Fishers State Rep. Todd Huston chosen as next House Speaker

Indiana House Republicans met on Monday at the Statehouse and selected State Rep. Todd Huston (R-Fishers) to serve as the next House Speaker.

House Speaker Brian C. Bosma (R-Indianapolis) recently announced his plans to not seek re-election and retire after the 2020 legislative session. To smooth the transition, House Republicans gathered on Monday and chose Huston to serve as Speaker-elect. He will work closely with Bosma during the upcoming short session and is expected to be sworn in as House Speaker by the full House as the session

"I'm incredibly grateful for the support from our caucus and the tremendous opportunity to serve in this new leadership role," Huston said. "Indiana's economic strength is largely rooted in strong, conservative leadership, and I'm honored to work alongside Speaker Bosma during his final legislative session and help continue our state's momentum."

First elected in 2012, Huston represents House District 37, which includes Fishers and a portion of Hamilton County. Bosma announced that Huston will no longer serve as co-chair of the House Ways and Means Committee, but he will remain a member of the committee. Huston authored the state's structurally balanced budget (HEA 1001), which included a historic investment in education funding with \$763 million in new money for K-12.



ticket. Non-discretionary offenses include felonies, misdemeanors, and driving while suspended offenses. Non-discretionary offenses that were not removed from the data used for the story include alcohol, drug, and driver's license offenses. Non-discretionary offenses are not what most people consider a traffic ticket.

Officers are allowed latitude when making the decision to issue tickets for minor offenses including, but not limited to, speeding, stop sign and equipment violations. These types of offenses are considered discretionary offenses. In 2018, 4,737 individuals were issued tickets for discretionary offenses by the Carmel Police Department. Of those individuals, 3,428 were white (72.4 percent), 967 were African American (20.4 percent), and 342 were listed as other race (7.2 percent).

The conclusions failed to account for people who were cited for multiple violations during a single enforcement event. For example, if an officer cited a driver for driving while suspended and speeding during a single enforcement event, each violation was counted as a separate person.

The data used for the story included only violations of Indiana Code. The data did not include city ordinance violations, which make up a significant portion of enforcement events. Many city ordinance violations are traffic related and are considered discretionary. In 2018, 15.3 percent of all tickets written were for violations of city ordinance.

Population demographic data from the 2018 American Community Survey (ACS) by the United States Census Bureau differs drastically from data presented by the reporter during the news story. The ACS showed that Carmel residents that reported their race alone or in combination with "Black or African American" was 5.3 percent of the total population. Further, the daytime working "Black or African American" population of Carmel was 11.7 percent. The ACS only accounts for resident and daytime working populations. Additionally, the news story failed to consider any data regarding visitors and travelers. Carmel has multiple major travel corridors, including Interstate 465, U.S. 31, U.S. 421, and Keystone Parkway. These roadways accommodate tens of thousands of vehicles daily. Visitors may go to one of the many medical, office, hospitality, or retail destinations throughout the city. To accurately characterize a traveling population, a traffic study would be necessary.

The Carmel Police Department takes numerous measures to be as transparent as possible. The Department is accredited by the Commission on the Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). Part of that transparency is that we are one of few agencies in Central Indiana that document every traffic stop whether it results in a citation or warning. This documentation includes race, gender and age.

The Department has used in-car video cameras for more than 20 years. Also, on March 1, 2019, officers began wearing on the happy to others with creative and body-worn cameras that are integrated with the in-car cameras, but can also be used independently from the in-car camera system if the officer is away from their vehicle. Video recordings are randomly reviewed by supervisors as part of their ongoing evaluations of officers' activities.

The Department has a policy that prohibits biased-based policing and discriminatory practices. Complaints regarding bias-based policing or discriminatory practice are reviewed by the Deputy Chief of Staff.

The Carmel Police Department is committed to excellence in everything we do. We perform our sworn duties ethically, maintaining respect for individual rights, human dignity, cultural diversity and community values. We will continue to implement and follow policies related to best practices in the field of law enforcement, provide the best training possible, and utilize technology to increase transparency and efficiency.





Doctor praises Congress for work on new obesity bill

To see just how many people are affected by the obesity epidemic, take a look at the numbers.

The World Health Organization states that worldwide obesity has nearly tripled since 1975. In 2016, more than 1.9 billion adults, 18 these, over 650 million were obese.

Right here in our own country, the Centers for Diseases Control and Prevention (CDC) estimate that over 93 million American adults are considered obese, while the rates for children and adolescents aged 2 to 19 is equally bleak with 13.7 million considered obese. The statistics Washington avoid addressing issues in Indiana are no better – a third of Hoosiers are considered obese, and two-thirds are considered overweight.

Why does this matter? Because today we know that obesity is closely associated with increased risk of disease such as heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure and even certain types of cancer. Stopping the obesity epidemic would mean saving lives and living longer, healthier lives.

Obesity is taking a serious toll on our nation in other ways as well. Obesity is a public health crisis that strains our nation's economy. The CDC estimates that the annual cost of obesity in the United States is a staggering \$147 billion, with obese patients accruing almost \$1,400 more in health care costs than Ameri-

cans with a healthy weight. Medicare It also expands benefits to include and Medicaid patients specifically behavioral counseling from qualicost \$61.8 billion per year! In Indiana, those costs in healthcare and lost productivity are estimated at \$8.5 billion per year, according to the Richard H. Fairbanks Foundation.

The longer a person is obese, the more significant these factors become and so the prevention and treatment of this condition is extremely important.

The Treat and Reduce Obesity Act (TROA) of 2019 was introduced into the 116th Congress by a bipartisan group of Representatives and Senators, and now includes Indiana's own Rep. Susan Brooks and Sen. Todd Young as cosponsors. To date, the bill has acquired over 100 bipartisan cosponsors in the House and 13 bipartisan cosponsors in the Senate. we need more of in Washington.

The bill takes on the obesity problem in America by providing the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) with the authority to


As our population ages, it is imperative that we look into long term, permanent health care solutions such as this common-sense legislation because the benefits would be significant. First, seniors who have faithfully paid into the system would directly benefit from necessary care and treatment, thereby reducing the risk of experiencing other serious obesity-related diseases. Secondly, the bill will save taxpayer money in the long run.

By investing in preventive care, we will see a cost reduction which is critically important as Medicare faces insolvency by 2026 – three years earlier than expected.

Ultimately, this bill is about ensuring our seniors have access to the quality health care they need and we urge members of Congress to join in this bipartisan effort to solve a real problem, facing real Americans.

Wimmer retires as Fishers head football coach

Rick Wimmer is retiring as the head football coach at Fishers High School.

Wimmer told his players about his retirement Monday afternoon, and news spread outside of the high school soon after. Wimmer had coached the Tigers since the school re-opened in 2006.

"I just felt like it was the right time," said Wimmer, who was already a highly-accomplished coach by the time he came to Fishers. But just by getting the opportunity to start the program, that gave Wimmer the chance to fulfill a dream.

'That was one of the things that was most attractive about the job. I was one of those guys that always dreamed of starting a football program," said Wimmer.

Fishers quickly became a force in Indiana high school football. The Tigers played their first varsity season in 2006 without any seniors, and finished the regular season 0-9. "We were in a couple games and had chances," said Wimmer.

But Fishers got its first-ever win in that year's sectional, beating Kokomo 33-7. The very next season (2007), the Tigers picked up their first Hoosier Crossroads Conference win, and Fishers won the first me," said Wimmer. He plans to stay on of its four HCC championships in 2009.

"Our first conference championship in 2009 was certainly a high point," said Wimmer. The Tigers also won HCC titles in 2010, 2013 and 2017.

The biggest title of all came in 2010, when Fishers won the Class 5A state championship. The Tigers beat Lawrence Central 38-19 in that game. It made Wimmer only the fourth coach in Indiana high school football history to win state championships at two different schools.

Overall, Wimmer compiled a record of 99-61 at Fishers. In addition to their 2010 state title run, the Tigers also won sectional championships in 2013 and

Wimmer's first state title came in 1987, during his fifth year as the coach at Zionsville. Wimmer got his head coaching start with the Eagles in 1983, after five seasons of being an assistant coach at Rushville. At Zionsville, Wimmer went 44-12 and coached teams that won three Rangeline Conference and two sectional titles, plus had three undefeated regular seasons.

Wimmer also had nine-season stops at Merrillville (1988-96) and Greenwood (1997-2005). At both schools, Wimmer's teams won two conference championships and at least one sectional title, and he also won a regional title at Merrillville in 1992. Wimmer's overall coaching record is 263-144.

Prior to coming to Fishers, Wimmer noted that he had never been at any school longer than nine years.

"Obviously this was a good place for as a physical education teacher at Fishers High School.

"Coach Wimmer ends his 37th year of guiding student-athletes through the lessons of leadership, perseverance, and teamwork," said Fishers athletic director Rob Seymour. "Fishers HS would like to thank Coach Wimmer for his commitment to the Tigers and his passion for the game of football."

In addition to the victories and championships, Wimmer is also happy to see


