Westfield student earns full-ride to Notre Dame

Mahamat Djour, a Westfield High School (WHS) senior, was selected for a full four-year scholarship to the University of Notre Dame through the Quest-Bridge National College Match program.

Students apply to the program to potentially be matched to one of 40 highly selective universities around the country. Students can list up to 12 universities on their end (Ma-

hamat listed three), then the colleges each choose the students they are interested in, and possible matches are made.

Out of 14,926 applicants, only 1,127 students were chosen to receive this scholarship.

Mahamat is the oldest of eight children and is from Chad. He is involved in WHS Executive Government, Dance Marathon, Speech and Debate, Cross Country (he earned a semi-

state invite this year), Track, DECA, National Honor Society, Spanish National Honor Society and he tutors in math, science and Spanish through his own program called "Mahamat's Classroom."

At Notre Dame, he will major in Global Affairs, Political Science and Economics. In fact, he wrote his college essay about his future studies in Global Affairs without knowing that he will be taking part in the

inaugural Global Affairs program at Notre Dame.

He hopes to minor in Arabic, French and/or Spanish. He has been able to take advantage of and earn credits in many of the AP classes at WHS, which will free up his college course load for study abroad in Spain, Italy and/or France.

His future goal is to return to Chad and become the President with the priority of ridding the country of corruption in the government.

Boutique hotel planned for downtown Fishers

When Browning Investments first announced the construction of a large complex along 116th Street in the heart of the Nickel Plate District in downtown Fishers, there

was an expectation that a hotel would be included in that development, along with the headquarters of First Internet Bank.

Browning, Dora Hotels and Fishers city officials announced Wednesday a five-story, 116-room high-end, boutique hotel to be located in the city's downtown Nickel Plate District. The Hotel Nickel Plate, a Tapestry Collection by Hilton

hotel, will feature a full-service restaurant on the first floor and Nickel Plate Trail access.

The city news release describes a design centered on the history of the Nickel Plate Railroad in Fishers.

"Downtown Fishers is quickly becoming the heart of our community, showcasing the vibrancy of the community alongside growing and entrepreneurial com-

panies," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "Hotel Nickel Plate will create another iconic destination downtown where residents, visitors, businesses and more come together to enjoy all that downtown and the Nickel Plate Trail has to offer. We're grateful to Browning and Dora Hotel Company for bringing our vision to light."

Noblesville Fire launches senior outreach program

The Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) announced it is collaborating with the Shepherd's Center of Hamilton County (SCHC) to launch a new service for the citizens of Noblesville.

The Noblesville Senior Outreach Program is designed to help provide certain in-home services that

senior citizens need. The program is voluntary, free of charge, and is customizable to the needs and desires of the citizen, and can include: NFD personnel performing a safety inspection of the home to check for fire and health hazards specifically targeting slip and trip hazards, checking and replacing smoke detector batteries, installing replace-

ment smoke detectors or carbon monoxide detectors if needed, and installing exterior key lockboxes. If further services are requested, NFD can connect citizens with the Shepherd's Center of Hamilton County.

According to the SCHC website, "Shepherd's Center of Hamilton County provides programs to promote and support inde-

pendent lifestyles for seniors in Hamilton County. Our vision is to be known throughout Hamilton County as a trusted resource for connecting seniors with beneficial programs to support their independence. Through our programs, seniors have the opportunity to connect with services or

Comprehensive plan update set for 2020

Roundabouts on 146th Street?

The Hamilton County Commissioners have approved an overall updating of the county's Comprehensive Plan beginning in January. The last update was undertaken in the 1990s.

Innovative Planning of Carmel will do the work, which includes the county-wide thoroughfare plan. The remainder of the update is confined to the areas of county planning jurisdiction outside the territory covered by municipalities.

The study and recommended changes will be underway for most of the year 2020 with public hearings to be scheduled in the county's various communities. Cost of the project is \$139,000 with a "not to exceed" limit of \$150,000 should officials want additional information, according to planning director Chuck Kiphart.

In other matters at Monday's commissioners' meet-

ing, Steve Dillinger reported work is continuing on studies aimed at resolving traffic congestion at three intersections along 146th Street. He said experts are looking at the possibility of roundabouts or other modifications to allow smoother traffic flow at U.S. 31, Gray Road and Carey Road intersections with 146th.

Commissioners also passed on second reading of an ordinance governing non-authorized signs in highway right-of-ways. The ordinance is an attempt to get consistent rules throughout the county. Cities and towns are being consulted in the effort to get that consistency.

And, commissioners approved a supplemental agreement with USI Engineers for their continuing work on plans for a Pleasant Street bridge over White River. Commissioners have been told the City of

in one of ICPYAS prevention programs.

Noblesville wants to proceed as soon as possible with widening of Pleasant Street which, with the bridge, will create a bypass of the city business district. Noblesville is applying for federal highway funds. Dillinger estimates construction is about two years away.

Finally, commissioners approved renewal of a contract with the Town of Atlanta for police protection. The county sheriff’s department has provided the service in recent years after Atlanta, with a population of only about 800, found it too expensive to operate its own police department.

The development of the hotel is the result of a project agreement that included the transfer of land for development and construction of the luxury hotel. The agreement was approved in December 2018.

The Fishers City Council will consider incentives to the developer for the construction of the hotel during its December 2019 meeting. The City of Fishers is proposing a waiver of impact and permitting fees and \$2.1

million from the existing downtown Tax Increment Financing (TIF) fund as its incentives to the project. Browning and Dora Hotel Company will commit to an 85 percent minimum taxpayer agreement for 25 years.

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Noblesville F.O.P. Lodge No. 198 holds Shop with a Cop

The 22nd annual Shop with a Cop program, led by the Noblesville Fraternal Order of Police Lodge No. 198, was held Saturday, Dec. 7 at the Noblesville Meijer store, 17000 Mercantile Blvd. This program provides underprivileged children in Noblesville and Noblesville Township with warm clothing to help them get through the winter months.

NPD Deputy Chief Jon Williams, who has coordinated the program every year since it began, said the Shop with a Cop participants – infants to 16-year-olds – come from a holiday assistance list given to the Noblesville F.O.P. by Nancy Chance of Good Samaritan Network, or from recommendations of police officers. This year, the event assisted 19 families and 66 children.

“It’s an opportunity to see in real time a positive impact in our community,” said Williams. “All of our officers have been called to negative situations. As police officers, our goal is to make the world a better place. At Shop with a Cop, we can see on the faces of families that officers are making a difference that lasts a lot longer than this singular event.”

The children selected to participate in the program went shopping with their parent/guardian as well as uniformed Noblesville police officers and their family members to pick out winter clothes including coats, gloves, shirts, pants, boots, underwear and pajamas. Because the event is held before the holidays, each child is given the opportunity to select a toy as well.

James Aloisio. “It’s also been great for our families to help us shop and see us interact with the public. So many shoppers have come up and thanked us for our service. to other individuals that will help enrich independent lifestyles.”


NFD Fire Chief Greg Wyant added, “Statistically, roughly 10 percent of our call volume comes from slips, trips and falls. Of those falls, approximately 75 percent are from residents 55 and older. NFD began developing this program several months ago

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Duke Energy increases energy assistance funds

Duke Energy has increased its winter assistance funding for qualifying Indiana customers who may struggle to pay their winter energy bills.

The company is contributing \$650,000 for low-income customer energy assistance through its Helping Hand program this year. In addition, Duke Energy Indiana customers and employees have contributed more than \$96,000 through November, and more is expected in December, raising this year's total energy assistance to approximately \$750,000. A portion of the company's funding is the result of an agreement with the Indiana Office of Utility Consumer Counselor.

"We know the winter months can be a hardship for some, and each year our shareholders and customers contribute to help families and individuals who may be struggling to pay their winter energy bills," said Duke Energy Indiana President Stan Pinegar.

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
