# Construction of new Westfield Playhouse to finish next spring

On Tuesday, the City of Westfield joined Main Street Productions, Inc. to break ground on the new Westfield Playhouse in the city's center.

The 160-seat theater facility will be within two to three blocks of the future Grand Junction Plaza, making it another amenity residents and visitors can enjoy while in downtown Westfield.

"Today marks an important step for our downtown," said Mayor Andy Cook. "The presence of the Westfield Playhouse will enhance the arts in the heart of our city. Main Street Productions has been an integral part of the Westfield community for many years and we are excited to welcome them to our downtown."

"Main Street Productions is

both nostalgic and proud when considering the accomplishments over the last 17 years in the old building in Eagletown," said Main Street Productions board member Tom Smith. "Since 2002, over 100 productions have taken place with no running water or indoor plumbing, but time moves on and the breathtaking growth of Westfield has presented us with a rare opportunity. We

are thankful for this exciting new future."

Funding of the new location is made possible through individual donors in the community including a major gift by the Estridge Family Foundation. Mayor Cook also announced the Westfield City Council committed \$300,000 and a land lease through the Westfield Economic Development Foundation (WEDF). And, recently,

Main Street Productions was awarded an additional \$100,000 grant from the Allen Whitehill Clowes Charitable Foundation, Inc. to construct the new theater facility.

## Fishers City Council unanimously passes 2020 budget

There was no opposition among the nine members of the Fishers City Council as the body voted Monday night to approve a \$119 million 2020 spending plan. The vote was 9-0.

Councilman David George was unable to attend last month's budget session where Mayor Scott Fadness laid out the numbers for the council. A public hearing was held on the budget in September, but no one chose to speak.

George explained Monday why he planned to vote for the budget, pointing to long-term plans to repair and resurface streets and roads in the city as they age.

of the council session, Democratic candidate for Fishers City Council At-Large, Jocelyn Vare, criticized the process used by the city administration and council in explaining the 2020 budget to the public. She suggested

the 2021 budget process be done differently, calling for a public explanation of the budget in plain language 30 days before the public hearing.

The 2020 budget calls for a 3 percent employee pay hike and includes a 2-cents-per-\$100 of assessed property value tax rate increase.





during the community com- ment time. He asked that the council vote on releas- ing the report done by an outside law firm concerning allegations that City Clerk Jennifer Kehl had violated the Civil Rights Act of 1964 in dealing with employees in her office.


The firm found no vi- olations of the law in its probe, but a brief statement from the city said the report found management issues in the City Clerk’s office and reduced Clerk Kehl’s responsibilities and staff. The full report has nev- er been made public, with

the city arguing that one or more of the employees still has the right to file an action with the Equal Opportunity Employment Commission (EEOC).

Day said the city could release the report and redact private information, such as the employee names.

# 150 years of Noblesville Schools

As we celebrate the 150th anniversary of Noblesville schools, I'd like to address a question I've often been asked over my 24 years teaching at the high school: "How is school these days?"

My standard response? "School is good." Then I add, "Mostly."

I feel the need to add the caveat because school isn't all good. It's not perfect. Families aren't perfect. There's a lot wrong with religion. Getting old sucks. But there's a lot good about those things too. See my point? Anything deeply human is going to have some issues. That said, I get back to my original comment – school is good.

Actually, Noblesville High School is the best place I know. And not because Forbes Magazine and U.S. News and World Report and their algorithms said so.

Sure, we've got decent SAT scores and a killer weight room. Nothing wrong with that. But I mean good in a different way. Good the way Mr. Rogers meant it when he said something was good. Noblesville's schools are good because of the number and nature of the people who populate the

places every day.

All those different people ... Life's rich pageant is what I call it as it scrolls past the bench near the drinking fountain in the English hallway where I sit most mornings, drinking coffee, enjoying the parade. In five minutes more than a hundred specimen of humanity will slouch, skip, shuffle or speed-walk past with three other girls while whispering loudly about some other girl's outrageous Instagram post as I sit there and

take it in.

See, in each one of those kids there is a brain. And in each of those brains there are over a hundred billion neurons (something like the number of stars in the Milky Way) making over a hundred trillion connections. And each nanosecond in each kid's head, as they walk by me as I sit on my bench enjoying my coffee, is an entirely unique moment in the history of everything – absolutely never to be repeated. When Mr. Rogers says you're special because there's nobody like you, he's profoundly right.

After being asked the question about the state of school, I sometimes get a second question, one directed not at school but at teenagers these days. This is most often asked by someone for whom my positive response about school was unsatisfying. The teenager question is usually delivered in a sympathetic tone, as if I'm a martyr of some kind for doing what I do – for having to be among all those emotional black holes and angry time-bombs eight or so hours a day. As if things in the world of young people must surely be getting worse as society

hurts towards the End of Times.

The implication is that kids were once very different than the ones we have to deal with these days. As we're in our 150th year of systematically educating kids here in Noblesville it makes me wonder ... Were those kids from the past so different? Were they better? Kinder? More whole and humane?

I have to believe that life's rich pageant was, in 1869, pretty much the same as it is today. Sure, the kids back then wore different clothes. Sure, their tablets didn't turn off. They sounded different when they cussed. Otherwise? I'd guess they were pretty similar to the students I watch go by every morning.

They had teachers they looked forward to seeing and teachers they didn't. They felt a flush of heat in their chests when they saw that handsome, shy guy or that beautiful and kind girl. They worried about how their lives would turn out, their sick cat, their upcoming quiz, but mostly they worried about how other people saw them. And they were just as unique as the kids today.

That's the paradox at the heart of life's rich pageant. It's one of those big paradoxes, the kind that seem to be at the heart of all things human: If you love something you have to let it go. It's death that gives life meaning. It's our stunning uniqueness that makes us most similar to every human being who ever walked the halls of a Noblesville school. Of any school anywhere, really.

So, 150 years in, how is school these days? If you look at it the way I do, it's awesome. Awesome not in the Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure/Jeff Spicoli way but in the Carl Sagan/Neil deGrasse Tyson way. And like all of the most human things in our lives, it's not perfect. It's better than that. It's good. Mostly.

The department recommends that anyone six months and older get a flu shot.

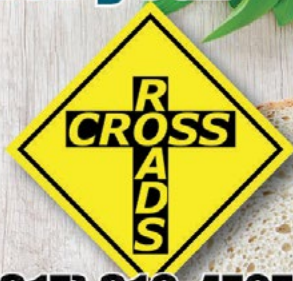

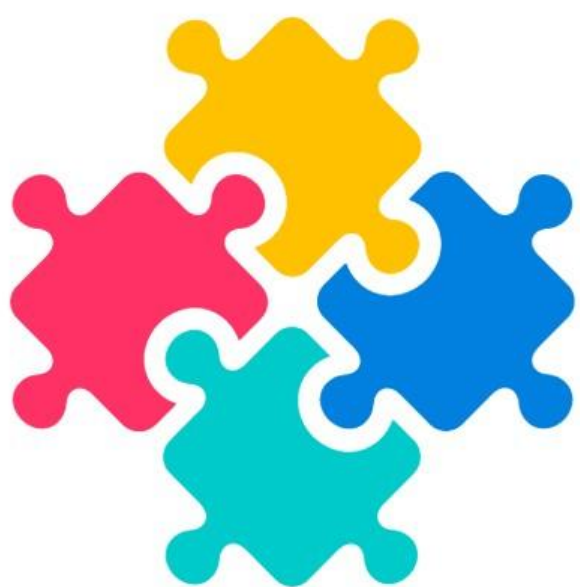

# Carmel realtor urges passage of proposed school referendum

**Submitted** Working to create strong, safe communities is a mission for Jason Rose – as a lifelong Carmel resident, real estate agent with Rose Realty/Century 21 Scheetz, and Vice President of the Carmel Middle School Parent Teacher Organization. Most recently, Rose has focused his energy on passing a school safety referendum and educating his community neighbors about the need for the new policy.

“We are encouraging our neighbors to vote in support of this referendum in order to allow the much-needed safety and mental health improve-

ments to our district,” said Rose, who has been a vocal proponent of the proposal. “If passed, the referendum will increase safety in our schools and help prevent violence from happening in our community.”

Rose became concerned with school safety after the Columbine and Sandy Hook tragedies. When two students and one teacher were injured by a gunman at nearby Noblesville West Middle School in May 2018 it hit “close to home,” as he has family who attended the school. In the wake of the shooting, the Carmel Clay School Board of Trustees passed a resolution to place a school safety referendum on the ballot for the election on Nov. 5, 2019.

The referendum will accomplish three main goals, according to the Carmel Clay Schools’ website:

- 1) Place at least one highly-trained school resource officer at each school;
- 2) Increase the number of social workers and partner with local mental health providers to have therapists available in every school; and
- 3) Provide students, staff, and community members with ongoing training to improve safety and reduce violence.

At 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 24, Rose will hold a community information meeting centered around school safety and the referendum at the office of Rose Realty/Century 21 Scheetz, located at 270 E. Carmel Drive. Dr. Michael Beresford, the Superintendent of Carmel Clay Schools, will present information on the referendum and have an open forum at that time. The event is free and open to the public.

“Learning more about the proposed initiative – and getting out to vote – is an important role of being a vested member of the community. Since we live in the ‘City of Champions’ we all need to take ownership and win the fight for school safety,” concluded Rose.

## AG Hill joins multistate investigation into Facebook over possible antitrust

**The REPORTER** Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced Tuesday that Indiana has joined a multistate investigation into Facebook over possible antitrust violations.

“Just like individual citizens, corporations must be held accountable for following the law,” Hill said. “And just like individual citizens, corporations also enjoy the presumption of innocence until facts prove otherwise. In this case, we must follow the facts to determine whether Facebook

has engaged in anti-competitive behavior in violation of state and federal antitrust laws.”

Anticompetitive behavior may hurt consumers, Hill noted, by leaving them with fewer choices and higher prices. A social media company, for example, might be able to charge higher prices for advertising if it successfully thwarts competitors from gaining a




foothold in the marketplace.

“To protect consumers and the free market, we must promote conditions under which all entities may compete on a level playing field in accordance with the rule of law,” Hill said.

The multistate investigation is also looking into whether Facebook has compromised consumers’ personal data and privacy.
