Victoria Spartz suspends State Senate campaign to explore run for Congress

State Sen. Victoria Spartz (R-Noblesville) is suspending her race for re-election to the Indiana State Senate to explore her run for Congress.

In a media release Spartz said: "As I took a deeper dive in the last few months into a number of issues affecting our state, like education, health-care, welfare and business deregulation, I realized that the control of the states by the federal government is way more significant than I could ever anticipate.

"Our federal government is broken and dysfunctional with uncontrolled spending and ever-increasing socialistic trends. "As someone who grew up in socialism, I saw what happens to socialism when it runs out of money, fixed finances of large corporations and started my own businesses, as well as worked in the weeds of the legislative process, I can be a great asset to the people of our state and 5th District in

McKinney elected 2020 president of County Council

Rick McKinney has been elected president of the Hamilton County Council. He replaces Brad Beaver in the role. Amy Massillamany will serve as Vice President. Election of officers is an annual practice at the first meeting of each year. McKinney was elected to the Hamilton County Council in 1996. He is an at-large member who also served as council president in 2001, 2008 and 2014. McKinney owns Clearview Professional Window Cleaning. He was appointed to Carmel's Board of Public Works and Safety by then-Mayor Ted Johnson in 1992. Four years later, he secured his current spot on the County Council. Since then, McKinney has been instrumental in maintaining a low tax rate, opening council meetings up for public comment and being available for public viewing on the Internet, and funding parks, public safety and infrastructure. McKinney and his wife Cheryl currently reside in Westfield.

Rezoning for new development at old 96th Street Marsh moving forward

The Fishers Plan Commission unanimously voted a favorable recommendation for a rezoning at 96th Street and Lantern Road, a former Marsh location. The rezoning now goes to the Fishers City Council for final approval.

Strongbox Commercial is planning to add parking and create a Vasa Fitness Center. There are also plans to construct a strip mall, but no tenants have been lined up at this time. Only one resident commented at the public hearing asking what sorts of businesses will occupy the retail space. City Planning Director Tony Bagato responded that the usual types of tenants are likely, such as small restaurant locations. The rezoning is needed because the Fishers City Council enacted a commercial overlay to ensure any development at former Marsh locations will be evaluated by city officials. The city is waiving the normal fees in this project because Strongbox is cooperating with the city on technology to record vehicle license plates to assist law enforcement.

Schaibley's bill allowing Hamilton County an additional magistrate moves forward

The House Courts and Criminal Code Committee has approved State Rep. Donna Schaibley's (R-Carmel) legislation opening up the opportunity for Hamilton County judges to appoint an additional magistrate. "It is amazing to see how much our county has grown over the past several years, but with an increasing population also comes a heavier workload for our judicial officers," Schai-

bley said. "The committee's vote is an encouraging step in the process to ensure Hamilton County has the resources it needs." According to Schaibley, the new magistrate would work with local circuit and superior courts to handle minor offenses or hold preliminary hearings for more serious crimes. She said the most recent data from The Weighted Caseload Measure shows the county has one

judicial officer for every 29,432 people. County judges, commissioners, county councilors and the county prosecuting attorney support the legislation. House Bill 1038 now moves to the House floor for further discussion. State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) represents House District 24, which includes portions of Boone and Hamilton counties.

AG Curtis Hill: Landlords cannot be held responsible for tenants' municipal utility bills

Landlords cannot be held responsible for tenants' municipal utility bills, Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill said in an **advisory opinion** issued Thursday.

"If a tenant is responsible for payment of utilities under a lease, the municipal utility cannot hold the landlord responsible for payment unless the landlord is a party to the service agreement," Hill said. "The utility cannot deny service to subsequent occupants of the property, and unpaid utility bills do not constitute a lien on the property."

Further, Hill said, a municipal utility that requires a property owner to sign for an account with a tenant so that the landlord is responsible for the tenant's delinquent bills is acting in a manner contrary to the purpose of the statute. In fact, imposing such a requirement may exceed the utility's authority under Indiana's Home Rule Act.

The Office of the Attorney General issued the opinion in response to an inquiry from state Rep. Woody Burton of Greenwood. He sought guidance on issues related to recently-enacted legislation designed to clarify the responsibility for payment for services provided by municipally owned utilities to rental properties.

Rick McKinney running for re-election to County Council

County Council at-large member Rick McKinney announced Wednesday that he would seek re-election in the May primary election. Below is a press release sent by McKinney to local media.

"I am writing to give you notice of my filing for re-election to the Hamilton County Council in the May 5, 2020 Republican Primary.

"I have supported and will continue to support necessary funding for PPP: Pavement (roads/bridges), Parks (quality of life) and Public safety (Sheriff, jail, emergency communications, courts, probation, prosecutor and community corrections). Projects started or completed since 2016: Westward expansion of 146th Street, Lowes Way ramp from 146th Street to Keystone, State Road 37 redesign, 96th Street and Keystone bridge, solar power project for the jail complex, expanded jail and Koteewi Park amenities.

"I have both the experience and independence needed to separate "needs" from "wants," which will become even more critical as county revenues stagnate or decline as state funding formulas change and expenses increase with more demand for government services. I have voted against projects that were bad ideas or a waste of taxpayers' money and will continue to do the same if re-elected.

"I believe I should be re-elected because I am the one official who, to his word, has kept all promises made in all my campaigns. Dye, who lived in Carmel, was world-renowned for his golf course designs, which include Crooked Stick Golf Club in Carmel, Brickyard Crossing at Indianapolis Motor Speedway and TPC Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida.
In Indiana, he also designed or helped design these sites: The Bridgewater Club in Westfield, The Club at Chatham Hills

in Westfield, Dye’s Walk Country Club in Greenwood, Eagle Creek Golf Club in Indianapolis, Forest Park in Brazil, The Fort Golf Course at Fort Harrison State Park, Greenbelt Golf Course in Columbus, Harbour Trees Golf Club in Noblesville, The Camferdam Golf Experience at the Children’s Museum of Indianapolis, Maple Creek Country Club in Indianapolis, Oak Tree Golf Course in Plainfield, The Pete Dye Course in French Lick, Plum Creek Golf Club in Carmel, Sahn Golf Course in Indianapolis and Woodland Country Club in Carmel.
Dye was married to former amateur champion Alice Dye. A course designer, too, she was called the “first lady” of U.S. golf architecture. An Indianapolis native, she died Feb. 1.
