophrenia or other severe psychotic disorders. If these dissociative disorders do form into schizophrenia, there is no cure and the condition can last from years up to a lifetime, causing hallucinations and psychotic episodes. Mayo Clinic says that the cause of schizophrenia is also unknown but can be related to the structure and chemistry of the brain, similar to that of someone who experienc-

WHEREAS, the Public Safety Revenue must be distributed directly to Hamilton County to be budgeted and appropriated by the Hamilton County Council; and,
WHEREAS, the Public Safety Revenue shall be maintained in a separate dedicated county fund and used only for paying for the expense of a PSAP in Hamilton County; and,
WHEREAS, the required number of members of the Tax Council now desire to amend the local income tax rates to add one tenth of one percent (0.1%) increase in the local income tax rate of Hamilton County to be collected for the purposes of paying operating costs and the costs of acquiring and maintaining real and personal property for a Hamilton County PSAP; and,
WHEREAS, in accordance with Indiana law, the members of the Tax Council who cast a vote in favor of an Ordinance amending the local income rates within a County, must hold a duly noticed public hearing on the proposed increase of the local income tax rate.
NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the required members of the Hamilton County, Indiana, Local Income Tax Council as follows:
Section 1. The required members of the Tax Council hereby find that a need now exists to modify the local income tax rate imposed upon residents of Hamilton County to add a Public Safety Tax Rate of one tenth of one percent (0.1%) to be used only to pay the costs of a PSAP. This modification will amend the Hamilton County local income tax rate as follows:

Section 2. The local income tax rates proposed above shall become effective on January 1, 2020, and shall remain in place until amended or repealed.
Section 3. A duly noticed public hearing was held by the members of the Tax Council on the dates shown on the attached Resolutions. Proper Notice of the Public Hearings, which included a copy of this Ordinance, were published pursuant to Indiana Code 5-3-1 and copies of the Notice were provided to all taxing units in the County.
Section 4. All of the Public Safety Revenue shall be paid to Hamilton County to be deposited in dedicated funds or accounts to be budgeted, appropriated, and used to pay all or part of the following:
a. Salaries and wages of all Hamilton County employees of the Hamilton County Communications Department, including those benefits paid to Hamilton County Employees pursuant to the Hamilton County Personnel Policy.
b. Costs of constructing and maintaining any buildings or equipment used by Hamilton County to provide E-911 services, and other public safety communication services, to and from the County PSAP, and to and from, any Hamilton County public safety agency.
c. The proportional part of the utilities and maintenance costs for the part of the Hamilton County Sheriff Offices and Jail Complex used for the Hamilton County Communication Department, and any other building or structure used for a PSAP.
d. The costs of the maintenance, acquisition, and replacement of all software, necessary and desirable for the operation of PSAP services, including all licensing fees.
e. The costs of the maintenance and/or replacement of all towers and related equipment, which are used as part of the Hamilton County Communication system.
f. The costs of purchase and maintenance of equipment used primarily for public safety communications by police, fire, and other public safety agencies within Hamilton County.
g. Deposits into a sinking account to be used to fund future repairs or replacement of equipment or buildings of the Hamilton County PSAP.
h. Lease payments to pay the costs of new or replacement equipment of the Hamilton County PSAP.
i. Lease payments or bond payments to fund the costs of acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation of buildings, structures, or real estate to be used as a new or replacement PSAP.
Section 5. The Hamilton County Communication Operations Board shall prepare and recommend the annual budget for Public Safety Revenues and review and recommend all contracts and agreements to be funded by Public Safety Revenue. The membership of the Hamilton County Communication Operations Board shall be as follows:
a. The Hamilton County Sheriff.
b. A member of the Board of Commissioners, or the Board's designee.
c. The Mayor of Carmel, or his designee.
d. The Mayor of Fishers or his designee.
e. The Mayor of Noblesville or his designee.
f. The Mayor of Westfield or his designee.
g. A voting Representative of Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia, and Atlanta ("the Small Towns") chosen by a vote of designated representatives of the Small Towns. This representation of the Small Towns shall be subject to annual vote of the Small Towns.
Section 6. This Ordinance shall be of full force and effect from and upon its adoption of Resolutions approving this Ordinance by more than fifty percent (50%) of the vote of the members, which votes are allocated in 2019 as follows:

Shupe totaled four birdies in her round. She was followed by Sophie McGinnis, who scored an even-par 70, draining seven birdies. McGinnis made birdies on her first three holes.

Jocelyn Bruch scored a 73 (two birdies) and Brette Hanavan carded a 74 (one birdie) to round out the Westfield scoring.

“It’s really exciting,” said Shamrocks coach Trevor Neu. “One of the things that is important about it is it means we are seeded with the top groups next week at regional.”

Westfield is the first of three teams to advance to the Roncalli regional, which is set for Saturday at Smock Golf Club.
