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Carmel Clay Parks set to spend \$20 million in playground renovations

Carmel Clay Parks and Recreation (CCPR) has issued a \$20 million bond to renovate all its playgrounds in the area.

The organization released data of the average daily traffic in 2019. The numbers are based on counters placed in strategic locations throughout each park: Flowing Well Park, 515,072; Lawrence W. Inlow Park, 437,795; West Park, 392,901; Carey Grove Park, 95,632; and River Heritage Park, 26,071.

Renovations are a result of the Clay Township impact program. According to Carmel Clay Parks, one of the primary initiatives of this program is to update and enhance the existing parks by making them more

accessible, safer and available year-round.

In spring 2019, Clay Township launched its Impact Program to improve the community with a focus on parks and public safety. The impact on the parks system includes a \$20 million investment in enhancing and reimagining CCPR's existing parks, playgrounds, greenways and facilities.

Clay Township Trustee Michael Klitzing. "Through open communication with our elected and city officials, and

stating, "Working with Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation on this project has been a very exciting process. We know that the funds we're putting back into the parks through our Impact Program will positively impact the community for years to come."

"We're approaching a window of time when we need to make reinvestments in our parks," said CCPR Director Douglas Callahan. "Through open communication with our elected and city officials, and

keeping everyone involved with planning, we're able to share our vision and how to best use resources to invest in the parks, and ensure they stay at the level our community expects and deserves."

Six parks will be impacted through the Clay Township Impact Program investment. Updates include added restroom facilities, as well as improved access to the White River, erosion control, playground and splash pad updates.

The projected budget for this park's upgrades is \$1.9 million. Upgrades are set to include bank stabilization, restrooms, a parking lot and trails.

Fishers approves funding privacy costs for homes along Nickel Plate Trail

Homeowners with property touching the Nickel Plate Trail will be eligible to apply for a grant program of up to \$2,000, defraying the cost of installing screening, privacy, or buffering improvements.

If a homeowner's property frontage along the trail exceeds 300 feet, the owner may be eligible for

an additional \$500 grant. The Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety voted Monday in favor of the program that is aimed at funding improvements such as planting trees and shrubs, constructing fencing and other improvements as reviewed and approved by city staff.

Funds from the Nickel Plate Trail bond will fund the program and is budgeted to cost the city \$181,000. The city will establish an application process; for more information, visit bit.ly/2toCNR2.

Noblesville Council awards 'Stake in the Ground' to City Controller Jeff Spalding

The Noblesville Common Council recognized Jeffrey Spalding, chief financial officer and controller, as the 2019 Stake in the Ground honoree at its meeting last Tuesday night.

The "Stake in the Ground" Award is designed to recognize city employees – typically at the director level – who go above and beyond their job by "putting a stake in the ground" to be the best city employee and have a significant impact in serving constituents. Each councilor makes a nomination and then all members vote on the award.

Spalding began working as the city controller in February 2017. The Office of Finance and Accounting

manages the city's finances and oversees the budget process. A guiding theme Spalding brought to OFA is to "right size and realign" the overall structure of City budget to best use taxpayer dollars wisely and allocate finances logically and clearly.

"I was very surprised and it is much appreciated," Spalding said upon winning the award. "I enjoy the work I do here and it is nice to be acknowledged and recognized when you are working to do the right thing."

Noblesville Schools to install vaping detectors

The Noblesville school district is looking to curb the use of teen vaping by putting new technology in three of its buildings.

Vape detection sensors will be installed at Noblesville High School and at Noblesville East and Noblesville West middle schools. School officials hope the addition will help reverse a growing trend among teens.

Noblesville Schools released a statement saying in part, "These will be an important deterrent as the sensors will assist administrators in quickly addressing student vaping. ... We work with our Noblesville Police Department school resource officers to address vaping, and the dangers of vaping are covered with students in health classes."

District officials say vaping has become such an issue that the district recently implemented a new remediation program at Noblesville High School. Any student who is caught vaping must attend a mandatory Saturday vape counseling class.

The sensors are one of the many safety initiatives being paid for through the November 2018 referendum that provided funding for safety, mental health and staff compensation.

Wellbeing Coalition of Westfield launches wellbeing index survey

Last Thursday, the Wellbeing Coalition of Westfield launched the first-ever Westfield Wellbeing Index Survey. The announcement was made at the State of the City luncheon in Westfield.

"Having an independent-from-government group come in and take this on is wonderful," said Mayor Andy Cook. "This is a grass roots effort not a government initiative and our community has stepped up!"

"This survey will give us the data to really step back and see what we, as a community, can do to help our residents of all ages live better lives," said Kyle Miller, Coalition volunteer and Project Lead. "The critical next step is getting our citizens to take 10 minutes and give us their honest feedback."

The Index will provide an in-depth look at the overall wellbeing of Westfield residents by exploring how people view their lives and daily experiences. Wellbeing is a term used to describe the extent to which individuals lead happy, healthy and productive lives in five interconnected areas: Physical, social, emotional, spiritual and mental. Having



a baseline understanding of how people are doing in these areas will help identify areas of strength as a community, and at the same time, highlight areas for improvement so all Westfield residents have the opportunity to thrive.

All responses on the survey will be completely confidential and no personally identifiable information will be collected.

The survey will take about 10 minutes to complete and is open to any Westfield Washington Township resident ages 18 and older. It can be taken now through March 1. The Wellbeing Coalition, in partnership with IUPUI's School of Public Health, will analyze the data to show areas of strength and challenges in the overall wellbeing of Westfield residents. The results will help guide the Coalition as it works to build on Westfield's strengths and address its challenges. The tool was modeled after the work completed in Santa Monica, Calif.

Noblesville façade improvement grant program now accepting applications

Applications are currently being accepted for the City of Noblesville Façade Improvement Grant Program. Since 2008, the Façade Improvement Grant Program has stimulated investment of more than \$2.1 million through public and private investment in building façades

and the program continues to gain momentum each year.

The Façade Grant Improvement Program boundaries expanded in 2019. The program was previously limited to the Central Business District but now all historic, commercial properties in Noblesville are eligible to apply. The Façade Improve-

ment Grant Program is designed to stimulate business investment, maintain and expand economic contribution, promote architectural appreciation and initiate aesthetic improvements to historic properties within the incorporated city limits of Noblesville.

The city offers three

types of grants through the program: A small projects grant, which awards a 50 percent reimbursement of up to \$2,500; a substantial façade improvement grant, which awards a 50 percent reimbursement of up to \$25,000; and an architectural design

In the late 19th century, Noblesville was the largest city in Hamilton County. The Firestone plant and Forest Park were not yet built. The high school was downtown in Seminary Park and there was no hospital. Several railroads ran through town. The city limits barely stretched a few blocks outside of the courthouse square. It was a different time. For the next Noblestories, local author and REALTOR Kurt Meyer takes a close look at life in 1890s Noblesville with words and pictures from that era.

Noblestories is a program of the Noblesville Preservation Alliance that gives today’s residents a glimpse into Noblesville’s past. NPA is partnering with Hamilton County Television to present and preserve these memories to help inform and enrich the lives of current and future residents. The event is streamed live on Hamilton County TV and available for viewing afterward at noblesvillepreservation.com.

This is the fourth in the series, which also presented memories of high school in the 1960s, the Firestone plant and a promotional film of the city made back in the 1930s.

The next Noblestories program will take place at 4 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 26 at Preservation Hall, 1274 Logan St. The Noblesville Preservation Alliance recently purchased the former Logan Street Sanctuary and is committed to scheduling community-oriented programming. The hall is also available to the public for rent.

Noblestories is free and open to the public, which is encouraged to participate with questions and commentary.

No start time “flip” likely next HSE school year

The Hamilton Southeastern School board heard from Superintendent Allen Bourff last Wednesday on proposals to “flip” school start times, but Bourff told the board it is not likely such a proposal would be implemented during the 2020-21 school year.

Board members reviewed results of an online survey that garnered 1,840 comments. A total of 58 percent of those responding

clearly were opposed to flipping start times so high school and secondary school students would report for classes later and elementary students would start the school day earlier. A total of 42 percent clearly favored the proposed change. Bourff told the board there were some responses that made general comments but did not clearly state a preference for either choice. The Hamilton Southeastern Education Association will be consulted on the start

time flip issue, and Bourff expects a recommendation to be ready for the board in two to four weeks.

An item that could impact start times next school year is a proposal to implement a three-tier bus scheduling system. Superintendent Bourff and Director of Transportation Zach McKinney outlined several three-tier options for the board’s consideration. The board took no action. assistance grant, which gives of up to \$500 and helps pay a 100 percent reimbursement for the cost of professional

design services for improving a building’s exterior. The program is open to building and business owners who have commercial activity as their primary purpose. A multitude of façade improvements are eligible for funding.

While the boundary has been expanded, preference will be given to applicants that have property within the Central Business District. If funding allows after the March 31 application deadline, a second round of grants may be available later in the year.

All completed applications will be reviewed by a five-member Façade Grant Review Committee before being approved for funding

by the City of Noblesville Board of Works. Applicants will be notified within 30 days of the application period closing. This program highlights a key pillar of the Jensen administration focused on preserving and enhancing Noblesville’s historic downtown.
