Over the past 16 months, the No-
blesville Planning Department has been working with consultants and community partners to update the city's Comprehensive Master Plan, which was last updated in 2014. The City of Noblesville seeking additional feedback from the public. The comp plan draft is available at cityofnoblesville.org/planning. The 2020 Noblesville Comprehensive Plan establishes a vision and strategic framework for the city's future. The ultimate goal of this comprehensive plan is
to promote and enhance the many unique
natural features while also strengthening areas: A floodplain analysis, an update the city's tax base and offering a variety of to land use categories and Future Land housing options, thereby creating a stronger community.
Plan has update to the Comprehensive Plan has been completed in two phases. Phase I sought to clean up the document
by removing outdated/completed action items and incorporating additional plan ning initiatives that have transpired since the last update," Assistant Planning Direcor Caleb Gutshall said.
These planning initiatives included the Downtown Streetscape Master Plan, the Housing Study and Policy Guide, the SW Quad Revitalization Plan, and an updated ed earlier this year. Phase II began in the fall of 2019 and has focused on three main Use Map, and an overall plan for future growth.
"These "These three areas of focus are integral components that will help guide future
growth and development during Nobles growth and development during Nobles-
ville's next chapter," Gutshall said. "Public input has occurred throughout each phase to help guide the conversations and identify areas of priority and we are seeking more community feedback at this time before the final version is adopted."
