# Giant bird nest added to Westfield’s MacGregor Park

# Westfield Fire, Riverview Health launch PulsePoint

The Westfield Fire Department and Riverview Health announced the launch of PulsePoint, a free citizen emergency response app. Westfield is the first Hamilton County community to adopt this potentially life-saving technology.

PulsePoint, a smartphone application notifies community members that first responders are responding to a nearby cardiac arrest, which potentially would allow community members to provide life-saving assistance to victims of Sudden Cardiac Arrest until paramedics arrive.

The app also notifies CPR-trained community members the location of nearby AED units. When CPR-trained individuals receive an alert from PulsePoint, it tells them not only where a cardiac arrest event is happening, but also where they can find the nearest AED.

# New Logan Street Bridge to open Jan. 6

For motorists using Noblesville's Logan Street Bridge, it may have seemed that the reconstruction of the structure would never be done. But, after nearly a year, there is light at the end of the bridge.

Official dedication and ribbon-cutting has been set for Jan. 6. The multimillion-dollar project involves widening the span over White River to accommodate

sidewalks on both sides and a new deck. Total cost is slightly over \$4.2 million, according to County Highway Director Brad Davis. This includes an "overlook" on the southside, lighting and other aesthetics. The city of Noblesville is paying for these extra improvements which amounts to upwards of a third of the total cost.

Since it is a major bridge, county government is responsible under state law and therefore the project's lead agency even though the bridge is within Noblesville city limits.

The project is designed to give safer access across the river especially for pedestrians going to and from the new Federal Hill Commons on State Road 19 between Logan and Conner streets.

Davis said the delay in completion was mostly due to the rainy spring weather which caused a high river level. Originally completion had been scheduled for summer or fall of this year.

# Worker killed while installing decorations on courthouse square

Last Tuesday, emergency personnel from the Noblesville Police Department, the Noblesville Fire Department and the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department responded to a report of an injured person in the 100 block of North 8th Street.

According to police, Ryan Scott Herring, 21, fell while installing holiday decorations on a city light pole. Herring was a contract worker from Winterland Inc., the company hired to install decorations around the courthouse square.

According to the Noblesville Police Department, several sheriff deputies working security at the Judicial Center, as well as several citizens, immediately began providing aid to Herring until paramedics arrived.

Herring was transported to Riverview Hospital where he was later pronounced dead.

A statement issued by the Noblesville Police Department last Wednesday indicated the investigation is ongoing and detectives are assisting the Hamilton County Coroner's Office.

# Carmel OKs increase in park fee on new homes, shelves 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade change

On Nov. 18, the Carmel City Council voted on a pair of controversial proposals. One passed and one did not.

The council voted unanimously to pass a park impact fee. It would impact people looking to build a new home in Carmel. Right now, the fee is \$2,972, but the fee will increase to \$4,882.

Supporters of the increase say as the population of Carmel grows, the new people moving to Carmel should contribute financially to the growth of the city and its parks. But, opponents of the ordinance said, the increase is just too much.

Council members said it's a one-time fee, not a tax increase for new home builders. The fee would only apply to new home development and not to someone looking to remodel or add on to their home.

The ordinance will go into effect in January and go until 2025.

The issue of saving spots on the street to watch Carmel's Fourth of July parade, which has elicited significant public discussion, was unanimously shot down by the council on Monday.

Council President Jeff Worrell, who sponsored the proposed ordinance, pulled it from the agenda after he said the land use committee put forth a negative recommendation. The proposal would've limited when people can stake out their spots ahead of the CarmelFest Parade.

Under the proposal, people could have reserved their spots for the parade at 6 a.m. the day before the event, rather than weeks in advance as they do now. The proposal was brought up after some com-

plained chairs and spot markers not only made for unsightly clutter but also caused damage to grass and irrigation systems around the city.

Worrell said, “Maybe I was just too close to it? But my colleagues did not feel a sense of that this is something government should get involved with. I get that! I mean, I don't want government where it shouldn't be. But, my theory was that when something gets out of control or gets out of hand, we step in and set some guidelines, set some rules, and I think people generally appreciate that.”

As for what's next, Worrell said he plans to do some more work on the ordinance, get more public feedback and perhaps make some tweaks before potentially bringing it back before the council.

# Noblesville Schools support staff to get substantial raises

Noblesville Schools announced Tuesday that after a competitive compensation assessment of over 20 area school districts, it will address significant pay gaps among support staff ranks with a salary increase.

The raises will average 6 percent, but could be considerably more for some groups such as custodians and school secretaries, who were found to be near the bottom in salary comparisons with other districts.

"When the community thinks of schools they think of teachers, but schools do not run with teachers

alone," said Associate Superintendent Dr. David Mundy. "Our support personnel are integral to the everyday functioning of our education system and like teachers, we're committed to ensuring they are paid competitively for the important roles they play."

Custodians, secretaries and other support staff like classroom instructional assistants, bus drivers, maintenance employees, food service staff, technology professionals and financial personnel make up more

than half of the district's over 1,500 employees.

The salary adjustment for support staff follows the recent announcement of the largest compensation increase for teachers in almost 40 years. With these changes, Noblesville teachers and support staff are more competitively placed relative to other area school districts. The district was able to make these adjustments thanks to the passage of the November 2018 referendum.

# Noblesville Police charge two with neglect of a dependent

On Nov. 12, police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to 713 Nelson Circle to assist medics with a possible cardiac arrest involving a four-year-old male.

Based on initial observations and apparent evidence at the scene, officers requested investigators from the Criminal Investigation Division as well as investigators from the Hamilton County Department of Child Services to assist.

The child was initially transported to Riverview Health and later to Riley Hospital for Children with life-threatening injuries.

At the conclusion of the investigation, investigators submitted their findings to the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office and arrest warrants were issued for two individuals believed to be involved in the case.

Elijah Marice Mills, 32, Noblesville, was charged with Neglect of a Dependent Causing Catastrophic Injuries/Death, a Level 1 Felony; and Battery, a Level 3 Felony.

Taylor Renee Abrams, 25, Noblesville, was charged with Neglect of a Dependent Causing Catastrophic Injuries/Death, a Level 1 Felony; and Failure to Make a Report, a Class B Misdemeanor.

# Carmel, Noblesville first fire departments in Indiana to require dementia training

First responders around the state, including firefighters, emergency medical technicians and police officers, are learning how to identify someone who may have dementia. They're learning how body language, maintaining eye contact and even the tone of their voice can help calm someone with dementia, especially in an emergency.

The first-of-its-kind training in the state is thanks to a partnership between the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS), Dementia Friends Indiana and CICOA Aging & In-Home Solutions.

The Carmel Fire Department was the first in the state to make Dementia Friends training mandatory. Noblesville recently also mandated its department take the online course and

also has become partners with Dementia Friends Indiana.

Noblesville Fire Department has been working the last couple of years with the Shepherd's Center of Hamilton County to improve care among the elderly population. When the Shepherd's Center suggested the De-

mentia Friends Indiana training, Fire Chief Greg Wyant jumped at the chance to bring the program to his department of about 135 firefighters and EMTs. They completed the training Nov. 1.

# Carmel growing in population, but not crime

There are many reasons that people move to the City of Carmel, but one of the main ones is that it's a very safe community. Crime rates are low in Carmel, and the amazing thing is as the city's population grows, the number of crimes isn't increasing at the same rate.

I recently attended a training session put on by the Carmel Police Department for the Carmel City Council and I was impressed by the numbers they shared.

Carmel's population

increased from more than 86,000 in 2014 to more than 96,000 in 2018. The incident rate for crimes remained fairly the same during that time though, with 85,948 incidents in 2014, 83,904 in 2015, 83,955 in 2016, 85,537 in 2017 and 83,708 in 2018.

You would expect that with population growing that we'd have more crime, but it's generally stayed about the same. So when you consider crime per capita – which is the number of incidents per person – we

are actually seeing crime decrease in Carmel.

And this is just considering residential population growing. We are seeing an influx of people coming into Carmel to work at the new businesses locating to the city and to frequent our stores and restaurants.

When you break down the numbers, there was one homicide in 2014 and zero in 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018.

Year-by-year robberies were six in 2014, six in 2015, seven in 2016, six in 2017 and 10 in 2018, so generally about the same. Most impressively, nearly all of the robberies in Carm-

el are cleared. The message is clear: If you rob a bank or retail store in Carmel, it's very likely you'll get caught.

Rapes, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle thefts fluctuated from year to year, but no major increases were seen and in most cases the numbers were the same or lower than they were five years later. So, despite our growth, the number of crimes is staying the same and our rate is going down.

Semi-state football

'Hounds beat Pirates to make state

**CARMEL** - Carmel football players know to be ready, because every Greyhound will eventually have his day.

And usually, more than one Greyhound has his day at the same time.

Dylan Downing got the Greyhounds on the board last Friday as Carmel hosted Merrillville in the Class 6A north semi-state. Gabe Quigley came in again as quarterback to throw a great game. The defense came through. Add it all up and Carmel was a winner over the Pirates, 38-17, giving the 'Hounds another semi-state championship and another trip to the state finals.

Carmel will play Center Grove Saturday in the 6A title game. This will be the Greyhounds' 16th appearance at state, a new record for most trips to the big game. Carmel also won its 13th semi-state championship and its 10th in the last 14 years.

The Greyhounds make it look easy, but coach John Hebert knows the truth.

"It's hard," said Hebert. "You just can't count on it happening. And this is the round right here that's tough, too. It's the semi-state, because every team in it is riding momentum and playing great. Merrillville, I mean, 11-1, they lost by one point to Valpo. That was a tough team to beat. We got some scores and that helped us bust it open a little bit. They're a better team than that score shows."

The game was scoreless for most of the first quarter. Carmel broke through with just under two minutes to go when Dylan Downing found an opening and rushed 51 yards

into the end zone. Spencer Hanna made the extra point kick.

"I was concerned about how points were going to be achieved, because we had the disruption to our lineup," said Hebert. "We've got to go through these things, it's late in the season to be going through that. But Dylan carried us there with that run. He made several guys miss and then he outran the guys that had the line on him. Big-time players make big-time plays and that's what he did."

The Pirates kicked a field goal early in the second quarter to get on the scoreboard. Carmel's lead stayed 7-3 for most of that period, but the 'Hounds added a quick 10 points in the last two minutes of the half.

Quigley found Colton Parker for a 33-yard touchdown pass with 1:57 remaining. Hanna made the extra point, then a few minutes later kicked a 43-yard field goal. Carmel now had a 17-3 halftime lead.

That lead ballooned to 38-3 after three quarters. Zach White punched the ball in from the one-yard line, Ty Wise took a fumble recovery 67 yards into the end zone, and Parker caught a second touchdown pass from Quigley, this one for 48 yards.

Quigley finished the game 8-of-11 for 123 yards. He has been filling in for injured Zach Osborne since the regional game, and has stepped up big time.

"We're really fortunate to have two quarterbacks like that," said Hebert. "He's been great for us."

"And I kept telling him, 'Your time is going to come,'" said Hebert. "'We're going

to need you. You're going to be somebody we're going to ride when we need you.' And he's done that. He got us through last week. He scored 14 points for us, led us through regional. And now a semi-state championship, so one more game to go."

Carmel's defense also had another strong performance, holding Merrillville to three points for most of the game. The Pirates scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, but the game had been decided by then.

"I can't say enough about how great our defense has been this year," said Hebert. "Just took to fight and not give in and not give anything easy to our opponents. We've leaned on it all year and hopefully it'll carry us all the year."
