Austin Mace, a Noblesville native now living Austin, Texas, was recently honored to be named to Forbes Magazine as a recipient of their "30 Under 30" for 2020.

Mace and his business co-founder, Ryan Thomas, were honored in the Marketing and Advertising category.

Mace was raised in Noblesville and graduated from Noblesville High School in 2011. He continued his education at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, graduating with honors in 2015. He then moved to

Austin, where he and his business partner started Subvrsive, a company focusing at first on virtual reality applications before expanding out into other fields such as augmented reality. They now work with many major clients, many of whom are Fortune 500 companies.

Mace has acquired a list of honors, among them Eagle Scout,

Jan. 8 filing date kicks off election year

There are probably very few folks who don't know that next year is a big election year, with offices from precinct committeeman to President of the United States at stake. And, the process starts Jan.

8 when filing for office begins here in

Indiana.



In Hamilton County, voters will select from dozens of candidates who file for the all-important primary election to be held May 5. Besides president, the offices of congressman, governor, state legislators, judges, two county commissioners, and several other county offices will be up for election. Winners in the party primaries will, of course, compete in the November general election.

There are questions to be answered by the election:

Will Hamilton County help elect a new congressman or congresswoman who lives in our county? Both Republican and Democratic primaries are expected to feature several congressional candidates because the 5th District, in which Hamilton County is located, has an open seat with Rep. Susan Brooks' decision to retire.

Will Democrats win any local offices or will President Trump lead another statewide landslide like 2016 that carried many Republicans into office? Democrats won three city council seats locally in November. But, these wins came in relatively confined areas whereas next year's election will involve mostly races that are countywide.

And, what will the issues be in the coming election? Certainly for state legislative candidates there will be matters

The 2020 Noblesville Comprehensive Plan establishes a vision and strategic framework for the city's future. The ultimate goal of this comprehensive plan is to promote and enhance the many unique assets in Noblesville and protect valuable

the city's tax base and offering a variety of housing options, thereby creating a stronger community.

"This update to the Comprehensive prehensive Master Plan, which was last Plan has been completed in two phases. Phase I sought to clean up the document by removing outdated/completed action items and incorporating additional planning initiatives that have transpired since the last update," Assistant Planning Director Caleb Gutshall said.

These planning initiatives included the Downtown Streetscape Master Plan, the Housing Study and Policy Guide, the SW Quad Revitalization Plan, and an updated Thoroughfare Plan. Phase I was completed earlier this year. Phase II began in the fall of 2019 and has focused on three main

natural features while also strengthening areas: A floodplain analysis, an update to land use categories and Future Land Use Map, and an overall plan for future growth.

"These three areas of focus are integral components that will help guide future growth and development during Noblesville's next chapter," Gutshall said. "Public input has occurred throughout each phase to help guide the conversations and identify areas of priority and we are seeking more community feedback at this time before the final version is adopted."

The comp plan was introduced to the Noblesville Common Council on Dec. 17 and will be before the plan commission on Jan. 21, 2020. The council will see the plan again on Jan. 28 before potential adoption on Feb. 11.

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

Noblesville Holiday Tournament Millers advance to semi-finals

Noblesville won a hard-fought firstround game at its own Holiday Tournament on Friday.

The Millers beat Crown Point 48-43 at The Mill to advance to today's semi-finals. Noblesville led by a solid margin starting in the second quarter, held off a final run by the Bulldogs late in the fourth period.

"We're not allowed to put people away, we got to keep it close," said Millers coach John Peckinpaugh. "We just got to learn how to keep our focus and not let up in certain spots in the game. We're getting there. It's going to take time for us to get to the spot we need to be at, but I think we're closer than people think right now."

Noblesville led 8-6 after the first quarter, with EJ Smith scoring six of the Millers' points. Crown Point tied the game with a basket, but Noblesville answered that with a 6-0 run. Brendon Fisher scored off a steal, Alex Hunt made a layin and Jordan Gadis scored from his own steal.

Gadis also hit a 3-pointer and made a putback in the second quarter, giving him seven points for the period. The Millers led 22-13 at halftime. Early in the third period, Fisher converted and and-1 opportunity to get Noblesville ahead 27-15.

A 3 from Fisher late in the third put the Millers up 36-24. Crown Point made a 7-0 run that lasted into the fourth quarter and cut Noblesville's lead to 36-31. The Bulldogs got within 43-40 with 1:13 left, but the Millers were able to hang on.

Fisher led the Noblesville scoring with 15 points. Gadis came close to a double-double, collecting nine rebounds to with his 13 points.

The Millers are 4-5 for the season. They will take on Columbus North in Saturday's second semi-final, which tips off at 12:45 p.m. The first semi-final starts at 11 a.m. and will be played between Blackhawk Christian and Northridge. Winners will play in the championship game at 7:45 p.m.

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
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

Nunn then drove and attempted a reverse layup along the baseline. That, too, missed, but once again the Pacers couldn't triple with 19.7 seconds remaining in the half breaking control the board.
