Noblesville Schools invites the public to attend a public meeting regarding the district's new solar energy project.

The meetings will occur at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 21 at White River Elementary, 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 22 at Promise Road Elementary and at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 28 at West Middle School.

In September, Noblesville Schools announced it was seeking a solar solution to significantly cut energy costs and support the environment, which also is expected to generate hundreds of thousands of dollars in savings a year.

With two million square feet under roof, 550 acres and more than 10,000 students to serve, energy is one of the district's largest costs after teachers and support staff. Almost \$1.5 million dollars a year are spent on energy expenses for lighting, heating and air, technology tools and more.

Hill said that Whole Woman's Health's contention that Indiana law creates undue burdens on the right to an abortion is based on unfounded speculation rather than the actual effects of Indiana's regulations. Whole Woman's Health, he noted, has even conceded that it failed to show that Indiana's laws have prevented Hoosier women from accessing abortion.

"If accepted, these arguments would throw abortion jurisprudence into chaos," Hill said.




