Westfield Police Department to add AEDs to patrol cars

The Westfield Police Department (WPD) and Bolt for the Heart, a local nonprofit organization, have announced the addition of automated external defibrillators (AEDs) to WPD patrol cars. AEDs provide an electrical shock to the heart in the event of a sudden cardiac arrest.

"We know that every minute matters in the event of sudden cardiac arrest," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. "The addition of

AEDs in patrol cars will allow our law enforcement officers the ability to act as soon as they arrive on scene of a sudden cardiac arrest, which could be the difference between life and death. The City of Westfield and its residents are so thankful for this generous donation."

Hamilton Heights School Corporation celebrated the completion of the North Wing Addition to the Hamilton Heights Primary building at a special ribbon cutting ceremony Tuesday evening. The event drew in members of the community, school board, past and present, school personnel, some of northern Hamilton County's finest first responders, and representatives from W.R. Dunkin and krM Architecture, who have been involved with all phases of the project from the beginning.

The new 14,605 square-foot addition features new and enhanced amenities, including an extensive glass atrium with moveable glass and tackable walls. The bright, agile learning environment and flexible classroom walls create dynamic and engaging spaces for pre-school students to learn, play, and grow.

Julie Griffey, Hamilton Heights Primary and Elementary Schools Principal, shared her gratitude to all those involved for helping to bring this project to reality. "This is a beautiful space that will serve our students for many years to come."

The addition is home to the Little Husky Learning Center (LHLC), a private preschool within Hamilton Heights School Corporation, providing curriculum for children ages 3, 4, and

5 in multi-age classrooms and its Before and After School program. In addition, the wing is also home to the early childhood (ages 3 to 5) and life skills classrooms (EC to 4).

“This is a tremendous initiative by the Westfield Police Department and we are honored to be able to help them become 100% RESCUE READY,” said Pierre Twer, President of Bolt for the Heart. “It shows you how Westfield leaders are committed to keeping citizens safe as law enforcement is usually the first to the scene. No one loses in this type of effort because it will save lives.”

Bolt for the Heart is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization dedicated to providing law enforcement with life-saving AEDs. The organization has donated over 800 AEDs in Central Indiana to date, including 465 to the Indiana State Police and now 45 to the Westfield Police Department with support from IU Health and Performance Services. Last month, the Westfield Fire Department launched the PulsePoint technology in the city. It is a free emergency response app that allows anyone with a smart phone, who is trained in CPR, to register as a certified citizen responder. Then, if there is a cardiac emergency in a public place nearby, you will be notified. PulsePoint also has the locations of the nearest AEDs embedded in the technology. It is planned that the AEDs located in Westfield Police patrol cars will be tied to the PulsePoint.

Make use of Safe Exchange Zone at Sheriff's Office

As the holiday season approaches, don't forget the Sheriff's Office is a "Safe Exchange Zone." With the increase in internet arranged transactions, as well as child custody exchanges and other events where different parties may need to meet, it is important to have a safe location for area residents to connect.

The Safe Exchange Zone is located at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office complex, 18100 Cumberland Road, Noblesville. Two parking spaces located near the main entrance are reserved for the Safe Exchange Zone. The area is well-lit at night and is covered by 24-

hour video surveillance.

The idea behind the Safe Exchange Zone is to cut down on potential fraud and robberies that can be associated with these types of transactions. People can use the zone to meet and sell their goods with less fear of a quick or violent rip-off. Child custody exchanges can also be completed in the Safe Exchange Zone.

While the spaces are available on agency grounds, Sheriff's Office deputies do not participate or act as official witnesses in the transactions but can be dispatched to keep the peace, prevent disorderly conduct, or for criminal offenses.

A Safe Exchange Zone is also available in the main lobby of the Sheriff's Office for those needing an indoor location. The lobby is open around the clock.

Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind when conducting such transactions:

- Only do transactions with local buyers/sellers.
- Do not go to a transaction alone.
- Make sure a friend or family member is aware of the transaction details.
- Insist on meeting in a public area like the Sheriff's Office Safe Exchange Zone.
- Do not go into someone else's house, and do not allow them into yours.
- Complete the transaction during daylight hours if possible.

• Be extra cautious when buying or selling valuable items such as vehicles and jewelry.

• Only use cash or money orders to complete your transactions.

• Trust your instincts, if it sounds like a scam it probably is.

• If someone is not willing to come to the Sheriff's Office to conduct a transaction, this would be a sign to beware and possibly rethink the meeting.

Sheridan CrossRoads kids need your help

Dear Editor,

There is a little organization in Sheridan that makes a bigger impact on the community than most people realize, and if people in Hamilton County do not step up to help them financially soon, they will disappear.

Sheridan CrossRoads Student Center is a faith-based community outreach organization that offers local kids a variety of positive ways to spend their time. They show a movie each week, offer a community dinner free of charge that is prepared and served by the kids, help anyone who needs it with yard work or anything else the elderly may need, visit local assisted living facilities, and most important of all, they offer a hot meal to any local kid who wants it in the evening four nights each week.

They do all this on a shoestring budget and with very limited community support.

In fact, they do it in the face of a few individuals in the community who think CrossRoads is a waste of time because they either do not believe there is need or they don't appreciate that need being met by someone who did not grow up in Sheridan.

But nearly every one of the roughly 50 young people they serve come from homes all too familiar with drug abuse and crime.

They have been featured on both WISH-TV Channel 8 and Fox 59 in recent months for the work they do – and the resources they need to stay open to help these young people. They even produce a portion of The Reporter's weekly events, news and weather video with Mr. Weatherman, Paul Potect.

Invest in your family and your community

Why do you invest? For many people, here's the answer: "I invest because I want to enjoy a comfortable retirement." And that's certainly a great reason, because all of us should

school, so if your original beneficiary chooses not to pursue some type of higher education, you can name a different eligible beneficiary.

Another way to invest in your family is to help your adult children avoid feeling obligated to provide financial assistance to you. For example, if you ever required some type of long-term care, such as an extended stay in a nursing home, could you afford it? The average cost for a private room in a nursing home is more than \$100,000 per year, according to a study by Genworth, an insurance company. And Medicare typically pays very few of these expenses. So, to avoid burdening your adult children — while also preserving your own financial independence — you may want to consider some type of long-term care insurance. 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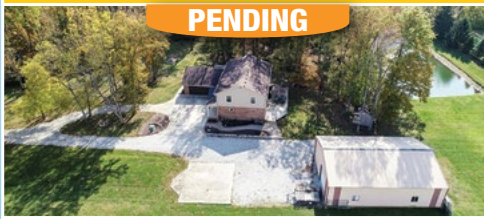

Tigers win hard-fought HCC opener over Millers

The first weekend of Hoosier Cross-roads Conference games saw some hard-fought contests, including one at the Tiger Den.

Fishers hosted Noblesville on Friday, and it was a fun battle between the two county rivals. The Millers stayed with the Tigers for the entire game before Fishers hung on for a 59-51 victory.

“The fun thing about this league is, you get all kinds of different and teams and great coaches,” said Tigers coach Matt Moore. “And tonight was the first step up for us to be where we need to be. You just got to take care of business. You got to win your home games and you got to steal some on the road.”

Fishers led 15-10 after the first quarter, with five different players scoring at least two points in that period. Alex Szilagyi had five points. Noblesville’s Alex Hunt also had five points in that quarter.

The Millers jumped ahead 18-17 early in the second period, but the Tigers reclaimed a 28-25 lead by halftime. Jordan Gadis had a great quarter for Noblesville with eight points, while Preston Roberts added seven. Meanwhile, Fishers’ Jeffrey Simmons was playing well under the basket, with six points.

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

Out of a timeout, Rose drove into the paint, then bounced a pass back to Griffin at the top of the key. Griffin drained the triple to give the Pistons a 104-101 lead with 41.4 seconds remaining.

After another timeout, the Pacers ran a give-and-go with Malcolm Brogdon and Domantas Sabonis off the inbound, but Brogdon lost the ball out of bounds while trying to drive past Andre Drummond. On the other end, Rose drilled a one-handed runner to make it a five-point game with 18.4 seconds to play.

After T.J. Warren missed a three and Sabonis missed the putback, the Pistons got a runout, allowing Langston Galloway to seal the game with an uncontested layup.

"We didn't execute," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said after the loss. "We didn't get stops when we needed to. When we did force a miss, they got the offensive rebound, and then offensively, we turned the ball over."

Griffin scored 25 points and Drummond added 25 points and 22 rebounds as Detroit snapped Indiana's two-game road winning streak.

Warren led all scorers with 26 points in the loss on 11-of-18 shooting.

The Pistons got off to a fast start on Friday night. Griffin scored five points as Detroit opened the game with seven unanswered points. Sharpshooter Luke Kennard then took over, scoring 11 points — hitting two 3-pointers and making three free throws after being fouled on another 3-point attempt — to help the hosts take a 32-19 lead after the first quarter.

The Blue & Gold fought back, opening the second quarter with a 17-6 run, climbing within two points of the lead on Sabonis' layup with 6:54 left in the first half.

But Griffin scored six more points as Detroit answered with another 8-0 run to retake control. The Pistons extended their advantage to as many as 13 points and took an 11-point lead into the break.

The Pacers flipped the script after halftime, opening the third quarter with a 12-4 run, featuring 3-pointers by Brogdon and Jeremy Lamb and capped by a fastbreak dunk from Warren.

Indiana eventually moved in front for the first time after Warren scored six straight points to give the visitors a 68-66 advantage with 4:45 remaining in the frame. Detroit briefly tied the game on Rose's layup 13 seconds later, but Brogdon's jumper at the 3:47 put the Pacers back in front.

Defensively, the Pacers locked down in the third quarter, as they held the Pistons to just 16 points in the

frame and took a 75-71 lead into the fourth.

The Pistons clawed back in the final frame, taking an 86-84 lead on Christian Wood's 3-pointer with 7:28 remaining. Indiana moved back in front on Myles Turner's three-point play 15 seconds later, the start of a 7-0 Pacers run. Detroit then responded with seven unanswered points of their own, retaking the lead on Andre Drummond's layup with 4:35 to play.

The two teams passed the lead back in forth multiple times over the next couple minutes and entered the final two minutes tied at 97.

Bruce Brown's jumper with 1:55 left in the contest gave the hosts a two-point lead. Brogdon and Sabonis each hit one of two free throws on back-to-back possessions to tie the game at 99. Rose and Warren then traded jumpers as the clock dipped under one minute with the score tied at 101.

Brogdon finished with 21 points, five rebounds, and five assists for Indiana. Sabonis recorded another double-double, tallying 18 points, 13 boards, and five assists. Jeremy Lamb (12 points, five rebounds, and four assists) and Doug McDermott (10 points and four boards) also finished in double figures.

Rose had 14 points, six rebounds, and five assists off the bench for Detroit. Kennard finished with 15 points and four assists.

Indiana closes out a five-game road trip on Saturday night, when they visit the New York Knicks on the second night of a back-to-back. The Knicks added some intrigue to that matchup on Friday when they fired second-year head coach David Fizdale.
