



Heights pilots program for a life of purpose, potential

Aptiv to open engineering lab in Westfield

Hamilton Heights High School is the first in Indiana to offer the Teach One to Lead One® (T1L1) community mentoring program. The program, currently being offered in six states and two countries, is being piloted at Heights from August through May.

The mentoring program is a unique collaboration between the school and local community mentors who lead students in an interactive curriculum that teaches 10 principles that are essential to life. Caring, responsible adults from the community are equipped with training, materials and support so they can bring life-changing character and leadership skills to students through one-on-one interaction one hour a week.

The T1L1 mentoring program has been credited with significantly raising academic performance, school attendance and changing the attitudes of the students to the positive. Most importantly, the program offers hope and helps lead students toward a path of purpose and potential.

Hamilton Heights High School Assistant Principal Whitney Gray is spearheading the program, which is focusing on a group of freshman and sophomores this year.

"We have been so grateful for this program and the mentors who have dedicated time every week to pouring into our students," said Gray. "The students are really opening up and have started to trust the mentors, which is really neat to see. We

are looking forward to seeing where this program can take our students."

"We have seen some great changes in our room," said Dee Roper, an Instructional Assistant at Hamilton Heights High School. "The students are opening up more and stepping out of their comfort zone. It is awesome to see students beginning to ownership of their actions and using what they have learned so far in class

and it is carrying on in their day. I love this program!"

"The idea of mentors from our community teaching Universal Principles in the school setting is a great way to reinforce the positive characteristics that support our students on the path for success," added Elisa Garcia, Heights Speech Educator Teacher.

Noblesville Commons Council approves parking pilot program

The Noblesville Common Council unanimously approved a new parking pilot program at its Oct. 15 meeting. The plan's intent is to simplify the parking ordinance – including adjusting hours of enforcement, location of free and time-restricted spaces and adding new short duration spots. The parking changes in downtown Noblesville will begin on Jan. 1, 2020.

"These changes – many of which were suggested by downtown merchants – move the city closer to a better parking strategy as supported by the Parking Study data – and allows for a one-year 'pilot' to study the impact of these changes in order to set a permanent strategy after the Levinson parking garage opens in late 2020," Mayor John Ditslear said.

On Tuesday, the Noblesville Common Council unanimously approved a new downtown parking ordinance. A part of the new plan will replace parking meters with kiosks, allowing downtown visitors the option to pay with credit or debit card in city-owned parking lots.

ordinance has been in existence since 1989 when there was no Hamilton County Judicial Center downtown and the city's population was one-third of today's size.

"When it comes to parking in our historic downtown, there is no magic solution that addresses everyone's needs because each

Weingardt defends tax increase in next year's Fishers city budget

At last Wednesday's Fishers City Council Finance Committee meeting, Chairman John Weingardt provided a spirited defense of the property tax increase built into the 2020 city budget.

As the panel discussed the final budget approval vote set for the regular city council meeting, that sparked the tax discussion.

The 2020 city spending plan includes 2 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation property tax increase, funding road repairs, including repaving in the Burberry Place neighborhood, where the concrete streets built years ago are beginning to come apart.

"If we wouldn't have done this, this incremental increase, we wouldn't be doing these roads," Weingardt said. "It's that simple. All these folks bantering about, about a tax increase, I mean, we're doing it for a reason. There's no such thing as a free lunch. We have to balance our budget. We can't borrow away like the federal government does."

He emphasized that the road work in Burberry Place, along with other parts of the city experiencing deteriorating concrete, would not be possible without this tax increase.

"In order for us to do anything, there

comes a point in time where we have to invest, and if people don't want this tax increase, I invite everybody wearing a purple shirt to go over to Burberry Place and knock on their doors, since they've got such a voice, and tell them, we don't want your roads repaired. I'm tired of it," Weingardt told Finance Committee members.

According to Weingardt, the one-year tax increase means the city will pay for this work all in one year, with no need to issue debt in the form of a bond to pay for it.

Finance Committee member Eric Moeller added that with construction costs rising every year, the city will save in the long run by doing this road work in 2020.

Democrats running for Fishers City Council have been critical of property tax increases the city has enacted over the past five years.

City Controller Lisa Bradford shared numbers she has crunched on the tax

NHS's David Ferris earns presidential teaching award

Noblesville Schools announced last Wednesday that Noblesville High School (NHS) math teacher David Ferris has been recognized with the national Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching from the National Science Foundation. The Presidential Awards are the nation's highest honors for teachers of math and science.

Applicants undergo a rigorous process for selection and are assessed by a panel of distinguished mathematicians, scientists and educators at the nation-

al level. Ultimately, teachers are selected based on their distinction in the classroom and dedication to improving science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education.

In 2017, Ferris was named an Indiana state finalist for the Presidential Award and a Teacher of the Year for Noblesville Schools. He's been a math teacher at NHS since 1983 and currently teaches AP Statistics, a course that he personally launched. He

also supports other NHS math and science teachers by serving as an instructional coach and the chair of the NHS math department.

In recognition of the achievement, Ferris will receive a \$10,000 award and a presidential citation. He'll travel to Washington, D.C. for an awards ceremony at the Lincoln Center, a tour of the White House, and scheduled visits to other national highlights such as the Library of Congress and NASA.

Schaibley urges legislature to allow Hamilton County to hire additional magistrate

The Interim Study Committee on Courts and the Judiciary recommended last Thursday that the General Assembly allow Hamilton County leaders to hire an additional magistrate, according to State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel).

Schaibley said the new magistrate would work with the local circuit and superior courts to handle minor offenses or hold preliminary hearings for more serious crimes.

“Hamilton County is the fastest growing county in the state, which means our courts need additional resources to keep up with the increased workload,” Schaibley said. “The summer study committee's recommendation is a positive step forward, and I plan to file legislation to help make our county's judicial process more efficient.”

She said the committee's recommendations received support from all of the superior court judges in Hamilton County, the circuit court judge, the Hamilton Coun-

ty Commissioners, the Hamilton County Council and the Hamilton County prosecuting attorney. Schaibley plans to author legislation to allow for an additional magistrate this upcoming session, which begins in January.

No injuries in Sheridan fire

On Oct. 14, the Sheridan Fire Department was dispatched on a working boat fire threatening a building at the Portside Marina, located at 1637 E. 226th St.

The call was upgraded quickly, prompting several assisting agencies, including Westfield, Cicero, Noblesville, Jackson Township, Zionsville, Indianapolis, Cicero Township, Kempton,

Lapel, Wayne Township and White River Township Fire Departments, as well as Carmel RSU (Support Unit), Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, Hamilton County EMA, Westfield Police Department, Hamilton County Highway Department and the Indiana State Fire Marshal.

The first units to arrive found a 12,000 square-foot structure fully engulfed.

Firefighters performed a defensive attack on the structure, and the fire was under control about 1 1/2 hours later.

A manager and two workers were in the building when the fire broke out, but everyone got out safely. There were no reports of injured firefighters. Due to the loss of the structure and its contents, the State Fire Marshal will investigate the cause of the fire.

increases for years 2015-2020. She says the tax rate has gone from 62 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation in 2015 to an estimated 71 cents in 2020, meaning the tax rate has gone up 9 cents over five years. For a family owning a home valued at \$207,000, and assuming the value has not increased, the actual additional tax on that home would have increased

a total of \$94 over that five-year period, according to Bradford.

Toward the end of the meeting, Councilman Eric Moeller asked about the 911 emergency service income tax increase the Fishers council has approved. Bradford said enough local councils have approved the increase and it will go into effect for all of Hamilton

County in 2020.

Moeller asked about a Hamilton County Council vote, and was told by Finance Committee Chairman Weingardt that the county council has decided not to vote on the 911 income tax increase.

“Another show of good faith by our county council on public safety,” Moller said, somewhat sarcastically.

driver and business has different requirements. We tried to create a scenario that will benefit the majority of those who depend on parking in downtown,” said Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitz, who presented the proposal at the Sept. 10 council meeting and also led the public meeting at City Hall on Oct. 1.

New complex set as . . .

Original CFD station faces demolition

Another Carmel landmark will pass from the scene next year when the city’s original fire station goes down. It will be replaced with a four story fire administration and Fire Buffs Museum building. The project will be financed by Clay Township, as part of its 19-part Community Impact Program designed to expand fire department and park system facilities.

The old fire station at 210 First Ave., S.W. was built nearly 70 years ago by what was then a volunteer fire department. It was the active fire headquarters until the 1980s when the present main station was opened on Civic Square.

Since then the old building, technically named the Donald Swails, Jr. Fire Station, has been home to the Carmel Fire Buffs Museum. The volunteer organization has collected and restored a number of early fire trucks and other firefighting equipment.

Originally it was hoped the building could be incorporated with the newly planned complex, but apparently it is not structurally able to withstand the addition of a second level and other changes being designed. The fire buffs are promised even more space in the new building than they have currently.

The new facility will go

up on property owned by the city of Carmel, which includes the former utilities office and town hall, along with garages that once housed the street department.

The city and township have cooperated on fire services for many years with the township buying some fire equipment and facilities.

Construction on the new building will begin early next year and take an estimated 18 months to complete, says Fire Chief David Haboush. It will house all administration offices and will include the fire museum, a Survive Alive educational section and community room, all of which will make for “a world class” facility, the chief believes.

A portion of the front façade will be a recreation of the face of the original fire station, using bricks and limestone salvaged from the Swails station. In addition to the historic façade, inside there will be a reconstructed office, dispatch center and dormitory room as part of the museum, in addition to space for the Fire Buffs’ substantial collection of antique fire trucks.

Meanwhile, the current fire headquarters on Civic Square will become entirely a fire station, upgraded to accommodate growing needs.

Beyond the play: Hamilton

Not all transactions are available on a kiosk, including upgrading your license to a Real ID. Make sure to check for the star in the upper right hand corner of your ID or license, and if you don’t have one, make time to bring your paperwork in to the branch before the October 2020 deadline.



'Hawks win high-scoring game with Carroll

Sheridan's Bud Wright Stadium has been the site of many exciting games over the years, and it can add last Friday night's Hoosier Heartland Conference win over Carroll to the list.

The game lasted until 10:09 p.m. – at 3 hours and 9 minutes, it was about as long as an NFL game. The final score was 64-56 – one man suggested the score was comparable to a high school basketball game. It was also a nice way for the Blackhawks to finish the regular season, which they did at 6-3.

"It's more fun for the fans than it is for the coaches, that's for sure," said Wright.

It was obvious the game was going to be a high-scoring affair early. Sheridan got on the board just 71 seconds into the first quarter when Silas DeVaney rushed 36 yards for a touchdown. Chris Starks made the extra point kick.

But the Cougars answered just 18 seconds later. Senior Ayden Ayres blasted off 61 yards into the end zone. Carroll missed the extra point, but the shootout was on.

"I didn't figure it was going to be a shootout until about halfway through the first quarter," said Wright. "Then I realized that, 'Hey, we're going to be.'"

The first period finished with Sheridan ahead 21-14. Christian Clausen scored on a nine-yard run, then Cayden Hunter took a 70-yard pass from DeVaney into the end zone. DeVaney then made a two-point conversion run.

The Cougars did all the scoring in the second quarter, allowing them to take a 26-14 halftime lead. That set the stage

for a third period that lasted quite a while, which is to be expected when both teams score 52 points in one quarter.

Both teams played great offense, and always had an answer for each other. Clausen streaked on a 65-yard run to put Sheridan back on top with 10:11 to go, then Carroll's Jayden Harness zoomed 69 yards to get his team ahead. DeVaney's 20-yard run pushed the 'Hawks back in front, but Clay Metzger took off on an 85-yard kick-off return, and the Cougars were leading again.

"We could've put them away, I think, early and failed to do it," said Wright. "Then they got momentum, then they played hard and we played hard. We were lucky to come out on it, I guess."

Carroll went up 50-35 when Metzger scored on a 40-yard run with 5:13 left in the third. Sheridan answered that when DeVaney rushed 29 yards to score, then threw a conversion pass to Reece Fisher. But the Cougars got the last word of the third period when Ayres caught a touchdown pass with 2:44 left. That gave Carroll a 56-43 lead.

But the Blackhawks took charge in the fourth quarter, not allowing the Cougars a point. Sheridan's offense stepped up as well. Gavin Renners scored at the 10:15 mark on a four-yard run, with Dylan Cork kicking the extra point. DeVaney then punched the ball in from the two with 4:28 left, tying the game.

"And then I think we had the momentum from there," said Wright.

DeVaney had one more big throw to make, and it was the biggest throw of the

game (literally and figuratively.) DeVaney tossed a pass to Fisher, who turned it into a 78-yard touchdown reception. DeVaney then threw his second conversion pass of the night to Renners. Carroll got one more chance, but the Blackhawks stopped them and got the victory.

DeVaney finished the game with 224 yards in 34 rushes, and passed for 245 yards, making 6 of 12 throws. Cale Cummings caught three of them for 82 yards.

"Cale Cummings, he's played reserve all year," said Wright. "Last week we

moved him up to varsity and he stepped up big tonight."

The 'Hawks finished HHC play at 6-1, giving them second place in the conference. Eastern is the HHC champion, finishing undefeated at 7-0; a 34-0 win over Clinton Prairie clinched the perfect conference season for the Comets. Eastern finished the regular season at 9-0, its first unbeaten campaign since 1974.

Sheridan will be back at Bud Wright Stadium Friday, hosting Indianapolis Lutheran in the first round of Sectional 46.

Tigers hold off Eagles, tie for 2nd in HCC

Fishers won a back-and-forth game with Zionsville 42-35 last Friday at Clarian Field at Reynolds Tigers Stadium, finishing up Hoosier Crossroads Conference and regular-season play.

The Tigers got on the board first, with Nick Leath catching a 19-yard touchdown pass from Marcus Roux in the first quarter. The Eagles would score the next two touchdowns on runs by Colin Price, and that led Zionsville to a 14-7 advantage in the second quarter.

Leath and Roux teamed up for a 27-yard pass play score to tie the game, but the Eagles got their own passing touchdown, and went ahead 21-14 at halftime. Dylan Scally opened the second half with a 33-yard rushing touchdown, and Jack Phillips' extra-point kick tied the game again at 21-21.

The pattern continued as the third quarter went on, with Zionsville scoring on another passing touchdown, and

the Tigers answering with a running score. Roux punched it in from the one-yard line, and the game was tied 28-28 after three quarters.

Millers score regional sweep

Noblesville soccer fans probably wished they could be two places at the same time last Saturday evening.

Why? Because at the same time, the Millers' boys and girls teams were winning regional championships.

The No. 2-ranked Noblesville girls won their third Class 3A regional title in four years at Logansport, beating No. 15 Fort Wayne Carroll 1-0 in the semi-finals, then cruising past McCutcheon 5-0 in the championship game. This marked the seventh regional trophy for the Miller girls since soccer became an IHSA sport in 1994.

Just down the road in Kokomo, Noblesville's boys team won the 3A regional championship there. The No. 8 Miller boys beat Harrison 1-0 in the semi-finals, then upset No. 2 Fort Wayne Carroll 2-1 in the title game. This was Noblesville's first boys soccer regional championship since 2011, and its eighth overall.

Both teams advanced to Saturday's 3A north semi-state in Kokomo. The Miller girls will play No. 7 Penn at 3 p.m., followed by the Miller boys' game with Lake Central at 5 p.m.

FIRST VARSITY GOAL

Grace Traskey picked a great time to

score her first-ever varsity goal for the Noblesville girls team. She got the only score of the Millers' regional semi-final game with Carroll, putting in a header in the 23rd minute off a corner kick by Carly Hudnall. The 1-0 lead was enough to get Noblesville on to the championship game.

Five different Millers scored a goal in that final game against McCutcheon. Elana Chatterton went first, finding the back of the net in the fourth minute of the game. Isabella Griffey provided the assist. Hudnall added the second goal in the 16th minute, then Ava Bramblett scored two minutes later, giving Noblesville a 3-0 halftime lead.

Meskerem James scored the Millers' fourth goal during the 47th minute, then Paige Landers completed the scoring in the 71st minute. Landers put in a header off a Kylie Roberts corner kick. The regional victory improved Noblesville's record to 15-0-3 for the season.

LATE SCORE IS THE DIFFERENCE

The Miller boys had to wait to get their goal in the regional semi-final over Carroll. Finally, in the 74th minute, Noblesville broke through when Palmer Ault scored, off an assist by Spencer Holland. The Millers then held on in the final five minutes to

advance to the final.

In the final, Noblesville took on a Carroll team that came into the regional title game with an 18-2-1 record. But the Millers struck first, and quickly: Harrison Christman got Noblesville on the board eight minutes into the first half.

The Chargers tied it up later in the half on a penalty kick, and the score remained 1-1 at halftime. But Christman came through again in the second half, putting a second goal in the net with 20 minutes left. The Millers held on, and soon the regional plaque was theirs, along with a 16-2-2 record for the season.

CARMEL GIRLS DEFEND REGIONAL

Down at New Palestine, the Carmel girls soccer team defended its 3A regional championship with two easy wins.

The No. 1-ranked and defending state champion Greyhounds first beat Metropolitan Conference rival Lawrence North 7-0 in the semi-finals. Naomi Mann got Carmel on the board with a goal in the sixth minute, off a double assist by Kelsie James and Susie Soderstrom.

James then scored several minutes later, with Jessica Greven providing the assist. Emma Antoine put the 'Hounds up 3-0, with Tamara Smith assisting. That was the last goal of the first half.

Carmel added four more goals in the second half. Lauren Rainbolt scored next, with Mann and Saliyah Brady getting the double assist. Brady then scored her own goal, off a Rainbolt assist. The Huskies finished their season 13-3-4, but not before winning their first sectional championship in five years, and 10th overall on Oct. 12.

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
