Fishers Council delays vote on rezoning proposal

The Fishers City Council was clearly split on a rezone of about five acres of land just east of State Road 37 near 141st Street Monday night, but the council, at the request of the petition-

er, decided to delay action on the request.

The Woods of Britton Apartment complex was eyeing the five acres adjacent to the development for expansion, constructing more apartment buildings. The Woods of Britton currently contains 500 apartment units.

Councilor Todd Zimmerman first came

Councilor Todd Zimmerman first came out against the proposal, saying Fishers has only one chance to develop the State Road 37 corridor commercially. His fellow council members Cecilia Coble, Eric Moeller and Selina Stoller all voiced their opposition to the rezone request.

With four "no" votes on the record before the final vote (five votes would defeat the proposal), Attorney Steve Hardin, representing the owners of Woods of Britton, suggested his client would be willing to withdraw the proposed rezoning, as council members mull over the issue, delaying consideration.

The council then voted 9-0 to continue consideration of the rezoning.

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


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

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Donald Scott Havens

Donald Scott Havens, 74, passed away on December 13, 2019, from complications of



Crohn's disease. He passed peacefully surrounded by his loving fam-

ily at the Richard L. Roudebush VA Medical Center in Indianapolis. Don was born July 29, 1945, in Elwood, to Alfred and Dorothy (Traylor) Havens. He grew up in Tipton and his leadership skills started early in life, serving as Tipton High School's class President all

four years. He graduated from Tipton High School in 1963 and furthered his education at Indiana University in Bloomington. In 1965, Don became a reporter and editor for the Kokomo Morning Times, a position he held until 1967. A Vietnam Veteran, he was called into service for the United States Army in 1967. He was honorably discharged in 1969. His training and experiences in the military helped prepare him for the next four decades of leadership roles in the public

Don returned to Tipton and was a manager with Anixter Brothers, a wire manufacturing company in Tipton. In 1975, Don started Ha-

vens Realty, where he was at the helm for over 45 years, continuing to grow the business and further strengthen the local community. He was a founding member of the Tipton Economic Development Corporation, a group created to help strengthen and develop the Tipton business community.

Don spent a total of 20 years in elected office, never losing an election. He served 12 years on the Tipton Utility Service Board. His service record over 12 years as a member of the Tipton City Council solidified his reputation as an outstanding civic leader.

Later in his career, Don was elected to two consecutive four-year terms as Mayor of Tipton, first in 2011 and again in 2015. His experience and leadership as mayor helped guide the continued success of Tipton's economy. For example, working together with fellow city and state leaders, Mayor Don attracted Chrysler FCA to bring operations to Tipton County, a massive investment in the county. Also, Mayor Don was instrumental in the creation of the Tipton Main Street Association, a volunteer organization working to beautify and build a better city. Recent projects have focused on the beautification of the downtown area, with landscaping and flower planting transforming downtown Tipton into a vibrant and exciting center for public gatherings. The Alley project, for example, revamped an empty downtown alley into an engaging gathering place for the residents and visitors to come and enjoy the heart of the city. Additionally, a new irrigation system at the municipal golf course, a splash pad and major renovations to the pubic pool have enhanced the city assets and improved Tipton's "Quality of Place" for the community.

For over four decades, Don consistently served Tipton's best interests, as a member of the Utility Service Board, the City Council, and as Mayor. His career record in government proved him to be an honest, ethical and transformative public servant who positively impacted the citizens of Tipton.

Don loved his family, friends, community and country. Don's pastime pleasures included golf, six-handed hearts, fishing on the French River, reading books, the daily WSJ, watching the news and kibitzing. Don was known for his eloquent writing and speaking abilities, able to clearly and persuasively express himself while remaining polite and respectful.

Don is survived by his wife, Tami Brown; children, Alison Havens and Josh (Marisa) Havens; stepsons, Robert (Tiare) Brown and Patrick Brown; grandchildren, Preston, Levi and Maxwell Allen and Jack Brown, with two more grandchildren expected in February

Covely; and a niece and three nephews. Don is also survived by his first wife, Lisa Havens (Will Case).

He and his wife Sue loved to entertain and their homes were generously open to friends and family 365 days a year. For 40 years, they hosted an annual pig roast for their cherished group of friends affectionately named, "The Piggers." Herb and Sue split their time between Carmel and Fort Walton, Fla., where they continued their tradition of sharing their home with all whom they knew.

Herb lived every day to the fullest, never took anything for granted, and was always thinking of others. As a family we will miss him forever, but hope to carry on his legacy and live by his example.



Noblesville hires Dave Sharpe as head football coach

A young coach is ready to take the Noblesville football team back to the old school. Dave Sharpe was hired as the Millers new head football coach Tuesday during the Noblesville Schools' regular board meeting. Sharpe's tenure as coach officially begins in January, but he is already preparing for the new job, and was talking with some of his future players minutes after his hiring was made official.

"It's a big small town," said Sharpe. "And I like that in a school. It's one big high school right in the middle of the community."

Sharpe spent the 2019 season at Hamilton Southeastern, where he served as the team's defensive coordinator. As a result, he has first-hand knowledge of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference, which he said "is as good a conference as there is in the entire Midwest, so we're going to play some great competition."

"There's no bad teams," said Sharpe. "Every week anybody can beat anybody. The rosters are so big, everybody's too platooned. It's a level playing field for most schools in the league.'

"Coach Sharpe has a great football pedigree and 14 years of strong, successful coaching experience," said NHS Athletic Director Leah Wooldridge. "He knows we've been a team in transition and he's committed to bringing stability and leadership to build our program. His focus on kids and his great football mind will be huge assets. I'm excited to see what we can accomplish together moving forward."

Sharpe's football pedigree comes from Jimtown, as he is the son of legendary Jimmies coach Bill Sharpe, who compiled a 288-54 record in 28 seasons (1980-2007) and four state championships (1991, 1997, 1998 and 2005). Dave Sharpe graduated from Jimtown in 2000, then attended Purdue University, graduating from there in 2004 with an education degree. He will teach physical education at Noblesville High School.

Dave Sharpe began his career as an assistant for the Jimmies, first under his father, then for current coach Michael Campbell, who took over in 2008 after Bill Sharpe retired. Dave Sharpe's first head coaching job was at John Glenn, where he went 13-9 in two seasons.

In 2015, Sharpe became the head coach at La Porte – another "big small town." In four seasons with the Slicers, Sharpe compiled a 26-17 record, including a Duneland Conference championship in 2016.

"My vision for Noblesville is to be the polar opposite offensively," said Sharpe. "We're going to go incredibly old-school. We're going to go double tights. We're going to go a full house T offense, and we want to be the oddball in the league. With everybody going to a full spread offense, we're going to give opponents something that they only get to prepare for once a year."

Sharpe said his plans for the next couple weeks include getting to know his players and to "continue to evaluate the kids from the game films that I just inherited." His top priority is to hire a coaching staff. "And then just setting the groundwork of what we envision the program with going forward," he said.




