It did not consider any other avenue of investigation of the office or personnel beyond those listed as it would have exceeded what was believed to be the jurisdictional scope allowed by the Judge's order assigning a Special Prosecutor.

Johnson knew heart disease ran in her family.

"I would make an effort to eat healthy and I came to Orangetheory three or four days a week," Johnson said.

But in April of this year, while at her regular 12 p.m. Orangetheory Fitness class, Johnson went into sudden cardiac arrest. She had just finished a 12-minute segment on the treadmill. It's a workout hospital where she later un- AEDs into rural areas.

An AED is a portable device used to help people who go into sudden cardiac arrest.

"Think of it like a battery, it jumpstarts the heart back into rhythm," said Pierre Twer, the president for Bolt for the Heart.

Huskies win emotional opener in OT

The Huskies opened their season Wednesday by hosting Lebanon in an emotional game in front of a packed crowd. Heights went back-and-forth with the Tigers for the entire 32 minutes, then fore a Lebanon basket finished the quarter an extra four minutes of overtime before Hudson Hochstedler's putback at the buzzer secured a 71-69 victory for the Huskies.

Everyone knew it would be an emotional game. Heights was playing its first game without Tony Etchison in the stands, after he lost his life in a farming accident last month. Etchison's son Gus, now a junior, is one of the stars on the Huskies' team.

"I knew it was going to be very hard for him, just to get that first one out of the way," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "I think the second one will be hard, too. It's just been tough for him. But he's been grinding, and he's got great support and our community's been good. We're going to keep plugging away and be there for him."

Gus' teammates were there for him, including at the end of the game. Etchison had already scored 41 points, and with the score tied at 69-69, was driving in with seconds left to hopefully put in the game winner.

Etchison drove in and put up a jumper that went off the left side of the rim. But Hochstedler came rushing in to grab the rebound, and put the ball back up. It swished through the net as the clock ran out to 0.0.
