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Ditslear named Sagamore of the Wabash

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear was honored with the Sagamore of the Wabash Award during the annual Mayor's Charity Jubilee on Nov. 9. Mayor-elect Chris Jensen presented Ditslear with the award on behalf of Gov. Eric Holcomb, who was unable to attend.

"I was surprised, humbled and honored that Gov. Holcomb thought of me for this distinction," said Ditslear. "I'm proud of the work we have done, the progress we have made and the outstanding reputation that Noblesville has earned. I truly love this city and the people who make up our community, and I thank the citizens for entrusting me with this honor for 16 years as their mayor."

The Sagamore of the Wabash Award is the highest honor bestowed on a citizen by Indiana's governor, and serves as a tribute

to those who have rendered a distinguished service to the state. The term "sagamore" was used by the American Indian Tribes of the northeastern United States to describe a lesser chief or a great man among the tribe to whom the true chief would look for wisdom and advice.

The award says Ditslear is "... distinguished by his humanity in living, his loyalty in friendship, his wisdom in council and his inspiration in leadership."

Since taking office in 2004, Ditslear has led Noblesville through tremendous growth and change. The community's population has grown 57 percent to more than 61,000 residents today. By welcoming commercial development and bringing thousands of new jobs to Noblesville, his initiative and leadership guiding that growth have greatly strengthened the

local economy – overseeing an increase in assessed value of taxable property by 134 percent to more than \$6 billion.

While his time in office is coming to an end, Ditslear has brought about several quality of life initiatives, including a major expansion of trails which has increased to more than 100 total miles. He also has added four new city parks including the purchase of 200 acres for the future Finch Creek Park.

conceptual agreement.”

For the two-year contract, the teacher salary range increases to \$37,500-\$77,500. Salary increases will be based on 1) an effective or highly effective evaluation rating from the previous school year, and 2) experience (worked at least 120 days).

For the 2019-20 school year, teachers will receive a \$500 base pay increase, with a \$1,000 step increase. Beginning the 2020-21 school year, eligible teachers will receive a \$1,000 step increase.

Teachers who receive Building Teacher of the Year in the preceding school year are eligible for a \$1,000 stipend. Any teacher who obtains an additional degree during this contract period (limited to a total of \$20,000 using one-time money) will receive a stipend of: \$4,000 for a Masters, Ed.S., or Ph.D.; \$2,000 for National Board Certification; and \$500 for

additional licensure.

Other changes include a \$1,000 payroll stipend paid to all eligible teachers in December 2019 and 2020. The district 401(a) retirement contributions will increase by \$100 and 20 additional HHCTA days were included for Association business and events.

A committee will be formed to review the ECA Schedule and make a recommendation to the Bargaining Committee in the summer of 2021 for consideration in 2021-23 collective bargaining agreement.

Dr. Derek Arrowood, Hamilton Heights Superintendent, credits the approval of the latest contract to a well-defined process, finding common ground, testament to the caliber of personnel working in the Heights district and their passion for students’ overall experience at Heights, and the corporation’s commitment to attracting and retaining high quality educators.

improvement and expansion of roadways throughout the city including all roundabout intersections in Noblesville. The connection of 146th Street to Interstate 69 as a major traffic artery across the city also led to Simon Property Group’s Hamilton Town Center outdoor mall, which helped fuel major commercial growth for both Noblesville and nearby Fishers to set the stage for

for several organizations, including the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, the Noblesville Boys & Girls Club, the Riverview Hospital Foundation, the Hamilton East Public Library and United Way of Hamilton County. On Saturday evening, it was announced that Ditslear had raised over \$1.08 million for local organizations prior to this year through his charity balls.

On Nov. 14, the Alphorn players will visit Carmel High School to present to the German classes. On Nov. 15, they will perform at Lawrence North High School and then in the afternoon at the Center for Inquiry School 2 for Kindergarten through fifth grade students.

History of the Alphorn

Archaeological records of the Alphorn in Switzerland date back nearly 2,000 years. Early instruments in the mountainous regions of the Alps were used for signaling and to announce daily activities.

Since ancient times, the Alphorn has sounded as a part of the daily activities of the shepherds and cowherds of these mountain

people. Such melodies became ritual signals for "all is well in the valley" and were passed down through countless generations, from shepherd father to shepherd son.

The instrument has a four-octave range. Since the Alphorn has no keys, valves, or slides, the player

can only produce pitches in the horn's overtone series. Due to its conical bore, increasing in size from the mouthpiece to the end of the bell, the Alphorn produces a mellow and reverberant sound that can carry for miles.

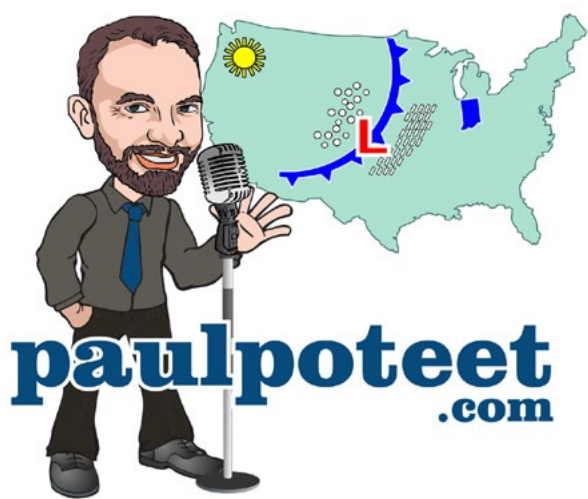

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State wins Hamilton County bench trial in case of home-restoration scammers

The REPORTER The Office of the Attorney General has prevailed in a case against two individuals who operated a home-improvement company in Hamilton County that scammed money from 63 Hoosiers, including 33 senior citizens. Over a 10-month period, Green Frog Restoration LLC took payments totaling \$389,187.82 for work it never completed. Nor

did the company refund the money paid by consumers. A Hamilton County court last week awarded judgment in **the case of James Twaddle**, who with Wanda VanWinkle operated the business from May 2014 to March 2015. The same court already issued a **default judgment against VanWinkle and Green Frog** in 2017. The default judgment, totaling \$1,268,870.44, includes \$389,187.82 in consumer restitution, \$367,523.52 in senior consumer treble damages and \$511,500 in civil penalties. Following an October trial, the court ordered that Twaddle also be held personally liable for Green Frog's \$1,268,870.44 judgment. Twaddle is also permanently enjoined from owning, operating or managing any home-improvement business in Indiana. Green Frog Restoration touted its specialty to be replacing siding and roofs on homes in the aftermath of storms. Before coming to Indiana, Twaddle already had been charged with home-improvement fraud in at least five Kentucky and Ohio counties. While out on bail, he moved to Indiana and used the alias "Jim Martin" to avoid being recognized for his ongoing criminal issues. During Green Frog's short time of operation, both VanWinkle and Twaddle took significant sums of money out of the business. Bank records show VanWinkle took approximately \$127,845 from Green Frog's account, plus spent approximately \$80,000 on personal expenses – including a BMW; psychic readings; and food and retail purchases from stores such as Kohl's, the Buckle and GameStop. Over the same time period, Twaddle paid himself \$108,774 from Green Frog's account and additionally used \$189,688.52 from Green Frog's account to pay his ongoing legal expenses stemming from criminal charges in Ohio and Kentucky, including a court-ordered payment of consumer restitution in the amount of \$150,000 to Ohio victims. Additionally, approximately \$130,000 in cash withdrawn from Green Frog remains unaccounted for. "The Office of the Attorney General takes very seriously our responsibility to protect Hoosier consumers," Attorney General Curtis Hill said. "When you break the law in Indiana, you should pay the price for your actions, and I am grateful for the Hamilton County court's conclusions in this particular case."

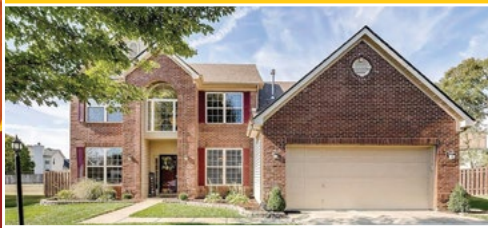

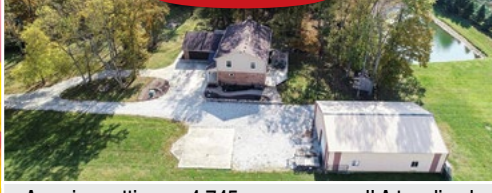
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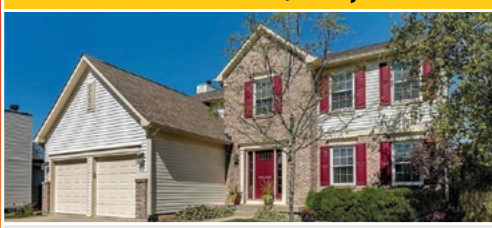

Shade receives Player of the Week honors

Noblesville freshman Ashlynn Shade was chosen as one of the first IBCA/Subway Player of the Week recipients for the 2019-2020 campaign.

North Judson-San Pierre junior Lillianne Frasure, Northwestern senior Madison Layden and Heritage Hills Junior Rebekah Gordon were also selected as honorees for the week of Nov. 4 to Nov. 9 in the recognition program coordinated by the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association. Frasure is the recipient for District 1. Layden and Shade are co-winners for District 2. Gordon is the honoree for District 3.

Freshman Ashlynn Shade has garnered a lot of attention already, and she backed that up last week with a couple of stellar performances to begin her career. Last Thursday, the 5-10 guard scored 26 of her team's 39 points, in a 62-39 loss at No. 4 Lawrence North. In that outing, she was 8-15 from the field, including 5-9 from 3-point range, plus she knocked down five of her six free throw attempts. She gathered six rebounds and collected

a steal as well.

Saturday, however, there was a different outcome, as Shade led her team to their first win of the season, 70-31, at the hands of Fort Wayne Snider. The rookie scored another 23 points on 9-17 shooting, while also knocking home three 3-pointers and a pair of free throws. She added seven rebounds, five assists, and six steals in the home victory.

Madison Layden has her team at No. 1 in the state right now, after putting up a couple of nice performances and leading Northwestern to a pair of wins last week. The 6-1 guard started her week off with a 28-point outing in a 70-15 victory at Lafayette Jefferson. In that game, she also posted four rebounds, three assists, six steals, and a blocked shot in the lopsided win.

In their home opener on Saturday, Layden poured in 31 points, helping the Tigers run past Twin Lakes 80-28. She was also responsible for four rebounds, three assists, and five steals. The Purdue University commit also shot the ball

well last week, making 20 of her 35 field goal attempts, seven of her 17 3-point attempts, and going a perfect 12-12 from the free throw line.

Lillianne Frasure had a steady two games last week, contributing at both ends of the floor. In a 49- 33 win at Rochester, the 5-10 wing began her season by scoring 24 points and grabbing 15 rebounds against a sizeable Zebra front-line. She also handed out four assists and collected six steals in their 16- point win.

On Saturday, Frasure helped lead the Bluejays to a 65-28 win against Rensselaer Central. This time, Frasure posted a triple-double, scoring 26 points, grabbing 20 rebounds, and tallying 12 steals. She also posted five assists in the effort. For the week she was 16-36 from the field, 3-5 from 3-point range, and 15-24 from the free throw line.

Rebekah Gordon posted a pair of double-doubles last week, helping her team to a 1-1 start on the season. In a 56-19 opening night win over Northeast Dubois, the 6-0 forward went for 20

points and 10 rebounds in limited minutes. She also had an assist, five steals, and a blocked shot in the effort.

The junior came back Thursday night and contributed 23 points, 10 rebounds, two assists, and a steal, but the Patriots narrowly fell to Crawford County 52-49. For the week, Gordon was 14-27 from the field, 2-5 from 3-point range, and a solid 13-16 from the free throw line.

This is the 12th season for the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Player of the Week program, and the eighth season it is presented by Subway Restaurants of Indiana, a banner sponsor of the IBCA. Shorthanded Pacers breeze past Thunder

The shorthanded Pacers continued their impressive run on Tuesday night, routing the Oklahoma City Thunder (4-7) 111-85 at Bankers Life Fieldhouse for their fourth straight win and their seventh in their last eight contests.

T.J. Warren led Indiana with 23 points on 10-of-14 shooting. Malcolm Brogdon tallied 20 points, six rebounds, and five assists, while Domantas Sabonis collected 18 points and 16 boards in the victory.

The Pacers won again with five players in street clothes due to injuries, the same conundrum they faced in each of their past three victories.

"We're learning our identity on the defensive end," Brogdon said. "Coming out of the gate, playing a strong 48 minutes, that's what the Pacers do and that's what we want to do this season."

Brogdon had it going early on Tuesday. The Pacers point guard hit his first four shots, racking up nine quick points. His last basket in that stretch — a 3-pointer — started a 12-2 Indiana run to give the hosts a 10-point lead.

Indiana took a 31-25 lead into the second quarter. The Thunder trimmed the deficit to four before the Blue

& Gold put together another run, reeling off nine unanswered points to push the margin back to double digits.

Brogdon scored Indiana's final six points of the half as the Pacers took a 52-42 lead into the break.

Warren took over in the early part of the third quarter. The fifth-year forward put on a mid-range clinic, drilling four straight shots from the top of the key as Indiana opened the third quarter with a 13-6 run.

"I just wanted to come out with a sense of urgency out there," Warren said. "I knew we had a good little lead and just wanted to put them away in the third quarter. Malcolm and the guards did a good job of getting guys in their spots and getting us organized offensively."

Warren added a 3-pointer a few minutes later, the start of a 15-2 Pacers run that also included two treys from Aaron Holiday and extended the lead to as many as 26 points.

Indiana took an 86-62 advantage into the third quarter and the Pacers' reserves quickly erased any lingering thoughts of a Thunder comeback. The bench opened with five straight points, but more importantly, they held Oklahoma City to just six points over the first five and half minutes of the final frame.

Indiana emptied its bench at the end of the game, with two-way players Naz Mitrou-Long and Brian

Bowen II seeing their first NBA action of the season.

Holiday was the fourth and final Pacers player to reach double figures, finishing with 17 points and four assists.

Danilo Gallinari led Oklahoma City with 14 points and Shai Gilgeous-Alexander added 11 points and six rebounds. Steven Adams finished with 10 points and five boards, while All-Star guard Chris Paul tallied seven points, five rebounds, eight assists, and three steals.

In addition to the long-term injuries to Victor Oladipo and Edmond Sumner, the Pacers were once again without regular starters Jeremy Lamb (left ankle sprain) and Myles Turner (right ankle sprain), as well as rookie center Goga Bitadze (concussion). Lamb is expected to remain out for a couple more games, though Turner and Bitadze could return to action as soon as Friday night in Houston.

The schedule gets more difficult this weekend, as the Pacers face the last two NBA MVPs on back-to-back nights. The Blue & Gold will travel to Houston to take on James Harden and the Rockets at 8 p.m. on Friday before returning to Indianapolis to host Giannis Antetokounmpo and the Milwaukee Bucks on Saturday at 7 p.m.
