The Carmel Clay Public Library is getting ready for a major renovation project. The library will spend \$40 million for a new parking garage and more room spaces

and teen areas. Since the library was built in 1999, Carmel's population has doubled in size. The library's board of directors hopes the expansion allows the facility to serve more people. Library Director Bob Swanay said, "We

think that we are going to deliver a new version of the library that the Carmel residents are going to love." The directors anticipate construction will last anywhere from two to four years. In the meantime, the library's business hours will remain the same.

Jan. 8 filing date kicks off election year

There are probably very few folks who don't know that next year is a big election year, with offices from precinct committeeman to President of the United States at stake. And, the process starts Jan. 8 when filing for office begins here in Indiana.



In Hamilton County, voters will select from dozens of candidates who file for the all-important primary election to be held May 5. Besides president, the offices of congressman, governor, state legislators, judges, two county commissioners, and several other county offices will be up for election. Winners in the party primaries will, of course, compete in the November general election.

There are questions to be answered by the election:

Will Hamilton County help elect a new congressman or congresswoman who lives in our county? Both Republican and Democratic primaries are expected to feature several congressional candidates because the 5th District, in which Hamilton County is located, has an open seat with Rep. Susan Brooks' decision to retire.

Will Democrats win any local offices or will President Trump lead another statewide landslide like 2016 that carried many Republicans into office? Democrats won three city council seats locally in November. But, these wins came in relatively confined areas whereas next year's election will involve mostly races that are countywide.

And, what will the issues be in the coming election? Certainly for state legislative candidates there will be matters involving education, transportation and drug abuse. At the county level, issues are harder to predict, but matters dealing with the explosive local growth and development such as road building, zoning and recreation are possible.

With the first of the year, candidates can be expected to begin announcing their intentions to seek election or re-election. Most incumbent officeholders are expected to run for new terms.

With election year comes political events and many forms of electioneering. One of the first events of the new year will be the county Republican Lincoln Day Dinner, scheduled for March 19 in Carmel at the 502 East Event Center.

Other events will follow, and as the political season gets underway, readers can keep abreast of candidates, issues and other election information right here in the Hamilton County Reporter.

Public input sought on Noblesville Comprehensive Plan 2020 update

Over the past 16 months, the Noblesville Planning Department has been working with consultants and community partners to update the city's Comprehensive Master Plan, which was last updated in 2014. The City of Noblesville is nearing the end of this process and is seeking additional feedback from the public. The comp plan draft is available at cityofnoblesville.org/planning. To share your thoughts and feedback, please email compplan@noblesville.in.us. The 2020 Noblesville Comprehensive Plan establishes a vision and strategic framework for the city's future. The ultimate goal of this comprehensive plan is to promote and enhance the many unique assets in Noblesville and protect valuable

natural features while also strengthening the city's tax base and offering a variety of housing options, thereby creating a stronger community. "This update to the Comprehensive Plan has been completed in two phases. Phase I sought to clean up the document by removing outdated/completed action items and incorporating additional planning initiatives that have transpired since the last update," Assistant Planning Director Caleb Gutshall said. These planning initiatives included the Downtown Streetscape Master Plan, the Housing Study and Policy Guide, the SW Quad Revitalization Plan, and an updated Thoroughfare Plan. Phase I was completed earlier this year. Phase II began in the fall of 2019 and has focused on three main

areas: A floodplain analysis, an update to land use categories and Future Land Use Map, and an overall plan for future growth. "These three areas of focus are integral components that will help guide future growth and development during Noblesville's next chapter," Gutshall said. "Public input has occurred throughout each phase to help guide the conversations and identify areas of priority and we are seeking more community feedback at this time before the final version is adopted." The comp plan was introduced to the Noblesville Common Council on Dec. 17 and will be before the plan commission on Jan. 21, 2020. The council will see the plan again on Jan. 28 before potential adoption on Feb. 11.

In an interview with *The Palm Beacher Magazine*, Joella Cain described Parsi as “Refreshing, talented, nice, unjaded – all adjectives that best describe this unpretentious artist. Celebrate opening of 96th & Keystone interchange

The public is invited to join the City of Carmel for a celebration of the substantial completion of the 96th & Keystone interchange project at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, Dec. 30 at Tom Wood Ford, 3130 E. 96th St.

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard, city officials, contractors, business stakeholders and anyone from the public is invited to attend.

In 2016 the city of Carmel embarked on a \$28.7

million project to improve the safety and mobility at one of the worst rated intersections in Indiana, the 96th and Keystone signalized intersection, situated just north of Interstate 465. After years of planning, pre-construction and utility relocations began in 2018, the bulk of construction took place in 2019 with the goal of completion by the end of the year.

The city of Carmel will formally celebrate the sub-

stantial completion with a ribbon cutting ceremony for the newest roundabout interchange in the city. Some work will continue through the rest of the winter months, and when the weather is more advantageous, crews will return to finish certain weather dependent items such as the final layer of asphalt, permanent pavement markings, landscape features, and painting of the bridge structure.

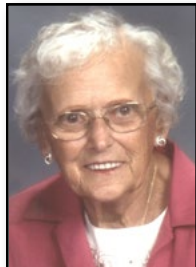

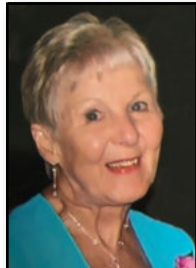

Last-second jumper sends Heat past Pacers

The Pacers put forth a valiant effort on Friday night in Miami, but it wasn't quite enough to do what only one team has done so far this season — beat the Heat on their home court.

Goran Dragic's jumper with 6.8 seconds left gave Miami (23-8) a 113-112 win over Indiana (21-11). The Heat are now 14-1 at home this season, the best home record in the NBA. Their only home loss came against the Lakers on Dec. 13.

The Pacers led 108-104 with three minutes remaining, but the Heat quickly rallied. Jimmy Butler dished to Duncan Robinson for a 3-pointer to cut the deficit to one, then put Miami in front with 2:21 remaining.

On the other end, Butler fouled T.J. Warren, who hit two free throws to briefly give the Pacers the lead at 2:03. Butler then drove and dished to Bam Adebayo for the go-ahead layup with 1:47 remaining.

Neither team scored for the next minute, until Jeremy Lamb knifed through the defense and hit a one-handed runner to give the Pacers a 112-111 lead with 30.8 seconds remaining.

Out of a timeout, the Heat put the ball in Butler's hands. He drove past his defender, but Myles Turner rotated over to contest his shot at the rim, causing Butler to miss off the front iron.

The rebound, however, was batted back out to the right wing, where Butler recovered. Miami swung the ball to Kendrick Nunn in the left corner. Nunn then drove and attempted a reverse layup along the baseline. That, too, missed, but once again the Pacers couldn't control the board.

The ball was batted twice before ending up in the hands of Adebayo on the left block. Adebayo kicked the ball back out to Dragic at the top of the key. Dragic then drove into the paint and converted the eventual game-winner.

The Pacers had a good look to win at the buzzer, as Aaron Holiday beat his man into the paint, but missed a left-handed floater.

Holiday, starting his second straight game at point guard in place of the injured Malcolm Brogdon (sore left hamstring), led the Blue & Gold with 17 points and nine assists in the loss. Six other Pacers finished in double figures, including Lamb and Warren, who had 16 points apiece.

Lamb got the Pacers' offense going early on Friday night, scoring Indiana's first eight points to keep them within striking distance.

The two teams traded the lead five times in the opening frame, but it was the Pacers who took a narrow 27-25 advantage into the second quarter, thanks in part to hitting 4-of-7 attempts from 3-point range.

The Pacers' second unit quickly extended the lead in the second quarter, opening the frame with a 7-0 run that featured a 3-pointer from Justin Holiday, a layup from Edmond Sumner, and a jumper from Doug McDermott.

The Heat eventually mounted a charge of their own, connecting on three 3-pointers during a 13-2 run midway through the second quarter to move back in front.

Indiana answered with a 9-2 run of its own, retaking the lead on McDermott's 3-pointer with 2:26 left in the half. But Miami made one last surge, with Robinson's triple with 19.7 seconds remaining in the half breaking a 55-55 tie.

After scoring just two points in the first half, Warren came alive in the third quarter, tallying 12 points in the frame.

Miami maintained a narrow advantage for most of the third quarter, but never led by more than six. Indiana tied the game twice and took a brief one-point lead after Turner's layup at 1:49, but the Heat took an 84-82 lead into the fourth quarter.

The Heat opened the fourth quarter with seven unanswered points to quickly stretch their lead to nine. But McDermott answered, hitting 3-pointers on back-to-back possessions to put the Pacers back within striking distance.

The Blue & Gold eventually surged ahead with a 9-0 run of their own, taking a 103-102 lead on Aaron Holiday's jumper with 5:03 remaining and extending it to four on Turner's 3-pointer 42 seconds later.

McDermott finished with 14 points off the bench, going 4-for-7 from 3-point range. Turner added 13 points and six rebounds, while Justin Holiday and Edmond Sumner each had 11 points in the loss.

Butler led all scorers with 20 points, going just 3-for-11 from the field, but 14-for-15 from the free throw line. The four-time All-Star also tallied nine rebounds and six assists.

Adebayo added 18 points, 15 rebounds, and six assists for Miami. Robinson also scored 18, going 6-for-10 from 3-point range. Nunn added 17 points, while Dragic had 14 points and six assists off the bench.

The Pacers will be back in action very soon. Indiana will fly to New Orleans on Friday night and take on Jrue Holiday and the Pelicans on Saturday at 7 p.m. They return to Indiana to host Philadelphia on New Year's Eve.
