Hamilton County, Wayne Township breaks ground on government center

Wayne Township is building a new Government Center, which will house the Wayne Township Volunteer Fire Department and the Wayne Township Trustee's office, as well as a community room.

Local officials, including Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heibrandt, Wayne Township Trustee and Board members, and members of the Wayne Township Volunteer Fire Department gathered at the building site at State Road 32 and Durbin Road in Noblesville on Wednesday, Sept. 25, for a ground-breaking ceremony.

Plans for the new government center began two years ago, when the Wayne Township Board agreed the existing Fire Department building was not going to be feasible to house the department long-term, as it had outgrown the small space.

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

Letter to the Editor

Reader lays out the case for cursive

Dear Editor:

For the past several months I've been in contact with Noblesville Schools Administrative Personnel, State Senators, our local State Representatives' offices and Noblesville School Board Members exploring the idea of bringing cursive back into Indiana schools.

In 2011, Common Core standards were passed, which allowed Indiana schools to eliminate cursive being taught in the elementary schools. Many school systems then eliminated this skill. In my conversations, particularly with Indiana State Senator Jean Leising, who has championed the cause of restoring cursive back into Indiana schools since that time, there are several things that are happening that you could classify under the category of "unintended consequences." Here are two conversations I've had lately:

1. A post office employee has told me she had passport applications denied because the high school applicant couldn't sign their name in cursive.

2. An employer wrote a note to a student praising him for a job well done. The student had to reluctantly hand the note back, explaining he couldn't read it because it was written in cursive.

Senator Leising explained to me that she's had conversations with employers who require doing research of historic documents in the courthouses of Indiana. They have told her they would like to offer permanent jobs to interns who have worked for them, but when they can't read cursive, they simply can't hire them.

The result? We are putting our young people who have been educated in the public school system at a disadvantage in the job market. Every private or parochial school I've researched is teaching this skill, so these students have an advantage when they enter the workforce.

The most recent unintended consequence had its grand opening at Federal Hill Commons in Noblesville last Saturday. It's an impressive display funded by Vance and Mary Jo Patterson of Morgantown, N.C., supported by the City of Noblesville and the Noblesville Parks Department. It is one of only three displays in the nation that is illuminated. It is something to see. The Patterson's vision was to bring life-sized versions of the Declaration of Independence, Bill of Rights and our Constitution to inspire us all. Our Congresswoman in Washington, Representative Susan Brooks, was the keynote speaker last Saturday. Our Mayor, John Ditslear, said the community can honor our history and teach future generations with the Charters of Freedom.

Unfortunately, the ability to read these documents has been eliminated for our young people who are now between the ages of 9 and 17 years old.

What can we do to change this?

Make it known to your child's teachers that you want cursive brought back. If enough teachers hear your concerns, they can bring it to their meetings with administration.

We all want our young people to succeed. Let's help them.

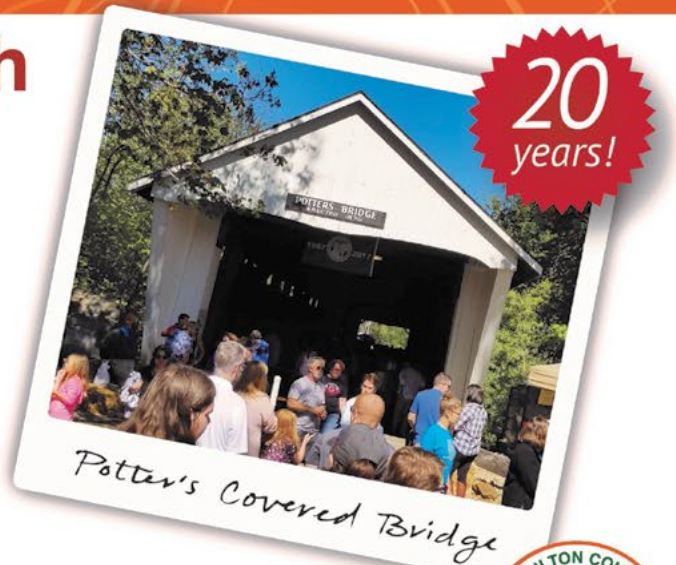

Recycling: Simple as 1-2-3

1. Know what to throw: Cardboard, paper, metal cans, plastic bottles and jugs.

2. Empty, clean dry: Keep all recyclables free of food and liquid.

3. Don't bag it: Never put recyclables in containers or bags.

Materials to recycle

- Paper and cardboard: Flattened cardboard, newspapers, magazines, office paper and common mail.
- Metal cans: Beverage and food cans.
- Plastic: Bottles and jugs; food and liquid containers with the lids on.

NEVER place these items in your recycling container:

No styrofoam, plastic bags and wrappers, food, electronics and batteries, yard waste, diapers, soiled paper, clothing or shoes, tools, toys, construction or medical waste. When in doubt, THROW it out.

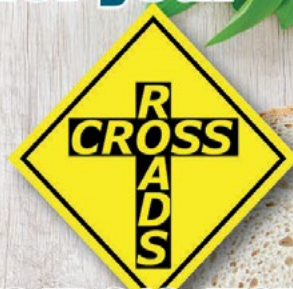

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Hoosier Road will close later this month

Spencer Farm expands to include winery, tasting room

Spencer Farm, a you-pick family farm in Hamilton County offering seasonal produce as well as locally produced pre-made food, has expanded its footprint with the opening of a winery and tasting room.

The small batch winery will occupy a historic place on Spencer Farm’s 40 acres in a newly renovated farmhouse originally built in 1883.

“We are thrilled to build on our successful history of sharing quality products and experiences in Central Indiana with the launch of our winery and tasting room,” said Mark Spencer, founder of Spencer Farm Winery and son of Spencer Farm’s founders Kyle and Lori Spencer.

The winery opened to the public on Tuesday.

Spencer Farm selected 10 varieties of wine-grapes to ensure a high quality, cold-hardy, and disease-resistant

vineyard that will thrive in Indiana’s climate. Test batches of wine began production last year while renovation of the farmhouse was underway, ensuring the tasting room would launch this fall.

“It was my love of wine and viticulture that sparked my desire to launch a winery and tasting room on our family farm,” said Mark Spencer. “We look forward to sharing our wines, as well as a beautiful new tasting room with our loyal customers and friends in Indiana.”

Marion County ends adult prosecution of marijuana possession under 1 ounce

Many marijuana possession cases in Marion County will no longer be prosecuted.

Acting Marion County Prosecutor Ryan Mears made the announcement Monday morning.

Mears says his office will no longer prosecute possession cases of less than one ounce.

“I have come to this decision as a veteran prosecutor. I have seen the resources devoted to these prosecutions and believe those resources can be used more effectively to promote public safety, ensure justice for victims, and reduce recidivism,” Mears said. “When faced with the choice between prosecuting this and prosecuting acts of violence, my priority is clear.”

State Attorney General Curtis Hill responds

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill made the following statement regarding a declaration by Marion County’s acting prosecutor that he will not file charges against anyone accused solely of possessing one ounce or less of marijuana:

“I respect and support the fact that prosecutors have absolute discretion in deciding when to file criminal charges and how to allocate their resources. Typically, though, prosecutors carefully exercise this discretion on a case-by-case basis rather than proclaiming that in all cases they will ignore a particular state law not to their liking. I am concerned that this proclamation in Marion County will attract to Indianapolis people with a particular interest in communities where drug enforcement is lax. It seems to me a curious strategy to put out a welcome mat for lawbreakers in a community already facing challenges related to crime, homelessness and other social problems stemming from drug abuse.”

The prosecutor’s office says about 80 percent of marijuana possession cases in 2019 have been dismissed.

The new policy does not apply to minors.

Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett’s office released this statement:

“Over the last three years, Mayor Hogsett has focused on reforming our community’s criminal justice

system, prioritizing treatment for those suffering from challenges related to mental health and addiction. While today’s abrupt announcement by the Marion County Prosecutor’s Office necessitates further discussion between criminal justice partners, it’s clear that our community’s focus should be on holding perpetrators of violent crime accountable and keeping

those who don’t belong in jail, out.”

Trapping draws set for Saturday

Trappers will be able to enter season draws in person at participating Fish & Wildlife Areas (FWAs) starting Saturday, Oct. 5.

Draws will begin at 10 a.m. local time. Trappers must be present at the participating FWA they would like to trap on and have a current trapping license to be successfully drawn.

Questions about property regulations, draws, or general inquiries should be directed to the property of-

fice at the location you wish to trap, because every property manages their trapping efforts differently. See wildlife.IN.gov/3077.htm for a list of property webpages, which provide each office’s contact information.

Westfield finished its HCC and regular seasons on a winning note, beating Avon 2-1 on Senior Night.

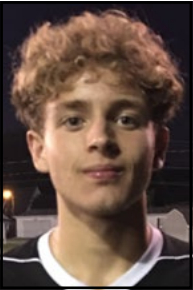
