The historic Nickel Plate Road locomotive No. 426 hopes to get a new life with the launch of a campaign by the Nickel Plate Express to restore the iconic locomotive. The fundraising campaign, dubbed *Full Throttle*, aims to bring the 1953

The 66-year-old diesel locomotive originally served the New York, Chicago and St. Louis Railroad in Frankfort before eventually arriving in Noblesville in 2001 after retiring from freight service. The locomotive boasts its original Nickel Plate Road number and paint scheme.

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



Although there are various pharmaceutical treatment options available, for the purposes of this article I will refer to holistic and nutritional options. Our bones are solid and rigid, but they are very much a dynamic and metabolically active tissue in our bodies. We need calcium to carry out a variety of functions like making our muscles con-

tract. When our bodies need more calcium Find boron in raisins, almonds, hazelnuts, available in our bloodstream, it gets pulled from our bones. Maintaining a balance between blood levels and bone levels is crucial to maintaining overall health.

In order to absorb calcium, the body requires vitamin D. Mushrooms are an excellent source – other than some supplements, they are the only plant-based source. Wild salmon is another vitamin D source. If you consume dairy products for additional vitamin D make sure that the products are low-fat and environmentally sustainable. of bone formation and maintenance. Dark leafy greens, cruciferous vegetables, sauerkraut, soybeans, pickles, pumpkin, pine nuts and blueberries are all good sources of





Zinc, magnesium, and boron each play a role in bone health and are trace minerals meaning that a small amount will suffice. You can find zinc in legumes, nuts, whole grains, dark chocolate (yum!), tofu, hemp seeds and shiitake mushrooms. Look for magnesium in whole wheat, almonds and cashews, dark chocolate (there it is again!) black beans, avocados and tofu.

dried apricots, peanut butter, walnuts and red kidney beans.

Remember that while supplements can certainly play an important part in your healthy regimen, whole foods are the best option for getting all your nutrition needs met. If you are on any types of medication, be sure to check with your licensed medical practitioner in case there may be any interaction between your medication and your supplements.

As noted in my previous article, Vitamin K is also a vital part of the process weight-bearing and strength training exercise are very important. We want to continuously be able to comfortably and stably support our own body weight throughout our lifetime. It is never too late, or too early, to begin considering how you can make a difference in your aging process and how that effects your quality of life. You can do this!

Tipton veteran awarded French Legion of Honor

Tipton resident and World War II veteran Daniel Mattingly was awarded the French Legion of Honor on Nov. 10, according to State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero).

As France's highest order of merit for military and civil service, this honor can be bestowed upon American veterans like Mattingly who risked their lives in World War II. Cook said Mattingly served in the U.S. Navy onboard the LST-212 during the war, and is noted for his participation in the Sicily Campaign and Allied Invasion of Normandy on June 6, 1944.

"Just like President Dwight D. Eisenhower and General Douglas MacArthur, Daniel now carries one of France's most prestigious distinctions because of his strength and bravery during World War II," Cook said. "We are forever indebted to him for his service to our country and the










John Allan Bragg January 7, 1953 - November 11, 2019
